

Clarendon Bronchos win opener against McLean

Clarendon's offensive backs literally took the ball and ran with it Friday night, Sept. 3, as the Broncho's outdistanced the McLean Tigers handily with the final score 29-0.

Running Back John Hall lead Clarendon rushers with 98 yards on nine carries and two touchdowns. Following close behind was Barry Schafer with 96 yards for 12 carries; and Howard Weatherton with 86 yards for 14 carries. Both also scored one touchdown.

On defense, Head Coach Jerry Wilson singled out nose guard Ricky Gerner for his tough, play-stopping performance. Gerner made several tackles in McLean's backfield along with pummeling the McLean center. "Gerner put so much pressure on their backfield they couldn't execute their plays well," Wilson said.

For Friday's effort, Gerner was awarded the weekly "Headhunter" defensive award by the Broncho coaching staff. Broncho Mike Newhouse received the Headhunter "big hit" award for a bruising tackle he made on Tiger Quarterback Sammy Haynes.

For offensive play, guard

Paul Hermesmeier and center John Tucker were given special recognition along with all the Broncho backs.

Wilson said one observer of Friday's game film said Clarendon's backs look like they scored most of the game's points by themselves. Wilson echoed this thought. "We were pretty pleased with our performance Friday until we got the film back," he said. "Then we began to see a lot of little mistakes we were making. If it hadn't been for these mistakes, I think we could have beat them 60 points."

Wilson continued, "Our offensive line did make some holes, but sometimes our backs just did it themselves."

Each Broncho runner is awarded a star for each touchdown scored. At Friday's game, John Hall earned two with Quarterback Howard Weatherton and Barry Schafer splitting one each.

The entire Broncho team saw action Friday with the second teamers finishing the last seven minutes of play.

In all, Clarendon started 20 men. Only two Bronchos played both offense and defense, John Hall and Barry Schafer.

Play began with the Bronchos scoring on their first series of downs. After receiving the opening kick-off, the Broncho's knocked off seven plays before back John Hall took it in for the TD. Hall also ran for the two extra points.

Coach Wilson said running for the extra points was a decision he made on the field. "I just felt we could run against them for the two points, so that's what we did."

The McLean Tigers seemed ready to tie up the game as they came back strong on their first series. They moved the ball from their own 25 yard line to the Broncho seven. The Broncho defense toughened up, however, and pushed the Tigers back to the 28 yard line where Clarendon took over on downs.

Clarendon's second score was a little longer coming than the first. A fumble by Barry Schafer on the 50 yard line ended the next drive. The Tiger's were forced to punt, however, four plays later, with the football finally coming to rest on Clarendon's own one yard line.

The Bronchos worked their way out of this deep offensive hole, traveling up to the Tiger's 32 yard line. On 4th down, with 11 yards to

go. Quarterback Howard Weatherton took off around his left end to push the drive to the Tiger 18 yard line. The expected scoring drive was stopped a few plays later, however, by a Weatherton fumble.

The fumbles began catching on as McLean followed suit and lost the ball at mid-field with Broncho Dan Brandes recovering.

The Clarendon offense took off again and three plays later, John Hall once again crossed the McLean goal line. Hall again made the extra point effort and with 3:28 left in the first half he had made all of the Broncho's 16 points.

McLean still had the fumbles as they lost the ball to Broncho Jackie Longan on their own 34 yard line. Two passes from Weatherton to ends Irven Thomas and Bill Bromley put the Broncho's on the 10. Barry Schafer bulled it over for the remaining distance and with the extra point attempt failing, Clarendon lead at half 22-0.

The final Clarendon score came with the Broncho's first possession of the second half. McLean received the

kick-off, but were unable to move the ball. Their short punt put Clarendon to work on their own 43 yard line.

The first play of the series, Howard Weatherton made a wide sweep around the right end and ran for 45 yards to the Tiger 29 yard line.

Weatherton and Hall ground out large chunks of yardage, finally bringing Clarendon to a first down on the Tiger four yard line. Weatherton quarterback sneaked it in for the touchdown. An extra point kick by Dennis Swinney made it 29-0 with 7:41 left in the third quarter.

The only scoring threat in the remainder of the game came when McLean moved to the Broncho eight yard line early in the fourth quarter. Defensive man Rick Gerner dropped the Tiger

quarterback behind the line of scrimmage and McLean faced a third down-sixteen yards to go situation for the first. Two successive pass attempts failed and the Bronchos had the ball again.

McLean's final offensive effort was stopped at midfield as the final game whistle blew.

