City still negotiating for business

Ongoing negotiations between the city of Clarendon and owners of Texas Saddlery are continuing, but no final settlement has been reached concerning the possible move of that industry to Clarendon.

Early this week, representatives of the city quoted an \$18,500 sale price for Clarendon's City Hall building, the building in which Texas Saddlery part-owner Tony Skinner said his company would buy to house the operation if they moved to Clarendon.

Walt Knorpp, Clarendon Chamber of Commerce board member, is handling most of the negotiations with Skinner. He said Skinner is now obtaining cost estimates for renovating the City Hall if his company decides to move. Knorpp said he

expects no final decision on the city's offered sale price until Skinner has completed these cost figures.

Texas Saddlery, now based in Amarillo, manufactures numerous types of western goods. The company specializes in catalogue sales.

Amarillo news media reports of county inaccurate, incomplete

Donley County has been the topic of two recent unfavorable Amarillo news media reports, with both news stories apparently based on inaccurate or incomplete information.

Both area physician Dr. Richard Gilkey and the personnel of the County Sheriff's office have been spotlighted in the Amarillo news media lately with critical reports of both.

Gilkey was charged on Amarillo's KVII Channel 7's Hot Line news program with charging his patients when they received the supposedly free swine flu vaccine. The local Sheriff's office was charged with ignoring a tip off from the Potter County Attorney's office that the widely reported dog fights were to be held in the county.

Both news media reports were incomplete in their facts, however.

The Gilkey charge was prompted by a letter sent by a viewer to the KVII news program "Hot Line." The station broadcast the viewers charge Nov. 5, according to their records, without first contacting Dr. Gilkey. Dr. Gilkey has never charged for either the swine flu shots nor an office visit required for the shot. The shots have been administered free by his staff each Wednesday afternoon at the Medical Center Clinic.

Gilkey speculated that whoever wrote the complaining letter may have come to his office for some other medical matter and while there also received the swine flu vaccination. They could have been billed later for other medical treatment at the same time as the vaccination.

Gilkey also said its possible they received the polyvalent flu shot from his office, a shot which im-

munizes against the more common type of flu viruses. This vaccination is not free.

The swine flu vaccinations are free to the public when both the vaccine and the medical supplies needed to administer the shots are provided by the U.S. Government. This is the case at his clinic, Gilkey said. If a doctor uses his own equipment to administer the shots (syringes, cotton, etc.) he can legally charge a fee.

Donley County was once again headline news last week when the Nov. 11 and 12 editions of the "Amarillo Globe News," reported the County Sheriff's Dept. had ignored earlier reports of the impending dog fights held here Nov. 6.

According to Globe News' Regional Editor Mary Kate Tipp, the story does not specify when these calls were made, however. Donley County Deputy Clyde James said he did receive two calls

from the Potter County Attorney's office, but they were both received Friday afternoon before the raid on Saturday morning.

Sam Kiser, an attorney in the office, verifies that he called the Sheriff's office on Friday after receiving a tip from a woman in Amarillo who was a member of the Animal Rights group.

He said he first received a call from her on Wednesday before the raid with a report

of the fight. She did not say where or when it was to be held. She called back Friday saying it was to be that weekend and in Donley County. Kiser said he then made his calls to county law enforcement officials.

"In my opinion, your local people did follow through," Kiser said. "I must apologize for any misconception the paper printed quoting me. I was just a go-between."

Obtaining doctors discussed at meeting

Discussion of doctor placement services took up the majority of time at November's meeting of the Donley County Medical District Board Tuesday, Nov. 9.

The board formally withdrew a proposal they had made to Dr. Kuhn Young Son, a Korean physician, at Tuesday's meeting. Dr. Son had previously turned down a district offer of a guaranteed

\$12,000 a year salary if he would establish a medical practice in the county. Dr. Son came to the board's attention through a doctor placement service based in New York.

The board discussed the possibility of using other such placement services Tuesday, in particular a service called MEDX which offers guaranteed physician placement. The Board instructed Medical Center Administrator Gerry Knight to contact MEDX representatives for further information.

Basically, Knight said, MEDX guarantees they will replace any physicians they place if he either leaves within a year's time or is dismissed for valid reasons.

For this guarantee, the Medical District would have to guarantee the doctor a \$15,000 yearly salary plus a \$1,500 ten per cent commission fee to be paid to MEDX. The District would also have to pay malpractice insurance for the physician, an estimated \$2,000 per year.

