Bull Sale Held Here Is Termed Success

The Rolling Plains Registered Beef Cattle Association 4th Annual Sale was the largest yet, says County Agent Flip Breedlove, secretary and manager of the sale. It is estimated that around eighteen hundred persons were on hand both days of the sale for the sale and the judging. Buyers of bulls were from seven states, including Texas. The judging of the bulls was on the fifth and the sale on the sixth.

Judging the Galloway bulls was Dink Hall of the Osage Cattle Co. of Welch, Okla. The grand champion bull went to P. C. Hale, Jr., of Cloverdale, California, and sold to the Osage Cattle Co. of Welch, Oklahoma, for \$1,000.00. The reserve champion Galloway went to Robin Green of Clarendon, Texas, and sold to L. M. Tittle of Mangum, Oklahoma, for \$480.00. Twelve Galloway Bull sold for an average of \$635.00 per head.

Dale Hoover of Perryton, Texas, judged the Hereford bulls and the champion went to Howard Gault and Son of Hereford, Texas. He sold to Mrs. J. R. Porter of Clarendon, Texas, for \$800.00. The reserve champion (See Bull Sale Page 8)

NMMI, Howard County Play Bulldogs Here Sat. & Tues. Nights

Two of the highest rated teams in the Western Junior College Athletic Conference will invade Clarendon on Saturday night of this week and on Tuesday night of next week to open the conference basketball campaign.

The New Mexico Military Institute team from Roswell, New Mexico, will be here on Saturday night and the powerful Howard County College Jayhawks from Big Spring will be here Tuesday night. Both games are conference games. Games will begin at eight o'clock.

New Mexico Military finished third in the conference race last year and Howard County finished first. The Jayhawks, coached by former Bulldog coach, Buddy Travis, are reported to be stronger this year than last. They compiled a 32-3 record last year and so far this year have lost only one game and that was to last year's national champion, Coffeyville, Kansas, Junior College in a game recently played in Coffeyville. The Jayhawks are featuring two 6 feet, 7 inch colored boys along with two others who are 6-5 and 6-2. Also, they still have Walter Carter, who led the conference in scoring last year.

New Mexico Military took consolation honors in the recent Odessa College Tournament. They lost in the first round to South Plains College and then defeated Schriener Institute and Lubbock Christian College.

High School Teams To Samnorwood Tourney

Both girls and boys basketball teams will take part in the Samnorwood basketball tournament this week end. The Bronchoettes begin play at 12:45 today (Thursday, Dec. 13) as they take on the girls from Miami. The Bronchos will play Miami's boys following the girls' game. The boys' game is scheduled for 1:45 p.m.

Miami is expected to bring a strong set of teams into this annual affair. Miami's boys team took first place in the Stratford tournament last week. The Miami girls have split games with Samnorwood, each team having been defeated on its home court.

In action at Claude last Friday night the local girls' team almost won over the strong Claude girls in a hard fought, low scoring battle that ended with Claude Mustangettes on top 37-32. Clarendon's Bronchoettes led the first quarter 7-4, but found it difficult to score in the second quarter and trailed 15-18 at half time. With the same troubles in the third period, plus the loss of Dorothy Richey due to a knee injury, the local girls were behind 22-31 entering the final quarter. The Bronchoette guards; Mollie Floyd, Janie Ivey, and Connie Martin allowed the Claude girls only 6 points in the last period and the Bronchoette forwards had a chance to upset the undefeated Claude team, but poor shooting percentages caused them to fall short once more as has been the story in recent years. Jeanette Ramey shared scoring honors with Dorothy Richey as they both had 12 points each.

Election To Expand Junior College District Is Scheduled For Dec. 21

This is a follow-up of the article that appeared in the Leader last week concerning the upcoming election to enlarge the Clarendon Junior College District.

One correction is being made on last week's article. There will be two voting places in the territory which lies outside the present college district but inside the Clarendon Consolidated Independent School District. Those two voting places will be at the Lelia Lake school house and at the Goldston Community Building.

People in this territory may vote at either of those places. The Hedley School District will also vote on the proposition of coming into the Clarendon Junior College District. They will vote at the Hedley City Hall.

Several questions have arisen concerning the election and the results of the election if it carries. Some of the questions and answers follow:

Who Can Vote?

Those people eligible to vote in this election will be people who are otherwise eligible voters. They must be residents of the territory concerned, must be of voting age, and have paid their poll tax or be exempt from such tax.

What Is Meant by Territory?

The territory is simply that part of the Clarendon Public School District which is not presently a part of the Clarendon College District. For example, the people who live in the city of Clarendon are not eligible to vote in this election because they are already in the college district. Those people residing outside the college district but inside the public school district may vote provided they are otherwise eligible voters.