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Largest county case load this year

Seventeen county court cases in August

Seventeen cases were tried in Donley County Court during the month of August, by far the busiest month for county court cases this year.

Ten of the cases involved Donley County drivers charged with driving while intoxicated. Eight of those

plead guilty and were given the same sentence by County Judge Billy Christal. These were fined \$150 plus court costs and sentenced to 10

days in jail. In each case the jail sentence was waived and the person placed on probation for six months.

The \$150 - 10 day jail sentence is generally placed upon first time DWI offenders, Christal said. Second time DWI offenders automatically lose their driver's licenses.

This was the case in another county DWI charge. The man plead guilty and

was fined \$100 plus three days in jail. Because he had been charged with DWI within the past five years, he was also ordered to surrender his drivers licenses for 12 months.

In the final DWI case, a Donley County man plead

guilty and was fined \$250 by Judge Christal. A 10 day jail sentence was probated for a six month period.

Three of the cases on the county court docket during August involved charges of welfare fraud. Three county residents were found guilty of falsifying yearly income figures in order to obtain welfare assistance. All those charged were ordered to pay back the excess amounts of welfare received.

Other county court action included charges of drug related crimes, assault and one charge of enticing a child.

The enticing a child charge involved a young Donley County couple. The two left the city against the wishes of the girl's parents. The parents filed charges against the young man because their 14 year old daughter is legally a child.

In County court, the 18 year old man plead guilty and was fined \$200 along with a 10 day jail sentence. The jail term was probated by Judge Christal for a six month period.

A local man was also involved in an unlawful possession of marijuana charge brought against him by Donley County law enforcement officials. The man was first stopped by local police officials for a speeding violation. A substance later proved to be marijuana was discovered in his car. He was placed in Donley County jail over the weekend pending county legal action.

Felony charges were not levied because less than four ounces of the illegal substance were found. The man plead guilty to the charge and was fined \$1 plus the \$51 county court costs. He was released into the custody of his parents.

Another County Court case involved two men arrested in Donley County July 16 on auto theft charges. The two were stopped by local highway patrol personnel for a traffic violation. The vehicle they were driving was later identified as one stolen from an Atlanta, Georgia business.

At the time of their arrest, a substance believed to be an illegal amphetamine was discovered in their possession. Charges of possession were brought against both men but later laboratory tests on the suspected drug proved inconclusive.

Both men waived extradition rights and were transported back to Atlanta to face the auto theft charges there. The two Donley County drug charges were dropped because of insufficient evidence.

Promotion concert due here

Amarillo Symphony Conductor Tom Conlin and his wife Roy will perform a special concert at Clarendon College's Harned Sisters Fine Arts Center Friday, Sept. 17, at 10:30 a.m.

The performance is designed to promote special Sunday afternoon concerts to be performed by the Amarillo Symphony beginning Oct. 10. The Sunday shows will be a repeat of the symphony's Saturday night performances. This is the first time Sunday concerts have been offered.

The Sept. 17 performance in Clarendon will be from 10:30 to 11 a.m. Students from Clarendon College and Clarendon High School will attend the show which will feature Tom Conlin at the piano and his wife Renay singing. The performance will be free and is open to the public.

The concert series beginning in October will feature such noted celebrities as Chet Atkins and Walter Cronkite during the season. First Sunday performance will be by pianist Lorin Hollander, Oct. 9. A special Christmas rendition of Handel's "Messiah" will follow Dec. 12. The Feb. 6 concert will feature Country Western star Chet Atkins. Eugene Fodor, violinist, will perform Feb. 27; and the series ends with Walter Cronkite narrating "A Lincoln Portrait" March 27.

Season tickets for the Sunday Matinee Series are \$25 for reserved seats.

Unreserved seats may be purchased at a family rate of \$30 for parents and children under 18. Group rates for 10

or more persons are \$12 each. Individually, Adult

tickets are \$18 and student tickets, \$12 for the season.

Tickets are also sold at the door at an increased rate for each performance.

3 welfare fraud cases heard in county court

Three Donley County residents were found guilty of fraudulent welfare claims last week by Donley County Judge Billy I. Christal.

The three charges involved giving false yearly income information to make the applicants eligible for more welfare aid. All three cases were investigated by Jim Curtis, investigator for the Lubbock Dept. of Public Welfare office, in cooperation with local welfare officials.

