## Weatherization Offered by PCS

Applications are currently being taken for the Panhandle Community Services Weatherization Program. This program provides free weatherization of low income homes, with emphasis on homes of the elderly and handicapped individuals.

With many of the elderly on fixed incomes-personal comfort and overall physical well being are of ten set aside in order to save on utility bills. Weatherization can reduce the cost of utility bills up to

30 percent, allowing these individuals to live in a better home environment.

Money to provide for this free service is a result of a fund for energy conservation by the state and federal government. There are some basic qualifications, for instance, incomes per year: a one-member family income must not exceed \$7,475.00 and two-member family is not to exceed \$10,025.00.

On-site home evaluations are conducted by a PCS representative of qualifying homes. Work on the home is conducted by a subcontractor. Individuals who are could benefit from this program or know of someone who they feel might be in need of assistance are encouraged to contact a Weatherization representative. ## DPS Warns Motorist To Drive Carefully

It is the 4th of July and the middle of summer vacation which means not only will Texas motorists be taking to the highways, but a lot of visitors will also be entering Texas. With the increase in the number of motorist on our highways, the possibility of having an accident will also increase.

Major Vernon Cawthorn, Regional Commander of the Texas Department of Public

Safety, stated, "That this combination can be deadly, if motorist do not take certain precautions over the 4th of July holiday."

"Before traveling you should insure your car is in good working condition including necessary equipment to help in case of a break down, such as a good spare tire. Long trips should be well planned, allot ample time for traveling, be well rested and take frequent breaks," said Major Cawthorn.

Do not mix drinking and driving. It not only could cost you big fines, jail time and loss of your driving privileges, but the cost

could be as high as your life.

Always be watchful of other motorist. All, too often, simple mistakes can lead to traffic accidents. Be courteous by displaying good driving habits that you expect others to display. Remember that courtesy can be contagious.

Insure that everyone in the vehicle is properly secured and that all loose items are in the trunk. During a collision, any loose object could be a potentially dangerous weapon.

