## Sheriff Reports on May

Donley County Sheriff Jimmy Thompson reports that May was a busy month for the department. There were six arrests for DWI, three for theft, three for aggravated robbery, three charges of public intoxication, two cases of sexual assault, two people charged with credit card abuse, one disorderly conduct, one reckless driving and one out-of-county warrant served. There were 25 arrests. There were 10 fire calls, 35 ambulance calls and 35 traffic tickets. There were nine cases of minors-in-possession.

## Robbery Story Clarified

Mack Smith has called to the attention of The Clarendon Press the fact that the account of the robbery in last week's paper made it sound as though all of the suspects entered the store where the robbery took place. He has requested that the paper note that only the Gaines brothers actually entered the building. The Press would like to apologize for any erroneous impressions left by the account.

The January 2nd robbery and the recent rash of arrests of minors with alcohol all underscore the fact that Clarendon has a drug problem. Substance abuse is not a remote phenomenon. It is here and now.

Denial of the problem will not make it go away. There are no easy answers. And victims are not limited to those who are deceived into using drugs. Drug habits cause burglaries, robberies and other crime. Substance abuse raises insurance cost, causes traffic fatalities and higher taxes.

There were six arrests in Donley County last month for driving while intoxicated, one for disorderly conduct, and three for public intoxication.

Next on the trip itinerary was a dance which was under the direction of Disc Jockey Jim Shadle.

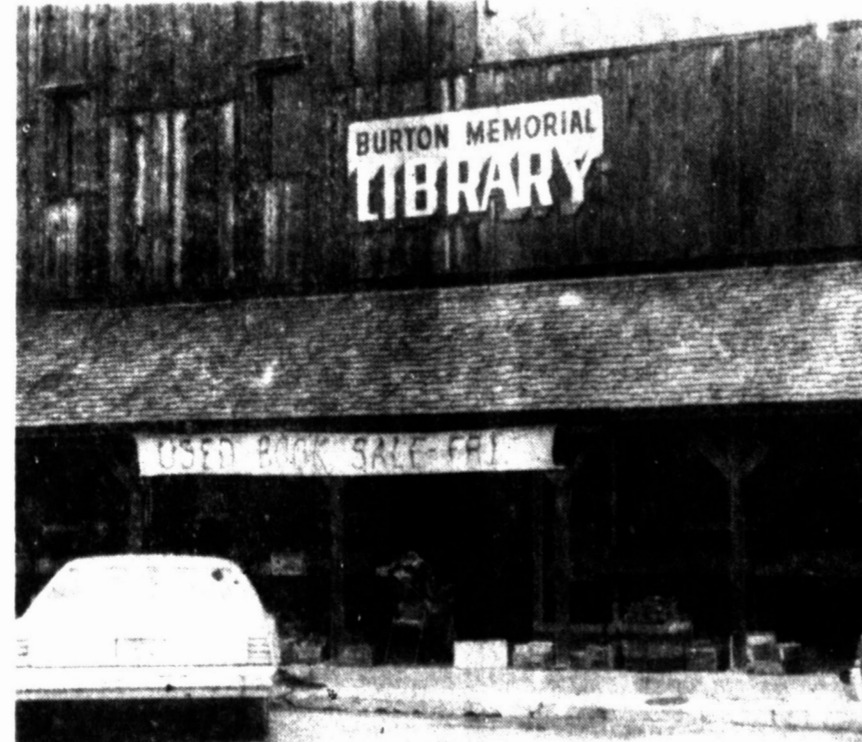
Larry Green and Susie Shadle won the Parents Dance Contest.



