Local Students Get Invitation To Tour Europe

Brook Grisham, son of Mr. & Mrs. Richard Grisham, Andrea Edwards, daughter of Mr. & Mrs. James Edwards, and Michael Moore son of Mrs. Judy McCully and Bud Moore, all received letters this week inviting them to participate in International Track and Field Competition. All three students received this invitation by qualifying for the Tri-State A.A.U. finals in San Antonio, Texas last July. They were among the top athletes invited to go on this trip as evidenced by their qualifying for the State Championship meet last spring. Tourism Linked to Historic Preservation

When you travel, are you likely to visit historic sites or museums? In a survey recently completed by the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation, it was found that most people answer "yes." In fact, next to shopping, visitors to Texas enjoy visiting historical attractions more than any other activity.

It's no accident that sites such as the Alamo in San Antonio, the barque *Elissa* in Galveston, and the Capitol Building in Austin draw millions of visitors each year. Texans and their visitors are interested in the state's history, and want to learn more about it.

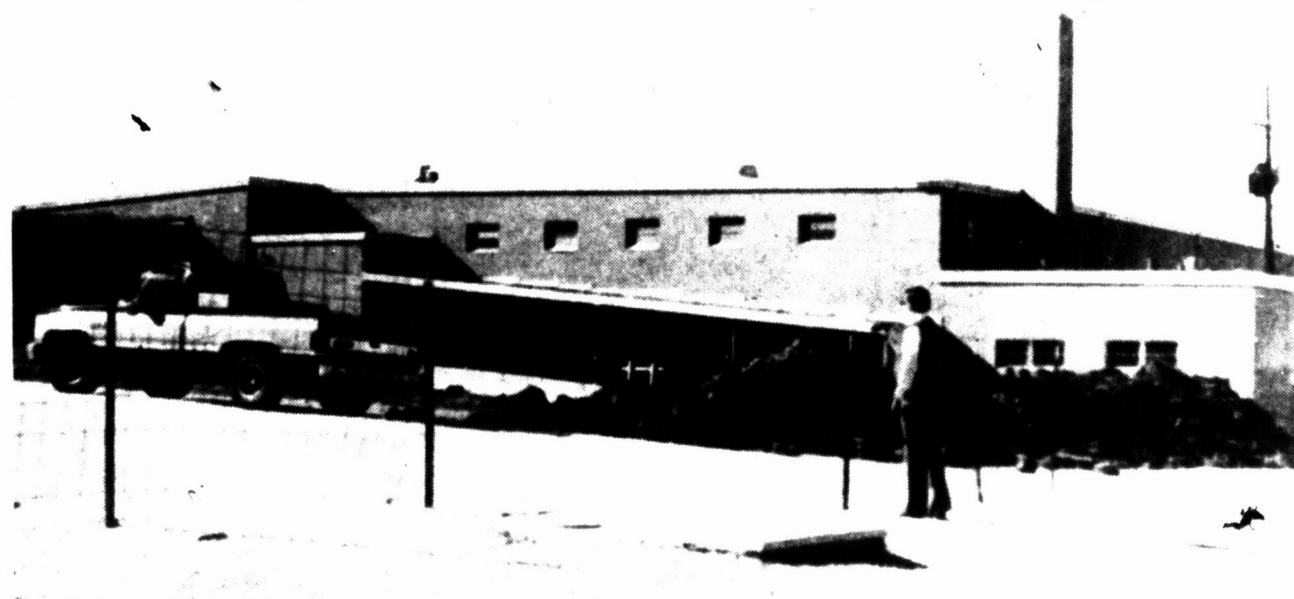
This fascination with history is being noticed by state lawmakers, too. With the slump in oil prices and a growing concern about the state's economic stability, government leaders are looking for other ways to increase revenues. One answer is tourism, a \$17.3 billion dollar industry in Texas, and growing. Tourism, particularly in the coming decade, will be inexorably linked to historic preservation—a partnership that will benefit us all.

Already, communities are capitalizing on this interest in history by maintaining local and county history museums, opening bed and breakfast inns, offering historical walking and home tours, and rehabilitating historic buildings for retail or cultural uses. All along the state's highways and byways, one can now view a variety of billboards advertising a community's museum or historic shopping area.

According to Arthur Frommer, author and operator of one of the largest tour companies in the nation, there are three major reasons why people travel: rest/recreation; a desire to view great natural sites; and an interest in the achievements of the past. **Cont'd on Page 6**

TDA Predatory Management Training Session

Donley County ranchers who are trying to control coyotes or other predators, may want to attend a Predator Management

Training Program that will be held at 6:00 p.m. on Thursday, February 9, 1989, at the Briscoe County Show Barn in Silverton.

