## Measles Outbreak in Houston Still a Threat

When an outbreak of rubeola (red measles) began in Houston last November officials at the Texas Department of Health (TDH) predicted that susceptible travelers might contract the disease and transport it to other cities. That prediction became fact, with several cases on college campuses traced to Christmas break in Houston.

Now, with the unusually large outbreak continuing in Houston, health officials have issued a new warning. TDH is concerned that many of the more than 50,000 people expected at Houston's livestock show and rodeo (Feb. 16-26) also could contract and transport the disease statewide.

While the new cases are occurring in all age groups, most patients are toddlers and infants less than 15 months old, and young adults, often high school and college students. Health clinics on several college campuses have reported a growing number of students with measles, most of whom were exposed to the virus during trips to Houston.

Robert D. Crider, director of TDH's Immunization Division, said that the Houston outbreak began last year with about 50 infants and children. Until that outbreak began, only 17 cases of measles had been reported throughout the state for the first 10 months of 1988. But by the end of December, the year's total reached about 250. New cases continue to be reported at an alarming rate.

Crider said that the Houston area still is the source of most reports. "Between November, when the first of the Houston outbreak began, and early February, more than 900 cases of measles have been reported in Harris County alone," Crider said. "In all of 1987, there were only about 452 measles cases in the whole state."

Crider attributed the sharp rise in the number of cases to several factors. He explained, "Many people seem to have forgotten how contagious the measles virus is. It can infect any susceptible person who is exposed to it. By susceptible, I mean anyone who has not had the disease, or whose immunization

cent of those vaccinated. Measles is so contagious that until the advent of vaccines, few people reached adulthood without being infected—hence the misconception that measles is a 'childhood' disease."

He added that persons born before 1957 are likely to have been infected earlier with red measles and are generally not considered susceptible to the disease.

Since 1981 state law has required that all children entering public or private school must show proof of immunization for measles, or furnish a physician-validated history of measles illness. On physician's advice to parents, most children are routinely immunized at 15 months with measles-mumps-rubella vaccine. The result is that for some years, measles among young children dramatically declined. In 1983, for example, Texas reported only 37 cases.

The symptoms of red measles are fever, runny nose, cough, watery eyes, and a rash which first appears on the head and face, eventually spreading over the body. Crider stressed that red measles, rubeola, should not be confused with rubella, German measles, which can cause serious birth defects in the babies of infected mothers.

## Breast Screening Starting March 13

The Breast Cancer Screening Project of the Don and Sybil Harrington Cancer Center and the High Plains Baptist Hospital of Amarillo will begin a community outreach clinic in Clarendon, beginning March 13, every Monday afternoon from 1 p.m.-5 p.m., at the Medical Center Clinic in Clarendon. The Project is designed to educate our community about the importance of early detection of breast cancer.

The clinic will provide low cost screening which includes a breast exam, individualized breast self examination instruction and a mammogram. The clinic will be staffed by professionals specially trained in breast cancer detection.

Currently the most effective method known to win the battle against breast cancer is early detection. Early detection is best done by following guidelines recommended by The National Cancer Institute for breast cancer screening for women who have no signs or symptoms of breast cancer:

1. Learn and perform breast self examination every month.
2. Have a physical examination including the breasts every year.
3. Have a mammogram according to the recommendations by age.  
**Age**  
35 to 40 One baseline mammogram  
40 to 50 A mammogram every 1 to 2 years  
Over 50 A mammogram every year

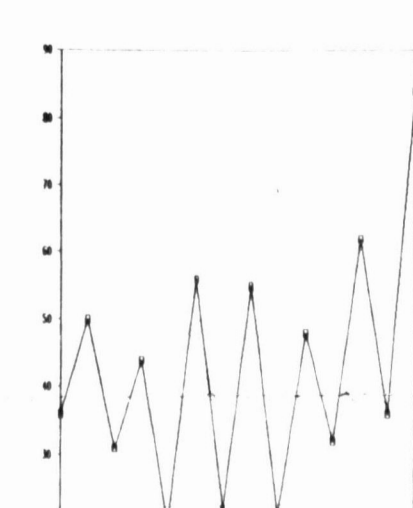

Any old business was tabled due to the time schedule. New business conducted was the preparation for the volleyball tournament to be held

