Moreman and Richardson receives 4-H Gold Star Award

Thirty-nine outstanding members of 4-H Clubs across the Texas Panhandle were honored here Saturday night, Nov. 6.

In addition to receiving the Gold Star Award, highest honor presented at the county level, the youths were challenged by a top administrator of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service to prepare themselves to face life as an ever-changing pathway rather than a series of rigidly restrictive plateaus.

Joining the youths at the awards banquet in the Hilton Inn were parents, government officials, Extension leaders, fellow 4-H'ers, educators and other community leaders.

Honored from Donley County were Melody Moreman, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jack Moreman of Clarendon and Richard Richardson, son of Henrietta Richardson of Clarendon.

Goals are important in life, but shouldn't be viewed as end products, the audience was told by Dr. Judy Sanders of College Station, state leader for county Extension programs with the Extension Service. "Instead of thinking of happy endings, think of life as a pathway to somewhere," she urged.

We need to set some goals for life, but we often make them too rigid, not recognizing that life is a changing

process, Dr. Sanders said. In setting goals, prepare yourself with the proper credentials such as training and experience to achieve them, she advised. And prepare, also, for some failures along the way, by having some alternative plans in mind.

She cautioned the youths they must try to decide if a goal they seek is worth the cost of attaining.

Two of the keys in reaching goals and enjoying life, the educator said, are to develop proper attitudes and to learn to like yourself. Most people reach only 15 percent of their potential, she said, and attitude has much to do with this.

She reminded the youths, "Of all the people you meet, you are the only one you never leave."

Mistress of ceremonies was Ralynda Wharton of Dallam County, chairman of the Panhandle District 4-H Council. Guests were welcomed by Pat McAlister, manager of North Plains Electric Cooperative, Perryton, one of six electric cooperatives which sponsor the banquet. The others were Deaf Smith, Greenbelt, Lighthouse, Rita Blanca and Swisher.

Dinner music was presented by Doug Burton, graduate student at West Texas State University, and three youths from Amarillo

High School. The Gold Star Awards were presented by Mrs. Sue Farris and Paul Gross, District Extension Directors for the Panhandle District. Four-H is the youth development program of the Extension Service.

The business meeting was adjourned.

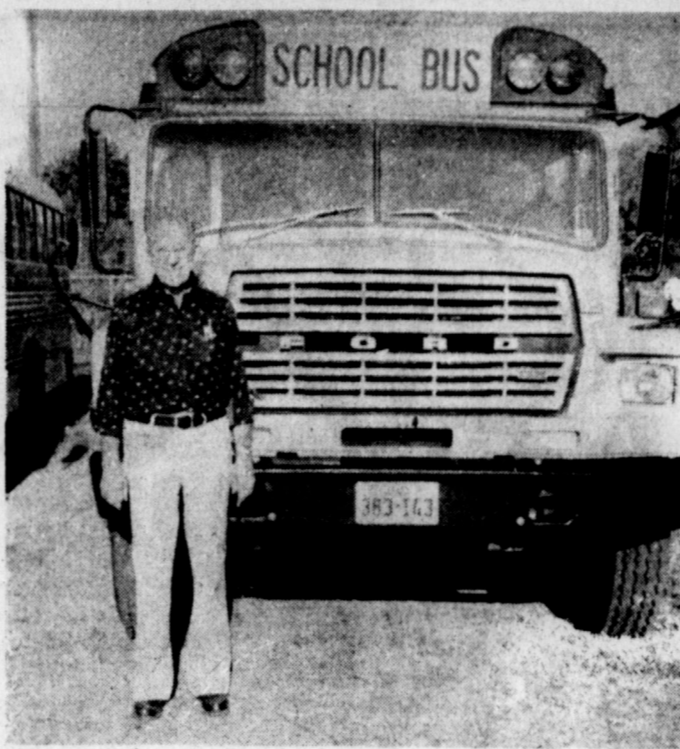
Janie Finch and Beck Hill were in charge of the program entitled "Communications: Public Relations and the Press". Janie introduced

Road Runner

Lloyd McCord

Road runners frequently travel long distances in their territory, and seem to prefer solitude. Our road runner homo sapiens, Lloyd McCord travels long distances as well, but is always seen in the company of dozens of kiddoes.