Knight said MEDX places Philippine doctors exclusively. He said the company also guarantees all placed doctors can speak, write and read fluent English. All physicians are also guaranteed to have passed an international medical exam and will be qualified to take the Texas temporary medical license FLEX test.

One drawback of the service, Knight said, is all physicians to be placed are currently in the Philippines and travel costs eliminate the possibility of bringing a potential candidate to the district. All candidates would have to be evaluated according to dossier information provided by MEDX.

Knight, following Board instructions, has already written MEDX and has talked to a representative of that company by telephone. The representative told him MEDX had interviewed approximately 450 Philippine doctors and selected 150 possible doctors to be placed from these.

The Boys teams have 28 players out. Coach Overcast said, "Twenty-seven girls tried out for the Clarendon's two girls' teams. For the boys, 11 freshman, seven sophomores, nine juniors and one senior are out for the team."

"When you don't have many seniors on your team," Overcast said, "you're going to be pretty much overlooked in pre-season polls." The Broncho Varsity Boys team was picked fourth in district by the High Plains Basket-

College insurance rates to increase

Clarendon College's Board of Regents approved an insurance coverage increase on campus facilities at their regular meeting Nov. 11. The old insurance coverage, handled through Knorpp Insurance of Clarendon, was decided to be inadequate due to building

cost increases since the facilities were constructed.

The newly figured insurance premium for the college's coverage was \$1,091 above the old price. The regents approved the additional insurance coverage after a lengthy discussion.

In unrelated business, the regents also discussed a recent Health, Education and Welfare audit of the college. In the audit report, HEW noted Clarendon College was in violation of an HEW act which states no building facilities built with the assistance of an HEW loan or grant may be used for medical or dental education programs. The college's current nursing training program is housed in such a building. CC President Kenneth Vaughan said HEW's reasoning in the matter is that money is provided for such programs through other HEW programs.

He said the college now has three alternatives: to relocate the nursing program; to have the used space declared ineligible and to repay "pro rate" money for the building's use back to HEW; or to request a waiver for the building's use.

The regents voted to request the waiver and all other action on the matter was tabled until this request was either accepted or rejected.

Childhood vaccinations set

Free vaccines against several childhood diseases will be offered in Clarendon at the Community Action Center on Main Street Nov. 29 from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m.

The shots will immunize against polio, diphtheria, lock jaw, whooping cough, measles and rubella. All Donley County residents are eligible for the free vaccinations.

Local artist due one-man show

Clarendon artist Don Stone will have a one-man art show at Clarendon's Farmers State Bank Nov. 28 from 2-5 p.m.

The show will be Stone's first and will feature many of the artist's work painted especially for this showing. Stone said no paintings at the show will be priced above \$45. All paintings will be framed and are done in acrylics.

Stone's paintings given away as a door prize. Refreshments will also be served.

Stone said he is a recent convert to painting. Since beginning last January, he has already won four 1st place ribbons in art competition. He also won the "Best of Show" award at the July 4th Clarendon Art Show. He was recently named "Artist of the Year," by Clarendon's chapter of the Artists Studio club.

Bronchos lose last game to Shamrock

Clarendon Broncho fans had a snowy ride home from Shamrock Friday Nov. 12, after 2½ hours of sitting in the cold November night to see their team finally beaten by the Irish 18-8.

It was a long night at Shamrock. The Bronchos lost after leading their opponents well into the second half. Most Clarendon fans traveling to Shamrock stayed until game's end, however, despite freezing temperatures and the extra-long game due to field lighting problems at

half-time. Half the stadium lights at the Shamrock field failed to come on after a half-time band routine in the dark. The game was delayed some 20 minutes until the electrical situation was fixed.

When the second half finally got underway, Clarendon fans saw their team's lead dwindle through accurate Irish passing and the nagging turn-over problem the bronchos suffered the entire 1976 season. Clarendon lost three fumbles and a pass interception which set

up the score that put the Irish ahead. The final Clarendon fumble also set up Shamrock's final score.

Initial scoring came quickly for both teams. Shamrock received the opening kick-off, but could not move the ball. They punted away to give the Bronchos their first possession, a down series which ended with a 36 yard Howard Weatherton run into the endzone. A two point after run by Tony Wallace gave Clarendon an eight point lead.

Shamrock came right back in the first quarter. On their next ball possession, they too worked towards the goal line, with a 24 yard TD ending their efforts. The Irish were unable to get into the endzone of an extra point and Clarendon maintained an 8-6 lead with 3:56 left in the first quarter.

Both teams settled into this score for the lion's share of the contest, with no one scoring again until early in the 4th quarter.