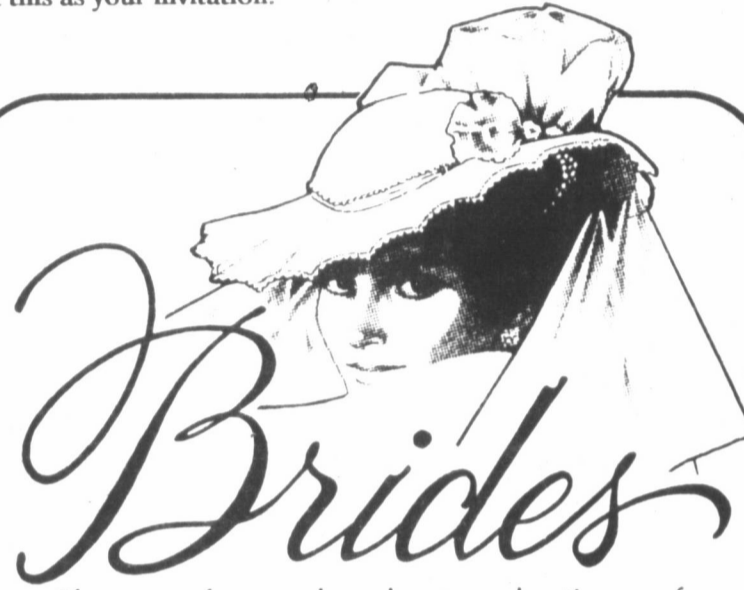

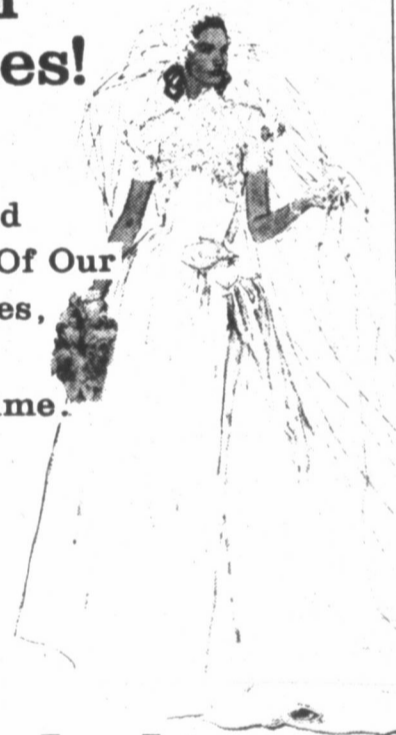

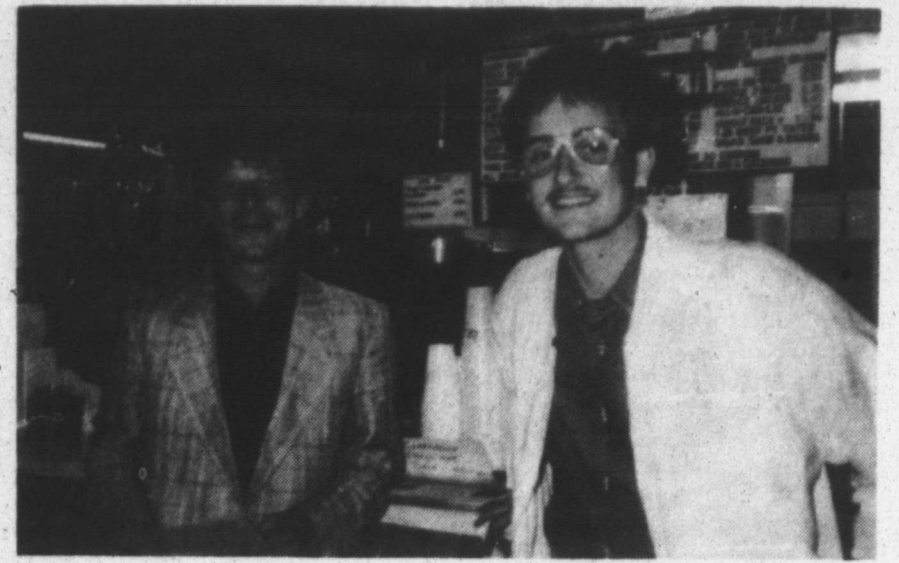

## Dear Editor:

We arrived in Fort Lauderdale the 29th of May and departed the 31st of May to Tallahassee, New Orleans, Beaumont, Fort Stockton, El Paso, Phoenix, Las Vegas, San Diego, Los Angeles, San Francisco, Kingman, Albuquerque, Amarillo, then to Clarendon.

We are both 22 years old and became airline pilots in Germany. We live in a great town called Puchheim, about six miles away from Munich.

We landed in Clarendon due to weather conditions at five p.m. The telephone on this airport was dead and there was no one around to help us. Half an hour

later, Troy Skinner arrived to fly his model plane. He gave us help, took us to town, showed us his house and gave us a pick-up to use. He was very kind and friendly towards us. **Great Race, Antique Cars Make Wellington Million Dollar City**

The small community of Wellington will become the Antique Car Capital of Texas for a day when vintage vehicles valued at more than \$5 million visit the city for a day of fun and competition Monday, July 3.

Highlight of the July Fourth weekend celebration is the visit of 120 antique vehicles which will be participating in the Seventh Annual Great American Race sponsored each year by Interstate Batteries.

The visit to Wellington, located on U.S. Hwy. 83 in the southeastern Texas Panhandle, will be the fourth stop on the day for the automobiles which will begin their cross-country race which ends Friday, July 7 at Disneyland, Ca. and will be covered from start to finish by the ESPN cable television network.

Also on hand that day will be more than 60 antique and classic automobiles which have been lovingly restored by car buffs from throughout the Panhandle and western Oklahoma.

