Clarendon Girls win 2-AA district meet

Winning every meet during the past two seasons with exception of one-the State meet, Clarendon girls have completed a very outstanding season by taking the District Championship for the third straight year. They scored in 14 of the 15 events and have ten individuals and two relays qualified to the Regional Track meet on April 22-23 at Texas Tech in Lubbock. The team is in a very strong position to defend the Regional title they won last year.

The District Championship was a well rounded team victory with 76 points coming in the field events and 103 points in the running events. Leading the team in its victory were several top performers, Linda Weatherton (won 4 gold and 1 silver), Susan Thompson (won 3 silver, 1 gold and 1 bronze), Muzzy Hayes (won 2 gold and 1 silver). Paula Noble (won 2 gold medals) and Connie Garmen (1 silver and 2 bronze). In addition there were others that performed above their normal efforts.

The team has competed very well, and they should be complimented for their efforts in one of the worst weathered springs in several years. They ran in snow, freezing temperatures and had only one "track day" during the season.

In addition, there were only two seniors, Susan Thompson and Krystal Hayworth. These two girls came out and made an effort and did show some leadership. A special thanks for their

Clifford, a graduate of Clarendon College, attended the University of Heidelberg, Germany, when her husband, Jack, was serving in the military. She has assisted her husband in the management of a grocery store for 20 years.

In 1977, Clifford became the first woman elected as a member of the city governmental body and Clarendon citizens elected her as mayor four years later. During her tenure, a new ambulance has been purchased for the city which maintains no hospital, citizens passed a bond to enable upgrading the water systems and the local government obtained funding from the Texas Aeronautical Commission for a grant to pay 80 percent of costs of repaving and new lighting at the municipal airport.

Clifford also is active as a member of 1926 Book Club, Early Bird Home Demonstration Club, Beta Sigma Phi Sorority, 4-H activities, and First United Methodist Church. The Burton Memorial Library has received a board, a chapter of the Friends of the Library through Clifford's work, has joined the state library system and moved into a newly-renovated facility. She and her husband are parents of three children.

Two suspects sought

While traveling through New Mexico on his way to Oklahoma City, Jessie John Doiron picked up two white male hitchhikers in New Mexico at approximately 8 a.m. on April 4. The three spent the night in Amarillo.

Early the next morning, while traveling down 1-40 north bound into Donley County, the two hitchhikers asked Doiron to pull off the

road so they could use the bathroom. When the hitchhikers re-entered the van, one entered by way of the front door and the other by the sliding door on the side. The hitchhiker, who had entered by the sliding door allegedly hit Doiron in the head with a hammer. Both subjects then allegedly pushed Doiron out of the van where he was caught in the front seat belt and was dragged several yards before falling free of the seat belt.

The van ran over his left foot.
At this report, Doiron is in the Intensive Care Unit of the Coronado Hospital in Pampa

with a busted spleen, four broken ribs and other internal injuries.

Complaint charges have been filed against the two hitchhikers for unauthorized use of a vehicle and attempted murder.

At the time of this report, the stolen had been spotted in Fayetteville, North Carolina. Sheriff Jimmy Thompson stated that they expect the Cumberland County Sheriff's office to apprehend the suspects withing the next 12 hours.

PIK Donley County's Pick

PIK, Payment in Kind, a program established by the government to help the farmers control the over production of certain commodities. Most area farmers have chosen to participate in the PIK program. This means that they will not be planting crops such as cotton, wheat or feed grains. This does not mean, however, that they will be idle this season. Far from it, they will be required to control noxious weeds such as field bindweed, redvine, trumpet creeper, pepperweed, milkvine and silverleaf nightshade. "There are a number of weeds that offer the growers the opportunity for significant population reduction while the land is idle," says Dr. Wiese from Texas A & M University. Extension weed control specialist. .. "These include johnsongrass, shattercane, field bindweed, barnyard grass and several more.

