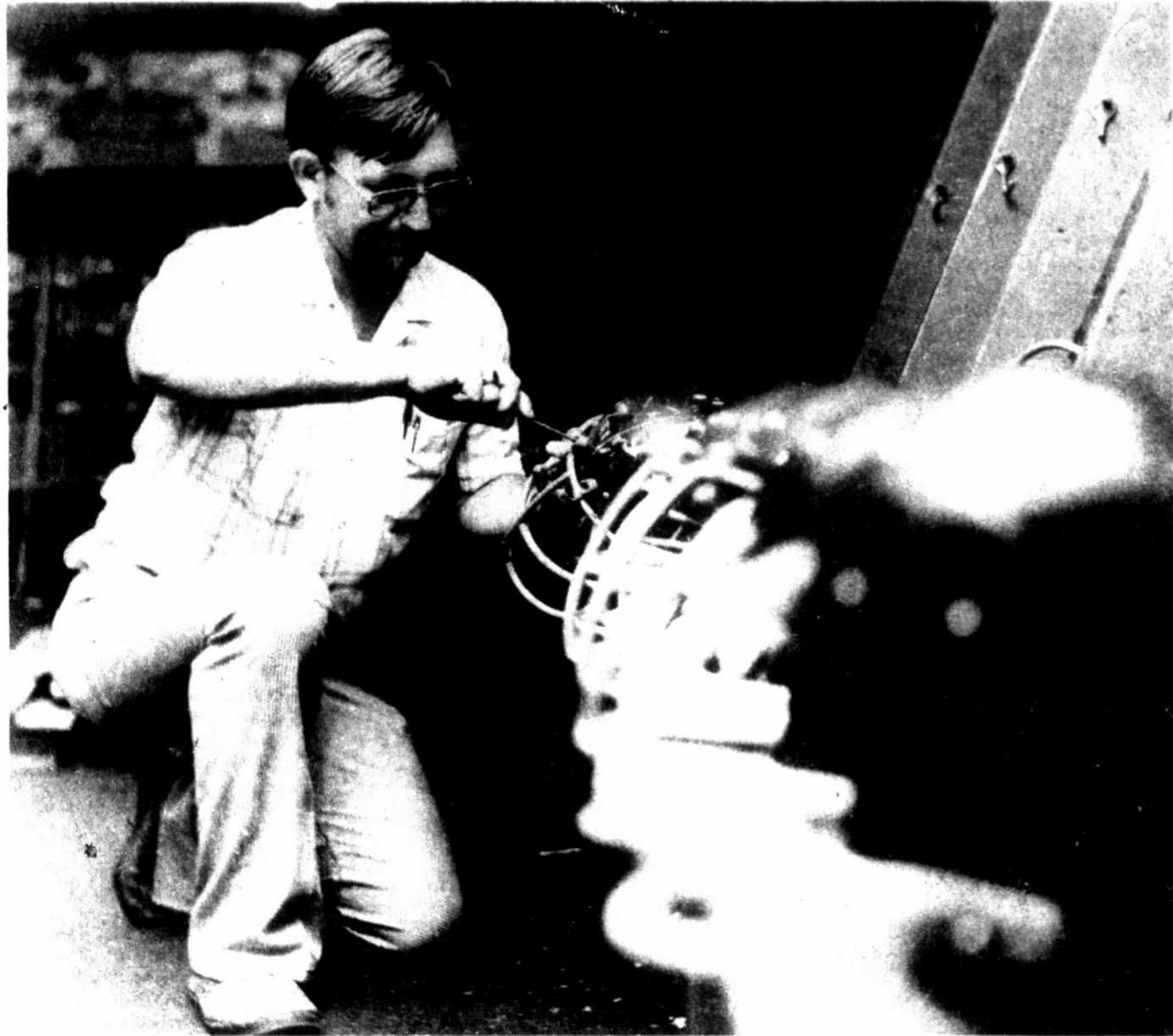

Clarendon football begins in earnest Monday, Aug. 9, as two-a-day workouts begin for high school athletes.