One case involved two charges of fraud, including overpayments of food stamps and medicare payment aid to dependent children. A local woman was ordered to pay back \$322.64 paid her by the state. She had been receiving excess payment of food stamps and insurance premiums for two months. Overpayments included \$85 worth of insurance premiums

paid by the state; \$140 paid for aid to dependent children; and \$97 worth of food stamps.

Along with restitution, the woman was ordered to pay county court costs totaling \$51 and placed on six month probation by Judge Christal.

She is currently repaying the over-payments in weekly installments of \$25.

The two remaining welfare fraud cases also involved over-payment of food stamp benefits.

Two Donley County women were found guilty of these charges. Both were ordered by Judge Christal to pay full restitution of the over-payments plus the \$51 court costs. One woman received a \$62 food stamp over-payment. The other received \$48 in over-payment. Both have paid back the excess welfare money upon Christal's orders.

White Deer game to be close

The Clarendon Broncho team spirit may be up from their opening game whitewash of the McLean Tigers. If so, they'll need it against Friday's opponent, the White Deer Bucks, according to Head Coach Jerry Wilson.

Wilson was cautious in print last week, saying the McLean game could be a tough one. The Broncho's came out of that one easy victors, but Wilson is cautious again this week.

His prediction of a close game could be well founded. White Deer played McLean in a scrimmage earlier this year, Wilson said, and literally "ran over 'em."

That scrimmage ended with White Deer scoring 5 times to McLeans 0. Wilson saw that scrimmage in addition to viewing White Deer two other times on film, a scrimmage against Wheeler and their season opener Sept. 3, against Vega. White Deer also opened their season with a big win, taking the Vega contest 33-9.

Clarendon's season offensive total of 29 points stacked against White Deer's 33 points makes Friday's contest likely to be a high scorer. "The game is going to depend on the defenses," Wilson said.

Defensively, Clarendon will have one advantage they might not enjoy often this season--they're bigger than White Deer. But Wilson said White Deer makes up for their size with one crucial team factor, quickness.

"Their whole team is quick," he said. "The backs hit the line fast, so fast its hard to tell who has the ball. And their line moves on the snap very quickly."

Wilson said this quickness also enables White Deer to recover rapidly from any mistakes. "We'll just have to beat them off the snap. Our offensive line didn't play as well as we'd hoped against McLean and White Deer's defense is quick. If we don't watch it they'll be in our backfield and that worries

me." White Deer did just that against Vega. Six times Vega managed to get within White Deer's 20 yard line and six times the quick White Deer defense managed to drop backs behind the line of scrimmage and hold off the scoring effort.

To win Friday, Wilson said the Bronchos have got to work out the "little mistakes" that plagued them against McLean. Game kick-off time is set for 8 p.m. at White Deer. Clarendon opens their home game season Sept. 17 against Stinnett at Broncho Stadium. Game time is 8 p.m.

