The Clarendon EMS Association is presently selling chances on a painting to raise money to purchase some of the new needed equipment needed to meet the new standards as Mobile Intensive Care Units for both local ambulances.

The painting is a beautiful sofa size, entitled "The Old Farm House". It is done in oil on stretched canvas and is framed. It was painted and donated by local artist Mary Martin who is well known in this area. It is a painting of the old Smallwood Place near the Hagy Ranch which is a Donley County landmark. This painting would look very good in any home or office and is a piece of Donley County history. The painting is valued at \$400.00 and is on display at the First Bank & Trust in Clarendon. It will also be on display at the old courthouse at the art show during the Fourth of July celebration.

Tickets are selling for \$1.00 each or 12 for \$10.00 and are available from any EMS Association member or from Delores Crump, Mary Martin, or from Ruth Hancock or Tookie Thornberry at the bank.

The public has been very generous in their support of this project. The local ambulance service is very intent on getting the best possible equipment to serve the people in this area. Their charges for service are among the lowest anywhere and they are able to keep them low due to support of projects like these. They are still in need of approximately six pieces of equipment

which are somewhat expensive. Most of the other needed equipment has already been purchased and is already in place on the ambulances. They were inspected last week and received renewal of their license to operate as well as a registry sticker which means they met the requirements under the old licensing standards. The new standards will probably be instituted within the next few months.

Mike Lindslev, with the EMS division of the Texas Dept. of Health made the inspection and stated that very few towns that he knew of had the quality of equipment and vehicles as did Clarendon. He said they were probably better equipped than most large cities. The painting will be given away Monday, August 1. You need not be present to win. The winner will be notified by phone.

White announce federal funds available

Governor Mark White announced today that \$2.4 million in federal funds will become available through the Texas Department of Community Affairs (TDCA) for the development and rehabilitation of public parks recreation areas and publicly owned lands.

TDCA is encouraging local governments to apply for the grants which provide 100 percent funding for projects. Applications to TDCA must be postmarked no later than July 1, 1983.

Donley County sales up says comptroller's office

State Comptroller Bob Bullock has sent checks totaling \$43.8 million to local sales tax payments to 974 cities that levy the one-percent sales tax. The cities who lean most heavily on oil and gas for their local receipts are still suffering, but the rest of the state is beginning to make up for the drops in revenue we saw earlier this year. So far this year, local sales tax cities have received \$353.5 million, less than one percent behind the \$354 million total paid by the same time last year.

The city sales taxes are collected along with the state sales tax by merchants and rebated monthly to the cities in which they are collected by the Comptroller.

The June checks were for taxes collected on sales made in April and reported to the Comptroller by the end of May.

City sales and use tax for

the period ending June 7, 1983 for the three cities in Donley County were:

Hedley sales for the 1983 payment to date is \$2,406.40 and for the 1982 same period was \$2,352.09 making a 2.31% increase.

Howardwick 1983 - \$3,083.98, 1982 - \$4,208.24, making a 2.95% decrease.

Clarendon net payment this period was \$4,473.35 with the same period last year being \$4,377.57. 1983 net payment to date, \$42,835.09 while the same period last year was \$39,654.22 with an 8.02% increase.

The surrounding counties do not seem to be doing as well as Donley County. Wellington had a net increase of only 1.89%, while Memphis had a 7.39% decrease, Turkey a 11.34% decrease, Claude a 19.75% decrease and Childress a 7.68% decrease.

WARNING SIGNALS

If we have been placed under a tornado warning and there are threatening clouds in or near Clarendon, the siren will be sounded TWO TIMES.

If a tornado is sighted by storm watch personnel the two blasts will be REPEATED SEVERAL TIMES and you need to take cover.

If there is a power failure, police cars and/or other emergency vehicles will be used in residential areas.

Remember when TWO BLASTS on the siren is REPEATED SEVERAL TIMES it is time to TAKE COVER IMMEDIATELY.

TORNADO WATCH: Tornadoes and severe thunderstorms are possible.

TORNADO WARNINGS: Tornado detected, take shelter immediately.

Planning ahead will enhance survival

Planning ahead and putting as many walls as possible between your family and a tornado will enhance your chances for survival if your home is struck by the plague of the plains.

Dr. James R. McDonald, who along with other members of Texas Tech University's Civil Engineering Department has been studying tornadoes for more than a decade, said evaluating your home for the strongest room or closet and acquainting family members with a plan of action can save time and lives in an emergency.