First workout of the 1976 Football season will begin at 8 a.m. Monday morning. Head Coach Jerry Wilson said he expects approximately 70 boys to turn out for Varsity and Junior Varsity play.

The team will not work out in pads until Friday, Aug. 13. Wilson said the workout schedule will vary according to how well returning Bronchos are in shape.

He said players should come to the field house to pick up their football shoes before Monday morning. The

coaching staff has been at the field house this week getting equipment ready for the upcoming season.

The Bronchos have 10 Varsity Lettermen returning this year. The loss of 15 Seniors from the 1975 team have left some gaps in his starting line up, Coach Wilson said. A crucial position to fill this year is Quarterback for the returning Bronchos. Offensive linemen positions are also up for grabs, he said, with only one lineman returning from last year's team.

The Bronchos will have their first test Aug. 19 when the Varsity and Junior Varsity teams scrimmage

Sanford-Fritch at Clarendon. Game time for the scrimmage has not been set.

The Broncho "A" Team will scrimmage Groom there Aug. 26. The "B" Team will accom-

pany them to Groom to play the Higgins Varsity squad.

First regularly scheduled game for Clarendon is a daughter of McClean Sept. 3, there.

CORN NEW COUNTY CROP

 "Corn is going to be the most important cash crop for me if the future is as good as it looks right now," says Bernie Green Donley County farmer.

The Green brothers and their father Horace, like a growing number of area farmers, are turning to this old crop with a new future for a number of reasons.

Ronnie McAnear of Clarendon, who expanded his acreage from twenty-five acres to seventy five this year, credits corn's hardiness in tough weather conditions as a big reason for the switch to corn rather than expanding cotton acreage.

McAnear said his field was subjected to three hail storms and two sand storms, coming back each time. McAnear's cotton in an adjoining field had to be replanted three times to make a stand.

Donley County corn growers have the advantage of planting a new crop on new ground with less chance of serious buildup of damaging insect and weed problems.

ASCS Director, Jerry Gage said he had not seen any serious infestations of the southwestern cornborer, ear worms and corn borers usually associated with areas that have been in corn production from two to five years.

Don Robinson, who's corn acreage north of Clarendon is planted in tight soil, is happy with the condition of his twenty-five acres of corn. It's the first he's grown and he believes it is a crop local farmers should definitely consider.

Lake McAnear, Robinson is impressed with corn's ability to withstand hard weather early in the growing season.

Broncho to play in bowl

Anthony Knowles, offensive tackle for the 1975 Clarendon High School Bronchos, will play in the 27th annual Greenbelt Bowl Football Classic Friday, Aug. 6 at 8 p.m. in Childress.

Knowles, a 1976 graduate of CHS, will be accompanied by Vicki Skaggs of Hedley, who was selected by Knowles as his nominee for Queen of the yearly football event.

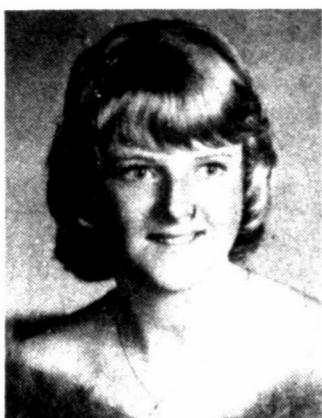
Each year, players from Texas and surrounding states are nominated by their high school coaches to play in the grid contest. Forty-four players comprise East and West teams.

Knowles will play for the West team, coached by Eastern New Mexico football coaches Jack Scott and Fred Bleil. The West team will be headed by coaches from Angelo State University and Jim Hess and Mike Martin.

Each player nominates his own candidate for Queen of the game. The Queen candidates will accompany the players to a picnic at Fair Park in Childress Thursday, Aug. 5. All Queen candidates also ride in the Bowl Parade Friday afternoon.

Three judges will select the Queen according to poise and personality. The winner will be announced at half-time of Friday's game.

A Greenbelt Bowl Selection Committee chooses the nominated players to compete in the event from approximately 140 sent-out applications. Knowles left to begin work-outs for the contest Sunday, Aug. 1.

School building fix-up

Auto theft charge here

A Clarendon youth was arrested and charged with unauthorized use of a motor vehicle Wednesday, July 28 in Clarendon.

