

DEALING WITH DANDRUFF

Dandruff...a dry, scaly, condition of the scalp...affects everyone. Some individuals have more of the flaky stuff than do others. There is no cure for dandruff. The condition can usually be controlled. even with severe scaling. Many experts recommend one or more of the following:

- * Apply a medicated preparation to the scalp that dissolves skin flakes. Most of these contain salicylic acid and some contain sulfur.
- * Clean the hair and scalp often using simple, nonmedicated shampoo. Daily shampooing will control many cases of dandruff.
- * Use a medicated shampoo that reduces the rate at which new scalp cells are being formed. Medicated shampoos of this type usually contain selenium sulfide or zinc pyrithione
- * Break the scales into smaller particles that are less visible. Special detergents and coal tar are in some products for this purpose.

Most dandruff treatment products are available without prescription. As one deals with dandruff, it is frequently observed that some products are better than others.

White signs Wildlife Act

Gov. Mark White signed into law the Texas Wildlife Conservation Act of 1983 this month which will enhance the stability of the state's wildlife populations and expand outdoor opportunities for sportsmen and outdoor enthusiasts.

The act gives the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department statewide authority for wildlife management and eliminates locally specialized wildlife laws previously in effect in 116 counties Texas counties. The bill was sponsored by Rep. Fred Agnich, R-Dallas, and Sen. Ted Lyon, D-Rockwall.

Ed Cox, Vice Chairman of the TP&W Commission expressed the appreciation of the tens of thousands of sportsmen and conservationists who supported the efforts of Texans for Wildlife Conservation. The group, whose members include the more than 800 sportsmen's clubs in Texas, was formed to promote passage of the Wildlife Conservation Act.

"It is the most far reaching

effect in 13 counties. Some of these laws were first passed in 1925 and were not responsive to today's wildlife management needs. In 30 other counties, commissioners courts had authority to veto wildlife regulations developed by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department. In 73 other counties, Cox said, the Parks and Wildlife Department had only partial authority to manage wildlife.

"The Wildlife Conservation Act puts wildlife management in the hands of professionals and eliminates the outdated laws that regulated wildlife in large parts of our state," Cox said. "The act will extend to every county the extraordinary success record of the Parks and Wildlife Department."

This measure will now ensure that the best needs of the wildlife will be met rather than the political desires in an area. Wildlife can now be safely regulated and controlled according to the guidelines established from research and field study conducted by biologists in the



April 15th was not the absolute deadline for making an individual retirement account act as a 1982 tax shelter. For those who have extensions on filing income tax returns, an IRA opened at any time during the extended period can act as a 1982 tax shelter.

FIESTA STEAK I beef round stead 1/2" thick 3 TBS flour 11/2 tsp salt

1/8 tsp pepper 3 TBS lard or drippings 2 beef bouillon cubes 1/2 C hot water

3 med. onions, quartered 1 lg green bell pepper cut in 1" squares

3 med tomatoes, cut in 1" wedges

Cut round steak into 6 servings. Combine flour, salt and pepper. Dredge meat in seasoned flour, pound to 1/4" thick, brown dripping. Pour off fat. Dissolve bouilon in hot water,

add to meat. Add onions cover tightly and cook over low heat I hour. Add green pepper and tomatoes, cover tightly and cook slowly 25 minutes or until meat is tender.

ROAST STUFFED CHICKEN

1 roast chicken salt and pepper 1/3 C raw long grain and wild rice mix 1/2 C orange juice 1/3 C water 2 TBS oleo

1/2 C diced celery 2 TBS chopped scallion 1/4 C chopped pecans 1 tsp grated orange rind