In first half play, Clarendon's defensive unit stopped the Irish twice on the bronc end of the field. The Shamrock team moved to Clarendon's 29 and to the Bronc eight, both times being forced into giving the ball over on downs. In the final scoring threat of the first half, the Irish were 1st and goal to go on the Broncho eight yard line. Clarendon held four straight downs, however, and went to the locker room at half with their two point lead intact.

After the delays of the halftime, Clarendon received the opening kick-off, winding up on their own 13. They

couldn't move it from there, and punted away to the Irish.

Shamrock's turn-around touchdown came as the fourth period was beginning. Clarendon seemed to be moving the ball well late in the 3rd quarter. They held the Irish for four downs and took over on their own 31. A long Weatherton gain put them across mid-field and in business at the 39. The next play proved disastrous, however, as Weatherton's pass was intercepted. A Broncho 15 yard penalty on the same play suddenly put the Irish threatening on Clarendon's 29 as the quarter ended.

The Irish passing game finally put them into the endzone a few plays later. Their extra-point attempt again failed, but they led 12-8.

With 10:03 left in the 1976 football season, Clarendon had the ball on their own 30 yard line, faced with 70 yards of field between them and the lead.

On the first play of the series, Clarendon fumbled with the Irish recovering on the 24. Shamrock finally put it in for the score from the one-foot line, going ahead 18-8.

Clarendon managed two ball possessions after the final Shamrock TD, but neither could be converted into points. They lost the ball on downs after a fake-punt attempt failed in their final possession of the season. Shamrock waited out the clock on the Clarendon 30 as the game's seconds ticked off.

The loss made Clarendon's season record 5-5, 1-3 in district play. The Bronchos lost to Wellington, Memphis and Shamrock in 2-A, and defeated Claude earlier at Clarendon's Homecoming contest. Other victories of the season were against McLean, White Deer, Stinnett and Quannah. The Bronchos also lost to Childress and Boys Ranch.

Many people are still asking if they should take the swine flu shot. My answer is yes. Only those allergic to eggs and those under 18 yrs. of age who are in good health should not take it. All others who are in good health and under 65 yrs should take the monovalent swine flu. The bivalent swine flu also contains the victoria strain flu and is specifically for the chronically ill and those over 65 yrs. of age. So if you have heart disease, asthma, emphysema or diabetes, you need the bivalent swine flu. Those under 18 yrs. with one of the above chronic illnesses will need two such injections two to four weeks apart for best immunity.

It is unfortunate that the politicians made such a mess of this immunization program. It is a good program, but those who need it most are afraid to take the shot because of the bad publicity. We have had virtually no reactions here in Donley County. So I strongly recommend the swine flu shot to all my patients. It would be better to take the shot than take a chance on a possible flu epidemic.

Some of you have asked about the regular polyvalent flu shot. (The polyvalent flu contains many of types A&B flu including the Asian and Hong Kong flu). The flu manufacturers did not make the regular polyvalent flu this year since they were making the swine flu, so there is no longer any regular flu shots available. I had a few hundred doses which had to be used before December this year and have already used up the supply. If you were lucky enough to receive the regular polyvalent flu, you can consider yourself a special patient. You'll also have to pay \$6.00 for the regular flu shot, because I had to buy it. It wasn't supplied by the government.

Over six hundred doses of the swine flu have been given in Donley County, which is well above the National average (less than 10% immunized). If you haven't received your vaccine yet and want it, please come in before the end of the month, preferably on Wednesday afternoon, but any other time if you can't come on Wednesdays, and of course - No Charge for the swine flu vaccination.

An ounce of Prevention is worth a pound of Cure.

LONE STAR FILES FOR RATE INCREASE [Clarendon], [November 5, 1976]-Lone Star Gas Company's local manager, A.E. Swearingen, today filed an application for a rate increase to provide the company an 8% rate of return.

Swearingen said Lone Star's distribution system serving Clarendon earned a 1.09% rate of return in 1975 and that \$28,536.00 is required to correct the utility's revenue deficiency. He explained that Lone Star has experienced increased costs of operation due to the current inflation, and unrecovered costs of purchased gas which substantially eroded utility earnings.

In June of last year, the Railroad Commission authorized Lone Star to recover 85% of its increase in the average cost of gas (above a base of .72 cents) from residential and commercial deliveries at the city gate. During the fourteen months ended August, 1976, Lone Star had unrecovered gas costs of \$14.2 million for gas delivered at the city gate for residential and commercial customers.

