Funeral Services Held For Mrs. Mattie Tyree, Pioneer Resident

Funeral services were held Tuesday morning, June 8, at Murphy Memorial Chapel for Mrs. Mattie Tyree, a pioneer resident of Clarendon. Rev. Baldwin Stribling, pastor of First Presbyterian Church officiated. Interment was in Citizens Cemetery.

Mrs. Tyree, 97, died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Faye Scoggins, in Phoenix, Arizona Friday afternoon. Her death was attributed to heart failure. She had been in declining health for the past six months. She had made her home with Mrs. Scoggins for the past seventeen years and visited here each summer.

Mattie Coffey and Harvey Tyree were married at Carthage, Mo. and came to Clarendon in a covered wagon in the early days of the town. Nine children were born to the union. She was preceded in death by her husband and eight of the nine children, including Walter, Will, Grace, Neva, Carl, Muri and two infants, Alice and Charlie.

Mrs. Tyree was a member of the Presbyterian Church. She was born in Hickory County, Mo. April 26, 1868. She remained active throughout her lifetime and maintained a great interest in activities about her.

Survivors include her daughter, Mrs. Faye Scoggins of Phoenix, Arizona; five granddaughters, among them Mrs. G. W. Estlack of Clarendon, Mrs. L. T. Whitlock and Mrs. A. M. Walker of Amarillo; three grandsons; fifteen great grandchildren; and three great great grandchildren. Pallbearers were Clifford Decker, Charlie Bairfield, Lee Bell, Carroll Knorpp, Clarence Bairfield, and Homer Estlack. Arrangements were under the direction of Murphy Funeral Home.

Rain, Hail and high winds were the weather picture last week end with parts of the county which still needed moisture receiving beneficial amounts. Reports are that the moisture was more beneficial all the way around than the destruction of the hail and wind. Blowing rain and hail hit the area Thursday evening and again Friday evening with hail doing much damage both east and West of town but in streaks. An area east of town caught the blunt of the storm Friday night, wiping out early crops in the Lelia Lake and Sunnyview areas. More damage was reported here in town and west of town Thursday night. Ben Lovell 15 miles west, lost a number of window panes in his service station and heavy roof damage to his station and house. Crops in that area were wiped out.

Rain totals came up during the spell with a total of 2.36 here in town; Saye's farm 1 mile south 2.35; Hubert Rhoades at Ashtola 3.10; C. C. Rich at Country Club 4.75; Willard Knox at Lelia Lake 2.62; W. G. Johnson at Hedley 3.35 and Ben Lovell 3.50. Washing from the heavy downpours damaged fields as well as covering up young crops and lakes of water were standing in sandy fields in the Sunnyview area.