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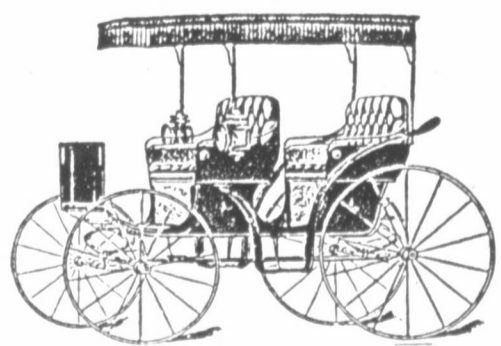

**New Space-Age Hearing Device Available Soon**

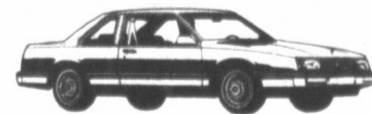

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## T For Texas

Tom Christian of Claude Texas has done a lot of things.

He's cowboied, run a bank, served as a Republican in the Texas House of Representatives when there weren't but half a dozen others, and he's spent the night in the Armstrong County Courthouse—more than once.

He'll never be famous for it, but this last distinction must be the most interesting one to me.

The other day Tom and I were visiting, and he reminisced about his nights of slumber in the courthouse.

"All rural courthouses had jury rooms, where the jury could be sequestered for a period of time," Tom began. "They were usually just a big room with a bunch of double beds in them."

"I know when I was in high school, which was back about four decades ago in the late 40's, the athletic trips were pretty long. A lot of times you had to go over 100 miles, and you got back late at night."

"The thing that the country kids got to doing was slipping into the courthouse late and spending the night in the jury room. And most of them, being country boys, were pretty used to waking up pretty early, so you could get out before the courthouse opened."

Commenting that he is now sure this wasn't a very well kept secret, he said that he and his friends always thought it was. It made them feel pretty daring to go up and spend the night in the jury room.

"It seems like we went through a window, because I don't think anyone was capable of doing much past opening a window. I don't think we broke in or entered in an illegal way; at least we didn't damage anything."

"Anyway," Tom continued, "that worked good for a long time, and that was our deal, and we thought that was pretty good."

Then one morning the boys slept a little too long. "We had to come out in the courthouse after everybody had gotten to the offices. I'm not sure they ever stopped us, but they probably backed us back some."

"For a lot of country kids coming in late at night, it did give you an opportunity to spend the night," Tom concluded. "It's hard to make as much sense out of it now as it did then."

As I think of my friend, Tom Christian, sitting in a grey suit at a desk or dishing out dutch-oven biscuits for out-of-state visitors at the "Cowboy Morning" he offers to tourists at his ranch on the Palo Duro Canyon east of Amarillo, it's still hard for me to imagine him as a boy climbing through that dark window to spend the night in the courthouse.

He did it, though, and multiple times. He's a veteran of sleeping in the jury room.

Progressive Farmer, a monthly magazine related to Agriculture, has a continuing interest in improving the rural communities and has a real "down-to-earth" article in almost every issue.

