## Gillham And White Fill Vacancies Created By Resignations At CJC

W. W. Pinkerton, recently elected to be Dean of Clarendon Junior College, resigned last week to take the position of Superintendent of Schools at Coppell Independent School District in Dallas County. Don Dorman, CJC basketball coach, also resigned recently. John R. Gillham, long time Vocational Agriculture teacher in the Clarendon School System, and most recently a graduate of Baylor University Law School, will replace Pinkerton as Dean of the College and Bill White, highly successful basketball coach at Hedley the past three years, will replace Dorman as Coach of the Bulldogs.

Pinkerton is ending an eight year period in Clarendon. He came to Clarendon in 1955 as President of the College and Superintendent of Schools. He served in this position until the spring of 1960 when he resigned to take a position with a publishing company. In the fall of 1961, however, he returned to the college in the capacity of head of the commercial department. He has held that position the past two years. Mrs. Pinkerton has also been a teacher in the public school system the past two years. The Pinkertons express their regret in leaving Clarendon, but feel that the opportunity in the Coppell school is so good that they can't afford to refuse it.

Dorman came to the college as coach of the Bulldogs in 1961. He was called into the Military Service in December of that year, but returned to the College last fall to resume his duties. It is unknown at this time whether or not Dorman has accepted another coaching position.

Gillham has been in the Clarendon School System for a number of years. He served for many years as vocational agriculture teacher in the high school and later taught mathematics in the high school and agriculture in the college. In March of 1961 he entered Law School at Baylor University and graduated with his law degree this spring. He was ranked very highly as a student at Baylor.

White is a graduate of Clarendon Junior College and played basketball for the Bulldogs. He graduated from CJC in 1956 and later took his degree from West Texas State College at Canyon. He coached one year at Lelia Lake and has been at Hedley the past five years. He was assistant coach at Hedley two years and has been head coach the past three years. His boys teams have won the district championship at Hedley in each of his three years as head coach.

## Rocky Carter Dies From Injuries Sustained In Car Accident Sunday

John Gerald (Rocky) Carter, age 19, of 202 East 2nd Street, Clarendon, died Sunday, June 23, at 2:00 p.m. in Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo from injuries he received in a one-car accident five miles west of Clarendon that morning at 3:00 a.m.

Rocky was born December 11, 1943, at Clinton, Oklahoma. He moved to Clarendon six years ago from that city. He graduated from Clarendon High School and had attended one year of Clarendon Junior College.

Rocky and Herman Vinson were in a one car accident one mile west of the Martin Baptist Church on Highway 287 about 3 a.m. Sunday morning. The young men were treated at the Adair Hospital in Clarendon before being transferred to Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo, where Herman Vinson is in critical condition.

Funeral services for Rocky Carter will be held today (Thursday), June 27, at 10:00 a.m. in the First Baptist Church, Clarendon, with Rev. Paul Hancock officiating assisted by Rev. Jerry Barrett. Interment will be in the home. Graveside services will be conducted by the Rev. Alvis Merrill, pastor of the Broadway Heights Baptist Church of Clinton with arrangements under direction of the Murphy Funeral Home.

## One Car Accident Takes Life Of Local Youth

A one car accident about 3 a.m. Sunday morning five miles west of town claimed the life of John Gerald (Rocky) Carter, 19, son of Mr. and Mrs. Dan Carter, and critically injured Herman Wayne Vinson, son of Mr. and Mrs. Herman Vinson. Carter died in an Amarillo hospital at 2:00 p.m. Sunday.

He received a long gash across the back of his head, skull fracture, broken jaw, loss of a number of teeth and a puncture of one leg. He is a patient at Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo.

Funeral services for Carter have been set for 10 a.m. Thursday morning at the First Baptist Church.

## Youth Captured After Second Jail Break

He was recaptured at Hobbs, N.M., June 15th after his first escape. He was assisted in his last bid for freedom by the Amarillo youth who was believed to have escaped in the same manner as Latham in his first break. Sheriff Behrens stated that the youth apparently slipped inside the jail snatched the jail keys, went upstairs and freed Latham from his cell.

After escaping, Sheriff Behrens said the youth broke into the AAA Motor Co., the second time for Latham, took three shotguns, ammunition and stole a car. They were trying out the shotguns near Lelia Lake when officers heard the shots and apprehended them.

Dist. Judge Luther Gribble ordered Latham's three-year suspended sentence revoked Monday and Graham, Texas, officials picked Latham up Tuesday morning to return him there where a five-year probation was to be revoked.