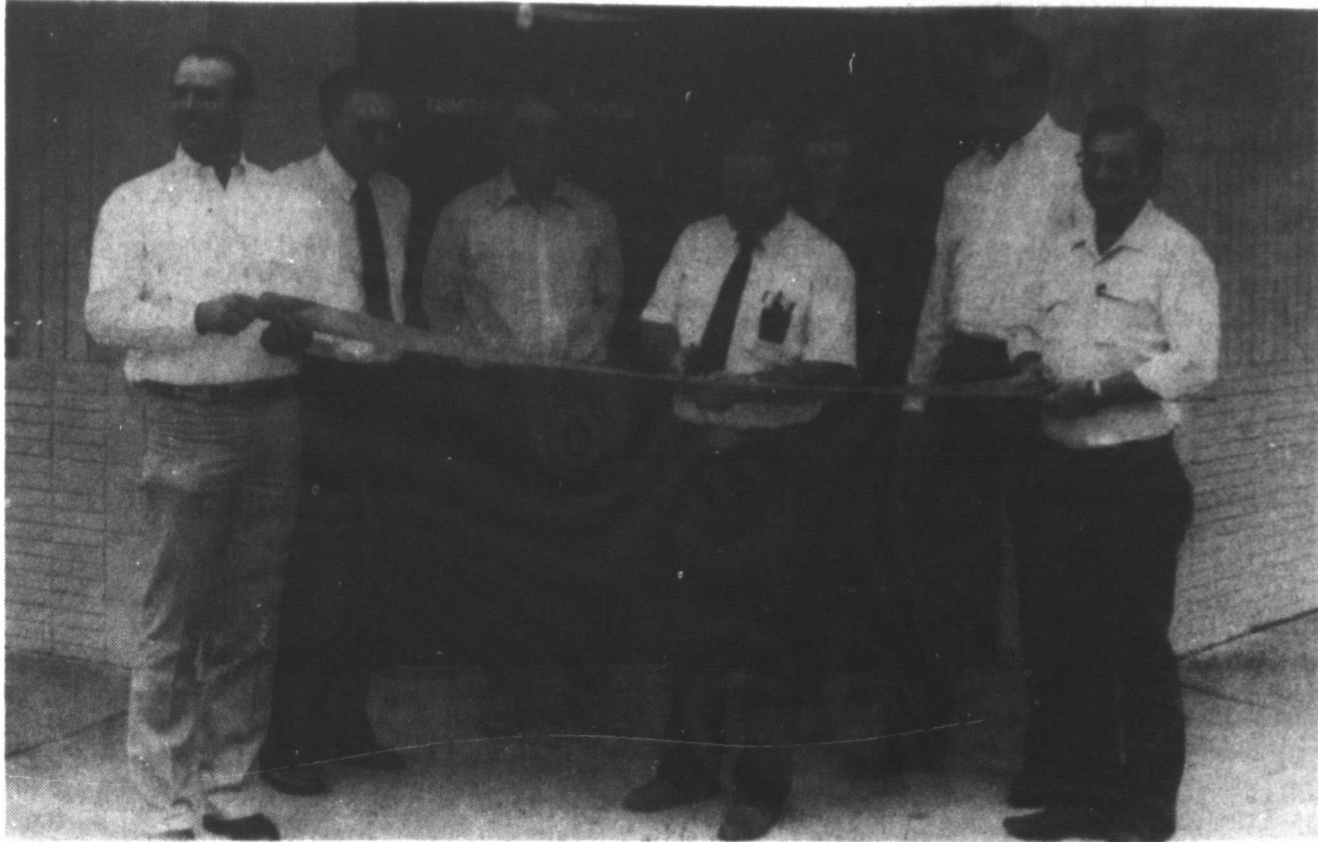

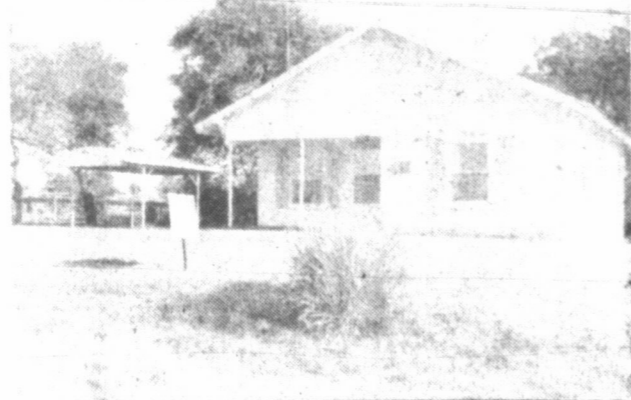

**A GREAT CLOUD OF WITNESSES**

The radio crackled with static. The announcer's words were hard to understand, but the message, broken though it was, got through to that group gathered around the barrels of apples and crackers in the little Appalachian village general store. The time: early June, 1945. The radio message: Victory in Europe! Shouts of joy rose from the little crowd, and not a few tears rolled down smiling cheeks. The worst war in history was nearly over. Mothers ran home to write what they hoped would be one of the last letters of love, news, and encouragement to that loved one on the European front. Those mountain boys had not been home for what seemed like an eternity, but now Johnny would surely come marching home before many more weeks had passed.

"...We wrestle not against flesh and blood, but against principalities, against powers, against the rulers of the darkness of this world, against spiritual wickedness in high places" (Ephesians 6:12).

"Wherefore seeing we also are compassed about with so great a cloud of witnesses, let us lay aside every weight, and the sin which doth so easily beset us, and let us run with patience the race that is set before us" (Hebrews 12:1).

In my mind's eye, I see the scene in Heaven somewhat like the situation in the little general store: the saints longing for news of the battle below. They are not worried—it would not be Heaven if it were filled with worry—but they are anxious about the progress of the battle, and filled with excited wonder as to whether this is the time God has chosen to forever eliminate Satan's influence from the earth.

The saints know, as we knew in June, 1945, that the war has already been won. But I see them almost wild with anticipation of what the Lord will do to rescue a few more souls from Satan's grasp as the great dragon writhes in his death throes.

A shining angel sounds a trumpet, and everyone listens intently.

