Comptroller report states taxes for Donley cities are up

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Friday sent 96.2 million to 967 Texas cities as their share of the one-percent city sales tax for November.

The 1982 statewide total so far this year is up 9.3 percent over the 1981 total up through the same date of last year. This payment reflects taxable sales made in September and reported to the

state by the end of October.

The city and MTA sales taxes are collected along with the state sales tax by merchants and rebated monthly to the cities in which they are collected by the Comptroller. Clarendon received net payment this period \$13,092.78 comparable payment prior year \$9,981.31 payment to date this year

\$71,239.50 up 10.46%.

Hedley net payment this period \$897.44 comparable payment prior year \$1,067.77 1982 was \$4,933.34, 1981 \$4,012.02 up 22.96.

Howardwick net this period \$1,346.06, total for 1982 \$7,835.51; 1981 \$6,606.77 up 18.60%.

A total of 4,701 fatalities was recorded on our streets and highways for 1981 and statistics show 923 fatal accidents caused 1,082 deaths and 17,343 injury accidents that caused 27,907 injuries in Texas that involved a drunk driver, according to Major Bell.

"Many drivers are not tested," Bell said, "because Texas has no law requiring chemical test on drivers in fatal accidents and it is probable that more than 50% of the deceased drivers in Texas were driving while intoxicated and were not reported as DWI."

The Texas Department of Public Safety urges all motorists to avoid the use of alcohol when driving. Let's all slow down a little and live a lot.

Thanksgiving

Thanksgiving in the United States, an annual day of thanks for the blessings of the past year, observed on the fourth Thursday in November in each of the states and the District of Columbia. American Thanksgiving had its inspiration in the proclamation issued by Governor William Bradford of Plymouth Colony in the autumn of 1621. The colonists observed that day of prayerful thanksgiving for the harvest by feasting on wild turkey, and the custom eventually became popular throughout New England. During the Revolutionary War, the Continental Congress ordered days of national thanksgiving, and in 1789 President Washington issued a call for thanksgiving upon the adoption of the Constitution.

Credit for the institution of a national Thanksgiving Day has been given to Sarah J.B. Hale, (1828) who as editor of the Ladies Magazine and of Godey's Lady's Book, campaigned tirelessly for a nationwide observance.

Finally, on Oct. 3, 1863, President Lincoln issued the first national proclamation fixing the last Thursday in November "as a day of thanksgiving and praise to our beneficent Father". In 1939, President Franklin D. Roosevelt proclaimed November 23 (the fourth but not the last Thursday) as Thanksgiving Day, and for the next two years he also chose the next to last (third) Thursday. Late in 1941 Congress adopted a joint resolution setting the date on the fourth Thursday.

The custom of setting a day of offering thanks to a deity has been traced back to antiquity, and throughout, history many such observances have been recorded in various parts of the world.

Most of the business will be closed Thursday, city, county and state offices, and most of the businesses. All-sups, Gibsons and Wil-Mart, LaRue Restaurant and some service stations will be open. If you are planning an out of town trip, please drive carefully. The Texas Department of Public Safety figures show that Texas experienced 53 fatal accidents during Thanksgiving holiday last year, speed and alcohol being the main contributing factors.

Children's development often worries parents

A common worry among new parents is whether their child is developing normally.

Parents should be reassured that most children are normal and that a wide range of conditions and behavior are considered "normal". Because no two children are exactly alike, parents cannot accurately judge their child by comparing the youngster with another. But most children go through developmental steps at certain ages, and knowing these can relieve many anxieties for parents.

The Texas Medical Association offers these milestones as a general guide in child development:

- 1 month: lifts chin off floor.
 - 2 months: lifts chest off floor.
 - 3 months: reaches for objects but without success.
 - 4 months: sits with support.
 - 5 months: sits on laps; grasps small objects.
 - 7 months: sits alone
 - 8 months: stands with help.
 - 9 months: stands by holding onto furniture.
 - 10 months: crawls.
 - 11 months: walks if led by one hand.
 - 12 months: pulls up and stands with the help of furniture.
 - 13 months: climbs up a few stairs.
 - 14 months: stands alone.
 - 15 months: walks alone.
- Before third birthday: talks in short sentences.
These time periods for development are broad generalizations. A normal child might well be behind or ahead at any stage. Still, parents should be attentive to the general course of normal development. Any major departure from it should be discussed with the child's doctor.

General Telephone information

Some of the changes sweeping the telecommunications industry, as a result of the deregulation of the industry by the Federal Government, were outlined by J.H. Davis, Operations Manager for General Telephone Company in Memphis. "When we talk about deregulation of the telecommunications industry, we are talking about something with tremendous impact," Davis commented. "We are talking about a complete overhaul of the most complex and extensive machine ever put together to provide universal service for customers, a \$100 billion item known as the American Telecommunications Network."