The old jail is getting so brittle that we may have to transfer our prisoners to neighboring towns like Collingsworth County is doing, Sheriff Behrens stated.

Her son, James A. Patman, died December 13, 1957.

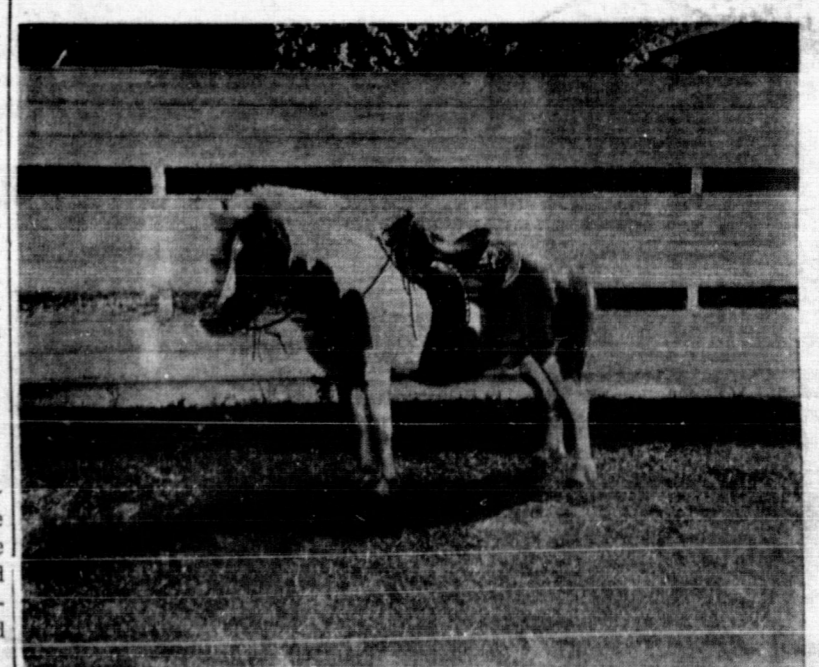
She was a niece of the late Col. Charles Goodnight and was his secretary for a while.

When Rachel Carson wrote "Silent Spring" she probably never dreamed that her book, besides creating quite a furor, to name only three, would be quoted, the subject of a television documentary, and finally cause Congress to try and pass more stringent laws controlling the indiscriminate use of insecticides, weed killers, etc.

Harry Scherman had his prophecy come true when he wrote back last September in "Book-of-the-Month Club News," the following: "Only with two selections in recent years have we advised members that it was unwise to use their privilege of rejection or substitution. We do so once again in the case of this remarkable book by Rachel Carson, for it is certain to be history-making in its influence up-

on thought and public policy over the world. The portentous problem it presents — of worldwide indiscriminate poisoning of all forms of life, including human — is in the same dread category as worldwide nuclear warfare. One can still have reasonable hope that the latter may finally be avoided. Miss Carson's menace, however, is not only very much present and actual but on the increase, particularly in our own land. There can be little doubt this will become one of the most widely discussed books published in recent years; and every intelligent citizen — we feel sure — will eventually find it necessary to have firsthand and full acquaintance with its disturbing contents. All the facts behind the main theme are scrupulously documented and, as one would expect of Miss Carson, highly readable."

In addition to being a very good writer, her "The Sea Around Us" was on the best-sellers list for 86 weeks and eventually translated into 30 languages. Miss Carson is a graduate biologist and worked for years as a marine biologist. So she is not writing about a subject she knows nothing about.

The library has only a short while ago been given a copy of her "Silent Spring."

Twenty-five books have been sent to the library for the memorial shelves of Doctor Jerome and Mrs. Sarah Stocking.

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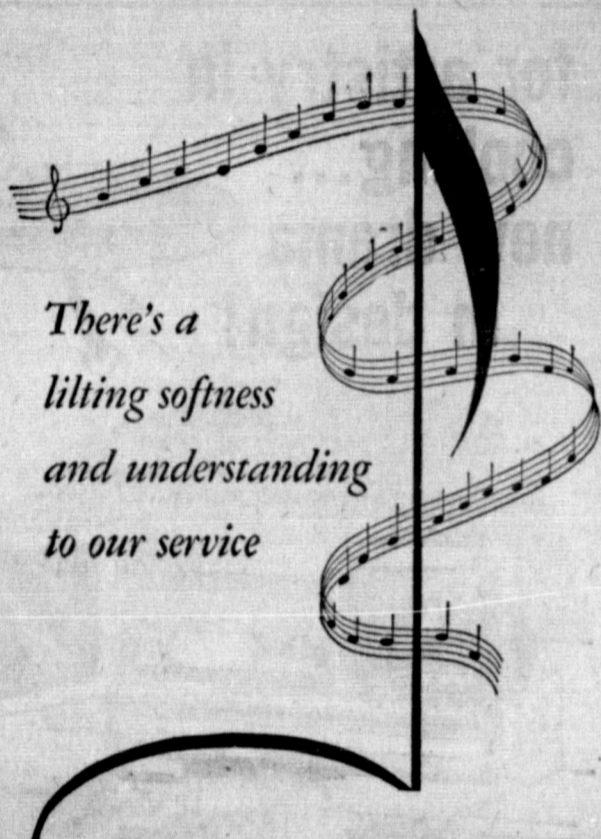