"I have driven the bus for out of town trips for the band for 29 years now," Lloyd said, "and have never had an accident or had one of the kids hurt on the bus." That is quite a record when you consider that Lloyd hauls the band students to their annual five out of town trips and they are keyed up and the weather is often less than perfect. Pride in his safety record is evident when McCord answered the question about how he could tolerate all of the noise.

"I don't really hear it sometimes because I'm concentrating on the road in front of me to be sure no one pulls in front of me and whatever." He did admit that having the diesel buses have helped him overcome the noise factor. "I have an advantage with the diesel buses, because they make a little more racket than the kids and all I have to do to overcome their noise that bounces off of the window back into my ears, is put my foot a little heavier on the foot feet."

Sponsors have helped control the racket and the enthusiasm some of the kids might exhibit now and again. "When I keep my mind on the road, the noise just goes to the background," Lloyd said.

The weather 29 years ago was worse than it is now, but rain is the worst for bus driving. Lloyd remembered one time to Quanah when the band couldn't even get out. The bus parked in the end zone to watch the game, but it rained so hard they never got out and an instrument never left the cases, but the boys played football in spite of the torrential rain.

McCord leaves home around 6:20 to make his trip to Goodnight and often doesn't get back until 4:30 or 5:00 p.m. "It's supposed to be a two hour route," he said, but sometimes he doesn't have to return all of the way to Goodnight if some of the kids have stayed in

town for a meeting or whatever.

Things are much easier now, says McCord, with Claude Thomas in charge. He keeps the buses in excellent repair and condition. He checks the oil every day and each morning, before the bus drivers arrive, he gets the buses running to make certain there won't be any buses out of commission.

"I'm bus number 20 and the bus is always the first in

the line. I told the new drivers that they would just have to get behind me because the kids are so used to being on the first bus that I couldn't move or they'd all get on the wrong bus," McCord laughed. He knows everyone of the kids that ride his bus and would, we are certain, be aware if one was missing.

- It is estimated that on any weekday in Texas, 1 out of 50 drivers has been drinking or is drunk. On weekends, this ratio climbs to 1 in 10.
- Last year there were 36,774 reported accidents in Texas that were the result of DWI — more than 100 per day.
- 23% of all traffic deaths in 1981 involved drunk driving. The ten year total of DWI related deaths in Texas is 19,000 — more than the population of many Texas cities.

Texans should be outraged at this senseless destruction by drunk drivers. For too long, society has permitted innocent persons to be killed on our highways, because it is easier to ignore the DWI problem than to face it.

People have been led to believe that DWI is not really a crime, and the drunken driver is not really a criminal, but this is not true.

For the month of November, the Texas Crime Stoppers Advisory Council is focusing its statewide "Crime of the Month" on DWI. No reward is offered. Instead, the Council urges you to support local and statewide efforts to reduce the number of drunk drivers on Texas highways.

Every Texan must make a personal commitment to help put an end to this tragedy. Together we can prevent the drunk driver from spreading further death and destruction on our highways.

**Control program completed in
 grasshopper infested area**

AUSTIN—Officials with
 the Texas Department of
 Agriculture (TDA) recently
 completed a five week grass-
 hopper control program on
 456,000 acres in the north-
 western portion of the state,
 Agriculture Commissioner
 Reagan V. Brown reported.
 "Statistics show that
 economic damage will occur
 when there are eight
 grasshoppers per square yard
 and the grasshopper popula-
 tion in this area averaged 30-
 40 grasshoppers per square
 yard prior to the treatment
 program. A few counties
 reported as many as 95
 grasshoppers per square

yard," Brown said.
 The spraying was divided
 into two different programs.
 Approximately 156,000 acres
 were treated in Shackelford,
 Callahan, Throckmorton and
 Stephens Counties and about
 300,000 acres were sprayed in
 Roberts, Ochiltree, Lipscomb
 and Hemphill Counties.
 The control program was
 set up on a cooperative basis
 with TDA supplying one third
 of the cost, the United States
 Department of Agriculture
 (USDA/APHIS) supplying
 another third and the rancher
 supplying the remaining
 third. The cost to the rancher
 will average 85¢ per acre.

