

#### Library has new books

The Gabie Betts Burton Memorial Library announces the receipt of four books, a gift of the Amon Carter Museum of Western Art and the Texas Commission on the Arts & Humanities (TCAH). The four-volume set of books

-- containing three with Bicentennial titles and one relating directly to Texas artistic heritage -- will be distributed to 375 public and regional libraries throughout the state.

"We hope," stated Maurice Coats, executive director of TCAH, "that the books will be circulated among the students and young people who visit the libraries.

Mitchell Wilder, director of the Amon Carter Museum, writes in the acknowledgement of this book: "Anyone could, and did, design a flag of his own choosing. The story of this metamorphosis of design is a fascinating revelation in the light of today's adherence to codes and practices involving use of and respect due to the



#### Artist paints American West

Justin Wells of Amarillo, likes to do one thing - draw orses. More specifically, he sketches and paints the people, animals and landscapes ociated with the horse culture of the American West.

Wells is interested in all periods of the American frontier. He likes to paint trail herds of longhorns and the American Indian. Wells is interested in all periods of the American frontier. He has illustrated stories about everything from Commanches to camels, Paiutes to preachers and bandits to brush-

Although this is a fascinating field for an artist to explore, Wells is even more interested in the Western Culture as it exists in America today. "Cattle people are still a unique class of human being," says the artist. "They are distinctly recognizable apart from any other group of men who make their living outdoors.

It seems that the idea of making one's living horseback has always been attractive in a romantic way. Although the reality of such a life has as much sweat and cruelty as any other occupantion, it's rewards offer a man some very special satisfactions.

It is this type of man and the culture that surrounds him that Wells is trying to capture on paper and canvas. He ought to know what he is talking about because he comes from this culture and is still very much in the middle of it. "All my pictures are of things I have seen and done or would like to have seen and done."

Always an admirer of good horses Wells raises and trains registered Quarter Horses. Next to painting a picture of a good colt he would rather train one, and indeed one helps the other. Knowing how a horse operates by personal experience rather than by observation above enables the artist's imagination to communicate the reality of a scene much more effec-

This is the basis of Wells' philosophy of art — one should paint what he knows and has experienced - and Justin Wells certainly knows and has experienced what he paints — The American

Justin Wells was born in Elk City, Oklahoma in 1941. He lived in Texas and Calif-