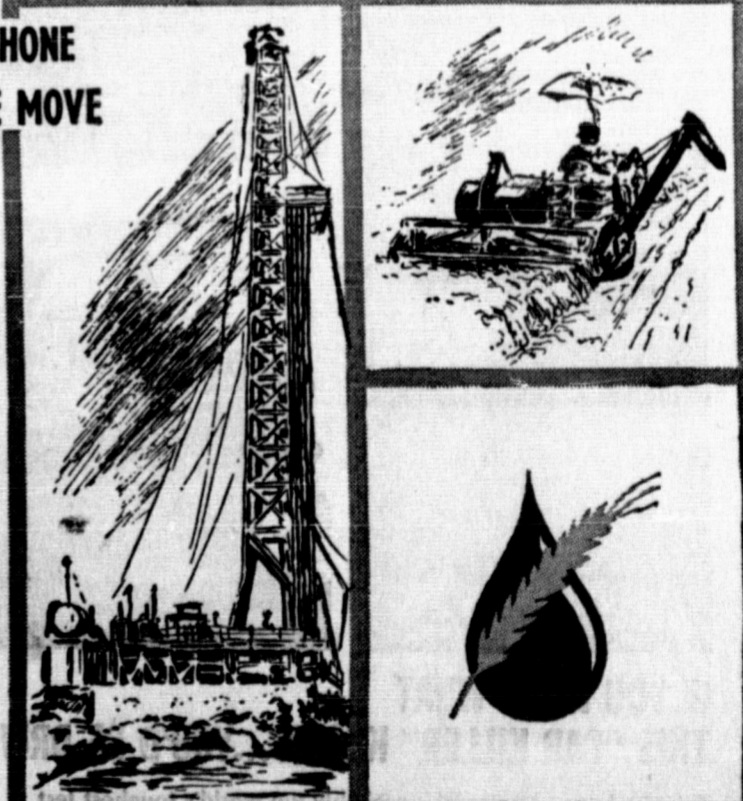

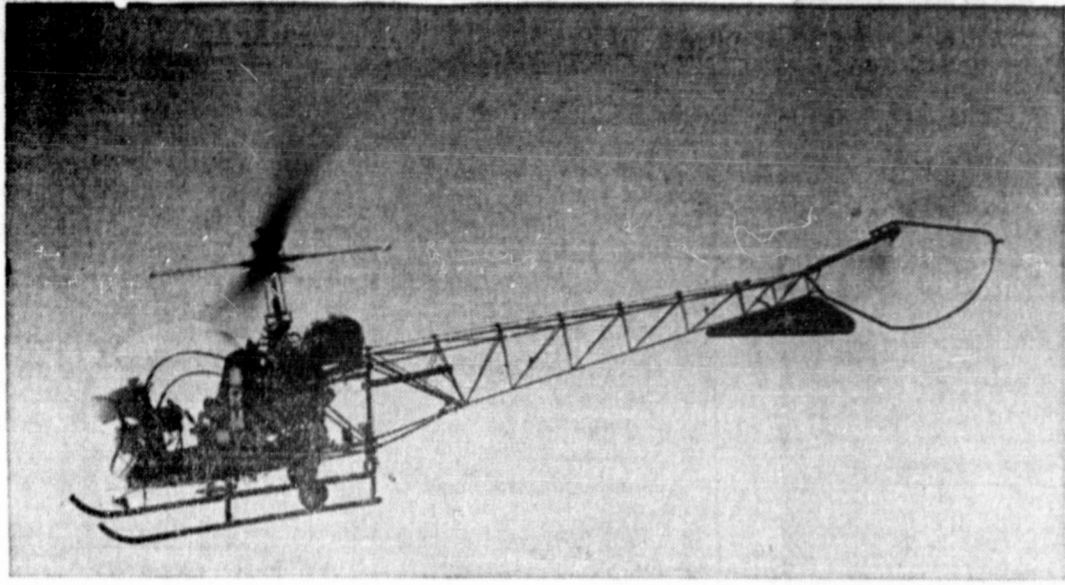

### TO THE PEOPLE OF THE 18th DISTRICT

By Congressman Walter Rogers

A Triumph For Decency... Among criminals, the most reprehensible species are those animals who trade on human prudence by peddling pornography. The lowest form of this vile class are the dealers in obscenity who move their wares among children.