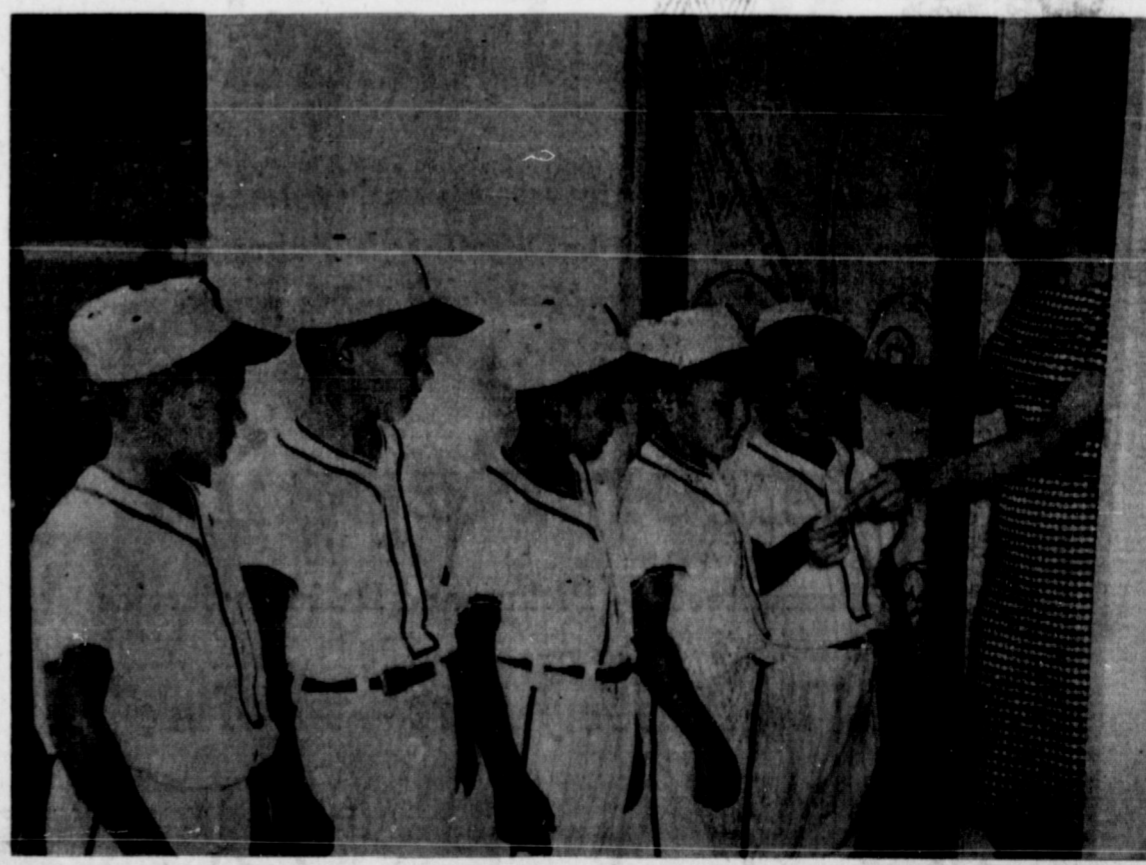

TO THE PEOPLE OF THE 18th DISTRICT

As I noted in this newsletter recently, the spectre of starvation haunts much of the world while here in the United States we are

so abundantly blessed as to face problems of an opposite kind—problems created by food surpluses. The less developed parts of the world, now containing 2.2 billion of the world's 3.1 billion people, are having an extremely difficult time keeping food production at a rate in pace with their growing populations.

Part of the challenge to agriculture is to insure that we possess a strong and powerful agricultural economy in the future. That means we must preserve strength throughout rural America, strength from the farmsteads on through the clusters of homes we in the Panhandle call "communities," through the towns and the regional city centers.

Reapportionment is an issue again being fought in Congress as those of us who see the growing threat to rural strength exert our best efforts in support of a Constitutional amendment to permit at least one house of two-house State legislatures to be organized on factors other than population.

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON SEPTEMBER 7, 1965.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 44 proposing an Amendment to Sections 2 and 25 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to provide for an increase in the membership of the State Senate from 31 to 39 members.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Sections 2 and 25 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read respectively as follows:

"Section 2. The Senate shall consist of 39 members. The House of Representatives shall consist of 150 members.

"Section 25. The state shall be divided into Senatorial Districts of contiguous territory according to population, as nearly as possible.

"Should the Legislature enact any enabling legislation in anticipation of this Amendment, no such law shall be void by reason of its anticipatory nature.

"This Amendment shall be-

come effective upon its adoption."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the 7th day of September, 1965, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment increasing the membership of the State Senate from 31 to 39 members, retaining the present membership of the House of Representatives, requiring apportionment of the Senate according to population, and deleting the limitation that no single county is entitled to more than one Senator."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

