Traditional activities set for Hedley Cotton Festival

Hedley's 25th annual Cotton Festival begins Oct. 7 with all the traditional activities scheduled for the three-day event.

Currently, Queen candidates for the festival are selling chances for a bale of cotton to be awarded during the festival's last day Oct. 9. A Future Queen contest is also being presented for

junior miss candidates.

Festival Queen candidates this year are Kim Woodard, Kathy Hamilton, Jeanie Lindsey, Lisa Stewart, Sis Johnson, Laura Wheatley, Milinda Doherty.

Future Queen candidates as of Sept. 27 were Rachel Torres, Stephanie Holland, Shelia Holland and Debbie

Ward.

Longest running feature of the festival will be the A.T.T. Amusement Carnival. The carnival will begin Thursday, Oct. 7, and continue until festival's end Saturday, Oct. 9.

Carnival rides featuring a large ferris wheel will be set up a block from Hedley's

Main St. Game and trade booths will be set up stretching from the carnival midway to main street.

Featured will be games such as bingo, a dunking booth, bake goods for sale and a flea market. Hedley High School classes will sponsor many of the booths at the carnival. Selling space at the flea

market will be \$5 for the entire festival.

Main events of the festival begin Friday, Oct. 8. The entire festival will conclude Saturday with the coronation of the Festival Queen and Future Queen at the Hedley High School gymnasium.

Included in the festival's two-day event will be early

breakfasts, an Old Settlers Reunion, an amateur talent show, a noon barbeque, evening dances, an Old Fiddler's and Banjo picking contest and a parade down main street.

Entertainment will also be provided throughout the festival by such entertainers as the "Keynotes," a Perryton singing group; the

singing Tom Pound family; the Lone Star Country and Western Band, the Big Texas Band, and tumblers from Amarillo's Maverick Boys Club.

Saturday's parade will feature marching school bands as well as float entries from throughout the area. The 500 pound bale of

cotton to be given away at festival's end will be worth the current market value.

Last week, cotton was listing at 62 cents per pound, making festival officials think this year's prize may be the most valuable one ever given.

Value at 62 cents per pound would be \$310.

Sherwood Shores water company notified

Local water system violating state regs.

The water system owned by Sherwood Shores #9 which services the Howardwick community is currently in violation of regulations set down by two state agencies.

A letter mailed to the Sherwood Shores office at Howardwick by the Texas Dept. of Health Resources contains an eight item list of areas where the existing water system is in violation of Health Dept. regulations. Copies of the letter were also mailed to Howardwick city officials.

The system is also in violation of the Public Utilities Commission because owners of Sherwood Shores #9 have not applied for certification of the water system to the commission of Texas. Deadline for this application was Sept. 1 this year.

According to information contained in a letter sent out to the news media by the Utility Commission all water or sewer utilities must have a Certificate of Convenience and Necessity issued by the Commission by Sept. 1, 1976. After that they will be operating illegally.

Representatives of both the Texas Dept. of Health and the Public Utility Commission said, however, that penalizing action regarding the violations would be far in the future, allowing ample time for all irregularities to be corrected.

Of the two problem areas, the Dept. of Health violations are probably the most serious and would require

the more time and money to alleviate.

In the letter addressed to Sherwood Shores President George DeArmond, the Health Dept. outlines eight violations of their water safety regulations.

According to Ron Freeman, director of Environmental Protection for Public Health Region 1, a Health Dept. branch office in Canyon, the more serious violation of the eight concerns the water system's lack of equipment to insure a constant water pressure on the water lines estimated 277 home connections.

The system currently uses constant pressure pumps to maintain water pressure. If these pumps were to go out, theoretically all pressure would be lost and dirty water could backup into the water system's pipes.

The Dept. of Health recommends construction of either elevated water storage tanks or pressure tanks to maintain this pressure.

According to the letter, required would be a minimum 10,000 gallon pressure tank or a 30,000 gallon elevated storage capacity tank. Construction of either one of these safety measures would be "fairly expensive," according to a Health Dept. spokesman.

Fluoride content of the system's water was also noted as exceeding the recommended limits established by Drinking Water Standards, but Freeman characterized this content as

"not real critical." Customers of the system were to be notified of the excessive amounts of fluoride, however and told that it could cause mottling of teeth in children 14 years and younger.