"A small house church in the slums of Los Angeles has reached dozens for our Lord Jesus Christ". His voice rings like a bell over Paradise.

The shouts of praise of the redeemed echo through Heaven.

Shortly, another silver-winged messenger sings from Heaven's ramparts: "The quiet prayers and witness of a farm woman in Iowa have brought her husband and son to a saving knowledge of our loving Lord."

Both angels and saints are beside themselves with joy.

The third messenger appears, then a fourth:

"The prayers of the saints have brought down a drug lord in Miami."

"The evangelistic services this week at Central Community Church have netted one-hundred and four souls as those fishers of men have obeyed the Spirit's call to work and witness."

Heaven goes wild with the news! Messenger after messenger soars in with glad tidings, and the rejoicing in His presence knows no bounds. "...Joy shall be in Heaven over one sinner that repenteth..." (Luke 15:7).

"...We are encompassed about with so great a cloud of witnesses..." This is the Lord's promise to us. Think about it! All those heroes of the faith mentioned in the eleventh chapter of Hebrews are longing for news of our victories in Jesus. Think about it! The apostles, whose earthly labor is over, are cheering you on in yours. Think about it! All the great preachers of the past—the Wesleys, Johnathan Edwards, Spurgeon, Moody, and countless others—make Heaven's halls ring with laughter and song as you labor in the Spirit's power.

What more encouragement could a Christian need or want? We have the love and support of our church family, the innumerable heavenly hosts of the redeemed and

angels, and, best of all, the very indwelling Presence of the Holy Spirit.

Satan likes to tell us that we are all alone in our Christian walk, and that our task is hopeless. Don't you believe it! "Wherefore seeing we are compassed about with so great a cloud of witnesses, let us lay aside every weight, and the sin which doth so easily beset us, and let us run with patience the race that is set before us, Looking unto Jesus the author and finisher of our faith..." (Hebrews 12:1-2).