"The safest place is still inside a substantial building," McDonald said. "This could be anything from a residence on up to a well-engineered building. Basements are still probably the best place to seek shelter if they are available. If not, the concept of using an interior closet, bathroom or small room is your best bet."

A general guide in determining the best spot, McDonald said, is to have as many walls as possible between you and the outside. Such a shelter should be in the interior of the house and away from exterior walls.

Although tornadoes generally travel from the southwest to the northeast, the winds of a funnel cloud can strike from any direction, because of their rotation, and create hazards of any exterior wall McDonald said.

"An interior shelter not only gives you protection from the forces of the wind, but also from the impact of flying debris and what we call tornado-generated missiles," McDonald said.

McDonald said there are several misconceptions about tornado preparations, including the precaution of opening all your windows. Benefits of opening windows have been shown by Texas Tech's Institute of Disaster Research to be of nominal benefit at best

and in some cases actually detrimental to the safety of your building or residence. Those findings on window openings have been accepted by the National Weather Service which no longer recommends the procedure.

"You can best spend your time finding a safe place rather than opening windows," McDonald said.

McDonald said some mobile home parks on the South Plains and nationally are providing or planning storm shelters for their residents. The Institute for Disaster Research offers as a public service plans and specifications for above ground shelters which are large enough to double as a recreation area or some other function.

Plans also are available for constructing an interior storm shelter in new conventional homes or for modifying a room in an existing home.

Knowing when to head for shelter remains a key to protecting yourself and your family, McDonald said, because few people in an area a tornado will strike can actually see its approach.

Normally, tornadoes travel from the southwest to the northeast behind a thunderstorm. Generally, rain and hail will obscure sightings of a tornado following in the storm's wake. Heavy rains and hail are key indicators of a possible tornado. Should you hear noises similar to a jet plane, take cover immediately, McDonald said.

Without question, McDonald said, city residents who anticipate a tornado or sight one should not get in a vehicle and try to outrun it in town traffic.

"The Wichita Falls tornado demonstrated this so clearly because 26 of the 40 deaths were in autos," McDonald said. "Only two people died in their homes."

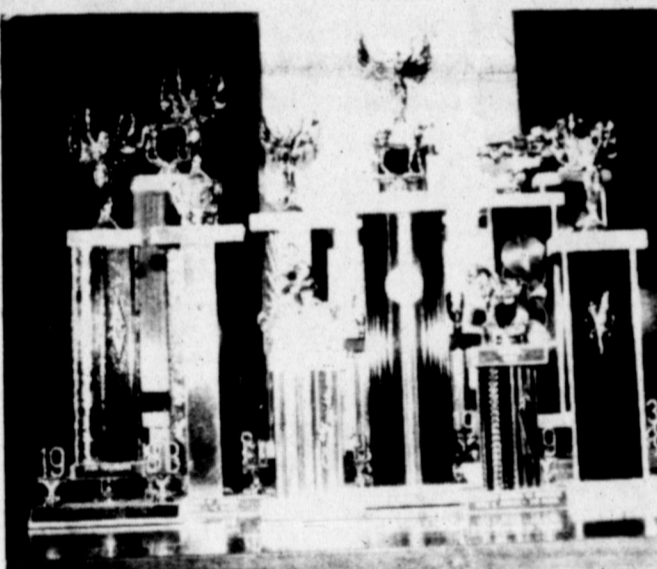

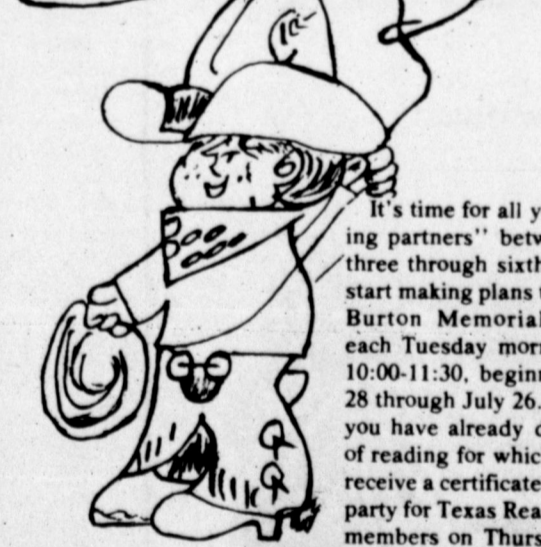

Agricultural Briefs

Steer Study—A recent Texas A&M University study comparing feedlot and show steers showed only minor differences, according to a livestock specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Texas A&M University System. The study compared 46 steers that were put on a performance test for 168 days in the same location and fed the same ration. The only difference was that some were halterbroken and handled as show steers while others were treated as feedlot steers. Both groups of steers compared favorably in growth and average daily gain. The show managed steers had a faster total growth rate—5.25 inches (measured at the hip) compared to 4.69 inches—while the feedlot steers averaged 2.25 pounds of gain a day compared to 2.19 for the show steers. Carcasses also compared favorably.