The session will include instruction on proper identification of causes of predation, alternate methods of predator control and m-44 sodium cyanide applicator certification training.

To continue use of M-44 sodium cyanide, all applicators certified before April 18, 1988 must take this course and be recertified. The training leading to M-44 sodium cyanide certification is free. Cer-

tification also requires a private applicator license, a noncommercial applicator license or a commercial applicator license, to purchase state-limited-use pesticides.

The Texas Agricultural Extension Service is assisting TDA in conducting this training session.

Also, the Extension Service has for sale at \$5.00 per copy, a publication entitled *Procedure for Evaluating Predation on Livestock and Wildlife*. Livestock producers concerned with predation problems may purchase a copy of this publication from:

Candy Factory "On Schedule"

According to San Thompson, a plan to start a candy factory in Clarendon is fairly well "on schedule". He said "Of course, things like this always take longer and cost more than estimated".

The entrepreneur was not willing to guess when production would begin, but he is setting up sales routes now based on the new

location here in Clarendon. The old factory in Oklahoma will fill early orders for these routes. The old kitchen will be phased out as Oklahoma employees retire or move on to other jobs, while the Clarendon operation will gradually expand. Thompson said "We are going to close it down slowly, by attrition. Both places may be

Contractor Working on Old Hotel

The old Peabody Hotel at the end of Kearney Street (across from the Fort Worth & Denver Depot) has been unlocked and workmen are busy cleaning up the debris of many years neglect and abuse. The structure's former owner has reportedly turned the building over to the city in lieu of fixing it up, forfeiting a bond posted earlier. The building cannot be demolished for five years.

At present the city plans to use the bond money to "mitigate the nuisance" (and hazard) presented by the dilapidated roof and upper floors. The walls and basic structure are solid, however, and there is some hope for renovation in the future.

Next week *The Clarendon Press* plans to run a story on the old landmark and its role in Clarendon's heritage.