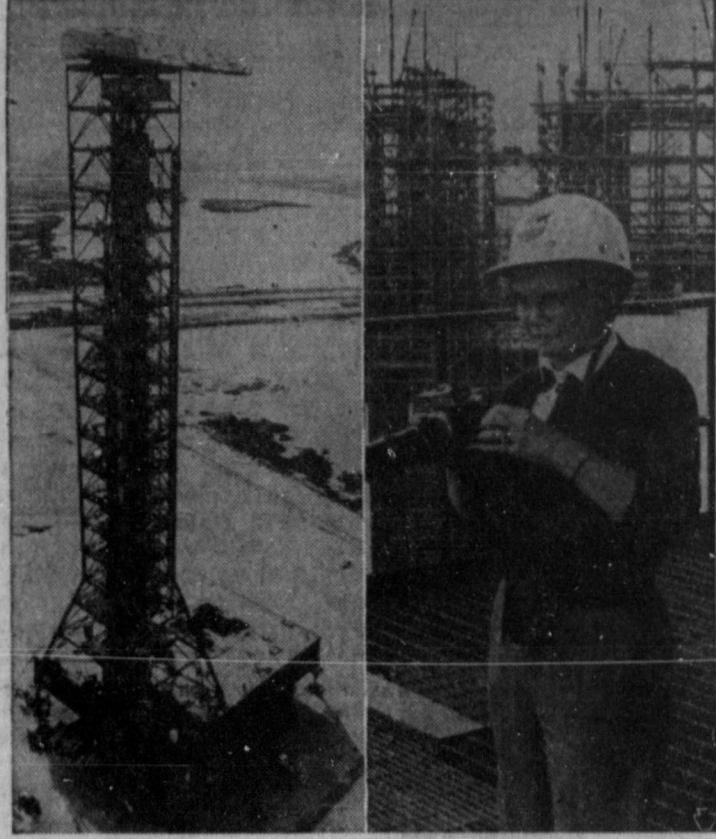

### Shooting The Moonport



Huge 360-foot moon rockets will be launched from this 400-foot Mobile Launcher (left), photographed by Lois Weisfog (right) from the uppermost level of another launch tower.

"Shoot the Moon" is the name of a wild form of poker. But the Gulf Oil Corporation knew it was no gamble when it decided to shoot a commercial about our country's first Moonport.

The company's optimism was justified when many millions of people viewed the commercial during the Gulf-sponsored NBC-TV coverage of the two-man Gemini space shot.

Early in March, with the permission and cooperation of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration, Gulf moved a camera crew into Cape Kennedy, Florida. Its purpose was to show the starting point of the first flight to the moon. Right now it is a massive launch complex covering 87,000 acres under construction on Merritt Island at Cape Kennedy.

Gulf also decided to cover the story of how a television commercial is shot by assigning one of its most adventuresome employees to take still pictures. The assignment went to Lois Weisfog, Gulf public relations photographer and photo librarian.

What Mrs. Weisfog and the TV crew had to shoot was the Free World's first true Spaceport. From this site, Apollo/

Saturn vehicles approximately 360 feet high and weighing more than 6 million pounds when fueled will carry men to the moon.

The main job was to show the Moonport under construction for a two-minute commercial. (Gulf is supplying fuels and lubricants for contractors' equipment on this job. The company also supplies rocket fuel to Cape Kennedy on a rotating basis along with other oil companies.)

While the filming crew was busy, Gulf's own photographer, Lois Weisfog, also was busy in the air, on the ground, and atop the soaring superstructure of the various facilities.

Many of the pictures Lois took will find their way into nationally-known publications. The commercial itself will be seen during the two-man, extended flight of Gemini 4 on NBC-TV now scheduled for some time in June.

**POWER LAWN MOWER CAN BE DANGEROUS**

A power lawn mower is a necessary piece of equipment for maintaining a beautiful lawn. But it can also cause plenty of trouble, even death, if handled in a careless manner or on areas where stones, pieces of wire, sticks and bones may be strewn.

County Agent Ronald Gooch offers these suggestions for preventing accidents involving the power lawn mower.

Keep the lawn clean and in good condition. Pick up toys, stones, sticks, wire and bones before starting the job. Keep the mower clean and in good repair and the blade sharp and keep persons, especially children, and pets away from an operating lawn mower, especially the rotary types.