All of the antique vehicles can be seen on the Courthouse Square located a half mile west of U.S. Hwy 83 on eighth street.

The display and car show of antique vehicles will begin at mid morning on the south side of the courthouse with the first of 120 racing antique vehicles expected to arrive in the city about 3:30 p.m.

These vehicles can be viewed as they park on the east side of the courthouse following a 15 minute stop for fuel once inside the city limits.

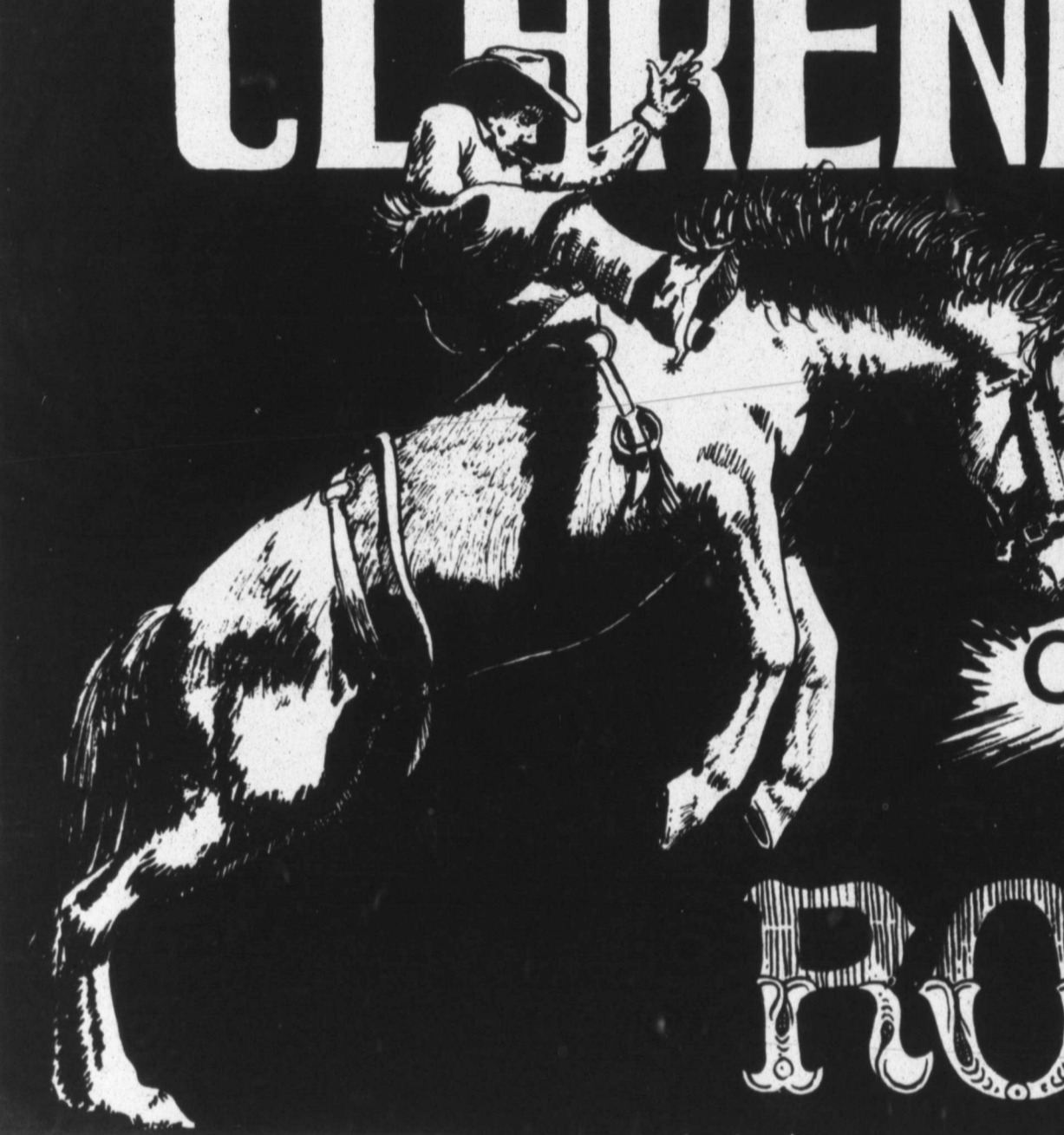

## Notice To Residents

Beginning July, 1989 (the first month of the City's fiscal year) the City of Hedley will implement a raise in the water rate. This is only the second water rate hike

since the City was incorporated.