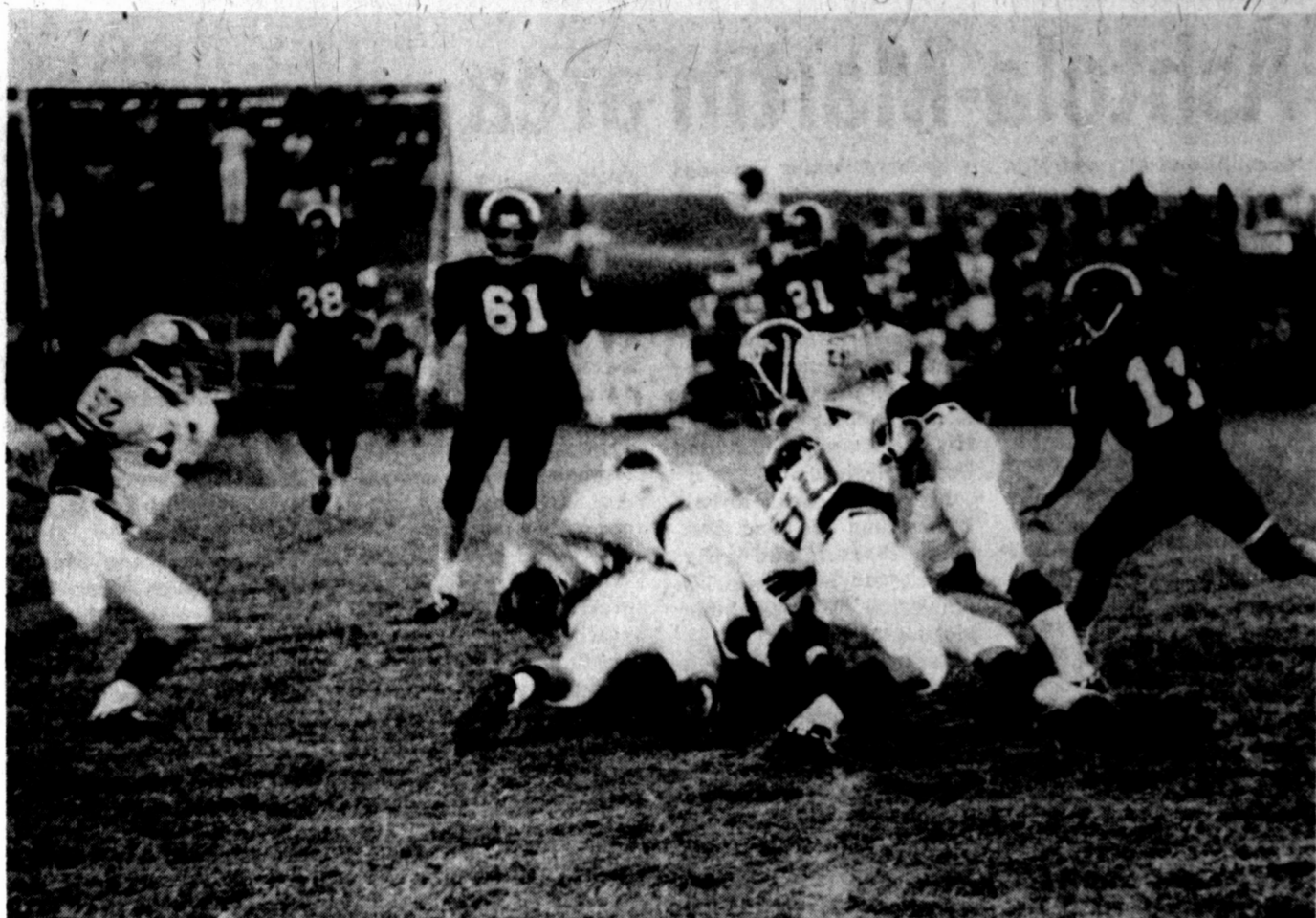

"No minimum age limit for the vaccine has been set yet, but we're expecting that children under the age of five may be excluded from receiving it," notes Jerry DeSha, of the Canyon district office of the Texas Department of Health Resources.

Immunization against A New Jersey flu will also be available through private physicians, but not before Oct. 1, De Sha adds.

"There won't be any of this vaccine on the market, and private physicians will get it from us. We were expecting it from the federal

government's contagious disease center in Atlanta, Ga., by mid-July. But there's been a delay until September," the health program director notes.

Arrangements for the two Donley immunization clinics are made by arrangement with county Judy Billie Christal who met with DeSha last month.

The return of the "swine flu" virus, which in 1918 created an international epidemic and took some 200 million lives-500,000 in the U. S. - was documented at Fort Dix, N. J. late last year.

Federal health officials who feared a new epidemic persuaded Congress and President Ford to authorize the free mass-immunization plan which goes into effect this fall.

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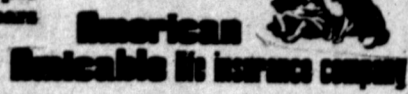
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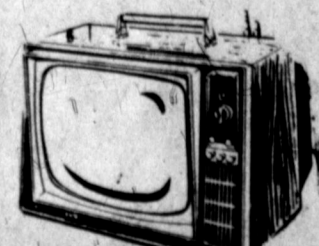

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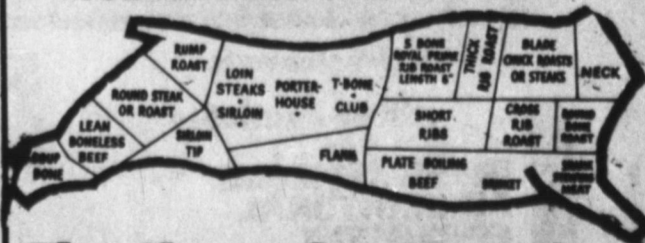
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Feedlot to table is costly business

The rancher or farmer who pays \$2 a pound for a T-bone steak in the supermarket probably can't understand why he only got about 30 to 40 cents a pound for his calf, says Ronald Gooch, county agent for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"First, the animal had to go to a feedlot where he was fed to obtain the grade and weight desired by most

retailers. As a 1,000-pound steer, he was probably sold for \$400. A packer purchased him and found he yielded only a 620-pound carcass. The price for the carcass then was at least 64.5 cents a pound," says the county agent.