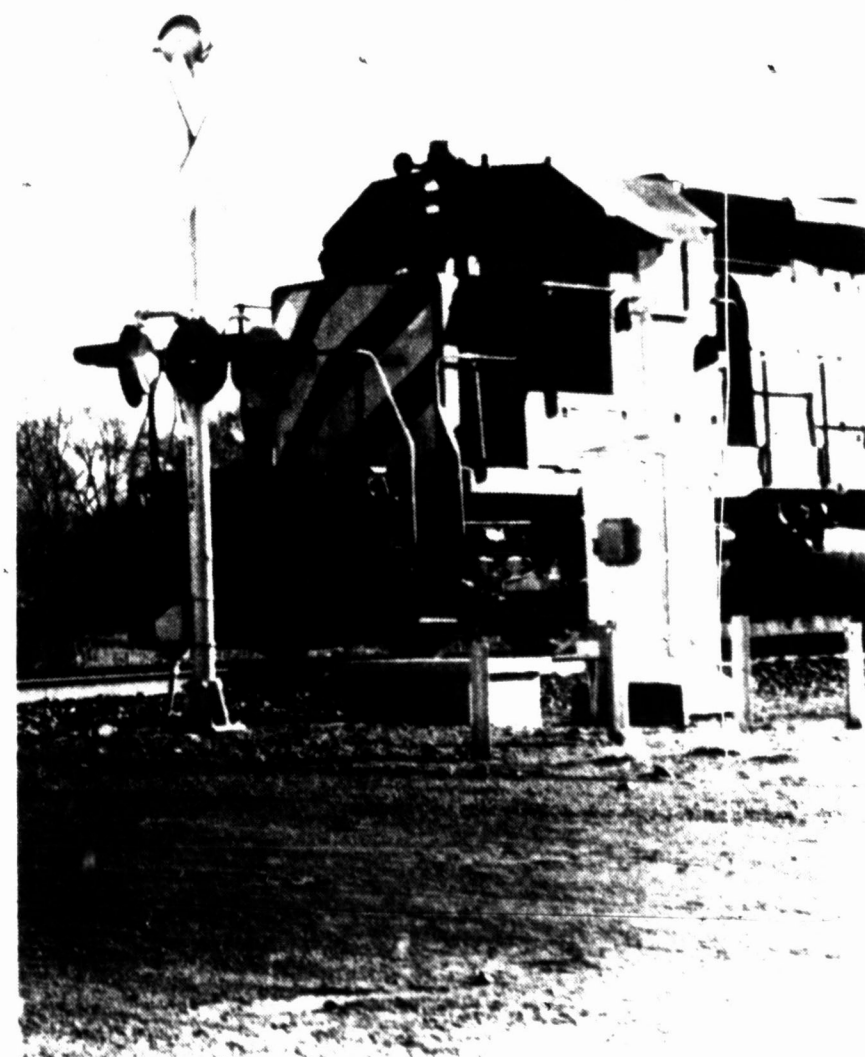

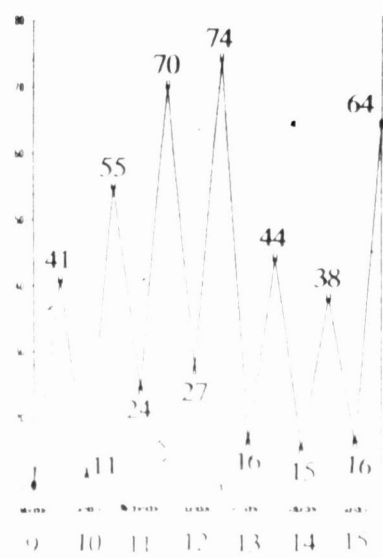

Son Of Local Man Promoted

Jack F. McAnear, son of Fed McAnear of Clarendon, was promoted to the position of Petroleum Engineering Associate effective October 2, 1988.

Jack began his career with Amoco in 1973 as a Robustabout in the Hastings Area. He graduated from Texas Tech University in 1975 with a B.S. Degree in Petroleum Engineering and was then transferred to the Houston Division in 1977 and then to Tulsa in 1978, with an assignment in the Petrophysics group. He returned to the Houston office to work in the West Texas-Eastern New Mexico Division in 1979, part of which time was spent as an Engineering Supervisor.

Jack was transferred to the Denver Region in 1982, where he was assigned to the Anschutz Ranch East development project. Some of his significant accomplishments on this project include developing a procedure for predicting permeability from gamma ray and porosity logs, developing a reservoir description for the modeling efforts, and acting as chairman of West-Lobe log analysis subcommittee.

Since 1986, Jack has been assigned to the Southern Division Coal DeGas group. In this assignment he has successfully correlated coal quality to density and gamma ray logs, which has resulted in improved methods of calculating reserves and running model simulations. He has used his petrophysics background to develop reservoir descriptions for our coal degas model and has performed various models. He also provides technical support to various groups in the Region, including Proration, Environmental, and Public and Government affairs. Jack's efforts have significantly contributed to the overall technical advances of this project.

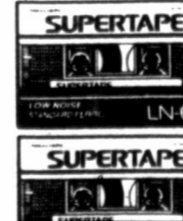
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Food 'n' Fashion 4-H News

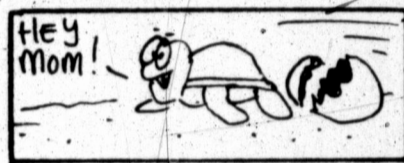

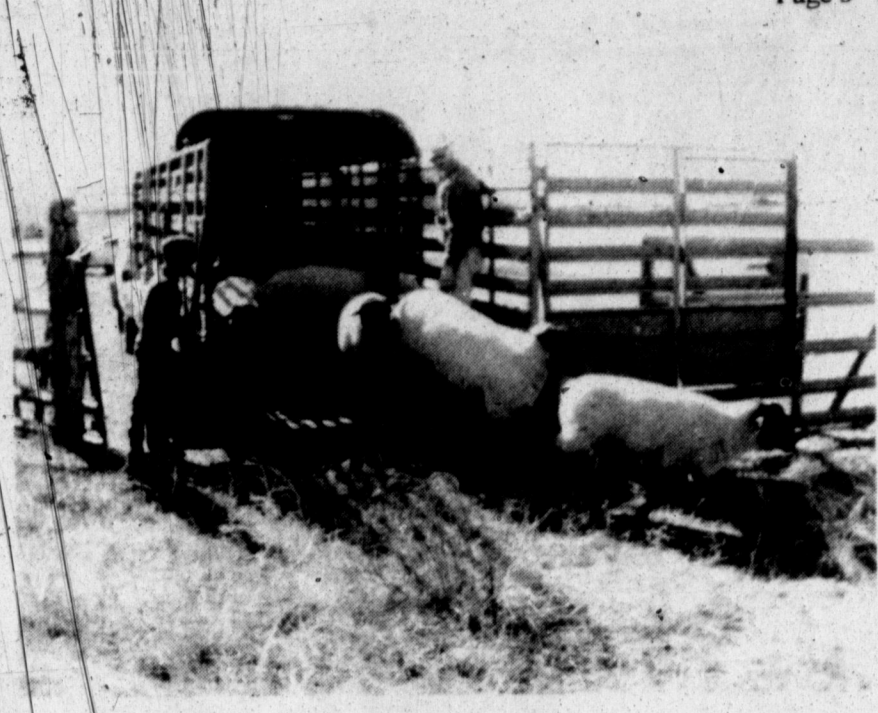
WTSU Names Local Girls to President and Deans List