Mark Lowrey, an engineer for the Dept. of Health in Austin, said there were over 500 water systems in Texas with excessive amounts of fluoride in their water, some of these exceeding the Sherwood Shores system.

Of the other six violation areas, none were deemed critical by Health Dept. spokesmen. Other violations include: addition of another certified operator for the system (only one certified operator is now employed); addition of an auxiliary power source for use in case of power failure; and the sealing of an abandoned water well at site number 2.

Other violations are: ground storage reservoirs should be provided with a water level indicator for determining amount of water in storage;

ground storage reservoirs should be provided with an over flow pipe and screened; and prior to construction of any major improvement to the system, complete plans and specifications prepared by an engineer should be submitted to the department.

Concerning prosecution of water standard violators, Freeman said the department usually, "goes out of its way to let the systems correct their violations.

"Otherwise," he said, "We'd spend all of our time in the courthouse."

According to representatives of the Texas Public Utility Commission, Sherwood Shores Water Company has also failed to apply for a utility certification with them. Formal deadline for this application was Sept. 1.

Operating without this certificate makes the water company's operation illegal. As Paul Buhlmann of the Austin branch of the Public Utility Commission explained, prosecution is not imminent for utility companies working without this certification. He said the main problem was one of inadequate manpower for enforcement in the commission.

Approval of the application is subject to a hearing by the commission. Buhlmann said numerous factors could contribute to this application being turned down. He said the Sherwood Shores company being in violation of the eight Health Department regulations could be grounds for rejecting the application. Other factors could enter in, he said, for example, if something was being done to correct the problems, the application might be granted.

Buhlmann said immediate legal action by the Texas Attorney General would probably take place if some group of private individuals sought to have the water company legally punished for violating the application law.

Korean doctor may visit here

An invitation was extended to a Korean physician last week by the Donley County Hospital Board to travel to Clarendon for a visit and to consider the possibility of establishing a practice at the Medical Center.

The board made their decision in a special called meeting Tuesday, Sept. 21. The special meeting was called because Board President Ernest Barbee could not attend the regular session Sept. 13.

The board instructed Medical Center Administrator Gerry Knight to write a

letter to the Benson Professional service based in New York, a service which locates jobs for physicians. The board agreed to pay expenses for one of three possible Korean doctors listed with the service to travel from New York to Donley County. A preference list of the three doctors was submitted along with the letter.

Stipulations of the letter were the district would pay expenses for meals, travel and lodging for only one physician, the district, if an

agreement was reached, would furnish space, supplies and certain services for the doctor; but the district would not furnish any set monthly salary for the doctor until his practice had been established.

The invitation was to be extended to the three Korean physicians in order of board preference. First on the list was Dr. Khun Young Son. Knight said the board was impressed with Dr. Son's medical training. He was educated at the Catholic Medical College of Seoul

area. Recommendations from Son's medical school were excellent, Knight said.

Other physicians considered were, in order, Dr. Hak Joo Cha and Dr. Inke Minn. Knight said he had already sent the letter of invitation and was now awaiting a reply. "If none of them are interested chance is we won't get an answer," Knight said.

He estimated costs of bringing one of the Korean physicians to the county would be approximately \$350 to \$400.

Boys Ranch defeats Bronchos in their first season loss

Nothing came together for the Clarendon Bronchos in their contest against Boys Ranch Friday, except the second half running of Broncho Back Tony Wallace.

Clarendon seemed to defy good fortune and their own playing ability Friday as time after time they either failed to take advantage of or simply gave away the game's all important breaks.

Their one point 20-19 loss tells only a part of the story not including four fumble losses; two pass interceptions; and two trips to within the Rough Riders 20 yard line without scoring. Only Clarendon back to generate large portions of yardage was Tony Wallace, who only carried the ball in the game's second half. Wallace was good for 122 yards on seven carries including a 72 yard romp

which set up a Howard Weatherton T.D. from the one yard line.

Early in the first quarter Clarendon seemed to have things going their way. Boys Ranch, after receiving the kick, fumbled on their 48 yard line with Broncho Dan Brandes recovering.

The Broncho offense started to work from there and didn't quit until Back John Hall took it in for the score from the seven yard line. Barry Schafer's kick was good, the score 7-0, and Clarendon seemed to be on their way.