Mow across embankments or terraces and never up and down. When starting the engine, stand away from the mower so as to make sure your feet cannot contact the whirling blade. Never leave the engine running while the mower is unattended.

Run the mower only fast enough to get a good, clean cut. Extremely high blade speeds are dangerous and cause excessive mower wear. If the mower is self-propelled, adjust its speed to your walking pace. Never let it

pull you. Fuel should be safely handled and stored. Do not fill gas tank while the engine is hot. If the mower becomes clogged, stop the engine and disconnect the sparkplug wire before unclogging or doing any work on the mower.

Do not operate electric mowers on wet ground. Riding mowers present the same problems as push or self-propelled types and the rules of safety should be observed.

Using a power mower is not a job for a child, warns the county agent. Only a person familiar with the mower should operate it.

**PRICE OUTLOOK FOR SHEEP AND LAMBS GOOD** — Smaller slaughter supplies, a smaller lamb crop and a decline in the number of sheep and lamb in feedlots are expected to keep sheep and lamb prices for the remainder of 1965 above those of last year. John G. McHaney, Extension economist, reports that prices for wool are not so favorable. Unfavorable factors, he said, include larger world wool supplies, lower mill use and increasing substitution of man-made fibers for wool.

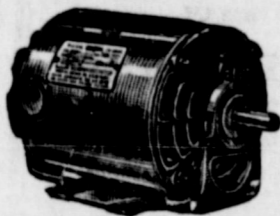

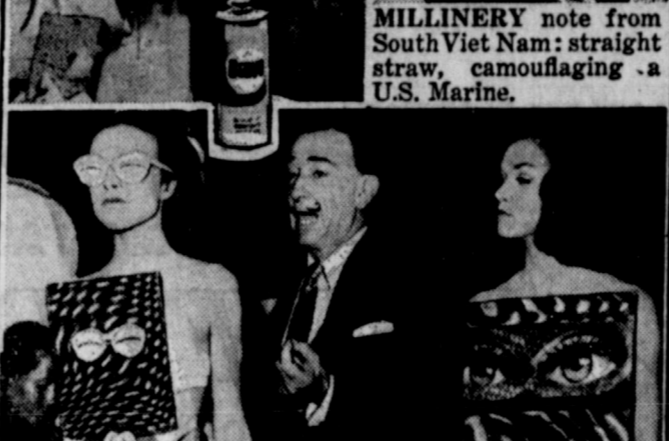

**NEWS FROM CITY HALL**

As you read in the paper last week, the city is commencing the unpleasant chore of collecting delinquent taxes. A local attorney has been hired to assist the city in this action. There is going to be a lot of grumbling. Nobody likes to pay taxes and it is certainly questionable that ad valorem taxes are very fair, but it

is the law of the land. I don't like to pay my taxes, but it is worth the price of these taxes to live in the United States, in the State of Texas, and in the City of Clarendon.

Right now we are concerned with those taxes due the City of Clarendon. Fortunately most of us pay our taxes. When a few citizens do not pay their taxes it is unfair to the majority who do pay. Each person has a reason for his delinquent account, such as lack of sewage service or water service or street service, or some

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other reason. As a city taxpayer there are some services about which I can complain, but I pay my taxes. You know the city taxes aren't great. And they are worth it to live in Clarendon.

Let's talk a little more about the tax problem. In addition to delinquent accounts, the other major problem is inconsistent valuation of property, hence unequal taxes. Not only is this unlawful, but it is unfair to taxpayers with some paying too high a tax while others too low a tax. This will be a slow, time consuming process, but the city will try to put a fair valuation on property so that taxes can really be equalized.

What about the tax rate? The aldermen want the tax rate left where it is. There is no need to increase the tax rate. Briefly, if you aren't delinquent in your taxes and if you have been ren-

dering your property reasonably accurately, you'll not need to worry about any change in your taxes. But you'll hear a lot of rumors and grumblings about what's going on at "City Hall." Some people won't want to pay delinquent taxes or have a fair valuation placed on their property.

