

Hedley Cotton Festival activities begin Thursday

Hedley's 25th Annual Cotton Festival begins Thursday, Oct. 7, with the traditional three-day carnival and concludes Saturday, Oct. 9, when the 1976 Festival Queen is crowned.

For three days, Donley County residents and Panhandle visitors may enjoy the carnival midway; booths featuring games of chance and merchandise for sale; and old settlers reunion; an amateur talent show; morning breakfasts and a noon barbecue; a downtown parade; an Old Fiddlers and Banjo picking contest; a drawing for a bale of cotton; the queen's coronation; and dances each night. The

festival is sponsored each year by the Hedley Lions Club.

All events will center around the Main Street of Hedley. Festival Queen contestants are now selling tickets for the cotton bale drawing, with the one selling the most to be named the new queen. A Future Queen contest for younger girls is also underway. Each contestant is competing for the honor by gathering donations at a penny a point. Both winners in the two contests will be crowned during special ceremonies at the Hedley High School Gymnasium Saturday night at 8

p.m. They will be crowned by the District Lt. Governor of Lions Clubs.

Queen Candidates this year and their Hedley sponsors are Milinda Doherty, Boothe Insurance Agency; Kathy Hamilton, Aesop's Fables Grocery; Sis Johnson, Doyle's Conoco; Jeanie Lindsey, LeFevor Feedlot; Lisa Stewart, Broken Wheel Feeds; Laura Ann Wheatley, West Texas Gin; and Kim Woodard, Security State Bank.

Future Queen candidates are Rachel Torres, Stephanie Holland, Debbie Ward and Shelia Holland.

The three-day carnival beginning Thursday will

feature rides furnished by the A.T.T. Amusement Company. Game booths set up from Hedley's Main Street to the midway will be sponsored by Hedley High School classes. A flea market will also be featured with space for sale at \$5 for all three days.

Main events of the festival begin Friday, Oct. 8, with a kick-off breakfast beginning at 7:30 a.m. in the Hedley Lions Den. Breakfast will be served till 9:30 a.m. and is sponsored by the Hedley Senior Class. Guests of honor at all morning breakfasts will be the present Queen Contestants and last year's

Queen Becky Johnson.

Friday's big events will be the Festival's annual Old Settlers Reunion and an Amateur Talent Show. Registration for the reunion begins at 10 a.m. with the event set from 2-4 p.m. Prizes will be awarded to the oldest man and woman attending and the old settler travelling the farthest.

The Talent Show will be from 5-6 p.m. Friday at the speaker's stand on Main Street. Ernie Houdashell of Amarillo radio station KFDA will emcee the event. All ages of talent may enter in either the 12 and under category; ages 13-18; or 18 and older.

A dance at 9 p.m. concludes the day's activities in the Hedley American Legion Hall. The Lone Star Playboys will play. Throughout the day, such groups as the Tom Pounds family, the "Key Notes," and the Lone Star Playboys will provide musical entertainment.

Saturday is the Festival's big day. It all begins with another breakfast from 7:30 to 9:30 a.m. at the Hedley Lions Den. Hedley's Junior Class is sponsor for the meal.

Beginning at 10 a.m. is more musical entertainment by the Pound Family, the "Keynotes," and the Big Texan Band.

A Lions Club Barbeque will be served beginning at noon Saturday. Tickets will be sold at the door. At 1 p.m., the traditional Festival Parade will begin. Special guests at the parade will be local Congressman Jack Hightower and his Nov. 2 opponent Bob Price. Parade entries will include floats sponsored by Hedley businesses, area marching bands and a special Kiddie Parade featuring kids in special costumes and riding decorated bikes. Each Queen Candidate will also ride on a float. Prizes will be given to winning entries in Saturday's parade.

Entertainment will be provided after the parade by the Amarillo Maverick Boys Club featuring tumbling and trampoline acts. Drawing for this year's bale of cotton will be at 5 p.m. The winner will receive the current market value of the cotton bale which could be over \$300.

At 6:30 p.m., the Old Fiddlers and Banjo Picking Contest begins. Several area musicians are expected to compete.

Crowning of this year's Festival Queen climaxes the day's activities at 8 p.m. A dance at the Hedley American Legion Hall will follow at 9 p.m.

Med. District to host Korean doctor's visit

Korean doctor Khun Young Son will be in Clarendon Monday and Tuesday, Oct. 11-12, to visit with the Donley County Medical District Board and discuss the possibility of opening a practice here.