What About Valuations?

This election on Dec. 21 is only for the enlargement of the district. However, if this vote

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

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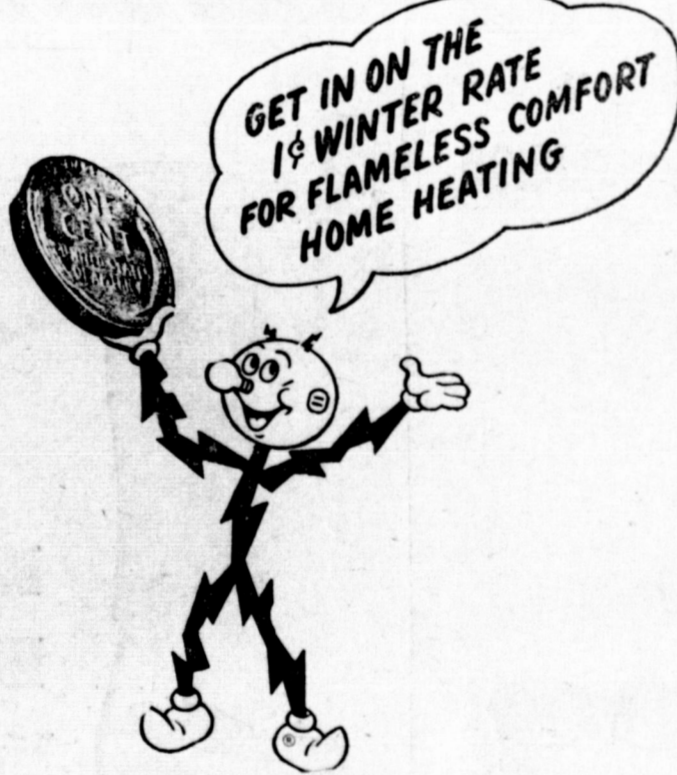

Applications Are Now Being Accepted For Postmaster At Hedley

An examination for Postmaster at Hedley, Texas, at \$5365 a year, will be open for acceptance of applications until January 2, 1963, the Commission announced today. This examination has been announced under revised qualifications standards agreed upon between the Commission and the Post Office Department.

Competitors for the postmaster vacancy in this city must have at least 1 year of experience (education above high

school level may be substituted for 6 months of experience) showing that they have the ability to maintain simple records of accounts or that it has given them a knowledge of postal procedures.

Competitors must also show that they are of good reputation and that they can meet and deal

with the public agreeably and effectively.

Applicants must take a written test. Those who pass will be assigned final ratings on the basis of this test and on their experience, and fitness for the position.

They must have resided within the delivery of the office for one year immediately preceding the

closing date of the examination. In addition, they must have reached their 18th birthday on the closing date for acceptance of applications. Persons over 70 years of age cannot be appointed.

Complete information about the examination requirements and instructions for filing applications may be obtained at the

post office for which this examination is being announced. Application forms must be filed with the U.S. Civil Service Commission, Washington 25, D.C., and must be received or post-marked not later than the closing date.

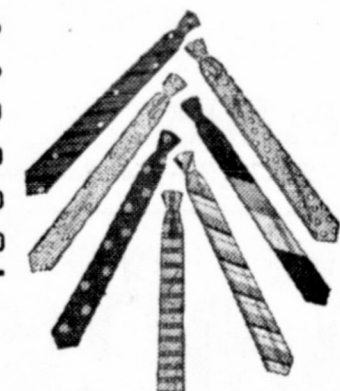

W. P. Baten, Jr., Is Appointed To Rangers

AUSTIN — Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, today announced the appointment of Hall County Sheriff W. P. (Bill) Baten, Jr., as a Texas Ranger. He will be stationed at Pampa.

Baten's appointment is effective December 14. He will fill the vacancy in the Ranger force created by the resignation of Ranger Bill Henslee, and will serve under the command of Captain Raymond Waters of Lubbock in Company "C" covering the northwest portion of the state.

Baten was born at Breckenridge on June 25, 1921, and reared in the Brice Community in Hall County where he attended public school. He later attended high school at Lakeview, also in Hall County.

After engaging in farm and construction work in the area, Baten entered the Army in July of 1942, serving in anti-aircraft in the South Pacific during World War II. Upon his discharge in December, 1945, he worked in a cotton mill in Memphis until he was appointed Chief of Police in that city in July, 1946.

In September, 1948, he resigned and became Chief Deputy Sheriff for Hall County. He was elected Sheriff in 1954 and served in that capacity until his appointment as a Texas Ranger.

