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

Grasses which are attracting wide interest at the center include a superior switchgrass for use in Texas and Oklahoma; a desert strain of sideoats grama; a southern strain of sand lovegrass; a western wheatgrass selected for bottomlands and waterway plantings in west central Texas; and a blue grama selection adapted to the redbed soils of western Oklahoma and Texas.

Forbs (broad-leafed, herbaceous plants), native legumes, and woody plants relished by wildlife and livestock are also being evaluated at Knox City. Such plants may have great value, especially for deer, turkey, quail, dove, songbirds, and other wildlife when used in mixtures with range and pasture plantings.

Forbs which appear most promising include selections of englemanndaisy, maximilian sunflower, bushsunflower, and showy menodora. Legumes under evaluation include trailing wildbean, least snoutbean, prairieclover, and western indigo. Woody plants being grown at the center include littleleaf leadtree, Texas kidneywood, and wild plum.


Seed or rootstock are collected from promising plants, then are grown and evaluated at Knox City. Donaho explained. Those districts.

that show the most promise for solving certain problems are then grown under field conditions on farms and ranches of soil and water conservation district cooperators. Selections that prove they can solve a specific problem while being superior to other strains available are then released by conservation districts to commercial seed growers. These producers then grow seed and sell it to the public.

Grass strains proven and put into use by SCS include Selection 75 kleingrass; El Reno, Uvalde, and Vaughn sideoats grama; King Ranch bluestem; green sprangletop, and Grenville switch-

Donaho said SCS plant materials work developed ways to harvest and plant most of the range grasses being planted in Texas and Oklahoma today.

Some of the groups who cooperate with SCS in its plant materials work in Texas include Agricultural Research Service, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, Texas A & M University, Texas Tech. University, Prairie View A & M University, Abilene Christian University. U. S. Air Force, U. S. Corps of Engineers, Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, and soil and water conservation

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





Voter registration deadline nearing for county residents

Deadline for Donley County voters to register for the Nov. 2 Presidential Election is 5 p.m. Friday, Oct. 1.

Voters must be registered to vote and a resident of the county at least 29 days prior to the election. Locals may register at the Donley County Courthouse Annex or by mail. Registration forms may be picked up at the annex.

Donley County voters will decide for or against seperating the County Sheriff/Tax Assessor office into two posts in that Nov. 2 election. Several uncontested county offices will also be on the ballot along the Presidential candidates and opponents for this district's U.S. Representative seat.

Republican Bob Price faces Incumbent Democrat Jack Hightower for that position.

Persons moving to Donley County within the 29 day voter registration limit may vote a limited ballot if they were registered to vote in the county they moved from. Alimited ballot means they may vote for all district, state and national offices, but not for county level elections.

Absentee voting in the county will begin Oct.13 and continue through Oct. 29. Absentee ballots may also be picked up at the Courthouse Annex and either returned immediatley or sent later through the mail. All absentee votes must be returned by Oct.29.

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

Clarendon football squads are undefeated thus far in the 1976 football season.






