A Gift of Life This time of year the streets are full of people rushing around trying to find the perfect gift for that special person. One parent will buy that baby his first teddy bear or the young man will invest in the promise ring for his fiancee, but no gift will match that which Billie Dunn gave her brother, Tony--the gift of life. Tony Shew, 38 years of

age, was stricken with diabetis at the age of 17. Over the past few years his kidneys began to fail him. Finally in May of 1983 Tony was placed on dialysis hoping to find a suitable kidney donor. Tony's kidneys once again were about to stop functioning. His eyes were beginning to go along with many other vital functions. His wife, three kids and grandbaby watched his condition deterriorate. Each of them knew without a kidney transplant her husband, their dad and her grandfather would die, but who could donate a kidney? In August Billie Dunn received a call from her mother, Mary Elizabeth Shew from Abilene, Texas. The call concerned Billie's brother, Tony. Immediately Mrs. Shaw began informing Billie of Tony's condition and the fact that he would die if a kidney was not given by a

believe the prayers are the deciding factors making the operation a success," though Billie. Opal Messer is one of the last individuals Billie talked to from Clarendon before going to Dallas for the surgery. Opal's positive attitude reassured Mrs. Dunn all would be fine. Billie who had never had an operation before was wondering what an operation would be like when Opal stated, "I have had three operations and everything worked out - you will be just

fine.' Before leaving Billie explained to her two children, Adrian, age 6, and Jason, 5, that their Uncle Tony is very sick and needed some of her kidneys. Since she had two and he barely had one she would share one of hers, so he could get well. With her children's minds at rest she could leave for Dallas. When leaving Billie's daughter, Adrain, said When I get big I'll give my kidney away like you, Mommy!"

On November 9, the night before the surgery, Billie Dunne was at peace and ready for the next morning. One doctor came in to visit, possibly to reassure Billie all would turn out great. The doctor visited for a while and commented, "A person in the streets of Dallas has a greater chance of dying than you will in surgery tomorrow." Billie was awakened around 6 a.m. Nov. 10 and taken to the operating room at 7 a.m. Billie knew as soon as the oxygen mask was placed on her face the sooner it would be over with. She would awaken and all would be alright. "The kidney transplant was successful...your brother accepted your kidney with no signs of rejection or complication," were the first words Billie heard as she awoke. Billie made it. Her brother could live with less pain in his life. Nothing could be more satisfactory than what Billie did. Billie was in the hospital for 8 days while Tony remained in the

hospital for eleven days. The doctors told Billie to

Billie was prepared and willing to risk her life to save her brother. Their relationship was not very close since Tony married and moved off when Billie was only 13, but still Billie was the only one who could give Tony a chance to live. The doctors stated, "The holiday season (Thanksgiving) is approaching and a lot of accidents will occur. Possibly one of the cadavers' kidneys would match Tony's and you would not be forced to give your kidney." Bill responded, "Tony might not be able to wait. I have been the most biologically suitable. It is meant for me to give him a

chance." The thing Billie could not stand was to see her brother lying helplessly in pain. At this point nothing would stop her from making Tony's life more pleasant.

The doctors began to give Billie literature to read in order to explain the procedure that was about to take place. One doctor stated that she had a 95% chance of making it, but anytime a vital organ is given up it reduces the chance of living. Billie felt her husband, Danny, indicated a little more apprehensive than she did. His love eased any fear she might have had. Billie had no fear of death or even being handicapped after the surgery. "The people of Clarendon helped reassure me by all their support and prayers come out for the best. My church, the Church of Christ, really is helping me through this ordeal.







HOME HEALTH CARE


Health care in the surroundings of one's own home is on the increase. This movement under the title of "home health care" is somewhat akin to the renewed interest in physician house calls that is occurring in some major cities. Exactly what is."home care"? As the name implies, this type of care is provided in the residence of the sick person.


Some programs. offer. what is called ."homemaker services". This includes such things as assisting the sick person with light housekeeping, laundry services, and even child_care. These are beneficial to confined or .elderly individuals who may not be able to totally take care of themselves.