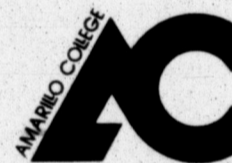

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New Space-Age Hearing Device Available Soon

Knoxville - Clear Corporation of Knoxville, Tn, has announced the development of a tiny, new hearing instrument, small enough to fit entirely inside the canal of the ear, yet powerful enough to change the way millions of Americans hear. This amazing device, called the Word Sorter Crystal Canal, utilizes a space-age microchip which functions like an electronic "brain" to sort words out of noisy environments, thus providing the wearer better clarity and understanding of speech.

The development came from an eleven-month project set up by Clear Corp., which combined with its engineering department a four-member team from the firm that earlier designed and built President Reagan's hearing instruments. Free electronics hearing tests are now being scheduled on a first-come, first-served basis for those interested in the remarkable Crystal device, through a special arrangement with local hearing instrument specialists. There is no cost or obligation, but appointments will be limited. All candidates for the new device receiving the test before the end of January, will be offered a trial period using the Crystal instruments as well as special, introductory discounts. FBI Announces Law Enforcement Officer Statistics

FBI Director William S. Sessions announced that 33 law enforcement officers were feloniously killed in the United States during the first six months of 1988. The preliminary Uniform Crime Reporting statistics showed a decrease from the first half of 1987, when 36 line-of-duty deaths occurred.

Firearms continued to be the weapons most often used in the slaying of officers. Handguns were used in 27 of the murders, rifles in 3 and a shotgun in 1. One officer was intentionally struck with a vehicle, and 1 officer was beaten to death with a blunt object.

Geographically, 15 officers were slain in the Western states, 11 officers in the Southern states, 4 in the Midwestern states, and 3 in the

Northeastern states.

Eighteen officers were slain during arrest situations. Among those 18, 7 were involved in drug-related situations; 5 were attempting to prevent robberies or apprehend robbery suspects; 2 were responding to burglaries; and 4 were attempting arrests for other crimes. Six officers were killed while investigating suspicious persons or circumstances; 3 were responding to disturbance calls; 3 were ambushed; 2 were enforcing traffic laws, and 1 officer was slain while on jail guard duty.

Twelve officers were wearing body armor at the time of their deaths, and 2 officers were killed with their own weapons. Thirty-one of the 33 slayings have been cleared by law enforcement authorities.

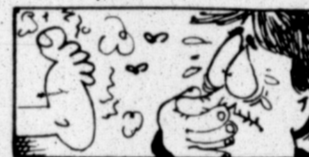

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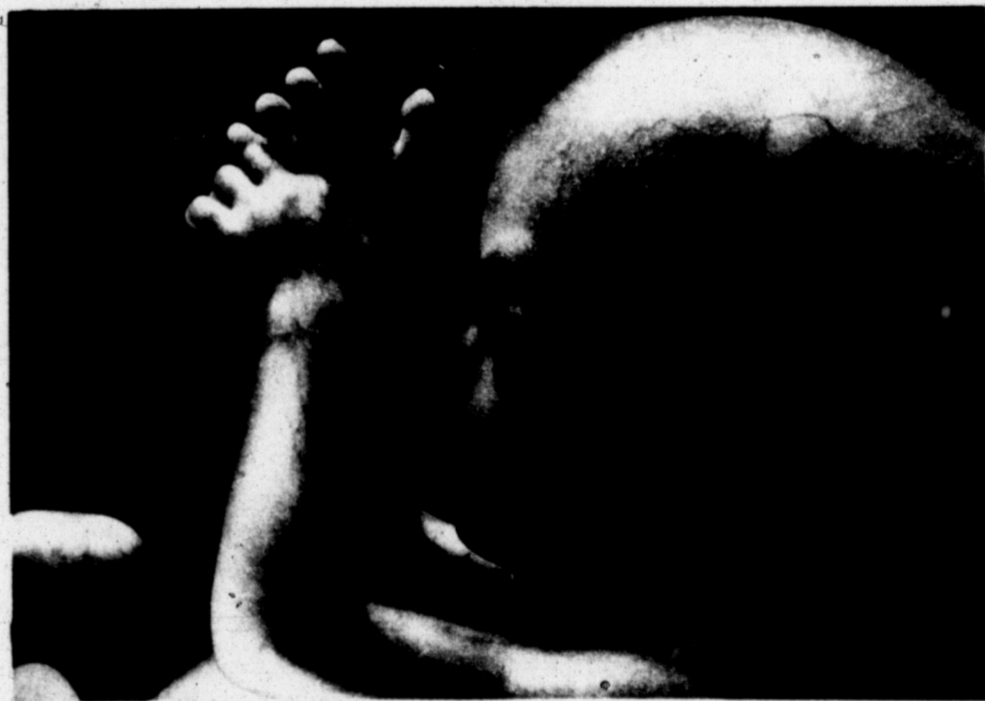