"The retailer buying the carcass must then cut and package it for the consumer. Cutting loss along with

bone, fat and some moisture are lost during this process so that only about 440 pounds of meat are left for retailing. The cost goes up rapidly to about 91 cents a pound."

When the other costs of slaughtering, transportation, lab or, advertising and packaging costs are added, the price goes up to about \$1.40 per pound.

Of course, the \$1.40 retail price is an average for all cuts of meat of a steer. Since the 440 pounds of meat included only about 16 pounds of T-bone steak, it must naturally bring a higher price than the cheaper and more abundant cuts.

A Black Preacher told me one time that he preached for the Baptists. "In fact", he continued, "Most all my people are Baptists unless somebody has messed with them." . . . Anyway, this would turn off the more evangelistic Baptists and they would let me go on to where they thought I was headed.

As a youngster I would peep back in at the door, and my, my, but they looked old for their age. I thought they would run their course in a few years. I thought all their preachers were old and feeble for the most part. When some kid asked me about my religion, I could make his eyes bug out telling him some experience carried on in this church . . . No music and foot-washing would win every time.

But, I finally grew up... Married a woman from one of the so-called Modern Baptists. She played and sung to the piano, and we went to Sunday School and partook of all the so-called Forbidden Fruit.

My wife spent more than a score of years praying that I would join some church, preferably the one she was already established in . . . Finally, I went down the aisle one night ninety miles an hour . . . I was happy with her church . . . I still am and will likely finish out my so-journ in this world without changing around. . . BUT, something happened that made me want to write this column. . . And I do so in the deepest of love for everyone

who loves my Lord. . . That includes Primitive Baptists, Hardshells, and just plain Baptists, and in addition I love all the other denominations that praise the name of Jesus, and love Him from their heart. . . God Bless You Each One. . .

Coming back to the cause for writing this; my late father had a younger brother . . . Even though he is older than Uncle Zeb he is still preaching, and for these Primitive Baptists. . . I love my father's church and his memory and I dearly love this younger brother who is the preacher in the family. Anyway, he lives a long ways from me, but a few Sundays back he was visiting in a church some 100 miles away . . . I took off at eight o'clock to hear him on Sunday morning, but other preachers were preaching . . . But on the next Tuesday he was preaching some 125 miles away . . . We went that night

Out of the two meetings, I felt we owed an apology about some of our past thinking. . . I came home with several tapes of the singing that we joined in . . . I am still playing it and thought it was beautiful . . . They didn't preach all of the 34 preachers who were there only two, and the preaching part lasted only two hours, with two hours of singing and hand-shaking . . . I didn't get too hungry before lunch . . . The preachers looked much younger. They were a fine group . . . Three young boys 8 to 12 years young came forward and led the songs. The brotherly love seemed so real . . . The food afterward was terrific. To look at the congregation we would guess near 500 . . . The memory of my parents church is more precious. I rejoiced with them about JESUS, and as I came home THANKED GOD for all those in all churches who look forward to HIS COMING . . . County Superintendent office budget approved for 1976-77

Donley County's Public School Board approved a \$26,988 budget for 1976-77 school year at their August meeting.

Major expense for the budget is the County School Superintendent's yearly salary. Salary for the superintendent is \$18,348 per year.

This is a \$756 increase over the 1975-76 salary rate of \$17,592 per year. According to County Superintendent Maurice Risley, this increase follows a state salary schedule for county superintendents.

New County Superintendent Jerry Hawkins will assume the office Jan. 1. Risley said Hawkins' salary will be set by the county school board at the first meeting after Jan. 1.

Yearly salary for secretary of the superintendent was set at \$7,200 per year. Other expenses on the budget was \$1,080 for office and travel expenses and \$360 paid to County School Board members for attending meetings.

Budget for this year is slightly more than the 1975-76 budget of \$26,232.

The increase in the budget was the yearly salary paid to the superintendent.

