Fire Destroys Old Lumber Co. Housing Cable TV - Rattan TV Service Offices

A quarter block of downtown structure was destroyed Tuesday afternoon when fire consumed the old Shamburger Lumber Co. building and lumber sheds which houses offices of Cable TV and Rattan TV Service. Overall loss was estimated at near \$25,000.

The fire broke out in the north-west corner of the sheds about 3:40 p.m. and swept swiftly thru the entire structure with a north-west wind aiding the blaze. Had the wind been out of the east, the whole east side of the block housing the College Boys Dorm, Clarendon Hatchery etc. would have possibly gone up in flames. Smoke from the fire was visible for sixty miles.

In fact, if it had not been for the assistance of the college boys the loss might have been much greater any way. They assisted in saving all TV equipment etc. possible from Rattan's TV before smoke and fire drove them back; they manned water hose and fought the blaze to keep it away from the dorm and Clarendon Hatchery buildings which caught fire momentarily during the height of the blaze. The dorm and Hatchery buildings received some damages but not extensive beyond smoke and soot damage. These boys are to be commended for their efforts along with the volunteer fire department which had all their units at the scene. Mr. Rattan expressed his personal appreciation to all who assisted in saving the items from his business.

Frank White, Jr. owner of the Lumber Co. building estimated his loss in excess of \$20,000. This included the building and equipment and supplies stored there. He said numerous other people had items stored in the building for which he could not make an estimate. There was no insurance coverage. Dennis Rattan, owner of Rattan TV Service and manager of Cable TV estimated their loss at over \$3,000 which was partially covered by insurance. Those having business with Mr. Rattan can call 3570 for information or service until he gets re-established in a new location.

Sayles Dozier, had his cart with all his yard equipment valued at 2 to 3 hundred dollars parked at the yard and all was lost. A fund for replacement was started at the City Drug late Tuesday afternoon. Anyone wishing to contribute may leave their do-

nation there or mail checks made out to Sayles to the Drug Store. Sayles has done yard work for many years and took great pride in the fine tools and equipment he had to work with.

Mrs. Rattan, who was at the business at the time the fire broke out, said she looked out the east window and saw the smoke and just barely had time to rush out and move their car before the flames swept thru the buildings. Cause of the fire has not been determined at this time.

1967 WHEAT ALLOTMENT

The Secretary of Agriculture has announced that there will be a 15% increase in the 1967 wheat allotment. Preliminary work on the allotments has begun in the county office. It is expected that the allotment notices will be mailed to producers around the middle of June.

COTTON ALLOTMENT TRANSFERS

Cotton farmers in Donley County are voting this month. This vote will decide whether producers want to permit the transfer of cotton allotments outside the county. It will not affect within county transfers.

Ballots and instructions for voting were mailed to all cotton producers on May 13. Be sure to vote and return your ballot to the ASCS Office either in person or by mail. To be counted, the ballot must be in the county office by the close of business on Wednesday, May 25. Both husband and wife are eligible to vote.

Ballots will be counted publicly at 10:00 A.M. in the Donley ASCS Office on May 26. Anyone who wishes may watch the vote count.

Be sure to sign the certificate on the back of the return envelope. Otherwise, the vote will not be counted. When two ballots are enclosed for husband and wife, each must be sealed in a separate blank envelope, placed in a separate postage free envelope, and the certificate signed by each voter.

