Jess Finley and seconded by Clarence Reynolds that on recommendation by the County Auditor, the Commissioners Court does hereby accept the 1964 audit and recommended by the County Auditor. The Court does hereby accept the check presented by Truett Behrens, Tax Assessor-Collector for the year 1964, in the amount of \$870.69 as cash unaccounted for. Motion carried unanimously.

Judge Drennan stated that the auditors report showed the above amounts unaccounted for but for no specific account so the money was deposited in the County general fund.

A large vote is expected as politics are beginning to warm up again after a lull of a week or so. All eligible voters should make an effort to vote so the issue can be decided and then everyone can work together for the betterment of Clarendon.

Regardless of how you stand on the issue, your vote will be needed either to change the form of government to Commission type or to retain the present form. Do not stay away from the polls and say "It will be defeated" or "it will carry with ease" without my vote... The way things go now-days, you can be disappointed quite easily if you depend on the other fellow to do your job... and in this case you are the only person that can cast your ballot.

A sample ballot showing how to vote either way may be found in the Leader elsewhere. Clip it out and take it with you if you are in doubt how you should mark your ballot.

CIRCLE C JAMBOREE SET FOR APRIL 9

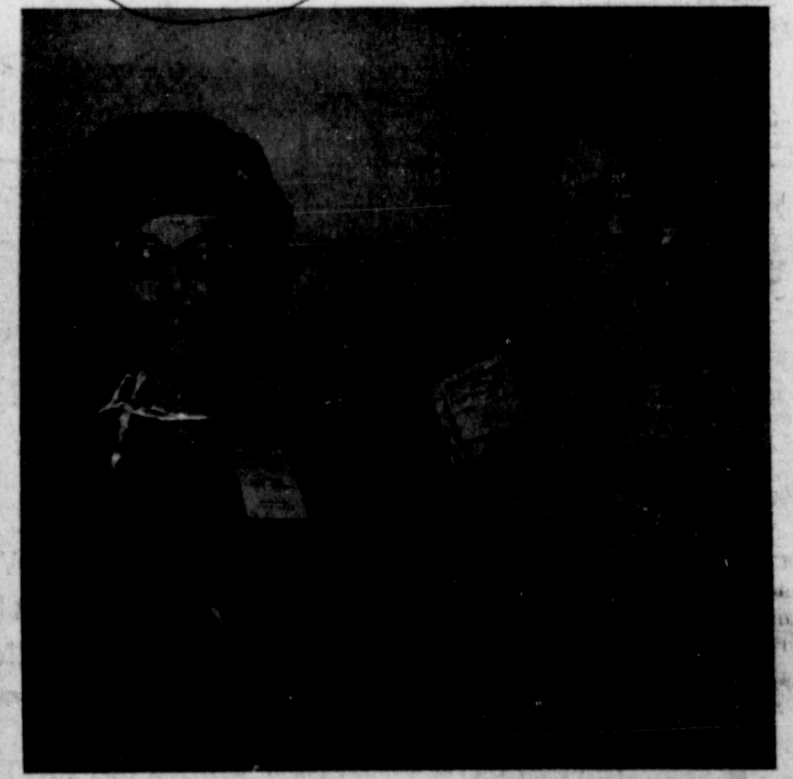

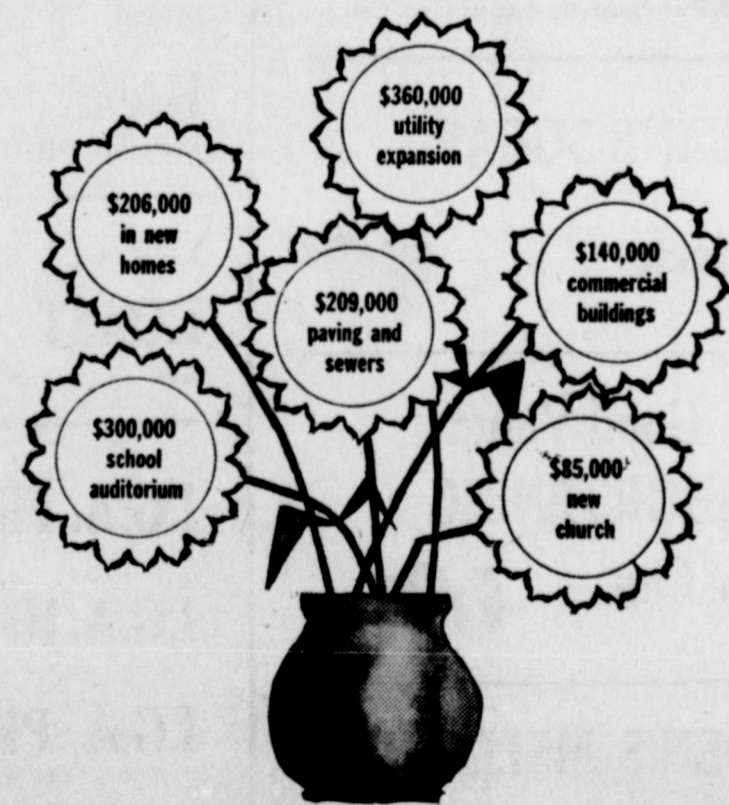
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PATTERNS FOR PROGRESS IN COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT



Stamford blossoms out with a bouquet of community improvements

DOMESTIC COTTON

If you are interested in the Domestic Cotton Program, March 26 is the final date to sign up. If you have a regular allotment larger than your domestic allotment you must sign up to participate. If your regular allotment and domestic allotment are the same, you do not have to sign up. If you have a regular cotton allotment of 15.1 to 20 acres, it may be to your advantage to give the Domestic Cotton Program special consideration.

1965 FEED GRAIN PROGRAM

There are only two days (today and Friday) left to sign up in the 1965 Feed Grain Program. Remember, you must file an application and then comply with the program to be eligible for price support loans and payments.

If you are planning on substitution (wheat for feed grain or feed grain for wheat) you must sign up in both programs. If you do not understand the substitution provision, be sure and come by the office and discuss it with us.

1965 ACP

During the past month, we have had a very glaring example of what can happen to bare ground in our county. Let's keep in mind that ACP will help you get a cover crop on all parts of the diverted acres we will be having under the wheat and feed grain programs.