His wife is the former Mary Gibson of the Brice Community, and they have two daughters, Mrs. Joy Duncan of Memphis; and Janetta Gibson, 12.

The new Ranger is at present President of the Memphis Chamber of Commerce, is a member of the Masonic Lodge, a past president of the Lions Club and a member of the Methodist Church.

Twenty-five hundred new classrooms costing approximately \$75,000,000 are needed annually to house the increased student population in Texas public schools.



HILITES & SIDELITES

AUSTIN — Twenty changes in Texas' two per cent sales tax law are recommended by the Texas Commission on State and Local Tax Policy.

Some changes would result in decreased revenue and some would mean an increase. But the total outcome of a legislative put-and-take would produce an additional \$10,500,000 a year from a tax that is expected to bring \$170,000,000 into state coffers this year.

Sen. George Parkhouse of Dallas is chairman of the commission. Other members are Hugo H. Loewenstern of Amarillo; Dr. John R. Stockton of Austin, Senators Louis Crump of San Saba and Jop S. Fuller of Port Arthur; Representatives Charles Sandahl of Austin and Charles Wilson of Trinity.

Parkhouse predicted that if spending in the next biennium is in line with the present level, no additional taxes would have to be levied.

A large addition to income — if recommendations are adopted — would come from applying the state sales tax to motor vehicle sales in place of the selective excise tax now levied on vehicles.

Commission recommended repeal of the exemption of farm machinery and equipment, but suggested that feed for farm work animals; herbicides, defoliants and desiccants, and all fertilizer sales be exempt.

Some other recommendations were:

1. Apply sales tax to all clothing sales, which would up revenue \$10,000,000 a year.
2. Exempt vending machine sales of less than 25 cents, and all sales of less than 25 cents for retailers who derive 50 per cent of receipts from such sales.
3. Exempt sales made to state banks, since sales to national banks are exempt.
4. Exempt all sales of alcoholic beverages.
5. Permit grocery stores to pay sales tax in proportion to purchases of taxable and non-taxable items. Grocers with annual receipts of less than \$100,000 would pay sales tax on the assumption that 85 per cent of receipts are from exempt items.

ELECTION CHANGES — The Election Law Study Committee released a 221-page report on proposed changes in Texas election laws.

Sen. Tom Creighton of Mineral Wells, chairman of the committee, said the main goal is to remove conflicts and deficiencies from the present code. The more palatable suggestions will be included in one bill for legislative consideration. More controversial items will be presented separately.

Public will have a chance to challenge the proposals on December 6 and 7 when an open hearing will be held in the Senate chamber. Committee also will hold hearings at that time on a voter registration law and a proposal to change the dates of primary elections.

Some of the 120 proposed amendments concern:

1. Having voters check preferred candidates on paper ballots, instead of scratching those opposed.
2. Requiring write-in nominees and runoff candidates to pay the same fees as other candidates.
3. Fining voters who cast a ballot in one party's primary and then vote in the runoff of another party.
4. Requiring campaign expense reports by newspapers, magazines, billboards, printers, radio and TV stations, on all advertising contracts.
5. Requiring all voters over 60 years of age to get annual exemptions.
6. Permitting different parties to hold primaries in the same building, as long as there is no means of direct passage between polls.

DEBT INCREASED — State Treasurer Jesse James reports that the deficit in the General Revenue Fund increased by \$6,

000,000 between November 11 and November 23, when it was \$34,148,666.

GUARDSMEN WAIT — Waiting for approval of armories under the federal-state building program are 32 units of the Texas National Guard.

Federal government, which underwrites 75 per cent of the cost of each armory, is approving construction at the average rate of six per year, but there is no priority arrangement.

So far, 11 armories have been built under the program, according to Harry B. Kelton, director of the Texas National Guard Armory Board.

Eight are under construction at Bonham, Sequin, Dallas, Mexia, Kerens, Missions, Mercedes and Harlingen. Units at Brownwood, Tulla and Fredericksburg have approval for construction.

On the waiting list are units in El Paso, Clipper, Canyon, Belton, Olney, Houston, Electra, Wynnboro, Galveston, Paris, Taylor, Kingsville, Austin, Port Neches, Gatesville, Alice, Huntsville, Borger, Pecos, Monahans, San Antonio, Sulphur Springs, Grand Prairie and New Boston.

RUNS AT STANDSTILL — The "run rate" at Gatesville State School for Boys has been reduced to zero since September 4, when the new \$2,000,000 Mountain View School for serious offenders was opened.

School was dedicated last Saturday in a public ceremony featuring an address by Gov. Price Daniel.