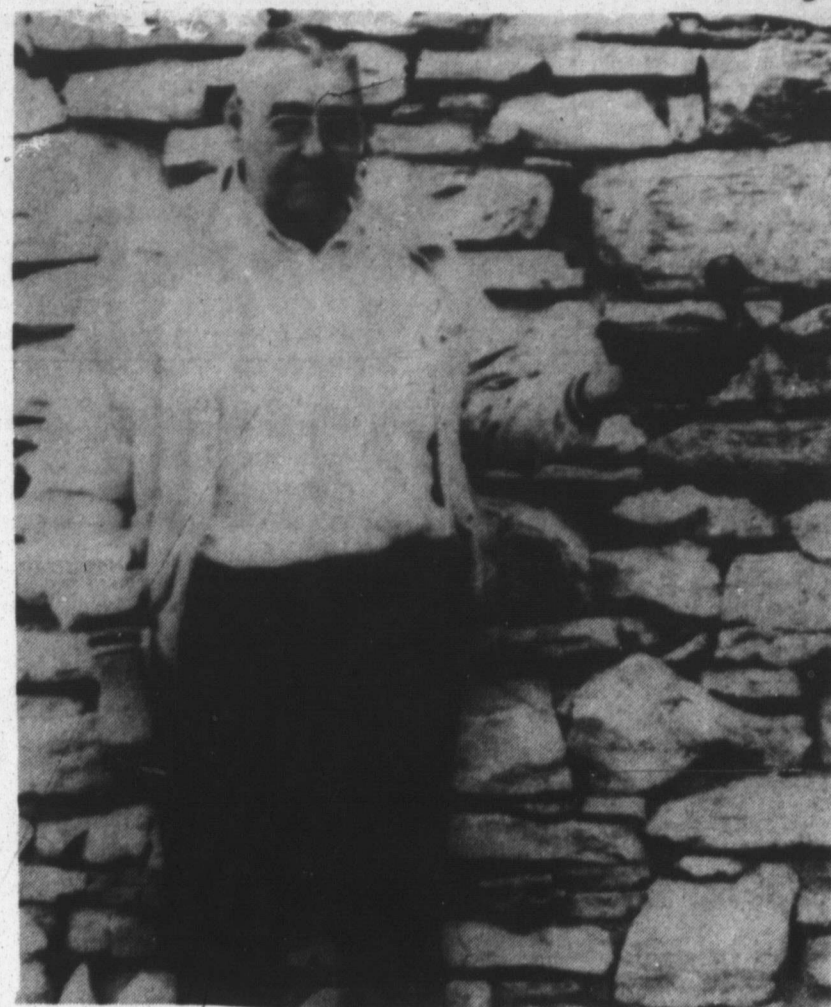
In the October 1988 issue, it had a real provocative article that should be must reading - *How Will Your Town Look in the Year 2000?* The following quotation from this article should relate:

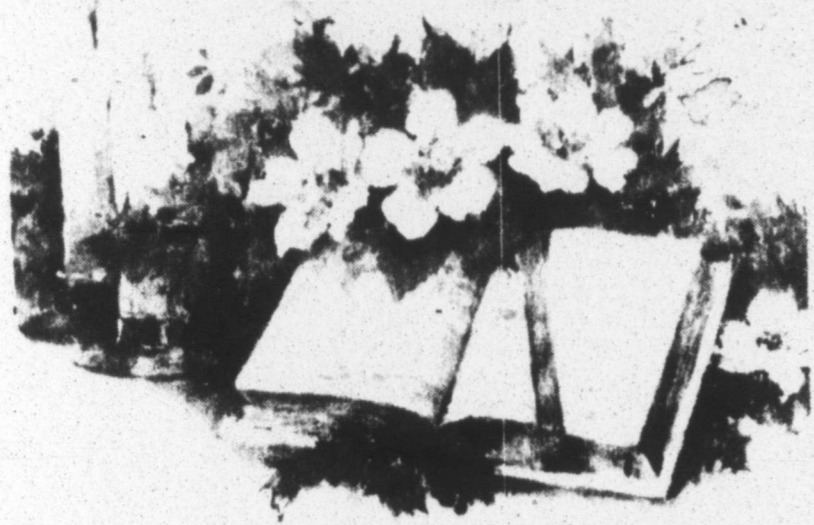

## Dear Editor,

As the Planned Parenthood Board of Directors, we feel strongly compelled to respond to Jeanette Loveless' inflammatory letter.

The Panhandle Planned Parenthood Association (PPPA) staff did not provide or advocate any books for adolescents to read. Mrs. Loveless did not explain that since there are no books kept at the PPPA offices, the staff (as a service to Mrs. Loveless), obtained a list of books available at the Memphis and Clarendon public libraries.

Though we have not read all the books in their libraries, it is hard to believe that accepted library books would encourage sexual activity as she outlined. To say she had merely received a list of books available at the public library evidently did not fit into her scheme of trying to discredit an agency which does so much good for our panhandle families.

Our agency provides family planning information and services to approximately 13,000 women each year. The services include pap smears, physical exams and screening for sexually transmitted diseases, diabetes, hypertension and pregnancy. We are the only medical resource available for many women in our rural areas.

