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

apply for crop insurance for **Barley and Wheat in Donley** County, Texas, according to Jakie Harris, Director for the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation (FCIC). Crop Insurance covers unavoidable loss of production from damage caused by adverse weather conditions, insects, plant disease, wildlife, earthquake or fire. Insurance begins when the crop is planted. Producers may choose from three coverage levels: 50-, 65-, or 75-percent of the established farm yield for insurance protection. "Three optional price elections for valuing production lost or damaged also are available," Harris says. "Producers of wheat. barley, and oats who can qualify for a new Individual Yield Coverage (IYC) plan are offered higher yield

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Monday said collection of the state's 10 percent mixed drink tax during the second quarter of 1983 was up 5.4 percent over the same period last year.

The once popular Farm to Market in the early part of the century, where the farmer sold his milk, eggs and produce directly to the consumer is once again becoming popular.

In 1913, Frank Hardin began to experiment with watermelons and cantaloupes. His business grew and to help take orders Hardin had a branch telephone installed on a pole in his field so his customers could call their orders in. In the mid thirties, this was a new type of business for this section of the country and orders were filled daily right there from shady grove of bois d'arc trees. Sorting tables held roasting ears, beans, cantaloupes and other produce.



In 1977, when they purchased the land, they started planting their orchard. For the next three years they planted about 100 trees each year. Then in 1980 they planted 2500 fruit trees and in 1981 they planted 300 trees. These trees include 11 varieties of plums, including the Bruce for jelly. Santa Rosa for eating and Stanley for prunes. Other trees planted were apple, apricot, peach, nectarine, and just about any kind of fruit tree which will grow in this area plus grape vines. Their goal is to have a 7,000 tree

them that the melon they had bought the summer before was so rotten that it had turned yellow. They had never seen or heard of a yellow meated melon. Bob and Cheryl not only replaced their melon, but cut a yellow melon for them to taste.

The Wiggins have many repeat customers who stop by year after year on their vacation trips. They have had customers from all 50 states and many South American countries as well as Europe. Australia. Romania. France and Germany

Their stand is open from early May until early October. In the early part of the season. Bob makes two and three trips a week to markets in San Antonio, McAllen, Presidio, Divine, and markets in Louisiana, Colorado and Mexico.

Bob and Cheryl make many trips in the winter months to buy items such as syrup, peppers, honey and jellies to name a few. They also work at the West Texas Gin during the ginning season.

Cheryl's Farm Market is a family affair with the Wiggins family. Their two sons, Chad and Bobo, and Bob's father and brothers help out when needed.

The stand has a pea shelling machine and for \$2.00 per bushel, they will shell your canning peas for you. They also have another machine which culls, washes grades, defuzzes and makes fruit, such as peaches ready to eat. This machine will be on display next year and you can watch it at work.

When their fruits and vegetables began to make, they contract to sell their excess to other markets some as far away as New York. Some 35-40 years ago, a

friend in Colorado gave Bob's father some seeds for Persian cantaloupes. For some reason these melon seeds are hard to find and anyone who buys one of these melons can sell the seeds back to Cheryl's Farm

the melons and vegetables taste better as there are approximately eight Farm Markets in the county not counting the pickups and trailers parked along Highway 287 between Clarendon and Hedley. All these Farm Markets

are excellent to buy fresh fruits and vegetables.



Three-Zone Dove hunting season

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission has approved a new three-zone alignment for dove hunting for the upcoming seasons. Meeting in Austin last

week, the commission established the Panhandle, Central and Rio Grande Zones. The new alignment replaces the two-zone system which had been in effect since 1946.

Ron George, dove program leader for the Parks and Wildlife Department, told commission members the three-zone system was designed to provide optimum hunting opportunity for hunters when the birds are available, within the context of proper management.

Significant changes brought about by the new alignment include a Sept. 1 opening date for a large portion of Southeast Texas which formerly had the later South Zone opening date; a straight 70-day season for the Panhandle-South Plains and much of North Texas; and allowance for two whitewinged doves in the daily

bag limit statewide. The new system also utilizes highways for boundary lines for better delineation of zone boundaries. Under the two-zone system. county boudaries were used. The Panhandle Zone mourning dove season will be Sept. 1-Nov. 9; the Central Zone season will be Sept. 1-Oct. 30, 1983, and Jan. 7-16, 1984; the Rio Grande season will be Sept. 17-Nov. 5. 1983 and Jan. 7-22, 1984. During the special fourday white-winged dove season in the Rio Grande Zone. hunting for both mourning and white-winged doves will be allowed Sept. 3-4 and 10-11. In the shaded portion of the zone, the daily bag limit will be 10 whitewings and 12 mourning doves. In the lined portion, the daily limit will be 12 mourning doves and two whitewings, for a total daily limit of 14 birds.

Shooting hours during the four-day whitewing season will be noon to sunset.

On fully-feathered wing must remain attached to the carcass of every dove taken by hunters in the Rio Grande Zone only, while the bird is being transported between the place where taken and one's abode or a commercial processing facility.

As in the past, all persons who hunt white-winged doves will be required to have a White-winged Dove Stamp in their possession in addition to a valid hunting license. The stamp require-

ment applies to any person taking or hunting whitewings statewide. A hunting license is not required of persons hunting doves in the county of residence.



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
Owens Family Reunion

The big day for the reunion was Sunday. Several attended church services after which a bountiful meal was



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