Inspectors from TDA and
 USDA aerially applied 12
 ounces of the pesticide ULV
 malathion to each square acre
 in the infested area. The
 chemical was supplied by
 USDA while TDA provided the
 applicator planes.
 The best time to treat grass-
 hopper infestation, Brown
 added, is during the summer,
 after the eggs have hatched
 and before egg laying begins.
 No more spraying is
 anticipated for this year. The
 Texas Department of Agricul-
 ture has been involved in

A football player likes game films, trips away from home, practice sessions without pads, hot showers, cold cokes, long runs, whirlpool baths, recovered fumbles, points after touchdowns, and the quiet satisfaction which comes from being a part of a perfectly executed play. "He is not much for wind sprints, sitting on the bench, rainy days, after game compliments, ankle wraps, scouting reports or calisthenics."

When you come out of the stadium, grousing, and feeling upset that your team lost, he can make you mighty ashamed with just two sincerely spoken words - WE TRIED! After a victory, when you walk up to him sitting in a noisy dressing room by his locker, and pat his tossed hair and say "Good Game Bronc" through the grime, sweat, and blood, a big grin breaks through that says: IT'S WORTH IT ALL!!!

Green Thumb helps people back to work
Cong. J.J. (Jake) Pickle, speaking to members of the Texas Farmers Union Green Thumb Advisory Committee in Austin, said that TFU Green Thumb and other Title V senior employment programs were strong examples of how the federal government can play a constructive role in helping older people join the work force.
"When people are not working, everything that happens to them is repulsive," the Austin congressman said. "A program like Green Thumb is a legitimate way to get some of our people back to work."
"That's realistic, not socialistic," Pickle added. "To do away with Title V is to put older Americans on welfare. At this point they're working."
TFU Green Thumb alone employs about 1,000 low-income rural persons 55 and over, in all counties across the state. Most work in schools, libraries, senior centers, and museums.
Pickle said that Congress was only exercising its "legitimate prerogatives" when it voted to override a recent presidential veto of an appropriations bill. The veto could have meant the end of Title V and Green Thumb, and would have seriously endangered the jobs of 54,000 older workers nationwide.
"The President proposes," said the 10-term congressman, "and we (the Congress) dispose. I'm a budgetary conservative, but I have my own values about what should be in a budget."
Pickle, who is chairman of the House Ways and Means subcommittee on Social Security, was critical of recent attempts to put more older Americans programs into block grants.
"Block grants would suffocate the (Green Thumb) program. We'd just have an old worn-out dead Thumb then," he said.
Advisory committee members also heard reports from Mike Moeller, president, Texas Farmers Union; Carl A Larson, president, Green Thumb, Inc., Washington, DC; and Diane Parrish, director, TFU Green Thumb, Waco.
Committee member from Clarendon attending the October 29 meeting was Eula Merrell, Green Thumb Area Supervisor.

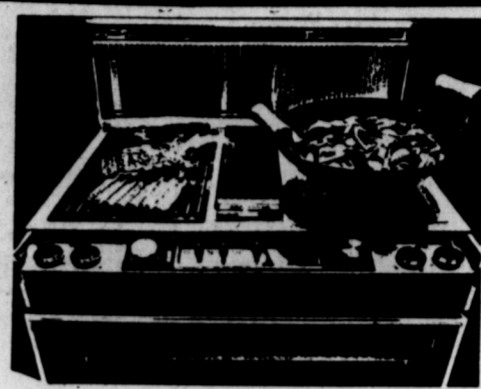

Hedley Jr High scrimmaged Kelton

The Hedley Jr. High Basketball team scrimmaged against Kelton, Monday the 15th. The Hedley Jr. High girls weren't very successful, but played a fairly good game. The girls lost 13-20 in the scrimmage.

The boys lost 22-23 in the last seconds of the game. We had beat their boys there with ease. Coach McCary played all 15 of the boys ranging from 5th to 8th grade. Although we lost the scrimmage, we feel we out played Kelton all the way.

Our first game is with Lakeview here, Nov. 29, 1982 at 6:00.

We feel lucky in the fact we received two new girls this morning, Stacy and Christina Cole, both 5th graders. They are the daughters of Carroll and Judy Cole. The Cole family moved from Clarendon to the Cook Ranch in the Hedley School District.