The government PIK rules state that "a farm operator shall, in a timely manner, use needed control measures for erosion, insects, weeds and rodents on the conservation use acreage". Failure to do so can result in a reduction or complete loss of program benifits.

In addition to weed control, the farmers participating in PIK must work on wind and water erosion prevention. A cover crop is most desirable and is required to protect the soil from erosion unless a farmer requests and receives ASCS permission to leave the ground as stubble from the previous crop. In this area, it is difficult to control wind erosion unless a cover crop or stubble is left in the field. If a farmer is to treat for weeds, the soil is best tilled which then makes it impossible to control erosion.

There are a total of 663 farms with one or more base acres of cotton, wheat or feed grains. Of this number, there are 523 enrolled in the PIK program.

A total of 74,621 base acres with all three base crops is registered with the ASCS and 69,319 have enrolled in PIK, or 93% of the total acreage.

There are 53,760 acres in cotton and 52,293 have been enrolled, or 97% of the total cotton base.

Wheat base acreage totals 12,349 acres and 84% or 110,342 acres have been enrolled.

Feedgrains total 8,448 acres in the area and 79% or 6679 base acres have been enrolled in the PIK program this year.







WON'T GO DOWN

Occasionally, an adult or child will experience one of two problems when attempting to swallow tablets or capsules. The first problem relates to a tablet or capsule becoming "stuck" in the throat. How can this problem be minimized? Simply take the medication with a large glass of liquid while standing or sitting in an upright position.

The second problem is the inability to swallow a tablet or capsule. This may be a particular problem with large tablets or capsules. What to do? First the medication should be placed on the back of the tongue. Force should not be used [if it is, gagging or choking may occur. Looking down while swallowing is often helpful. And taking the medication with a large glass of water or other liquid facilitates swallowing.

Sometimes people experience difficulty swallowing tablets or capsules because they believe they will have swallowing problems. The dosage units may appear to be too large to swallow. If one simply relaxes and tries to forget that there is a tablet or capsule on the back of the tongue, swallowing is usually accomplished. But if all else fails, the tablet or capsule can be placed in jelly or some other soft food that is pleasing to the taste.





Hank became the star of THE DEVIL IN TEXAS," Erickson says. "I figured that if people liked him so much, I had better give him a whole book to himself."

He wrote the book in the winter of 1982. It's called HANK

THE COWDOG, and it's just out from Maverick Books (\$5.95 plus \$1100 postage, Maverick Books, 1101 Baylor, Perryton, Texas (9070).

The story begins with Hank saying, "It's me again, Hank the Cowdog. I just got some terrible news. There's been a murder on the ranch.

Someone or something has broken into the chickenhouse and killed a chicken in cold blood. Hank and his buddy Drover get right on the case, and before it's all over. Hank has been accused of the murder, runs away from the ranch, and is captured by a tribe of wild coyotes.

If Erickson's subject matter has gone to the dogs, his writing career hasn't. After putting in a long fifteen year apprenticeship, he is at last winning recognition as a writer and public speaker. In March, he was elected to the Texas institute of Letters and becomes the only author north of Lubbock to be so honored.

Whith HANK THE COWDOG, Erickson is not only bringing out a book, but has also produced the material as an 'audio book.' "It's a new concept in the publishing world: recording a

book on tape. Actually it's just old fashioned storytelling. Erickson recorded HANK THE COWDOG in a professional sound studio in Amarillo. Sound effects and music were added later, after the author had recored the voice parts-which required that he assume the identities of fourteen different characters: three cowboys, three dogs, four coyotes, two buzzards, one cat, and one cowboy's wife.

The tapes are being sold as a package, including a copy of the book and two cassette tapes (two and a half hours of programming) for \$19.95 plus \$1.00 shipping, and are available only through Maverick Books.

No question about it, John Erickson's writing career has gone to the dogs. And he's enjoying it so much that he's already working on another Hank the Cowdog book.