13th Texas

4-H Dog Show

The 13th Texas 4-H Dog Show scheduled for August 20, 1983, at the Lou Hamilton Community Center in San Antonio.

Some of the general rules and regulations include:

*Any 4-H member is eligible to enter, but entries and fees must be received by July 31, 1983.

*Certificates signed by licenses veterinarian indicating that the dogs have been vaccinated against parvo virus, leptos, rabies, distemper, and infections hepatitis within 12 months, but two weeks prior to show date must be presented at the show.

*Sprayed, monorchid and neutered dogs may be shown without judging discrimination.

*Dogs entered in the Show must have been owned by the family or the exhibitor for at least 60 days prior to the show.

*A \$6.00 registration fee for each dog entered must accompany each member's entry.

Conformation Classes will be subdivided by breeds within a class if numbers warrant. Classes are as

Dog Shows. Obedience exercises are to be performed according to A.K.C. rules and regulations as modified for 4-H. 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Cancer Center Endowment Fund

More than \$13,000 has been contributed to an Endowment Fund account at the First Bank and Trust of Clarendon to benefit the Harrington Cancer Center in Amarillo. Money contributed to the fund, established shortly after the

Center opened in 1981, remains at the bank; only the interest earned is forwarded to the Cancer Center. "We are so grateful to the people of Clarendon for their support," said Marilyn Van Petten, director of development at the Center. "In this

Panhandle neighborhood, they stand out as friends to the Center and the patients we serve." She added that many donations are made in memory of friends and family. "When the bank notifies

us of a memorial gift, we send a letter to the family of the individual the donation is intended to honor, and, of course, send an acknowledgement to the donor," she said. The Cancer Center opened in August of 1981, and since that time more than 1,650 patients have received 18,000 treatments at the outpatient facility.

"Until the Center opened, cancer patients often traveled to Houston, Dallas or Oklahoma City for treatment. This usually caused a drastic change in lifestyle," Ms. Van Petten said. "Many people had to leave homes or sell businesses in addition to spending a lot of money."

"Citizens of this area have spent millions of dollars traveling elsewhere to receive treatment, and the emotional cost of this kind of disruption to patients and families is impossible to calculate," she said.

The \$10 million facility was built entirely from private donations. No money was borrowed.

"Now that the doors are open, however, more money is needed to pay for basic and clinical research, expanded patient care and continued education of physicians,

scientists, nurses and other personnel," Ms. Van Petten said.

In addition to basic treatment, the Center also provides a wide variety of supportive care, including the services of enterostomal therapists, a pastoral counselor, pharmacist and nutritionist.

"The Center is dedicated to the concept that the whole person must be treated, and that includes emotional, spiritual and financial needs as well as physical," Ms. Van Petten stressed.

"We do not deny services to anyone," she added. "And it should be noted that the destitute are not the only ones who are unable to afford medical bills for cancer treatment."

"When you consider that one chemotherapy treatment may cost several hundred dollars, cancer treatment is priced out of reach for many people. It's not unusual for cancer therapy to cost about \$20,000."

More than 60 financial institutions in a five-state area participate in the Endowment Fund program. Banks which establish the account pledge .02 of one percent of current deposits over the next three years to seed the account.

"There are several reasons why the Endowment Fund is beneficial to both the community and the Cancer Center," Ms. Van Petten explained. "The money contributed to endowment stays in the community to provide funds for local loans, and individuals have the convenience of making a contribution to a worthwhile organization simply by going to their local bank," she said.

"Also, many people would rather do business at home with their own banker," she said, "and the Endowment Fund reminds people that the Harrington Cancer Center is daily serving the needs of their friends and neighbors."