Coach McCary said, "I like to get these students in their

submerged brush. Being on the lazy side, the largemouth likes to ambush its supper. Cast to hiding spots or drift and work worms, jigs or spoons on deep cover.

Fish for blacks in spring in 2-10 feet of water, summer go deeper to 5-20 feet and fall 10-15 feet and winter even deeper 15-50 feet. Temperature ranges from 50-80 degrees but the best bet for largemouths is 70 degree water temperature.

SMALLMOUTH BASS: is widely acclaimed as the number one sport fish. It prefers slightly cooler water than the largemouth, and generally, doesn't grow as big.

Like the largemouth bass, the smallmouth is a nest builder. Spawning and nest building are triggered by water temperature in the spring. Spawning brings it to shallow water.

Smallmouth prefer clean, rocky areas. It will strike throughout the day, but is very nocturnal, so may also be available early morning and late evening. A preference for crawdads is its downfall, so use crank-baits and jigs imitating the crawdad.

WHITE BASS: are Greenbelt's favorite son. Similar in shape to the crappie, the white bass has silvery sides streaked by lateral black bars. It is also known as the silver bass, black-striped bass and barefish.

These fish travel in large schools and feed primarily on small minnows. The nomadic tendencies of the white bass force the angler to search a great deal. Early spring will bring this bass to the slightest current available to spawn.

If a current is not available, fish around rocks dams or isolated rock piles. During

spawning season, minnows or minnow imitations produce well. Summer will draw the schools near the surface where flies, small spoons or spinners will work well.

In spring, fish from 5-10 feet, summer 1-15 feet, fall 5-10 feet again and winter go deeper 15-20 feet. You can find them in 45-80 degree water temp. but the best bet is 68 degrees.

Greenbelt has a good surplus of walleye, and is so well stocked that the Inland fisheries folks use Greenbelt as one of the major lakes to collect eggs to hatch more to restock other lakes.

WALLEYE: are members of the perch family and can offer some of the best sport fishing to be found-walleye can reach weights of over 20 pounds but none that size have been line-caught in our lake yet.

Since it lives in deep water most of its life, the walleye is something of a mystery. The walleye spawns in early spring on windy points or rocky piles. Casting or trolling jigs, spinners, night crawlers or minnows around spawning areas will usually produce fish.

Patience is the rule when you deal with the walleye. After spawning is over, fish the same area, but move to deeper water. Walleye are school fish, so when you catch one, look around. There should be more.

In spring, fish 2-15 feet, in summer deeper water, 5-40 feet and fall fish from 10-20 feet and winter deeper yet, 15-70 feet. Around here, that is "drag the bottom" fishing. Walleye like a cooler water temperature, so fish in 40-70 degrees with 58 a sure fire temperature, with 46 in the spring.