Son's visit is in response to a letter sent by the district to him through a physician placement service based in New York. In that letter, the district agreed to pay his air fare to Donley County if he was interested. Stipulations in the letter said the district could furnish a doctor space, supplies and certain services if he wished to establish a practice. The district stated, however, they could not furnish any set monthly salary for a doctor.

Hospital District Administrator Gerry Knight received word Tuesday, Oct. 5, that Dr. Son had agreed to visit the county. Knight said a 1:30 p.m. reception would be held at the Medical Center's dining room Tuesday, Oct. 12 for Dr. Son. The Medical Center's Board of Directors will also meet with him at a called meeting Tuesday night at 7 p.m.

Earlier plans to organize a county recruitment committee to obtain physicians for

the Medical Center have been completed. Knight said, if any county citizens groups or individuals wished to talk with Dr. Son, they could do so either at or before the reception and board meeting Tuesday.

"Chances are," he said, "Dr. Son will want some type guaranteed salary at least until he can establish a practice here. He knows the district can't pay one, so any guaranteed money would have to come from another source."

As of Tuesday, Knight had not talked to Dr. Son. The

only correspondence had come by letter from the Benson Professional recruitment Service. Dr. Son will arrive by plane in Amarillo Monday afternoon, Knight said.

Son received his medical training at the Catholic Medical College of Seoul Korea. He is married and has one child.

Seven county defendants tried in district court

Jury trial was waived by seven defendants in Donley County District Court cases Monday, Oct. 4, including two individuals indicted on drug-related charges and two held over for trial on a recent auto theft charge.

Among those voluntarily giving up their right to a jury trial were Terry Blanks and Leesa McKnown, arrested on drug-related charges in Donley County last May. Also waiving their jury trial rights were Ricky Rowe and Gary Dale English, both indicted earlier Monday Morning on theft charges of

a 1970 Pontiac Firebird from Chamberlain Motor Co. Aug. 26.

These four defendants as well as three others tried Monday were placed on parole by District Judge Robert Montgomery.

Both Blanks, originally from Kansas City, Mo. and McKnown, a Cactus native were indicted on drug-related charges by a Donley County Grand Jury last June. Both were enrolled in Clarendon College. Blanks originally faced three charges and McKnown two.

Monday, Blanks plead

guilty to one charge of selling marijuana. The other two indictments against him were dropped. He was defended by Clarendon Attorney Mike Sanders. Because of the guilty plea, Judge Montgomery sentenced Blanks to a five year jail sentence and a \$1,000 fine. The sentence was probated, placing Blanks on probation for a five year period. His \$1,000 fine plus a county court costs of \$163.50 was paid Tuesday Oct. 5.

McKnown plead guilty to one charge of delivery of marijuana to a man later

identified as a Dept. of Public Safety narcotics agent. Her appointed attorney Monday was Clarendon lawyer Bill Lowe. Judge Montgomery placed her on two-year probation and fined her \$500 plus an \$88 county court cost. McKnown paid her fine Monday.

In a case involving an auto stolen from Chamberlain Motor Co., Ricky Rowe and Gary Dale English, both of Clarendon, plead guilty to the charge. They had been separately indicted on the auto theft charge by the county grand jury earlier Monday morning. Mike Sander was appointed by the court to defend them.

After their guilty pleas, Judge Montgomery sentenced both to a two-year prison term and a \$200 fine. The jail sentence was probated for a two-year period. In addition to the fine both Rowe and English were ordered to make a \$100 restitution payment to Chamberlain Motor Company and a \$150 restitution payment to Donley County

farmer. Earl Hamilton plus the \$163.50 court cost. Portions of a grain crop grown by Hamilton were damaged when the car stolen by Rowe and English was driven across it. Extensive damage was also caused to the auto stolen from Chamberlain's.

Both defendants agreed to pay their \$450 total fine in

monthly installments. They also agreed to follow all probation standards including appearance specifications that they must remain clean shaven and have their hair cut to the center of the ear on the side and not past the collar in back.

Remaining district cases heard Monday involved another county auto theft charge, a charge of forgery and a D.W.I. violator.

Kevin Cates, 17, of Clarendon, also plead guilty to an auto theft charge and waived his right to jury trial. He was represented by appointed attorney Bill Lowe. Cates was indicted Monday morning by the grand jury for theft of a pick-up taken July 28 from the home of Clarendon resident Mac Stavenhagen.

Cates testified he had taken the pick-up and driven as far as Claude west of Clarendon on Hwy. 287 before deciding to return the vehicle. Stavenhagen had since reported the pick-up missing, however, and Cates was arrested by Clarendon and Donley County law enforcement officers as he drove by the Stavenhagen household.