Deregulation will have an impact on virtually every aspect of the telephone industry, including costs. It should result in lower prices for some services and definitely higher prices for others. The net effect of deregulation and the competition it creates is that each product or service provided must pay its own way without subsidies from other segments of the business.

In reviewing how regulation began, the telephone

company official said, "The original goal was to achieve affordable telephone service for all. To achieve this goal, it was necessary for a policy of subsidization to be implemented. Long distance subsidies subsidizes local service. Business largely subsidizes residential service and metropolitan areas subsidize the suburban and rural areas. Deregulation abandons the subsidy approach. We have to make each segment of the business pay for itself. The universal service concept has to be replaced by a user pays concept. In other words, toll and business services will have to be competitively priced, eliminating their subsidies to local residential service. Obviously, this puts a heavy upward pressure on local service rates," Davis said. "As a result, one of the most difficult challenges for the telephone industry will be keeping a lid on local service rates."

The brightest hope for this is improved technology and Usage Sensitive Service, or U.S.S., according to Mr. Davis. "GTE expects to help customers meet increases in residential rates by phasing

in certain options for flat rate prices, including U.S.S., a concept new to most of the United States, but one which has been used in many foreign countries and parts of the U.S.A. for decades. Other positive considerations are that the competition will tend to hold down long distance rates and new technology will offer a variety of new services.

The next major change in the deregulation time schedule will occur January 1, 1983. At that time, the basic local and long distance switch networks will continue to be regulated, as well as all in-place equipment on customer premises. However, new equipment will be excluded from regulation and so called enhanced services that involve data transmission and data based services. As far as how this really affects the customers, the big change is in lease and purchase agreements for telephones and multiline systems and other gear in a customer's home or business. After January 1, 1983, existing customers may continue to lease their telephones from the telephone company with most of the traditional services. In addition, they will have the option of purchasing phones, either from GTE or other suppliers. There will be no new terminal equipment offered for lease at the old regulated tariff rates.

The Federal Communications Commission believes that competitive markets are the most efficient, that deregulation and competition will encourage new services and open more options for customers. Actually, the FCC is but one of the driving forces behind deregulation. Congress, the Justice Department and the Reagan Administration, like others before it, are eager to deregulate the American telephone business.

Deregulation is upon us. It is fought with trams. We view it as an opportunity to serve our customers in a competitive market environment from which customers, employees, shareholders, and the public in general, should benefit.

The Internal Revenue Service has announced a major redesign of its "Understanding Taxes" Program for 1983.

"Understanding Taxes" is a complete, free educational package, which teaches high school juniors and seniors important aspects of the

Federal tax system. Approximately five million students used the course last year.

After a year long study, the new "Understanding Taxes" curriculum will include more information and

skill development than ever before, the IRS said. The materials will now be presented in a "modular" format, permitting teachers greater flexibility when scheduling and teaching "Understanding Taxes".

The curriculum will include a line-by-line explanation of the Form 1040A and a discussion of a basic Form 1040 and Schedule A for itemized deductions. However, new chapters will also cover such information as the economics of taxation, tax legislation and facts and

fallacies about the IRS.

Student course books, teachers' manuals, special training visual aids and audio-visual materials are supplied free by the IRS. Teachers do not have to be skilled in tax law to teach this course, said the IRS.

Because of the changes in the program, the IRS has also developed a workshop to instruct teachers on the many uses of the "Understanding Taxes" curriculum.