He was arraigned Wednesday and placed in the Donley County Jail under \$2,000 bond. A pick-up owned by Mack J. Stavenhagen was reported missing to the Donley County Sheriff's Dept. early

Wednesday morning.

Descriptions of the vehicle were given to the Sheriff's Department and Clarendon Police Wednesday night. The pick-up was later spotted a few blocks from the Stavenhagen home being driven by the youth currently under arrest. City Policeman Steve Rogers and Donley County Deputy Eddie Hammons made the arrest.

Booster Club raised \$2,500 for the project with an added \$1,500 contributed from the CHS Athletic Fund.

Other repair to school buildings completed this summer includes refinishing the gymnasium floor, stripping and re-waxing classroom floors and hallways; and rebuilding a dishwasher in the school's cafeteria.

Tops of many school desks also had to be sanded as well as repainting trim on outside windows and having the school's boiler system cleaned and inspected.

But Robinson urges some caution. "I don't think farmers here understand how much money is involved in growing corn," he said. Robinson kept fairly close records of his production costs to date and figures he may have spent \$150 per acre.

"I'd consider one hundred bushels per acre the break even point. By the time the custom combine pulls into my corn I will have gone over the ground ten times from breaking to last cultivation.

We put down three hundred pounds of 18-12-5 liquid pre-plant and later sidedressed two hundred pounds of 28-0-0 per acre. Planting 28,000 seeds per acre to get a stand of around 24,000 I suppose we spent between fourteen and fifteen dollars an acre for seed," Robinson said.

For many new corn growers the decision to expand acreage will depend on two important related factors, labor and water.

McAnear said he may have planted too much corn this year even though he likes the crop's progress. Getting enough water to the thirsty acres is a problem with the size well he has to use and the need to use the same equipment on nearby cotton acres.

Those still using row-irrigation know corn still takes much hand labor. Because of this, several area farmers have installed center-pivot irrigation systems. Usually associated with the flatlands on top of the caprock, center-pivot systems may prove the solution, although an expensive one, to the problem of getting maximum production from sandy soils.

Bill Mooring's system, the Green Brothers center-pivot system show these big rigs can work well in the sandy, rolling cropland of Donley County.