Judge Montgomery sentenced Cates to a two-year prison term, probating that sentence for the same length of time. He was also fined \$200 plus a \$163.50 court cost. Cates agreed to pay back this amount in \$20

monthly installments. Another Donley County youth, Bryan Myers, 18 indicted on forgery charges by the grand jury Monday morning. Clarendon attorney Mike Sanders was his appointed counsel. Myers plead guilty to the charge, waiving his jury trial rights. He was charged with forging a \$78 check at the Gibson's Store in Clarendon, signing his grandfather's name, H.A. Shields, to the check.

He was sentenced by Judge Montgomery to a two-year probated jail sentence and fined \$200 plus court costs of \$163.50. Restitution of the \$78 was also ordered. Myers agreed to pay the money out in \$25 monthly payments. He was also place on probation appearance standards stating his hair could be no longer than mid-ear on the sides and not past the collar in back.

A D.W.I. charge against Clifford Smith Taylor of Clarendon was also heard in District Court Monday. Taylor, indicted earlier this year, plead guilty to the charge. Mike Sanders was his appointed legal counsel. Judge Montgomery sentenced him to a two-year prison term. He was also ordered to pay court costs totaling \$81. His jail sentence was probated on the condition that he voluntarily enter the Panhandle Alcoholic Recovery Clinic in Amarillo. Taylor

agreed to pay back the court cost amount in \$15 a month installments.

All Donley County residents placed on probation were turned over to local Probation officer Bill Kesterson. Each is also required to pay a probation fee of \$10 per month.

County grand jury indicts four

Four indictments were handed down by a Donley County grand jury Monday, Oct. 4, at the beginning of their fall term.

Trial for three of these indictments was conducted Monday afternoon by District Judge Robert Montgomery. In each case, jury trial was waived by the defendants.

Only indictment handed down by the jury and not tried Monday was an involuntary Manslaughter While Intoxicated charge brought against Micheal Hansard, 20, of Lakeview.

Hansard was involved in a highway accident east of Hedley on Hwy 287 Sept. 25 in which Mr. s Leonita Phillis Scheaffer of Louisiana was killed.

According to reports by

the High Patrol, Mrs. Scheaffer and her husband were traveling with another couple, Mr. and Mrs. John M. Walton also of Louisiana, when the accident occurred. Both families were returning from an area antique car show.

Hansard is charged with hitting the rear car driven by the Scheaffers while attempting to pass. Mrs. Scheaffer was thrown from the auto. Her husband also sustained injuries.

A test administered to Hansard to determine alcohol content of the blood registered above what is considered legally intoxicated.

Trial date for Hansard's case has not been set. If convicted, he could face a

two to ten year prison sentence.

Two other cases before the grand jury were passed on, indicating the jury did not feel there was sufficient evidence to bring felony charges against the individuals. Both involved assault charges against Donley County men.

Held over for trial were Ricky Rowe and Gary Dale English, charged with the theft of a 1970 Pontiac Firebird Aug. 26 from Chamberlain Motor Co. in Clarendon; Kevin Cates, charged with the July 28 theft of a pick-up owned by Mac Stavenhagen of Clarendon; Bryan Myers, accused of forging a \$78 check at Clarendon's Gibson's Store.

Broncho offense stymied by Childress

The Clarendon Broncos suffered their second loss of the season Friday, Oct. 1, losing to the strong AA Childress Bobcat team.

The Bobcats, rated in the top ten of AA schools by two polls, far outdistanced the Broncho's in offensive yardage, gaining 243 compared to a 98 yard offensive total for Clarendon.

Broncho back John Hall managed 65 of Clarendon's total output, Barry Schafer generated 37 yards for the night and Quarterback Howard Weatherston was sacked enough times to give him a minus-yard for the evening.

Added to the stymied offense was a reoccurring Broncho problem--fumbles. Clarendon fumbled six times, losing four of these to the Bobcats.

Clarendon was forced to punt six times Friday, at least giving kicker Irven Thomas a chance to turn in a respectable 34 yard average.

All scoring in Friday's contest occurred in the first half. Action in the second half was short gains, clouds of dust and spiraling kicks from the punters.

Clarendon received the opening kick-off, but had no chance to run it back as the Bobcat kicker put it deep into the endzone. In fact the

Childress kicking game kept Clarendon deep in their own territory for most of the first half.