Routine health care services may be provided in the home to those who are recovering from an extended illness; those with chronic diseases such as arthritis, those needing nutritional care such as special intravenous fluids; in fact, almost any health problem which does not require immediate hospitalization.

One large company recently announced a program of care that will approximate the "hospital environment" for some illnesses. Time will tell how far this new delivery system will ultimately go in bringing modern health care into the home.

. The legacy of a cross country walk across the United States began outside of Las Vegas at Hoover Dam for two Nevada grandmothers. On October 5, after several months of preparation. Jan Rose (61) and her sister-in-law Louise Rose (58) set forth on a two year journey. The. two women quit or a person could say "retired" from their jobs in order to fulfill a fantasy each had to travel and see the U.S. "Our main goal is to let people know that senior citizens are still physically fit, able-bodied people with sharp minds," stated Jan Rose. Louise went on further by indicating they wanted to show everyone that the senior citizens of this country was able to do more than live a life in a rocking chair. By the way. their motto is "We're Off .Our Rockers" which perfectly describes these women. The average ladies, no not average, but ... women full of zest_who have a Jot of love and kindness to give the people they encounter best describes the two. Jan and. Louise go to convalescent. homes and Senior Citizen centers striving to give hope and goodwill in the process. A fund was established before leaving Las Vegas in. which 100 percent of the contributions are used to help needy Senior Citizen Centers or handicapped_individuals. It is called Seniors Walking Across Am erica Fund.

The women trained. for nine months by hiking from Nevada to Idaho and then having some fun by "tubing" down a snow covered mountains on innertubes. The. Roses' carry 35-40 lb. back packs which contain only the essential tools necessary for the two's survival. The packs contain fruit, cheese, coffee, vitamins, peanut butter and crackers. Down-filled coats accompany them, along with a tent they set up alongside the road at night when not staying in a motel.

The team of two walked from Las Vegas to Tucumcari, New Mexico before a trucker "kidnapped" the ladies. He did so out_of kindness. The unidentified trucker told Jan and Louise they should not hike across the panhandle of Texas because it is so severe during the winter with towns far apart. The truckers said. "I am going to carry you to the best little town in Texas for va'll to recuperate with a friendly and safe environment." He drove until a sign indicated the words -- Clarendon, Texas. This was to be a place to rest for awhile. Immediately, Jan and Louise Rose found the town was just like the trucker had described. Clarendon_ welcomed them, but to its dismay the women disappeared in the Bain apartment complex. The two spent 11/2 weeks resting before being interviewed. Also, the women are writing a book on their ventures as they travel. Jan Rose completed the first four chapters in Clarendon. These women are not your ordinary hitchhikers seen on the highways, but .individuals dedicated to a justifiable cause. Each has three children and are widows. Jan's daughter, Dr. Joan Rose of Las Vegas, is the public relation chairperson of the venture. All the contacts are made_through Joan .. A little additional background information of the women includes Louise Rose being a "Queen for a day" on the game show in hollywood, California in 1963. She won her trip to the Mardi Gras Celebration at New Orleans. Jan worked for the . state while Louise was a casino cashier for a hotel on the Las Vegas strip. Now the Roses' have a job they have always wanted to do and that is their mission of goodwill they are currently on. When_asked what they would like to do in the Panhandle, they replied. "first-we would like to ride horses and round up cattle on a ranch, second-we would like to see cotton being processed, and thirdly-see a nart of the panhandle.". On Monday the women toured

The greatest two benefits received thus far in the trip is that. Louise gave up her 3 pack a day smoking habit (which was no easy task) and the fact that they have encouraged many people to get out of their rockers and enjoy life!

Thursday_night Channel 7 KVII-TV will interview the women after their venture in Canyon and Amarillo. The news media has followed these women everywhere they have gone. The three networks and the associated press covered Jan and Louise in a press conference before the two left Nevada.. Good Morning America of ABC invited the two -"young" women for an interview. Every newspaper along the way has been eager to hear and tell the captivating tales of Jan and Louise.

- Future plans include visiting former President Limmy Carter in Plains, Georgia and conversing with the current president, Ronald Reagan, at the White House in Washington, D.C.


Who's Who