Weldon Brewer of the Texas Youth Council said the "run rate" has been cut down gradually over the past five years.

In 1958-59, when the average monthly population at Gatesville was 1,115 boys, there was a monthly average of 51 escapes. In 1959-60, with 1,197 boys, there were 44 escapes a month. In 1960-61, with 1,364 boys, there were 31 escapes. In 1961-62, there were 1,502 boys with only 24 escapes.

Since the 200-plus inmates most likely to run were moved into the double-fenced Mountain View campus, there have been no escapes.

"A walled home may seem cruel to some people," Brewer remarked. "But it's a very humane arrangement when you realize that the boys within are able to take part in a training program and group recreation."

Before the new school was opened, the boys who broke out had to be confined to a small room.

Guards on Gatesville's 40 acres do not carry guns.

HUNTING DEATHS — Cecil Reid of the Sportsmen's Clubs of Texas urges hunters to put a stop to a tragic string of hunting deaths and injuries by practicing caution in the field.

He cites three recent deaths where hunters were mistaken for game and killed.

Reid said no hunter should allow himself to shoot at anything which he has not identified fully as game.

He urges hunters to request passage of legislation such as the "careless and reckless hunting" laws in effect in some other states.

COURT OVERRULES COMMISSION — Texas Supreme Court has negated an order of the Railroad Commission and revoked a specialized motor carrier permit to transport road building materials granted Lively Trucking Contractors.

Decision to vacate the commission's order was made on the basis that findings on which the permit was based were insufficient.

In a concurring opinion, Associate Justice Joe Greenhill criticized the Railroad Commission's use of a printed form of "standard" finding-of-facts on which an order is based; filling in date, names and authority.

He called this "a lack of procedural due process of law."

BRACERO CALLS DOWN — Texas cotton farmers reacted to a U.S. Department of Labor wage standard of 70-cents an hour, for braceros hired to chop cotton, by resorting to almost exclusive machine harvesting.

While 45,000 Mexican contract laborers were hired in August of 1961, only 16,000 were used in August this year, and they also harvested vegetables and grain.

Sixty-eight Texas counties have had increases in scholastic population ranging from 30 per cent to 202 per cent during the past ten years.

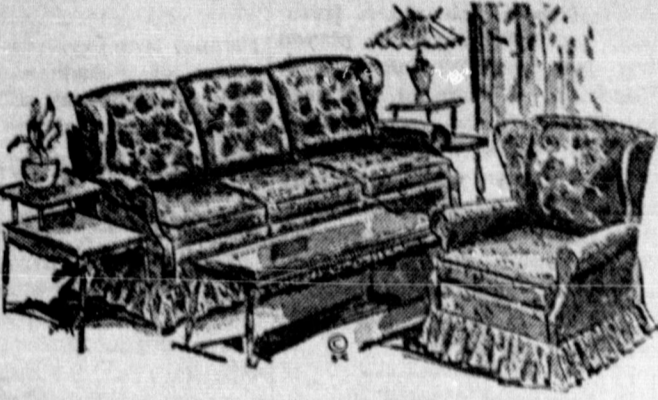

Soil Bank Regulations
The regulations governing the Conservation Reserve Program for 1956 through 1959, are hereby further amended as follows: "On and after October 15, 1962, the following uses of conservation reserve acreage will NOT be a violation of the contract even though the contract signers charge fees for such use:

- (1) fishing and hunting enterprises except the production of fish and game for commercial marketing;
- (2) camping excluding permanent trailer courts;
- (3) picnicking
- (4) riding
- (5) hiking
- (6) swimming

If the uses or activities permitted in the preceding sentence result in the area becoming subject to wind and water erosion adequate protective measures must be taken at no cost to the CRP. If permanent-type structures or facilities are erected on the CR in connection with the uses or activities permitted above, the area occupied by such structures or facilities shall be removed from contract."

Wheat Stabilization Program
If you intend to participate in the 1963 Wheat Stabilization Program and you haven't signed an "Intention to Participate" you must do so by Friday, Dec. 14. Remember, that you must comply fully with your intentions in 1963 or you will not be eligible to receive the extra 18 cents per bushel for your wheat or the diversion payment.

If you wish to change your intentions, you must do so by Friday, also. This will be your last chance to either increase or decrease your intentions.

Growers Without Allotments
If you do not have a wheat allotment on your farm, and you have planted 15 acres of wheat or less, please come to the office and let us know so that it can be measured at the time of performance.

Helpful Hint
To keep plow points from rusting while not in use, apply grease thickly to each point. You need not remove the grease when you are ready to plow again.