The Bronco's first drive faltered and they were forced into a short punt which wound up on their own 38. Childress took the advantage and drove in quickly for the score. The point after kick was off to the side, however, giving Childress a six point lead.

Clarendon's next possession also ended badly. Childress recovered a fumbled ball on the Broncho's 25, and proceeded to repeat themselves offensively. The Bobcats scored a few plays later, again missing the point after to lead 12-0.

A kick-off runback by Broncho Keith Topper to his own 41 began a drive that also faltered.

A good punt by Thomas put the Bobcats back to the 19, however, and a fumble recovery by Broncho Mike Newhouse a few plays later gave Clarendon their first break. Nothing materialized for the home team, however, except two major losses behind the line of scrimmage. Once again Thomas punted away.

The Bobcats settled into a long scoring drive which was almost stopped by a

near-interception by Howard Weatherston. The ball bounced off of his chest into the hands of a Bobcat receiver, however, and Childress had possession on Clarendon's 35 yard line. A ten yard completion ended the drive and gave the Bobcats their third touchdown. This time the kick was good and the score changed to 19-0.

The Bobcats were soon on the scoreboard again, set up by another Clarendon fumble on their own 21. It was a pass play again for the fourth touchdown and the final game score. With 4:21 left in the second quarter, the score would not change again, remaining at 26-0 Childress' favor.

Broncs need big win against Quanah

Clarendon's Broncos will attempt getting back in the win column Friday night after being drubbed by the Childress Bobcats in their last game effort 26-0.

Friday, Oct. 8, they play a winless Quanah Indian team in Quanah. Game time is 8 p.m. Quanah, an AA team, has lost to Clarendon district opponents Wellington and Memphis this year. Wellington beat the Chief's 48-6 and Memphis took them 42-12.

Clarendon Coach Jerry Wilson said his team wants a win this week very badly after two straight losses. "We've got to turn things around," he said. "Childress was just too big for us." He cited one 150 pound Clarendon lineman who had to face off against a 215 pound Childress player all night.

"Once again," he said, "I've got to give our kids credit. They didn't give up in the second half." Trailing by 26 points at half Friday, Clarendon held Childress scoreless the rest of the game.

For this Friday's contest, Wilson said some offensive

changes may be made. In the Childress game, Clarendon lost four of six fumbles to the Bobcats. "We had kids not holding on to the ball and we had poor hand-offs," he said. "Friday we might wind up with our old offense intact or there may be some changes. That's one thing we're going to look at this week during workouts."

Wilson did have favorable comments about his team's kicking game last Friday, in particular the punts of Irven Thomas. He also singled out Broncho defensive lineman Jackie Longan as having "probably his best game of the year." The Broncho Big-Hit Award went to Keith Topper this week.

Looking ahead, Wilson said he didn't foresee any easy games for Clarendon, although he speculated they would probably be favored in the Quanah contest.

The main reason for our going down this time was the unfortunate day which it was held; Clarendon School's day at the Tri-State Fair. Our failure to meet the minimum quota, however, will not permanently affect our participation in the program. I am confident that this spring we will easily be able to reach our quota and more.