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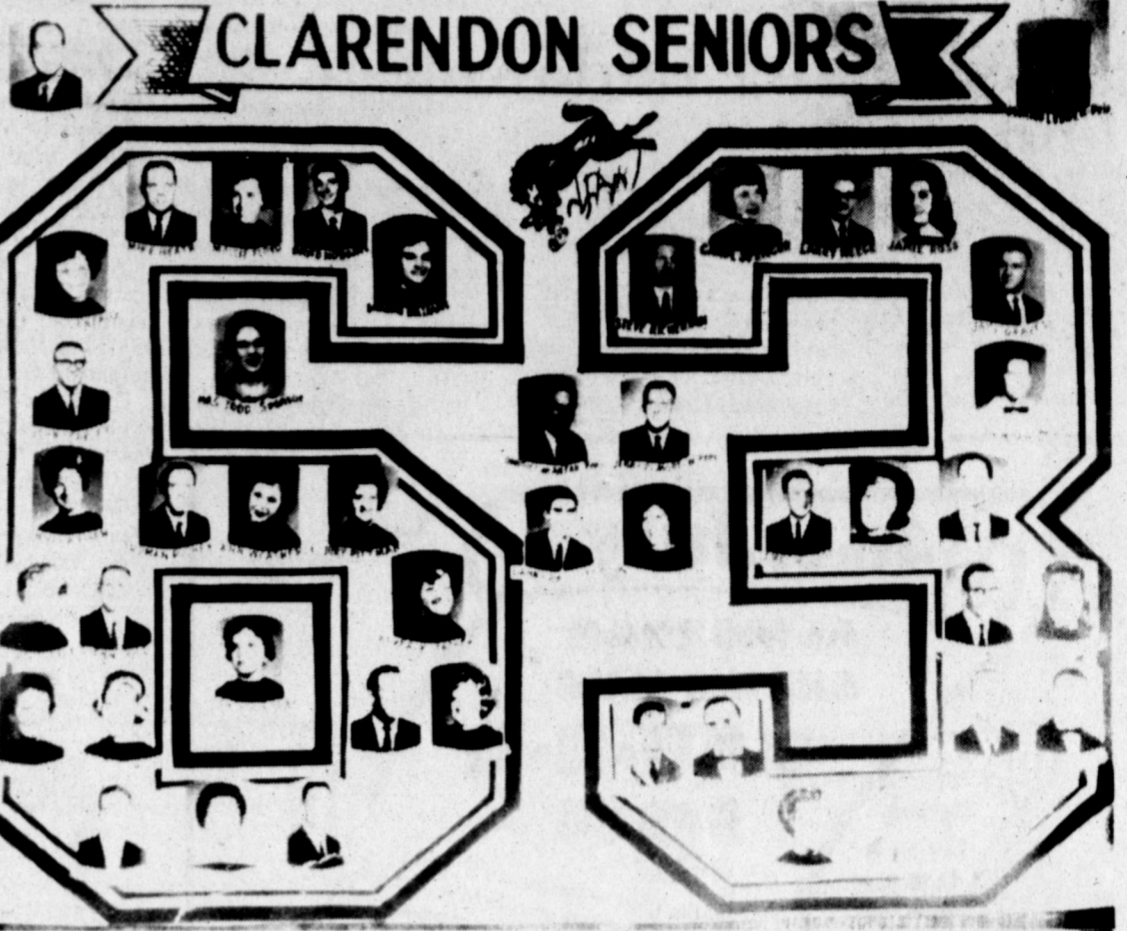

of interest to VETERANS

Each month, the Veterans Administration mails some 600,000 checks worth over \$200 million to veterans studying under the GI Bill and dependents of military personnel whose death or permanent and total disability was service connected. Since the first GI Bill of Rights was enacted in 1944, more than 18 million veterans have benefited.

In general, veterans' benefits are not taxed and need not be reported as income. Starting this July 1, however, students going to school for business purposes will have to

deduct half of any GI Bill payments from their education costs before claiming a business education exemption. A law forbids taxpayers from gaining a double benefit by receiving tax-free income and taking income tax deductions on it. For GI Bill benefits, half the veteran's monthly check is considered to be for living expenses. The other half, for tuition, cannot be claimed as a business education expense.

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

For some individuals, eye ointments are more difficult to use than are drops. Manufacturers of eye ointments suggest the following steps for proper drug usage:

- * Wash hands thoroughly with soap and water to eliminate infection-causing bacteria.
- * Remove cap and squeeze the tube, discarding the first portion of ointment if it appears dry.
- * Do not allow the tip of the tube to touch the eye. Tilt your head back, looking at the ceiling.
- * Pull the lower eyelid down, with the other hand, and place the proper amount of ointment (usually 1/4 to 1/2 inch in length) on the lower eyelid.
- * Close eye gently and roll eyes in all directions (temporary blurring may occur because the ointment is dissolving).
- * Wipe away any excess ointment with a clean tissue...replace and tighten cap to make sure the ointment doesn't dry out.