The Boys Ranch offensive drive once again faltered and punted on fourth down. With Clarendon on the 25, Lonnie Wade of Boys Ranch intercepted a deflected Howard Weatherton pass and took it all the way for a Rough Rider score. Kick after made it all tied at seven

each.

One minute, fifty seconds remained in the first quarter as a short run-back on the kick by Clarendon's Tony Wallace made it first and ten from the Bronc 21. Clarendon's fumble a few plays later by John Hall set up yet another Boys Ranch T.D. The Rough Riders took six plays before Brad Silver took it in for the lead. A point-after attempt missed to make the score 13-7 Boys Ranch.

Clarendon seemed ready to come back, however, before another fumble doused the effort. The Broncs moved from their own 36 to Boys Ranch territory on the 46. Here, Howard Weatherton broke free for a long gain, only to have the bubble burst with a fumble. Boys Ranch had the ball again on their 24.

After both teams produced

unsuccessful series of downs, Clarendon's Tony Wallace made a break for Clarendon, intercepting a bobbled Boys Ranch pass on the Rough Riders' 36. It only took a few plays, however, for good fortune to turn again. A Weatherton pass was intercepted near the goal line and Boys Ranch hung on to the ball until the half ended.

Donley County's second blood drive of the year fell short of required amounts of blood donations, but membership in the Red River Regional Red Cross Blood Program will be unaffected.

Seventy-three pints of blood were donated by county citizens Wednesday, Sept. 22, 17 less than the required 90 pints. Past

At Friday's game, if you wanted to watch only a single quarter, the third period would have been a perfect selection.

It first seemed a dismal repeat for the home team. Clarendon received the kick-off, Clarendon fumbled the ball, Boys Ranch recovers on the Bronc 26. Several plays later, Rough

Rider Boyd Garrett is in for the score and the kick after makes it 20-7.

But Clarendon's Tony Wallace turned the game around. On the first play from scrimmage, he took off on a 72 yard spree that ended only one yard short of the score. Howard Weatherton made short work of the short yardage, taking it over for

the T.D. A missed kick by Barry Schafer made it 20-13. Good fortune continued for the Broncs as the ball slid off the side of kicker Irven Thomas' foot, bounced to the Boys Ranch 42 to be recovered by Clarendon's Ricky Gerner. Runner Wallace again made a long gain to Boys Ranch 10, setting up Barry Schafer's score from the eight.

Another missed kick by Schafer resulted in Clarendon trailing 20-19. In approximately seven minutes, the Broncho's were within one point with good fortune apparently still on their side.

Boys Ranch fumbled on their 45 with Broncho Gary Thomas recovering. Passes to Irven Thomas and runs by Wallace and Weatherton had Clarendon on the three yard line. If all things end, however,

this was Clarendon's stopping point. Quarterback Howard Weatherton stepped back from his center a beat too quickly as the snap went past his hands and was in the air for grabs. Boys Ranch recovered with 2:36 left in the third quarter. They didn't give it up again until 7:30 remained in the game and they'd moved all the way to the Bronc eight yard line.

On the eight, Tony Wallace recovered a Boys Ranch fumble, but the Broncs offense faltered that deep in their own territory. They punted away with the final minutes ticking away. They regained the ball on a punt with 2:20 left, but the Rough Riders held them scoreless as the game ended 20-19.

Clarendon drops a 3-1 record with the Rough Riders remaining undefeated in four outings.

Bronchos to play 'toughest opponent,' Childress

Clarendon's bronchos were promised a rough five days this week by Head Coach Jerry Wilson to prepare for Friday's contest against the Childress Bobcats.

The Bronchos face their toughest opponent to date after their first loss of the year and Wilson said he wanted to get them mentally as well as physically ready.

"It's rough to lose one like Boys Ranch," he said. "We're a two or three touchdown better ball club than we played like Friday."

The Bronchos will need those "two or three" touchdowns Friday against the AA

Bobcats. Childress is rated in the top 10 AA teams by two polls this year. Number five by UPI and number eight by the Harris poll. They are undefeated, winning over Paducah and three still-to-play Clarendon opponents: Wellington, Shamrock, and Memphis.

The Bobcats beat Wellington, rated high in Clarendon's district, by 12 points last Friday, Sept. 24. And in the Clarendon-Childress game last year, the Bronchos lost 41-6.

"So to win Friday," Wilson said, "We're going to get back to fundamentals." It was this memory loss of

football "fundamentals" which cost them heavily in the Boys Ranch game, Wilson said.