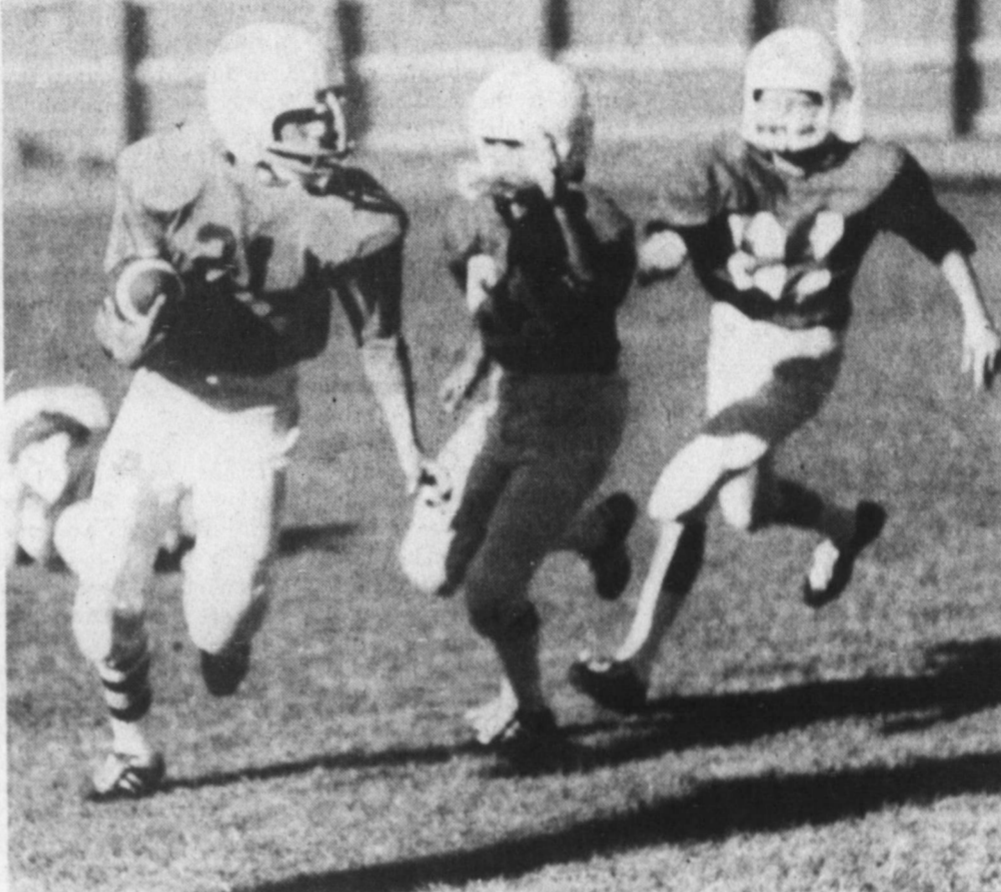

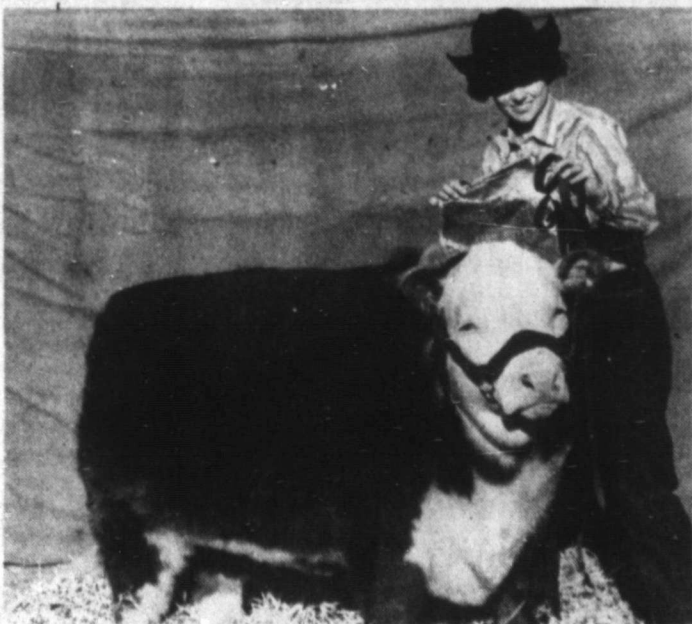

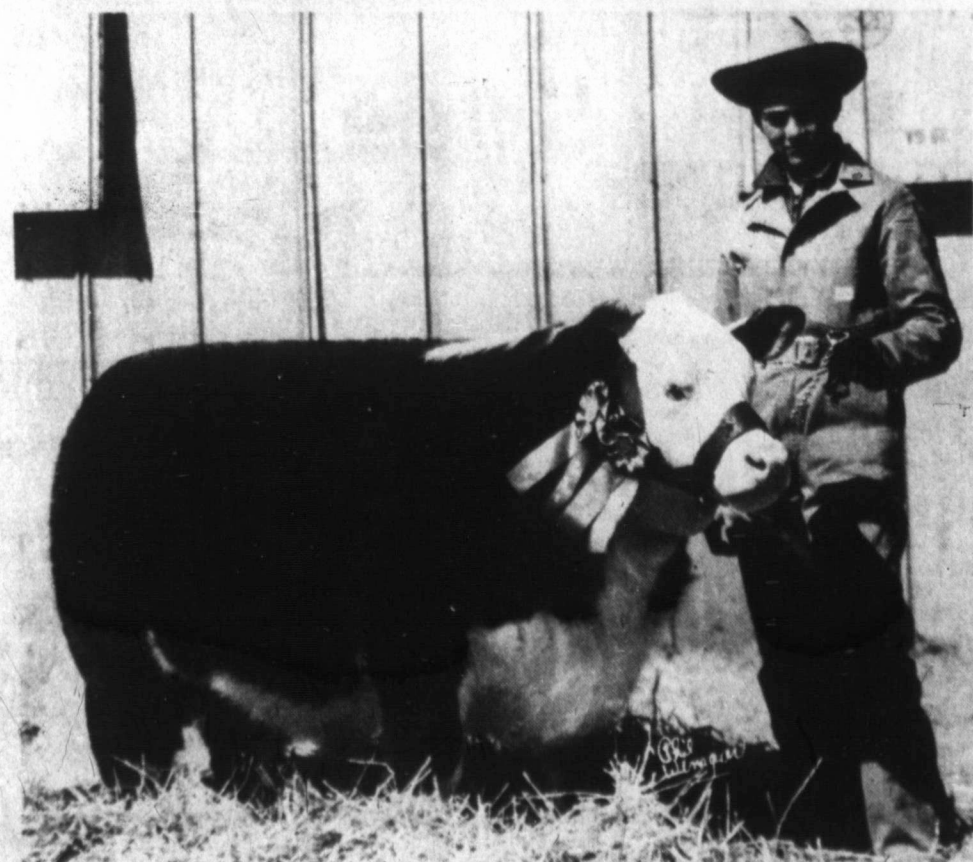

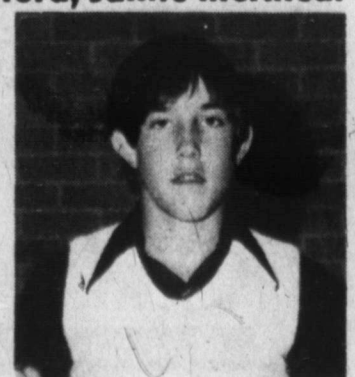

AN OPEN LETTER TO THE VOTERS OF THE 13th CONGRESSIONAL DISTRICT FROM CONGRESSMAN JACK HIGHTOWER

Two years ago I was elected to Congress by an overwhelming margin against an incumbent Congressman. During the 1974 campaign I refrained from any personal attacks on my opponent.

At that time I made it a point with my volunteers and my staff that they should treat anyone who opposed me with the utmost respect.

I thank all of my friends, supporters and staff for keeping the 1974 campaign on the highest level possible.

Responsiveness of government was a key issue. Our government does a poor job when it compounds our problems with red tape and burdensome regulations. Bureaucratic brush-offs of legitimate requests are very frustrating. I decided to organize my staff in such a way that people could deal at the local level with the bureaucratic maze of the federal agencies.

I promised two years ago that you would be able to call a number in the district and get an answer. When I took office I immediately established district offices in Amarillo, Vernon, and Wichita Falls—staffed by personnel who have been instructed personally to be responsive to the wishes and needs of my constituents. I am pleased that many people have told me they appreciate the work and attitude of my assistants. This is the only way I know to have a responsive Congressional office and I assure you I intend to try to improve this service constantly.

The Postal Service has been a bigger mess than ever since the Nixon Administration reorganized it. This is one reason I have chosen not to flood the mails with political propaganda such as newsletters. My alternative has been to communicate through the news media and to come home to the district at every opportunity for personal