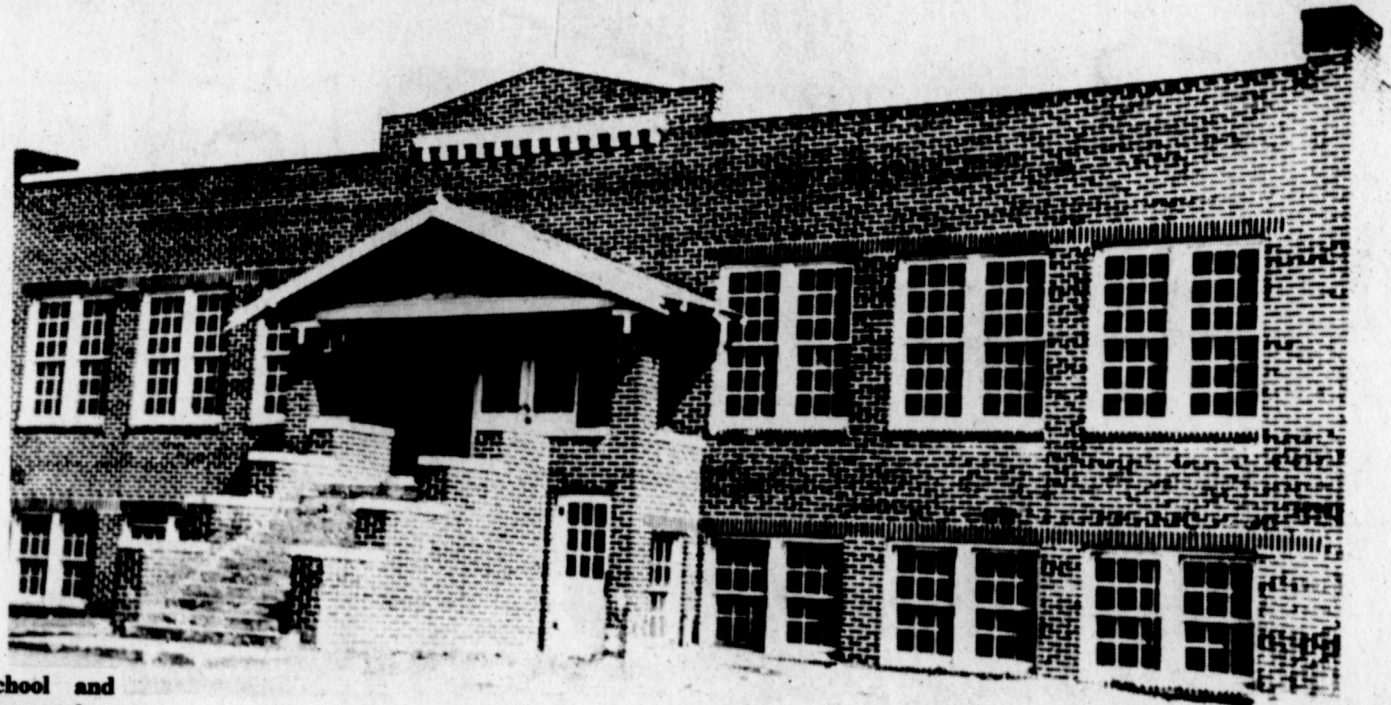

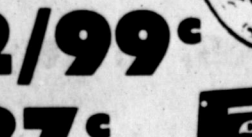
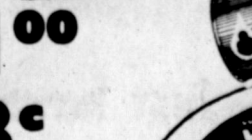

VA News

Families of veterans who select a burial site for a deceased veteran in a private cemetery have two options for Veterans Administration assistance in marking the grave.

VA will provide, upon request, a headstone or marker free of charge and ship it to the consignee designated on the application. Cost of placing the marker in a private cemetery must be borne by the applicant, however.

A second option is that VA will reimburse part of the cost of a headstone or marker bought privately and placed on the grave of a veteran. The current amount is \$67, the average cost of headstones purchased by VA.

Application for the VA headstone or marker should be addressed to Director, Monument Service (42), Department of Memorial Affairs, Veterans Administration, 810 Vermont Avenue, N.W., Washington, D.C. 20420.

Application for the \$67 reimbursement for a marker other than the VA standard should be filed at the VA Regional Office. Proper routing of the application will expedite service.

The Donley County 4-H Horse Club would like to thank Margaret Smith and Trista Moore for helping us throughout the years and helping us accomplish many new things.

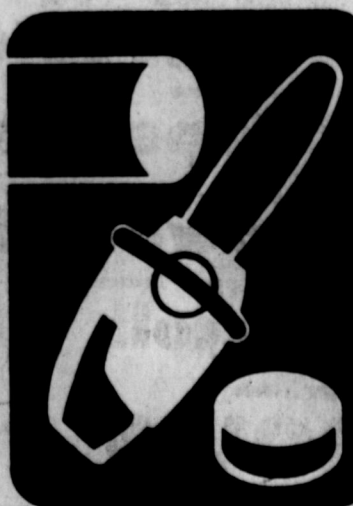

Safety Corner



Woodcutting Safety

Firewood can offer an economical heat source. However, an accident can be costly if it causes you to lose worktime. When working with firewood—

- Wear a hard hat, goggles, sturdy gloves and safety shoes.
- Respect a chainsaw. Grip it firmly with both hands. Watch for knots and nails that could cause the saw to kick.
- Before felling a tree, be sure it will fall safely and that you have a safe spot to get to quickly.
- Wear goggles when splitting wood, and keep hand tools sharp.

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KING SOLOMON SAID...

For centuries, scientists have been interested in determining those things that cause us to be "healthy". Concern about the value of water has led some people to drink mineral water while others consume distilled water as they pursue health.

A recent article in the *Journal of the American Medical Association* relates health to one's emotional state. Australian researchers found that immunity (ability to fight infection) was decreased in individuals following the death of spouses...a possible relationship between emotional depression and decreased ability to prevent disease.

Researchers at Johns Hopkins University feel that the environment and one's family health history strongly influence the state of our health. They concluded that good emotional (psychological) health comes before good physical health and that the factors most frequently associated with emotional health were: warm relationships with parents, good self-esteem, an optimistic approach to living, and a spontaneous, outgoing temperament.

Modern researchers have found that good health may come from within the individual. Thousands of years ago, King Solomon said (Proverbs): "A cheerful heart is good medicine, but a crushed spirit dries up the bones".