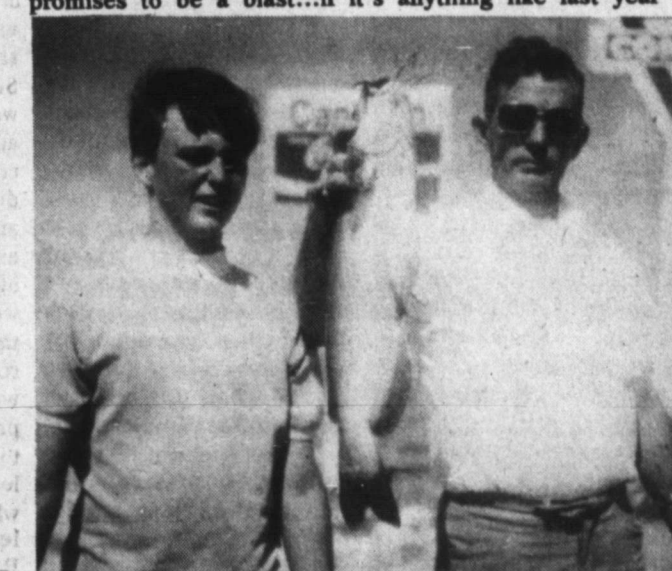

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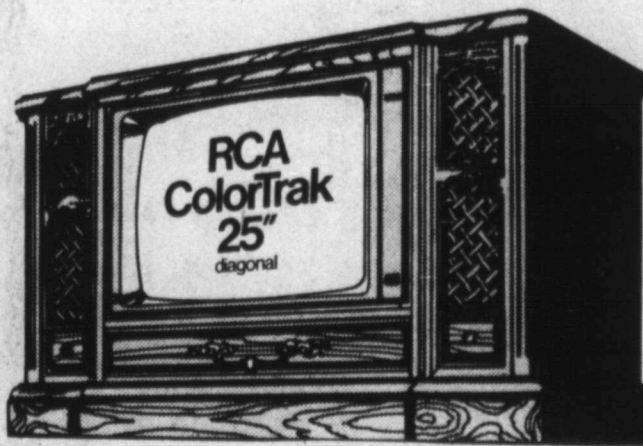


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Howardwick Partyline--report of visitors

NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 49)

Repealing Sections 49-d and 49-d-1 of Article III of the Texas Constitution, S.J.R. 49 amends Section 49-c of Article III of the Texas Constitution to provide for and authorize an additional \$400 million in Texas water development bonds that may be issued on approval of two-thirds of the members of each house of the Legislature for such water development purposes as the Legislature may prescribe.

The amendment contains a specific prohibition against the use of state funds for the development of water resources from the Mississippi River and also requires that before any single water development project may be undertaken requiring the expenditure of more than \$35 million in bond proceeds, it must be approved by resolution of the Legislature.

The amendment removes the constitutional requirement that certain revenues must be used to retire water development and water quality enhancement bonds and removes the constitutional interest rate limit on such bonds.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing an increase of \$400 million in the amount of Texas Water Development Bonds that may be issued on approval of two-thirds of the legislature; amending and consolidating provisions of Sections 49-c, 49-d and 49-d-1 of Article III of the Texas Constitution; and repealing Sections 49-d and 49-d-1 of Article III of the Texas Constitution."

NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. 99)

H.J.R. 99 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to increase from \$100 million to \$200 million the aggregate principal amount of Texas water development bonds which may be issued and outstanding by the Texas Water Development Board to provide grants and loans for water quality enhancement purposes as established by the Legislature.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"A constitutional amendment to increase from \$100 million to \$200 million the amount of Texas Water Development Bonds that may be issued for water quality enhancement purposes."

Since outerwear garments are a major investment, consumers should shop carefully and wisely. Real leather and suede garments should be well-matched in color and texture. They should be supple enough to conform comfortably to the body during wear. If possible, lift the lining and examine the wrong side of the leather or suede. If it is a different color on the wrong side, any surface scuffs will be visible.

Garments should fit comfortably since alterations are difficult. Stitching cannot be let out without showing. Restitching in the same place further perforates and weakens it. Care instructions should be followed exactly.

Real leather, suede and their fabulous fakes are continuing as one of the most popular outerwear categories for everyone this fall. Current styles feature more detailing and fashionable design variations. Popular colors include buttery tans and earth tones of rust, mocha and brown shades. Real leathers and suedes are more expensive than a year ago. Costs for cowhides have risen almost 50 per cent, while sheep, lamb and pig skin costs have remained stable. Sharply soaring costs of real fur--five to 100 per cent higher--and lamb shearing trims will limit their availability except in the more expensive price ranges.

Realist-looking, and more affordable, fake fur trims will be seen in the popular price ranges. Real and fake fur trimmed styles will be more popular than a year ago--as much as one-third of the market.

Often special procedures or cleaning specialists are recommended. Some fakes are only washable or drycleanable, not both, may be neither.