In addition, PPPA provides parent/child education for approximately 4,000 to 5,000 persons annually. The programs provided include Responsible Decision Making, Teenage Pregnancy, Developing Self Esteem and How to Say No, etc. Churches and schools repeatedly request our programs. Does it make sense that we would continue to have so many requests if our education were less than appropriate?

PPPA has a very active Religious Advisory Committee composed of many ministers and religious

leaders in Amarillo. The Religious Advisory Committee provided a workshop last fall for other religious leaders in the area, thereby presenting a forum for discussion focused on the church's role in sexuality education. The Presenters for this forum represented the church of Christ, Baptist, Catholic, Episcopal, Jewish and Methodist religions. This same committee is co-sponsoring a luncheon this April to bring Reverend Chris Steel to speak on the subject of AIDS. Does this sound like an irresponsible approach to education?

We are appreciative of the many calls received in support of our agency and the services we provide. These calls were in response to the remarks made by Mrs. Loveless.

The American way is to have the freedom to voice differences of opinion, however, the American way is not to attempt to discredit those dedicated to serving others.

they moved when He moved. When morning came, they found breakfast on the ground. When enemies arose, God routed them. God's provision for them, as necessary as it was, almost eliminated any need for faith, or even any need for exercising the will. It seems that the more His presence was evident, the more they took Him for granted.

Can you really love someone without faith and trust in that person? Can you really have love-producing faith in someone, and at the same time take him for granted? Could this be the reason that God seems hidden at times? Is this why He does not always rush to answer every time we ask "Why"?

I can't come up with easy answers to questions which have been asked for ages. But it seems that God asks something so simple: love Me, trust Me. We place faith in everyone and everything else. Why not God? Is it because we, like Israel, take Him for granted so much that we hardly know Him? Yancey, the devout Christian and Bible scholar, says in effect that he realizes he does not know God as well as he should. His solution: feed on the Word as a starving man devours his bread. God will honor the search for Him, and will not seem so hidden.

Almost everyone with property in Donley Appraisal District has now been mailed rendition forms. Please complete the listing of your taxable property and return the forms by the end of March. All personal property must be rendered each year even if there has been no change from the prior year. You should include cars, pickups, trucks RV's, travel trailers, motorcycles, boats and airplanes.

If you own a business, you should render your business inventory held for resale and other business related equipment.

January 1 of each year is the assessment date in Texas; render only that property which you owned on January 1, but make your rendition before April 1.

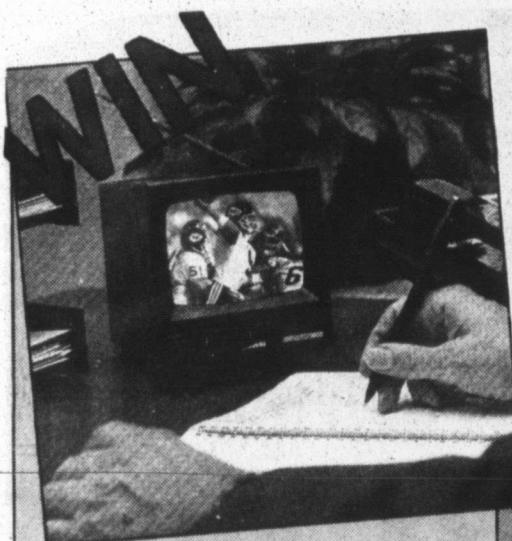

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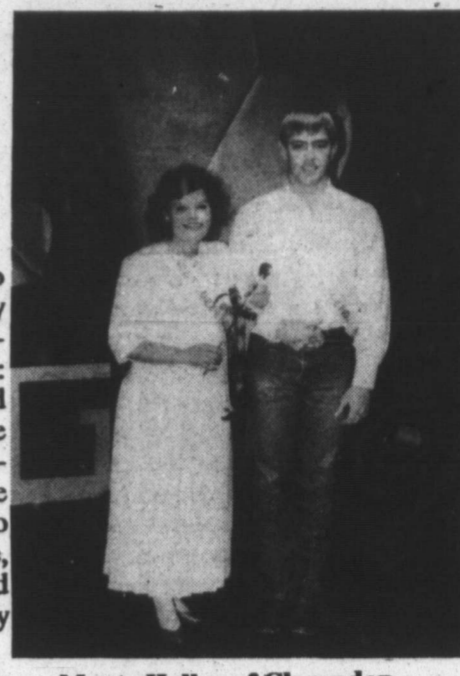