"These costs result from the rapidly rising gas prices during the last few years. For example, our average cost of gas climbed from 18 cents per thousand cubic feet in 1971 to \$1.03 in June of this year, a 472% increase. Utility earnings declined from \$23.3 million in 1971 to \$13.1 million in 1975, or 44%," Swearingen said.

The company's application would raise the average residential customer's bill about 1.41 cents per month, based on 8 Mcf (thousand cubic feet) consumption.

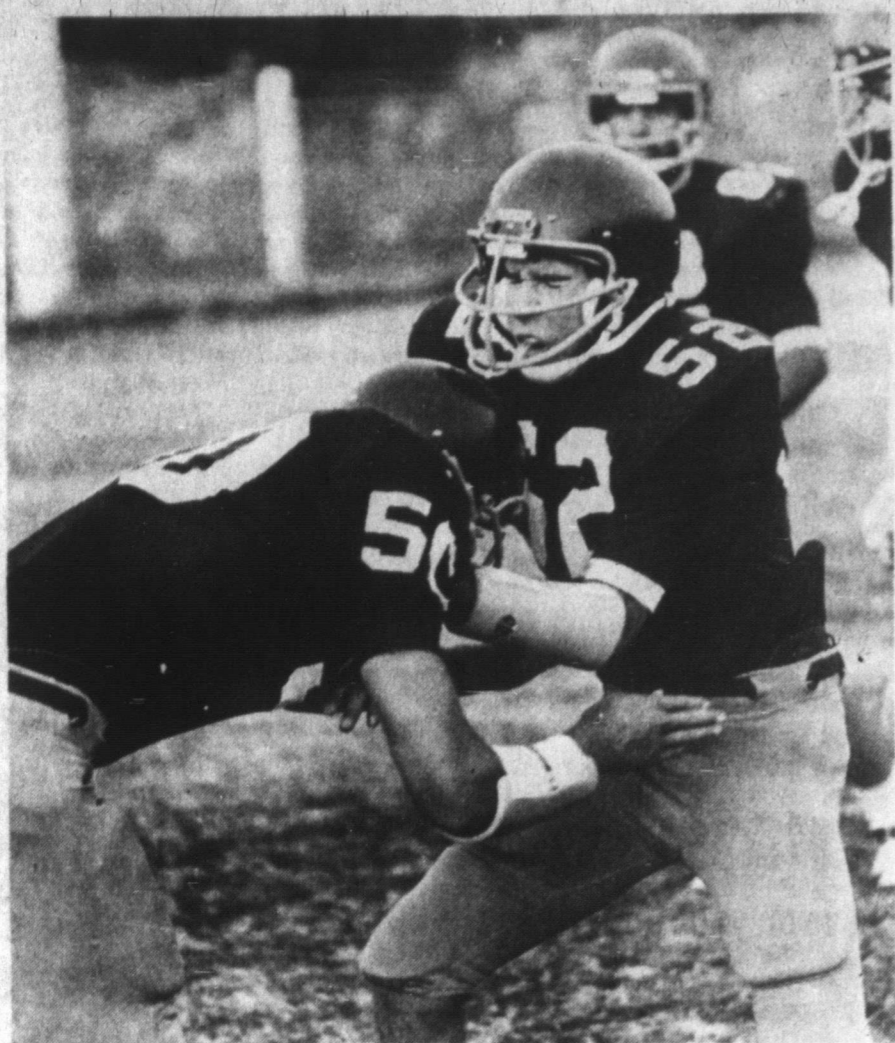

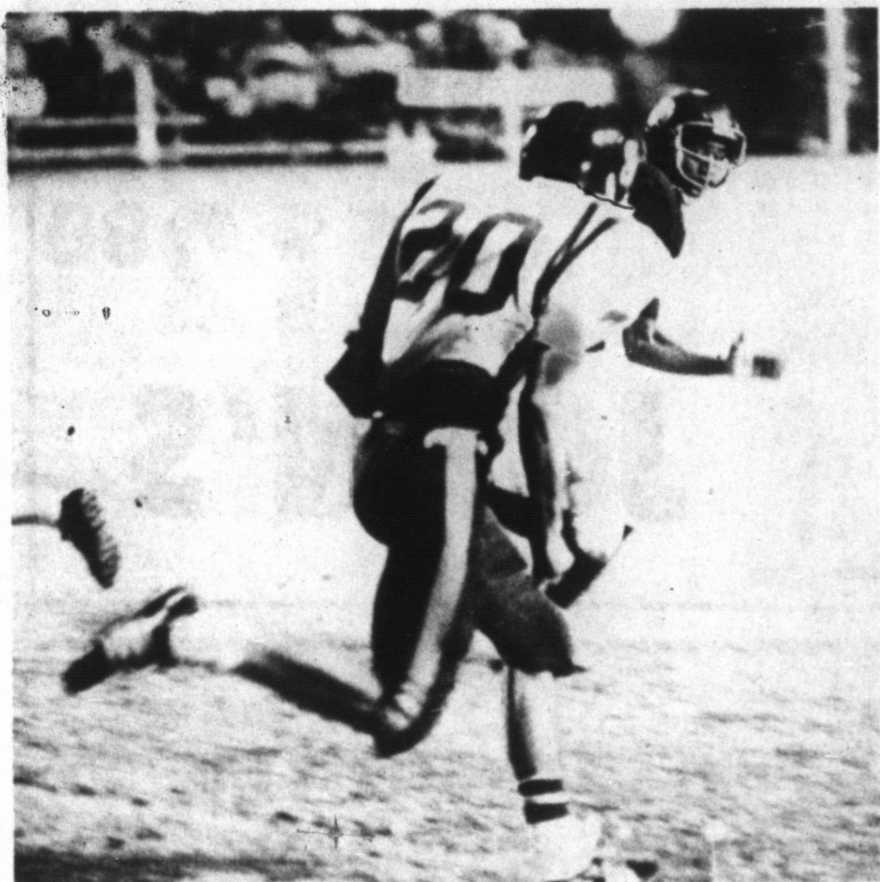


Bronchos workout before scrimmage

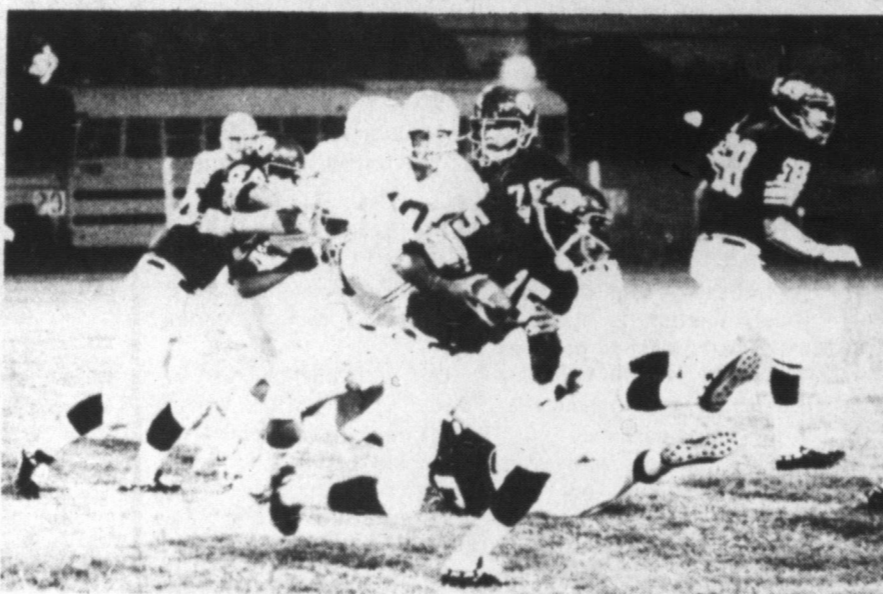

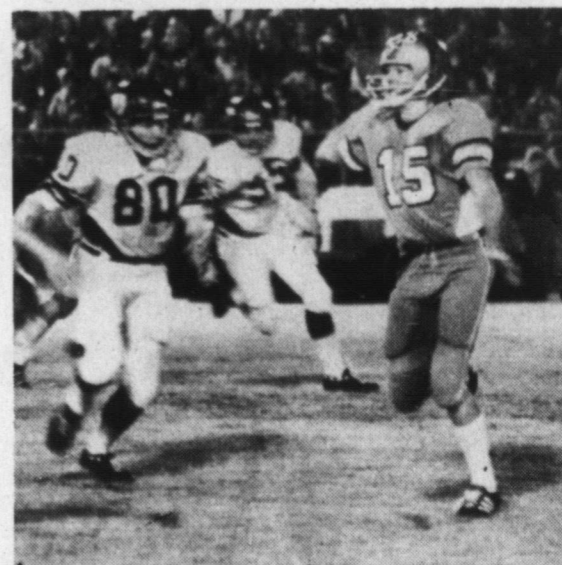