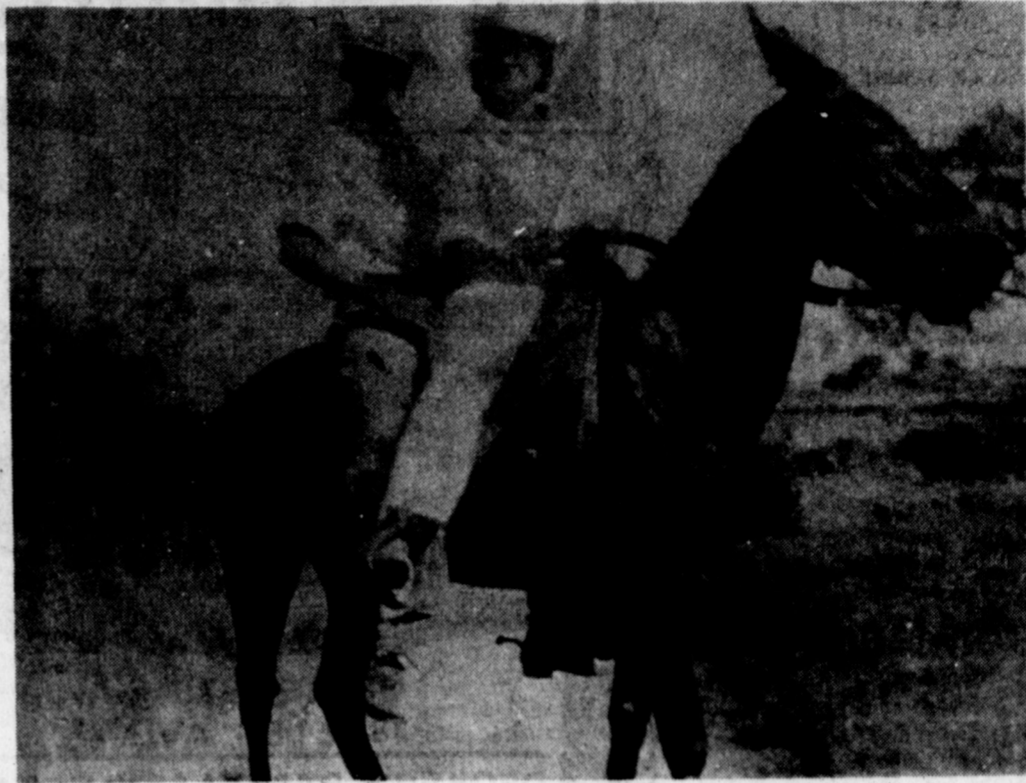
CRAPPIE: there are two kinds in Greenbelt, white and black, but they look so much alike that it isn't practicable to identify their differences. While most of the crappie you'll catch are from 6-10 inches long, bigger ones aren't that uncommon.

A popular pan fish with a flattened appearance appearance and silvery sides, the crappie is a nomad and travels around the lake in schools searching for food. Spring signals spawning and crappie move into brush, trees or cattails to raise their young. In the spring, use small jigs, spinners or plugs.

After spawning, your best bet is to troll or drift live bait around cover. During the summer, try to find a temperature layer of 63 degrees. Night fishing is also good during the summer.

Crappie are usually found 5-20 feet and go deeper in winter. They like 40-78 water temperatures and the best bet is 63 degrees.

CHANNEL CAT: are the mainstay of most Greenbelt fishermen. Those can't catch anything else can always get a cat. Channel cat prefers live bait and is best fished overnight in warm waters or from a trot line. A very nocturnal feeder, the catfish may be found just about anywhere on the lake. Catfish spawn during the spring when they are susceptible to worms, minnows or crawdads. After the spawning season, fish from 10 p.m. to 3 a.m. with just about anything, dead or alive.

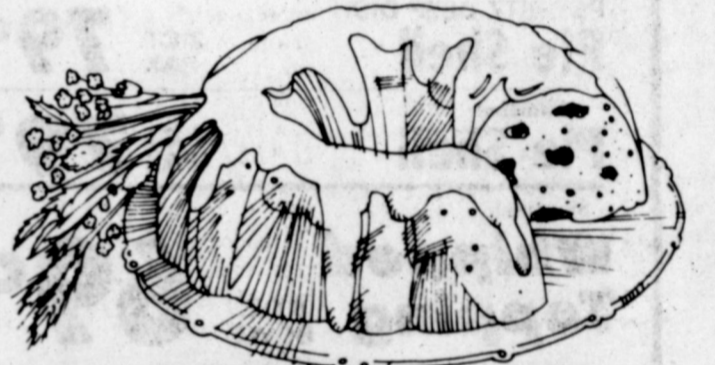

Mary Hazel Van Zandt remembered the "Company H train; Carolyn Hamilton saw the parade in her town; Durrell Stark remembered the crippled boys returning home. Naomi Green recalled that her father had been on the front line on Armistice Day.

World War II had two surrendered dates, May 7, 1945 when Germany surrendered and Sept. 2, 1945 when Japan surrendered after receiving the first atomic bomb attacks in the history of the world. Helen Cooke joined the Waves and served as a non-combatant woman in service. She taught instrument flying. She met her husband while in the service. When the final surrender came her husband remembers a friend rushed into the room "Japan has surrendered! Thank God we made it through the war!"

Vietnam was the longest war the United States ever fought. The veterans of that war did not come home to parades and celebrations. Only now are these men being honored in Washington, D.C. by a memorial with the names of the men and women who died in that war.