Deuteronomy 6:7-9

Why Does God Hide?

by Jon Leggitt

In his latest book, well-known evangelical author Philip Yancey chronicles the story of a young man who professes Christianity while in college, suffers enough

over the next several years to provide the script for a soap opera, and, as a result, decides he hates God. In his attempts to counsel the young man, Yancey comes to the conclusion that basically all our doubts turn on three questions: Why is God silent? Why is He unfair? Why does He hide Himself? Yancey convincingly demonstrates that God is certainly not silent, unfair, or hidden, but, he says, there are probably times when all of us have felt this way. Who has not wondered why the righteous man suffers while the evil man prospers? And aren't we tempted to think, especially if we are the sufferer, that we are being treated unfairly?

As the young man continues to rail against God, he cries out, "If . . .

He would just speak aloud one time so that everyone could hear, then I would believe. Probably the whole world would believe. Why doesn't He?"

Why, indeed, doesn't He? Yancey found the answer early in the pages of the Word. Listen to these words from the nineteenth and twentieth chapters of Exodus: "And it came to pass on the third day in the morning, that there were thunders and lightnings and a thick cloud upon the mount, and the voice of the trumpet exceeding loud; so that all the people that was in the camp trembled. . . . And Mount Sinai was altogether on a smoke, because the Lord descended upon it in fire. . . . and the whole mount quaked greatly. And when the voice of the trumpet sounded long, and waxed louder and louder, Moses spake, and God answered him by a voice. . . . And all the people saw the thunders, and the lightnings, and the noise of the trumpet, and the mountain smoking: and when the people saw it, they removed, and stood afar off. And they said unto Moses, Speak thou with us, and we will hear: but let not God speak with us lest we die."

Make no mistake about it--the children of Israel camped at the foot of the mountain would never have asked, "Why is God silent?" God was anything but silent at

Sinai. Never would they have asked, "Why does He hide himself?" He was all too evident on that rugged peak. In fact, all through the Exodus experience a Hebrew had only to peep outside his tent to see the pillar of cloud by day or the pillar of fire by night. Did such visible and audible manifestations of the presence of God cause the people to believe? Did they love God more as a result of such awesome displays?

No. Quite the contrary, most of the Old Testament is the sad record of the apostasy of Israel, and the tragic results of that rebellion and unbelief. What about the multitudes who witnessed Jesus' miracles? Surely every last one of them came to believe. But the Word plainly says that was not the case. In fact, very few became true followers as a result of the miracles.

The miracles, the rumblings on Sinai, the pillar of fire and cloud served their purpose--God always knows exactly what He is doing--but they did not produce what He wants most from us. And what is it? He wants most of all? Deuteronomy 6:5 reflects the consistent message of both testaments: "Thou shalt love the Lord thy God with all thine heart, and with all thy soul, and with all thy might."

The people of the Exodus stayed put when the pillar of cloud stayed;

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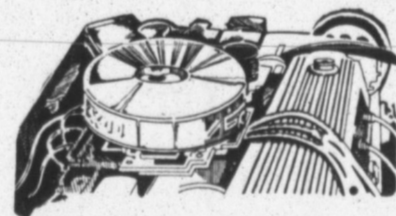

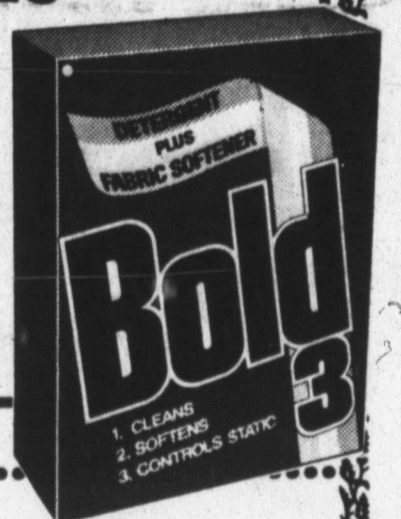