Members absent: Aldermen Paul Bivens and Lynn Floyd.

Others present: City Secretary Donna Edwards.

Minutes of the November 22, 1988 meeting were read.

Discussion followed regarding the trip to Wichita Falls by Mayor Davidson, and Aldermen Kidd and Bivens, to view the transfer station used in trash disposal operations by that city.

Motion was made by Alderman James Thomas, seconded by Alderman Benny Osburn to have City Attorney Jim Shelton draw up a deed for the Peabody Hotel Building for the City which will allow the City to use the money held in the escrow account to be used to abate the nuisance and with the agreement that the City will not tear the building down for at least 5 years. Motion carried.

Discussion followed regarding what had been discussed with Mr. John Kiehl regarding plans for a park project and grant application with 50% matching funds. It was discussed that, if possible, the City could get land donated along the drainage ditch for the City's in-kind share of the grant funds. The five things proposed for the project are: 1. jogging trail, 2. playground equipment, 3. shelter, 4. croquet court, 5. volleyball court. The City will hold a Public Hearing on January 10, 1989 at 7:00 p.m. for discussion of the proposed project plans.

"Little towns, too, have learned that preservation can create a thriving tourist industry," Frommer adds. In Texas, communities in every corner of the state have organized successful tourism programs. For example, the city of Georgetown in Central Texas has recently hired a tourism director to oversee that community's tourism efforts; Goliad, a small community in South Texas, has launched an aggressive tourism plan; and Waxahachie near Dallas, already well-known as a popular on-the-spot location for various Hollywood films, has also hired a tourism director.

The key is to support the entire breadth of our Main Streets and historic districts. A sole historic home in a town will not turn the economy around, but a concerted effort on the part of city government and the private sector may.

"Among cities with no particular recreational appeal, those that have substantially preserved their past continue to enjoy tourism," Frommer wrote in a recent preservation magazine. "Those that haven't receive no tourism at all. It is as simple as that."

He cites the cities of Atlanta and Charleston, both leading tourism destinations. Atlanta, which has obliterated most of its historic fabric, relies on conventions and business meetings to attract out-of-town visitors. Charleston, on the other hand, offers a rich historical background that draws visitors every year. Tourism and historic preservation, he argues, work together for the entire economy, and other commercial interests, including real estate development, do not suffer as a result of this partnership.

Curbing Births, Not Pregnancies
By Stan E. Weed

More than a million teenagers—most of them unmarried—become pregnant each year, and the number is rising. The belief is widespread that the number will be reduced by opening more "family planning" clinics and making them more accessible to teens. However, research a colleague and I have done suggests otherwise.

As the number and proportion of teenage family planning clients increased, we observed a corresponding increase in the teenage pregnancy and abortion rates: 50 to 120 more pregnancies per thousand clients, rather than the 200 to 300 fewer pregnancies as estimated by researchers at the Alan Guttmacher Institute (formerly the research arm of the Planned Parenthood Federation). We did find that greater teenage participation in such clinics led to lower teen birthrates. However, the impact on the abortion and total pregnancy rates was exactly opposite the stated intentions of the program. The original problems appear to have grown worse.

We have but to look at the last 20 years of teaching. "If it feels good do it, but use birth control" to prove this is not working for our good.

I am sorry dearest Rachel. I can't comfort you but until the children stop dying I will weep with you.