Thus it was with considerable satisfaction that I noted this week the conviction — 28 counts of a federal indictment — of one Ralph Ginzburg, a 33-year-old Brooklyn native who was out to pile up a fortune by publishing pure filth. Ginzburg's main endeavor in pushing a variety of erotic material was his magazine "Eros," which, when publication began, brought a deluge

of complaints to my office and those of other Members of Congress and to the Post Office and Justice departments.

Others who would deal in salaciousness can contemplate the possible penalty Ginzburg could pay, after sentencing is pronounced shortly, for his adventure in defying decency and the law: 140 years in prison and \$140,000 in fines.

I am pleased to report to you that the federal government is working diligently to clean the mails of such trash as "Eros" and to bring to justice the men engaged in this despicable "industry." In the period from July 1, 1962, to May 24, 1963, a total of 683 arrests were made in the United States for violations of Postal obscenity statutes — 141 more arrests than were made in the same period of the previous year. Convictions totaled 565 in the latest period, compared with 438 for the same period of the year before — an increase of 29 percent. I salute the responsible officials of the Post Office Department and of the Justice Department's Criminal Division for their fine cooperation and aggressiveness in handling these cases. All decent Americans can be proud of this campaign.

I'm not only interested in seeing a curtailment in the flow of mailed obscenity, I am doing what I can to bring a halt to the circulation of lewdness in motion pictures and in movie advertisements. I have introduced in this Session of the Congress H. Res 72, similar to measures I introduced in past Sessions, to bring about a "complete investigation and study of the problem of obscenity, lewdness, salaciousness, and immorality in connection with the production, distribution, and exhibition in the United States of motion pictures and in connection with advertising related thereto." This is the wording of the resolution, which has been referred to the Rules Committee of the House. If approved by the House, the resolution would provide for the appointment of a special subcommittee of the House Committee on Interstate and Foreign Commerce to hold hearings and recommendations for corrective legislation.

We must be on guard in this Nation against a laxity in morals that could, as happened in Great Britain with the Profumo scandal, shake the very foundations of the Republic.

Among other measures I've introduced this year in the House is H. Res 67 to investigate personnel and procedures in the U.S. Department of State. The investigation I propose would not be merely a "fishing expedition." It has very definite objectives spelled out in the resolu-

tion, which is among the many measures awaiting consideration by the House Rules Committee. Because the State Department's activities are so vital to the continued security of the Nation, I believe it is important that a check be made so that the Congress and the People can make an assessment of its effectiveness.

Specifically, my resolution asks for the creation of a nine-member select House committee to (1) investigate the personnel of the State Department (2) investigate the practices and procedures of choosing personnel in all division of the State Department (3) investigate the methods, practices, and procedures in assigning personnel for both routine and special work or assignments (4) investigate the background and capabilities of all personnel in relation to their duties and assignments (5) investigate personnel who may not be directly connected with the State Department but whose work is tied to State Department

activities, and (6) formulate recommendations concerning changes in practices and policies related to State Department staffing or the staffing of other federal agencies associated with State Department activities.