As rated by the Clarendon coaching staff from the game film, no Clarendon offensive lineman graded above 70 per cent in blocking. This means they achieved their blocking

assignments less than 70 per cent of the time.

"We were also real disappointed in our defense," Wilson said. These two things, added to four fumble turn-overs, two intercepted passes and twice within the Boys Ranch 20 yard line without scoring, all

contributed to the losing effort.

"Losing to Boys Ranch isn't something you can explain by this or by that," Wilson said. "You win as a team and Friday we just lost as a team. But I've got to admire the kids. Down 20 to 7 they came back fighting."

In Friday's contest, one Bobcat to watch is halfback Ricky Smith, a runner Wilson said "ate us up" last year. He described Childress as a team "well coached" with excellent knowledge of football's fundamentals.

But Wilson thinks Clarendon may have a slight psychological edge. "Childress was really up for the Wellington game last Friday. Chances are they won't be near so high for this one."

But Wilson isn't ready to completely depend on psychology. "We're really going to work this week, back to the fundamentals. To Learn these, we're going to go over it time and time again, till we get it right."

First poll by CC instructor indicates Carter now leading

Results of CC Instructor Bill Taylor's first informal poll dealing with Presidential preference among students in his college classes resulted in a clear preference for Democratic nominee Jimmy Carter.

Taylor polled approximately 100 Clarendon College students asking them who they preferred in the upcoming Presidential Election Nov. 2. Results for classes polled Sept. 20-21 were 58 per cent favoring Carter; 33 per cent for President Gerald Ford; and nine per cent undecided.

Taylor noted this survey was conducted prior to the candidates first televised debate Thursday, Sept. 23. Polls taken on Sept. 27-28 may show some variation which could be credited in

part to the debate. Taylor said.

The survey will be conducted in Taylor's Monday and Tuesday classes each week until the election. Taylor conducted a similar poll during the last Presidential election in 1972. He said results from that survey were within two per cent of how the Panhandle vote actually went.

Results of the weekly poll will be published until Nov. 2 in the "Clarendon Press."

