The new law also elim nates deferred adjudication
ing that any person convicted of drunken driving will be
unable to have the offens unable to have the offense
removed from his or her record af
bation.
The new law provides
tougher penalties which are
designed to encourage re-
peat offenders to seek treat-
peat offenders to seek treat
ment for alcohol problems
Those willing to enter alcocol
treatment programs will face rreatment progra
more lenient jail
more lenient jail terms than
those who refuse. The new
law requires the director of
law requires the director of a
the curt should the notify not make a good faith effort to participate in treatment.
The new law also allows the court to order the defendant to pay for all or part of the
cost of such a rehabilitation
program.

## LIOUIDS OR TABLETS?

Antacids are formulated into chewing gums, lozenges, powders, tablets, and liquids. The most popular dosage forms are the tablets and liquids. Butwhich is the best dosage form-tablets or liquids?

In order for antacids to effectively neutralizestomach acids, they must exist as tiny particles. The antacid in liquids is already in such a form. Tablets, on the other hand, must be chewed tharoughly and then must remain in the stomach for a period of time before they are reduced to tiny particles. For this reason, liquid antacids often worker faster and neutralize more acid than do antacids in tablet form.

It is not convenient to_place as much antacid in tablets as in liquids. Eor-one popular preparation, the antacid in 2 tablespoonfuls is equal in quantity to that contained in 17 tablets. For individuals who require large doses of antacids (for example, those with gastro-intestinal .ulcers), exclusive use of tablets would be must more costly than use of liquids.

Tablets are convenient and may becarried in pocket or purse. For occasional indigestion, they are excellent. When large doses are required, the liquids are usually more effective and more economical.