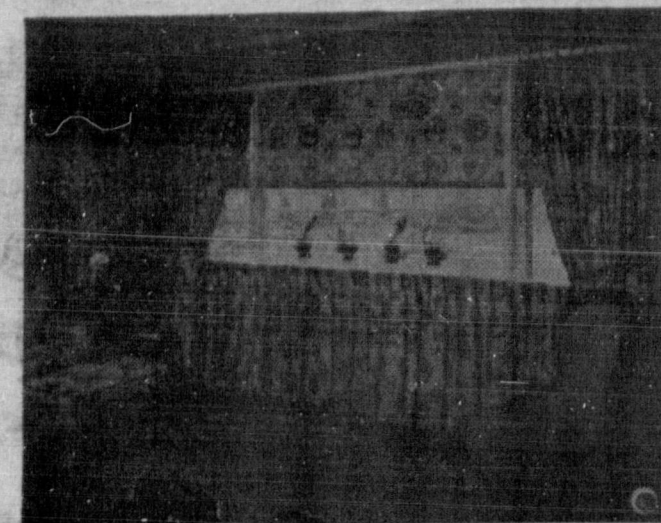

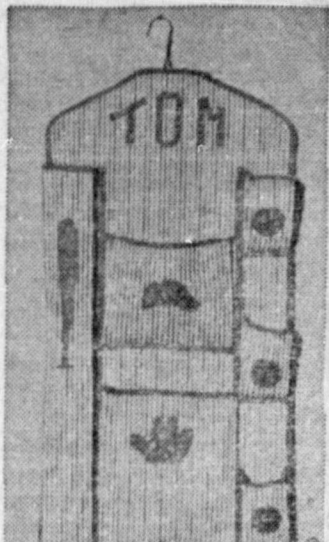

### McCully Announces New ZIP Code For Clarendon Post Office

Our five-digit ZIP Code is 79226. Postmaster McCully announced today.

"Everyone in Clarendon, Texas, will use this ZIP Code on all their correspondence to speed mail deliveries and reduce the chance of mis-sent mail," Postmaster McCully said.

Postmaster Mrs. Pauline Roberts announced Lelia Lake will use ZIP Code 79240. She stated that everyone in Lelia Lake will use this number on their correspondence.

ZIP Code, the Post Office Department's revolutionary new system of improved mail dispatch and delivery, goes into effect nationally on July 1.

The Postmaster stressed the importance of all citizens of Clarendon and Lelia Lake learning their city's ZIP Code and using it in their return address on all correspondence. In answering mail, they said, ZIP Codes taken from return addresses on incoming mail should be used.

"The ZIP Code is literally the last word in mail addressing," Mr. McCully said. "It should follow the city and state in addresses."

He cited this example of the proper use of ZIP Code:  
Mike M. McCully  
Postmaster,  
U.S. Post Office  
Clarendon, Texas, 79226

The new ZIP Code plan, Mr. McCully said, for the first time will permit the Post Office Department to short-cut repeated address reading.

"The address on mail must often be read as many as eight or ten times by postal employees, to get it to the proper destination," Mr. McCully said. "Each handling slows the process of mail dispatch and adds to the opportunity for human error."

"With ZIP Code, a clerk needs only to glance at the code to know immediately to what national area, state and post office the letter is destined, and to speed it on its way, cutting up to 24 hours off the time between deposit and delivery."

Mr. McCully said that when ZIP Code is in full swing, the United States will have "the most modern system of mail distribution and delivery in existence."

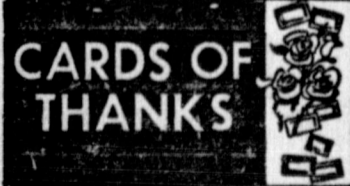

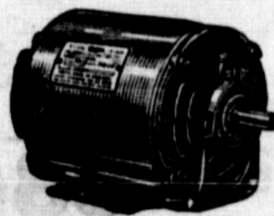

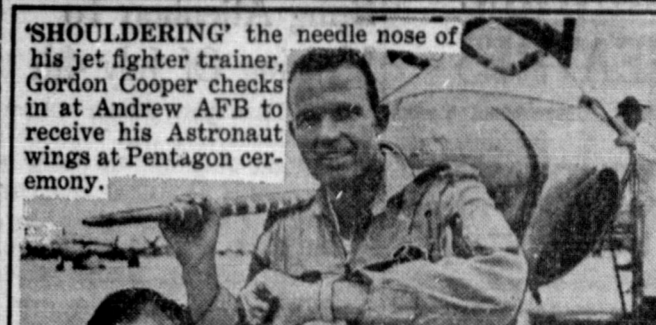

Conservation work costs money. That's why we have an ACP. Many farmers still may not understand that they can obtain program help in getting the needed conservation job done on their farms.

Just drive around the country and you can easily spot the farms where conservation farming is being practiced. In most cases, you would also find that the Agricultural Conservation Program is cooperating with the farmer in carrying out the conservation practice on the land.

For farmers who may not fully understand just how ACP works, it's purpose is to encourage the establishments of soil, water, woodland, and wildlife conservation practices needed in the public interest. The program therefore, has an incentive type of approach to the problem — it shares the cost of sound conservation measures which the farmer would not carry out without such assistance.

Funds for this purpose are authorized by Congress in recognition of the fact that the Nation's natural resources are vital not only to the farmers and ranchers who operate the land but also to the health and well-being of each citizen, both now and in the future.

ACP practices to promote conservation measures are selected to meet local as well as national conditions. Each county has a list of the practices, specifications,