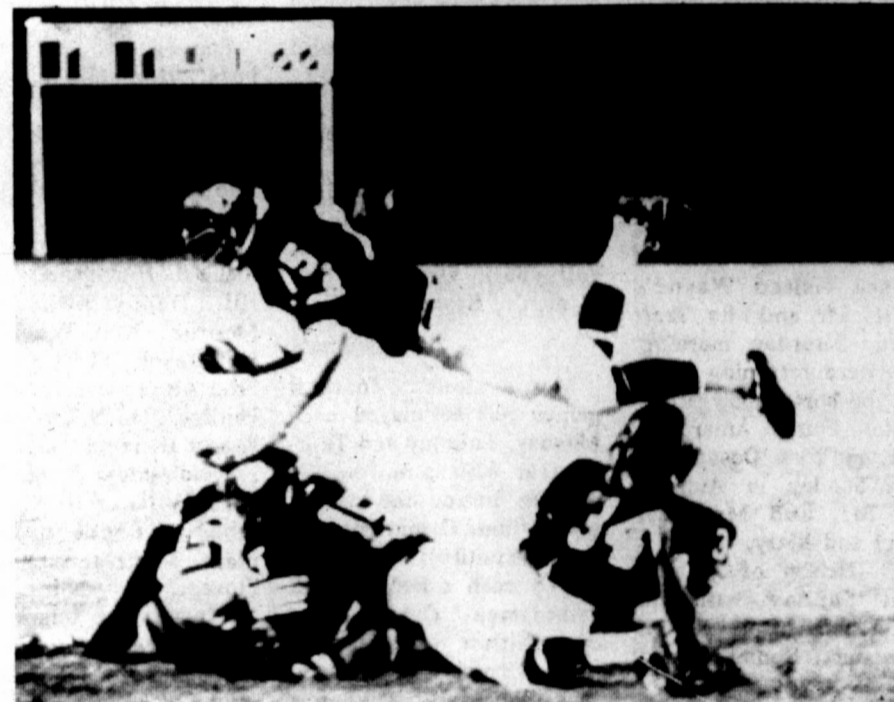

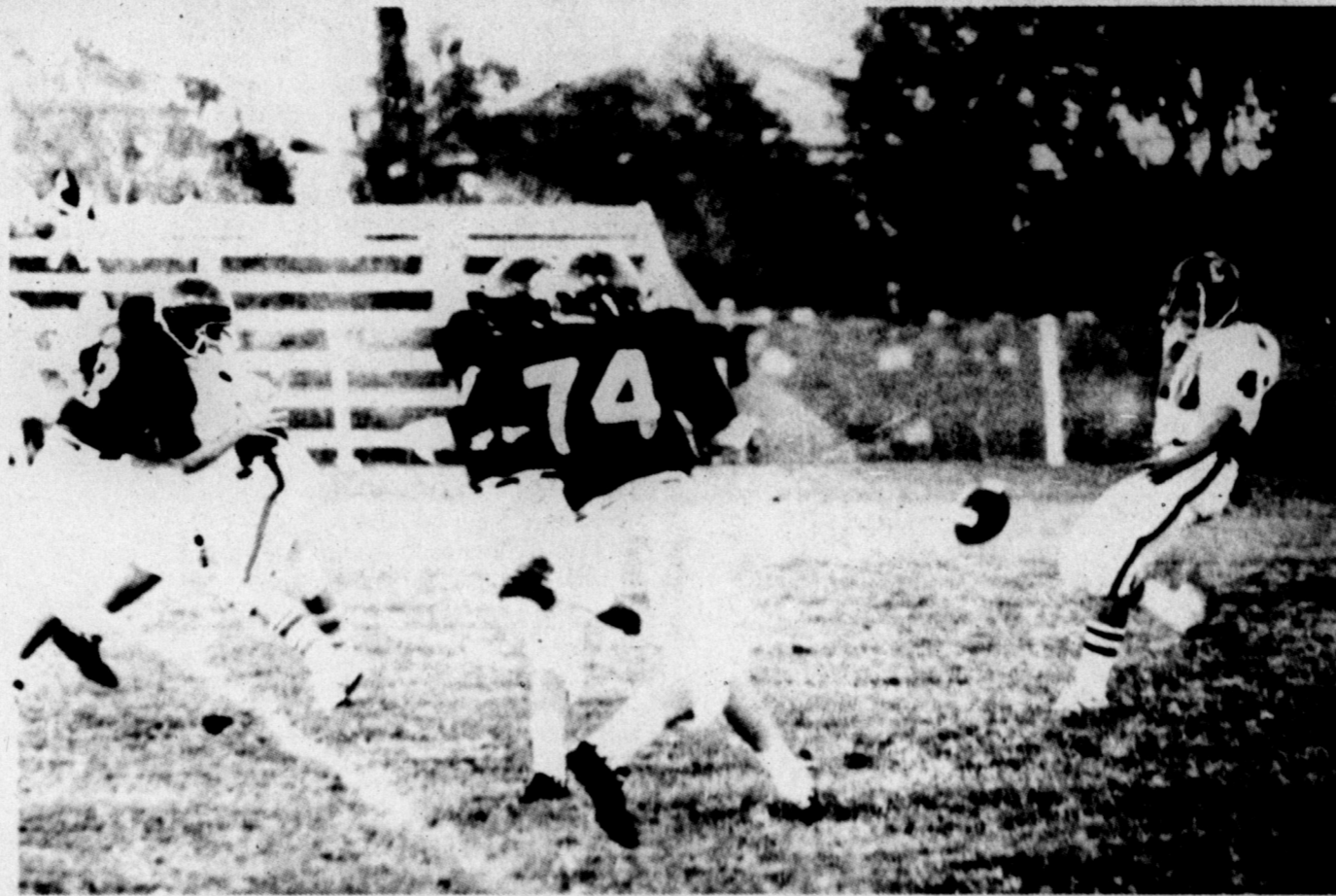

The Junior Varsity loss makes them 2-1 for the year.

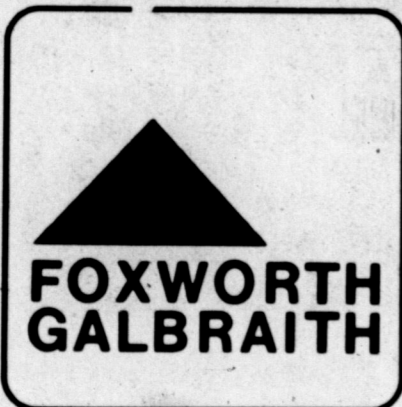