Due in part to the City's low expenditures and to low inflation the City of Hedley has been able to offer the citizens with the lowest water rate of any incorporated city in the Texas Panhandle.

The decision to raise the water rate came after many hours of study and discussion. Therefore, based on the new costs that the City has been forced to bear, old failing equipment, and the rising cost of insurance plus the need for more coverage etc. the City of Hedley will implement a new water rate which will be realized on the July, 89 bill to be received August, 89.

The water rate will be changed from: \$8.00 for 3000 gallons to \$15.00 for 5000 gallons. This means that all minimum water bills will be \$15.00 instead of \$8.00, and every meter will be allowed to utilize 5000 gallons before any more is charged rather than 3000 gallons which is the allowed amount to be utilized at the present.

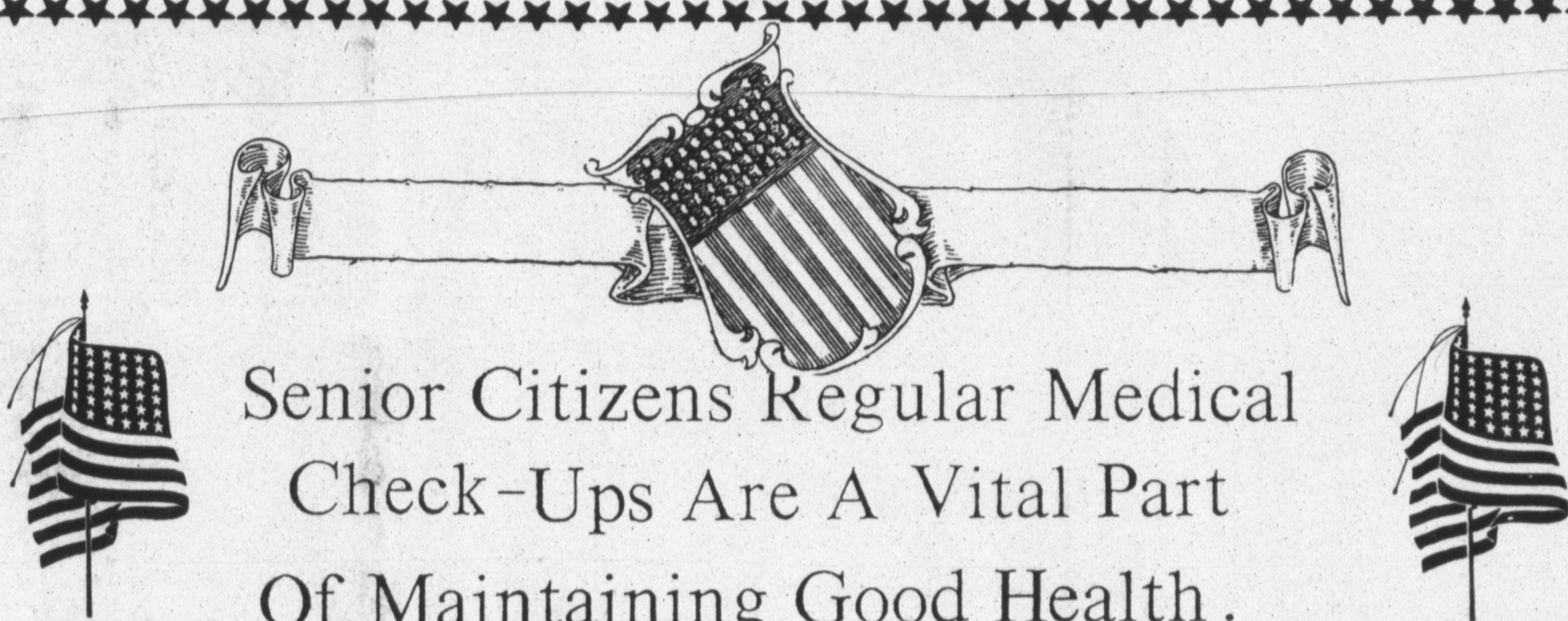

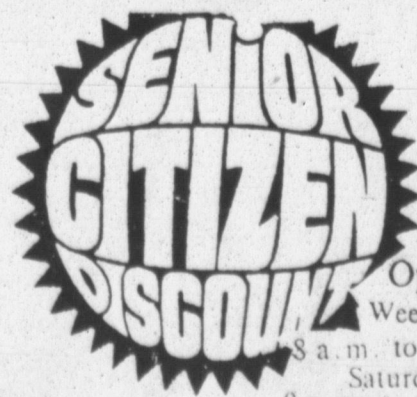

monitoring visit report and the end-of school inservice day activities were discussed. The Petty Cash Report was reviewed.

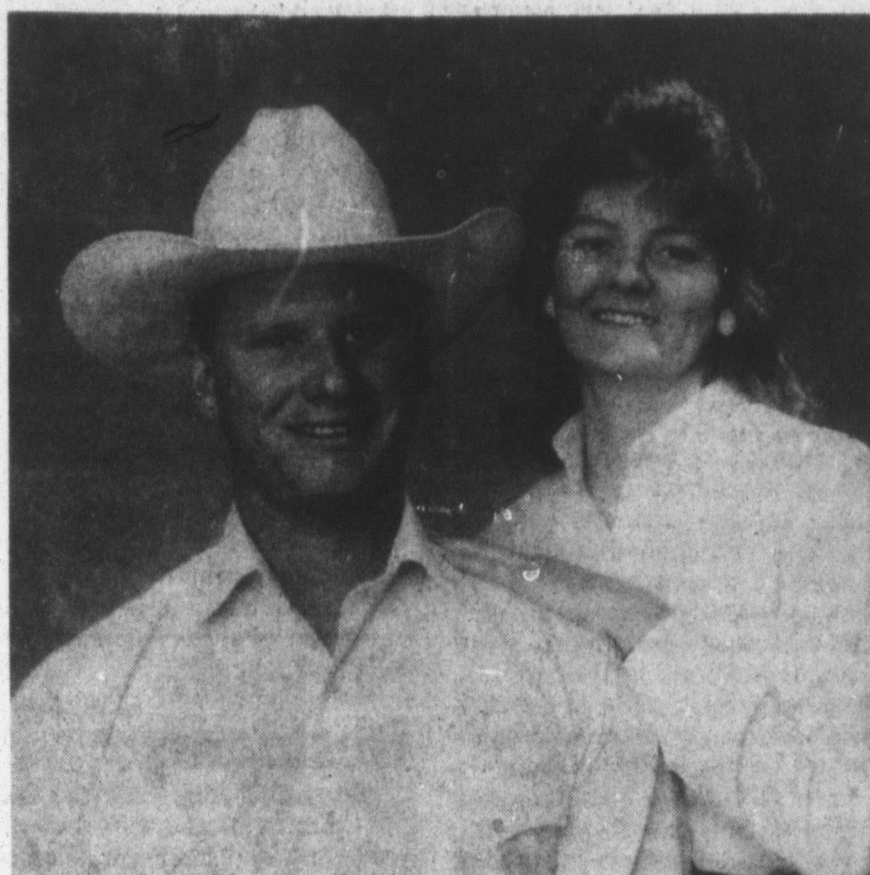