So you're going to buy an outboard motor?

Well, we suggest you do considerable thinking before you buy. We're not against outboards. On the contrary, we are strong for them! We just think you shouldn't rush the deal.

Back in the early days there wasn't much difference in motors. Most of the brands were just about alike. They were small, didn't have much horsepower, and would push a boat only a little better than a pair of oars. That is—if and when you could get them to run. They were dirty, greasy, smoky, sputtery, and cantankerous.

Not so today! Modern outboards are streamlined, handsome, and dependable. They start easily and quickly. Many of them have electric starters. They also have reverse gears. Furthermore they run smoothly and quietly. And they come in all shapes and sizes, from 3 h.p. to 100.

Maybe you haven't thought much about boats and motors until now. But you've just bought a place on the lake or near the coast, and you think it would be fun to get on the water.

Or maybe you've been a bank fisherman all this time. But now you yearn for greater mobility, so you can reach the big fish hideouts that can be approached only by boat.

Anyway you're going to buy a motor. What kind?

Well, let's say you're buying just a motor—not a boat. You can rent a boat nearly anywhere for a couple of dollars a day. So you want a motor to carry in the car, clamp on the back of a rented boat, and go fishing.

If that's your situation, you want one of the smaller motors because it will fit handily into your car trunk and is easy to move from car to dock. A little 3 h.p. is fine. It's light, easy to carry and consumes a minimum of gas and oil.

But if you have to cover more than two or three miles, the trip is going to seem long. If your distance from dock to fishing hole is greater than that, you'll be happier with a 5 or 6 horsepower outboard. They weigh under 50 pounds. That's not too heavy and there is plenty of power in these small water-threshers.

When you get into bigger

motors, the carrying job becomes a real chore. I would not recommend a 12 to 15 horsepower as a portable motor to anyone who isn't a pretty powerful hombre. And no more than that to anyone, if he's going to carry it very far.

But let's assume that you're in a different kind of a situation. You are going to mount it on a trailer and haul it to the water.

In that event you want at least a 15-horse motor or possibly a 25. Now you've got enough speed to reach the more distant fishing holes quickly.

We're still talking about fishermen, but there are a great many outdoor families nowadays—and getting to be more all the time—who want more speed for their boats. They are anxious to go sightseeing around the lake and pull water skiers. They want broad-beamed open craft or small cruisers. They need at least 35 horses. Better yet—40 or 50 h.p.

Moving up the scale... if it's deep sea for you, then you need a bigger boat and a 75 to 100 horse motor.

Some of these craft, designed for outboards get pretty hefty—like cabin cruisers with lots of room inside. In that case you can put two of these powerful outboards on the transom and head for Florida, feeling safe enough in anything less than a hurricane.

No matter what the horsepower, a fisherman's motor should be capable of slowing down to trolling speed without choking up and dying.

Another requirement of a good fishing motor is that it should be able to go where the fish are—in stump and weed filled bays, over sand bars, and through rock-strewn rapids.

So select a motor that can take it. One that can bounce over rocks without tearing up a lower unit or snapping a clamp bracket. For such rough usage, look for a streamlined, slanted lower unit.

A fisherman wants ease of handling. He wants to idle along the shore, casting with one hand and operating the boat with the other. Some outboards have all controls in the twist-grip throttle, and that's convenient.

There's one other kind of motor that merits your consideration. This is the little electric job that lets you glide along slowly, smoothly and silently for casting or trolling. No speed here, but a wonderful little motor for getting you around in bassy water.

Another question that pops up is: What about buying a second-hand motor?

Well, I guess it's a matter of opinion, but certainly you can pick up a bargain this way now and then. You should exercise caution, though. I wouldn't go too far back in point of time—such as one with an integral fuel tank.

If you decide to buy a used motor, have your dealer to check it carefully for flaws. Seek his advice. If you buy it, then let him put it in his service department for a complete working over before you take it out on the water.

Most important of all... before you buy a motor—new or used—check to be sure you get the motor that meets your specific needs.