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

Texas' First Pinto Bean Plant Going Up in Perryton

Clarendon farmers may soon be able to add beans to the list of crops they grow, and the profit potential for the new crop looks very promising. The completion of a new processing plant in the Panhandle may be a harbinger of things to come.

"Texans are champs when it comes to baking, boiling, refrying or even marinating pinto beans. We've got a thousand delicious recipes. Only recently, however, has Texas been growing pinto beans commercially, and today we take a giant step forward into the commercial processing of the simple frijole," Deputy State Agriculture Commissioner Mike Moeller said here.

Moeller made the comments at the groundbreaking ceremony for the new pinto bean processing plant being constructed 2 1/2 miles northwest of Perryton. Moeller was joined for the ceremony by the plant's owners, Gary and Vicki George, and State Senator-elect Teel Bivins.

"Frijoles have long been a staple in Hispanic, Black and Southern Anglo diets, and Texans consume between 140 million and 150 million pounds of pinto beans each year. However, most of the pinto beans we eat are imported from other states—mainly Colorado. We Texans pride ourselves on being fairly self-sufficient, and it just does not make sense to depend on others for a food item that is so important to so many of us," Moeller said.

"The Georges' pinto bean cleaning and processing plant will go a long way towards the development of a home-grown pinto bean in-

dustry. This facility will cost nearly \$700,000 to construct. The project is being funded in part with a \$298,000 grant/loan from the state Commerce Department's Texas-Capital Fund. The rest of the funding comes from loans from the Production Credit Association.

"Once completed, this facility will be able to process 20.8 million pounds of beans each year, sold in two-, 10- and 50 pound bags. TDA estimates that the plant can expect first year sales of nearly \$460,000 while creating up to 12 new jobs for this Panhandle community. The plant also creates a new source of income for Panhandle farmers. We estimate that the area's pinto bean production will need to increase from the present 500 acres to 14,000 acres to keep this plant busy.


"This pinto bean plant also represents a commitment by TDA to help producers diversify their production and become food processors as well. TDA began working over three years ago with Gary George in his effort to launch into pinto bean production. He was having trouble making ends meet on his large cotton and grain operation, and pinto beans started out as little more than an experiment. This year, George had more than 300 acres of beans in production, a crop worth roughly \$50,000. Earlier this year, George sold 315,000 pounds of beans to Fleming Foods in San Antonio at the price of 20 cents per pound. In addition, George will market another 155,000 pounds of beans to their wholesale and retail customers in the Panhandle," Moeller said.

"The best news about pinto beans is that Texas is just starting to take advantage of this crop's market potential. TDA estimates that about 50,000 acres of pinto bean production is needed just to satisfy current in-state demand for the beans. Texas producers could earn an extra \$17 million a year by growing pinto beans and the construction of additional processing facilities like this one at Perryton could increase the farmers share of the bean market to \$22 million.

"Although pinto beans can be grown as far south as Waco and as far west as El Paso, the cool nights and low humidity of the Panhandle combine to create excellent growing conditions. According to various field tests, pinto beans grown under dryland conditions can yield between 1,000 and 1,200 pounds of beans per acre. Pinto beans are also an insect-resistant plant which grows well in dry areas with just a little water and fertilizer. Since beans contain no saturated fat or cholesterol and are high in

Artificial Tears for Dry Eyes

The production of tears by the eyes may be decreased by the presence of an infection in the eyes or trauma to the eyes. It has also been observed that the eyes often become dryer as a part of the aging process. The lack of adequate tear production, for whatever reason, may cause the eyes to burn and turn red. Immediate relief may be achieved through the use of nonprescription medicines which are called "artificial tears."

The ingredients in artificial tears include a thickening agent such as methylcellulose and a preservative such as edetate disodium or chlorbutanol. Occasionally, individuals will be sensitive to the preservatives in these products. If sensitivity does occur, products containing different preservatives should be considered.

Thickening agents cause the eyes to become wetter by decreasing the surface tension between the eyeball and the eye solution. These ingredients also cause solutions to remain in the eyes twice as long as compared to plain salt water solutions.

According to the Handbook of Nonprescription Drugs, products which are intended for use in the eye must be sterile, clear, and free from particles.

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vitamins, calcium, iron and phosphorus, they have become popular among health-conscious consumers," Moeller said.

"This pinto bean processing facility is just one of 108 TDA-assisted agricultural diversification and processing projects which have the potential to produce over \$720 million in first year sales and create 8,300 jobs across Texas.