contact with constituents. All you ever heard about Washington having an artificial atmosphere is true. It has been my experience that the worst Congressmen are those who rarely come home. I am not going to let that happen to me. My policy is to talk with the people at home to see what they are thinking, and return to Washington and vote their philosophy and interests. I live in the district and commute to Washington.

As many of you know, I am being attacked, broadside, by my opponent in this 1976 campaign. His allegations and innuendos are based upon a misrepresentation of the record. I have voted in my two committees—Agriculture and Small Business—and on the floor in exactly the way I have reported to you and as I promised. My record is conservative by any measure. It is also independent of domination either by the Democratic leadership of the House or the Republican White House. I am neither an obstructionist nor a rubber stamp.

As this Congress adjourns, its overall record is mixed. This Congress has done some things it should not have done and left undone some things it should have done—such as enacting a "sunset" bill to cut down on federal bureaucracies or formulating an effective energy plan. We have been able to enact a bill to provide for prompt payment for the cattleman. We were able to pass a bill to provide for some relief on the estate tax problem which should benefit everyone who wants his or her property to remain in the family. These steps are not enough but they are movement in the right direction.

All of us feel sometimes that our views are not reflected properly in Washington. I would prefer a Congress that holds a tighter rein on spending, but I do not choose the other 434 members of the House. I work with them and try to influence them, but I cannot dictate their votes. I feel my job is to represent you—the people of the 13th District—and I pledge to do my best to represent you well.