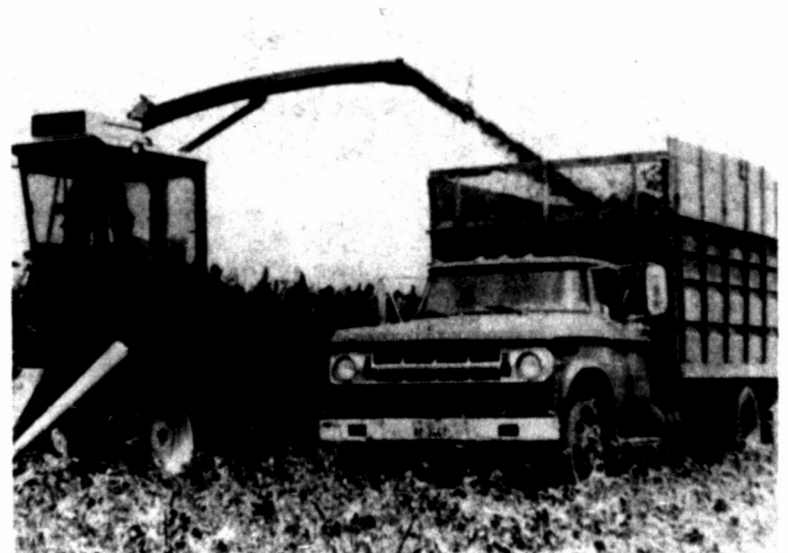

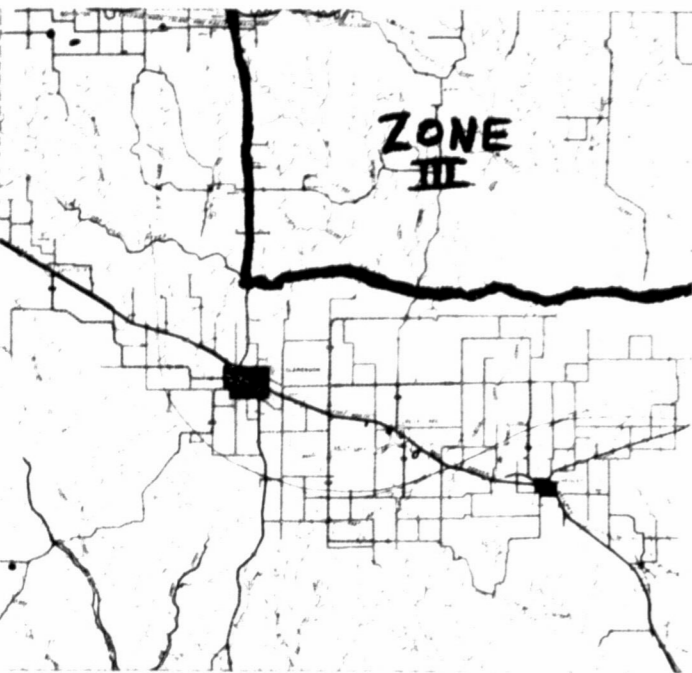

District vote Aug. 14

The Donley County Soil and Water Conservation District will hold an election for the director of Zone III on Saturday, August 14, at 8 p.m. in the Soil Conservation Service Office in Clarendon.

Boundaries of Zone III are the Salt Fork Red River (southern boundary), Highway 70 (western) and the eastern and

northern boundaries are those of Donley County. To be eligible to vote, one must own land in this zone. Spouses of land owners are also eligible. To hold office, one must own land in the zone and live in Donley County.

Homer Hardin is presently serving the district as Zone III director.

Home Freezing Hints Offered To Consumer

A meal on a moment's notice; fresh corn in December; deer from last fall's hunt — all compliments of the home freezer.

Freezing is one of the simplest, most popular methods of preserving foods at home. It retains the natural color, flavor, texture and food value of most fruits and vegetables, meats and baked goods.

The quality of the food frozen can vary with freshness of product used, methods of preparation, packaging and conditions of freezing. For successful freezing, select good-quality products. Freezing will not improve low grade food.

Frozen meat, poultry, fish and eggs equal the fresh products in nutritive value. Retaining this value of fruits and vegetables depends largely on the treatment before freezing, storage temperature and method of cooking and serving. Handling the food promptly also retains quality.

Improper packaging can cause undesirable flavor and appearance. The selection of containers depends on the type of food and personal preference. All materials should be moisture-vapor proof to prevent evaporation and retain the highest quality in frozen foods. Glass, metal, rigid plastics, freezer wrapping materials, waxed cartons and most bags are recommended because they are moisture-vapor proof or at least resistant.

All packages should be airtight. Freezer burn, a surface discoloration on meat and poultry, often results when meat or poultry dry due to improper packaging.

Freeze fruits and vegetables at 0 degrees F. or below.

Meat should be frozen in a commercial plant at 5 to 20 degrees for best results. Space packages of unfrozen food at least one inch apart since heat must be given off in order for them to freeze. Put no more unfrozen food into a freezer than will freeze within 24 hours.

For quickest freezing, place packages against freezing plates or coils. Storage temperature matters. For example, many foods noticeably lose quality and vitamin content when stored at about 25 degrees F. in an "open-at-one-end" household refrigerator freezer. Frozen foods undergo slow changes in storage and will not retain quality indefinitely.

Freezing does not sterilize the product, but the low temperature prevents the growth of harmful yeasts, molds and bacteria. Some micro-organisms are killed by freezing but many survive.

Land owners in program

A federal law that has brought about a more stable agriculture, more dependable income, and an improved quality of the environment in the Great Plains is 20 years old this month.

The Great Plains Conservation Act was signed into law by President Dwight D. Eisenhower on Aug. 7, 1956. Under terms of the legislation since that time, more than 50,000 farmers and ranchers in 10 states have entered into long-term conservation contracts with the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

In Donley County there have been a total of 229 Great Plains contracts developed on 306,627 acres of


