Committee To Study Feasibility Of Farm Retraining Program

Seventy-four area farmers and other interested individuals were on hand for the meeting last Thursday at which time representatives of the Texas Education Agency, and Texas Employment Commission explained the Farm Retraining Program of the Manpower and Development Act.

H. M. "Flip" Breedlove was named chairman of a committee to study the feasibility of the program here. This committee will meet tonight in the community room at the Farmers State Bank at 8 p.m. to determine whether a school of this nature will fit our locality.

A report from the Texas Employment Commission indicated a need for trained employees in irrigation and farm machinery peration.

If the program is instituted here, it will consist of a 20 week course of 800 hours available to people in and around Clarendon in sufficient number or the Texas Employment Agency will place applicants here. Tractors and other equipment will be rented from local dealers and Clarendon College facilities will be made available. Each course could mean around \$40,000 in revenue to this locality.



Church Installs Fallout Shelter





FALLOUT PROTECTION capability designed and built into a new church at McLean, Va., achieves shelter area for 300 persons on part of the first floor (shaded area in drawing at right) by increasing the ceiling slab for the first floor from 2-6 inches of concrete, and other supplementary measures. One of these measures is added radiation protection obtained from the retaining wall which helps to shield the part of the shelter area adjacent to the outside walls.

It's Integral Part Of New Building

Fallout protection features built into the new McLean Bible Church at McLean, Va., are invisible to the untrained eye, as are similar measures built into many new structures springing up across the Nation. They are very real, nevertheless.

The church is one of 34 new buildings of various types which

The church is one of 34 new buildings of various types which are cited in a new civil defense publication as examples of designing fallout shelter into structures at little or no extra cost at the time they are built, and without impairing their appearance or use. The shelter feature added only \$900 to the cost of the \$217,000 church, or about six cents of the \$15.24 cost per sq. ft. of the building. 

FERTILITY PROGRAM CAN CUT PRODUCTION COST

A good soil fertility program s one of the best methods for lowering the costs of crop and pasture production. And, points out County Agent Ronald Gooch, the basis for the program should be soil testing.

But, he adds, the soil sample submitted to a testing laboratory must be taken with care and be representative of the fertility conditions which exist in the field.

First, determine where the samples should be taken. Many fields, explain the county agent, have conditions which require more than a single sample, For

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



FALLOUT SHELTER BUILT-IN EASILY

A new booklet just issued by the Defense Department's Office of Civil Defense (OCD) describes and illustrates 34 new buildings across the Nation in which "slanting" techniques of fallout protective design were used to build-in fallout protection at little or no added cost and without affecting the buildings looks or efficiency.

The publication, entitled "New Buildings With Fallout Protection" (TR-27), also dispels the notion that a fallout shelter has to be single-purpose, underground and unattractive. It points out that all buildings across the Nation provide some

across the Nation provide some degree of radiation shielding, and many of these contain shelter space in above-ground areas.

Many other buildings have weak
points in shielding which could
have been avoided had knowledge of fallout and protection The theories were put into practice in the 34 buildings cited by the OCD booklet.

Following are some examples of "slanting" techniques:

Reducing or eliminating windows or placing them high up in a room to cut down direct exposure of occupants to out-side radiation, which moves in straight lines.

 Filling hollow walls with a radiation-shielding material such as sand.


