USDA Sets Referendum for Watermelon Research and Promotion Plan

The U. S. Department of Agriculture has set February 6-21 for watermelon growers and handlers to vote on a proposed research, advertising, and sales promotion program to improve the position of watermelons in the marketplace.

J. Patrick Boyle, administrator of USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service, said the program would operate at no cost to the federal government. It would be financed by an assessment of up to 2 cents per hundredweight on watermelons, paid by farmers who grow five or more acres of watermelons and by first handlers--the dealers who buy directly from farmers. Those growers and handlers are eligible to vote in the referendum, Boyle said.

A grower of five or more acres of watermelons who also handles watermelons would pay assessments for each function. Producers and handlers assessed under the program could request and receive funds.

A 29-member board representing watermelon producers, handlers, and the general public would administer the program. Twenty-eight members of the board would be appointed by the secretary of agriculture from nominations originating in the industry; one would be a public member appointed from outside the industry. Industry representatives would be divided evenly between handlers and growers. As in similar research and promotion programs, the board would develop plans with approval by the secretary of agriculture, and would over-see a

small administrative staff managing the program's daily work.

Projects developed under the program would favor no particular production region or variety of watermelon grown in the contiguous 48 states.

To pass, the referendum must be approved by either two-thirds of those voting or a majority of producers and a majority of handlers accounting for at least two-thirds of the volume of watermelons represented in the referendum.

The National Watermelon Association originally proposed the plan, in accordance with the 1985 Watermelon Research and Promotion Act.

Notice of the referendum will be published in the Dec. 20 Federal Register. Ballots, copies of the proposed program, and summaries of its major provisions may be obtained from county extension agents where watermelons are grown. Copies also are available from Richard H. Mathews, Marketing Order Administration Branch, Fruit and Vegetable Division, AMS, USDA, Room 2525-S, Washington, D. C. 20090-6456; telephone (202) 475-3916.

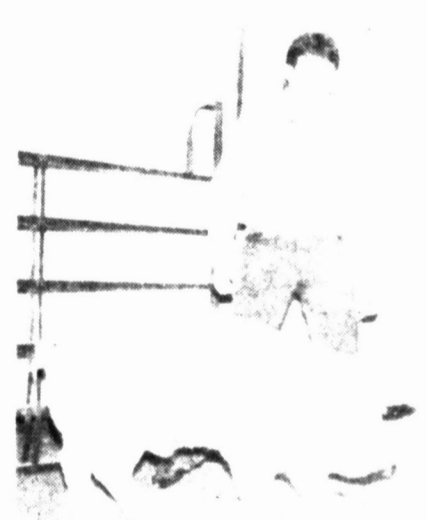

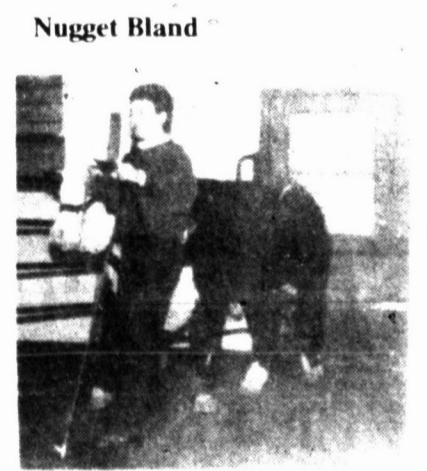

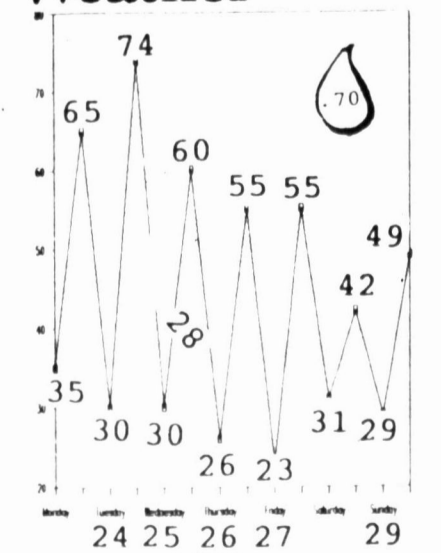
Donley County Junior Livestock Show Names Winners



Local Artist's Prints Offered

The cardinal provides a bright splash of red color against the backdrop of the somber grays and tans of the winter landscape. For those who take time to enjoy such things, cardinals are an obvious and brilliant reminder of the promise of the spring yet to come.

If you know its descending territorial song, you will also know when you have a pair setting up an early spring nest in your neighborhood. Its call is loud, determined, and unmistakable, and can be heard throughout the entire summer and autumn, if weather allows the raising of two broods. Cardinals are a favorite at winter and summer feeders, but tend to be bullies with smaller birds. Most of the cardinals' feeding occurs early in the morning allowing other birds plenty of time to feed.

Although cardinals have been accused of pecking at ripe fruit, stomach analysis of birds has shown little fruit fiber, but large amounts of weed seeds and non-beneficial insects. Numbered among those insects are various caterpillars, cutworms, and potato beetles.