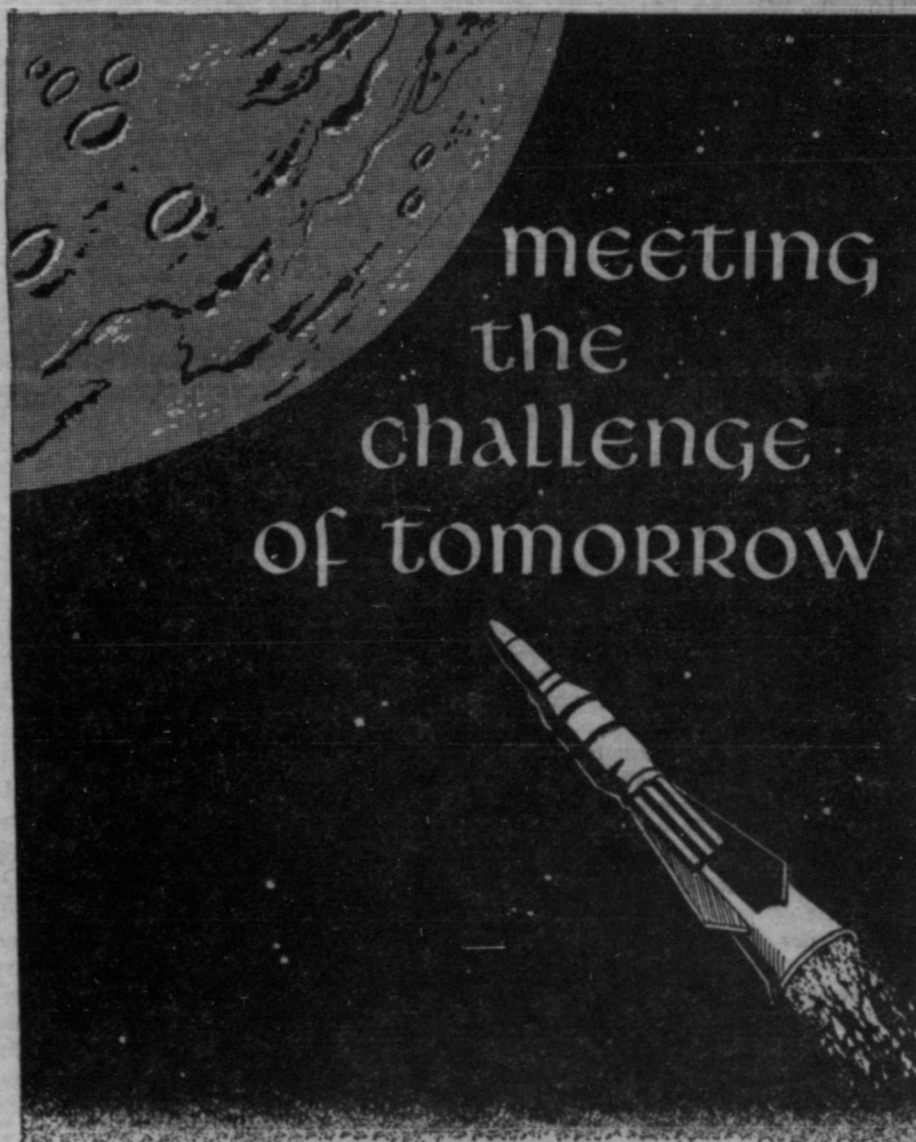

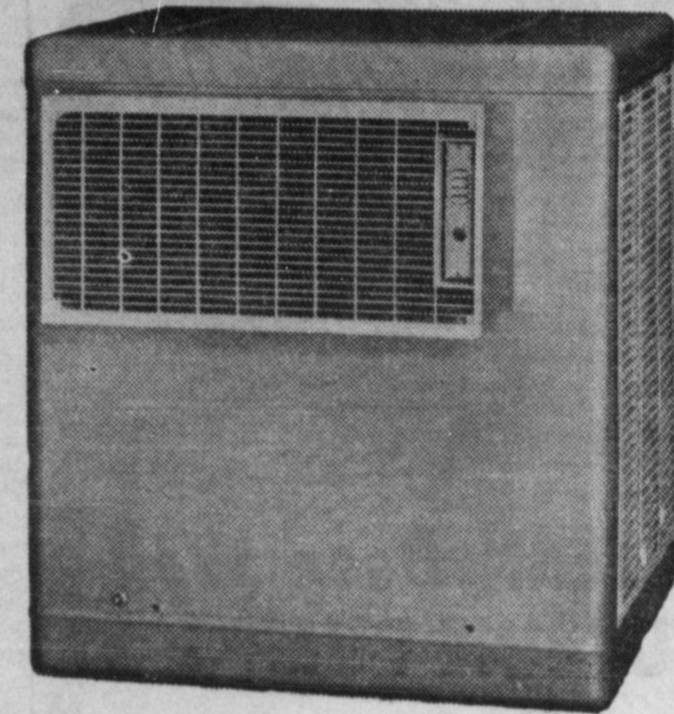

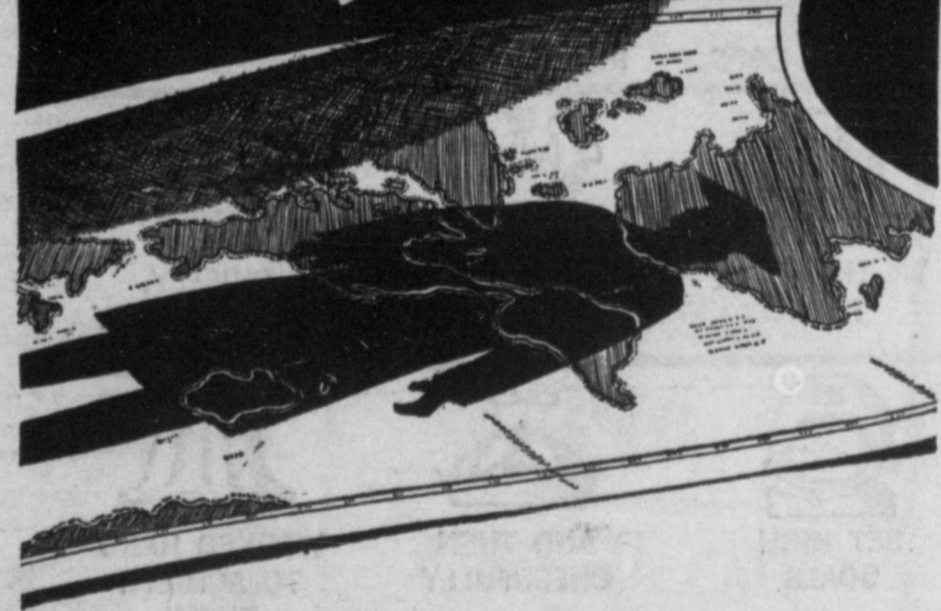

MOBILE LAB TESTS FOR HARMFUL FARM CHEMICALS

Safe food and water supplies for Texans is the goal of a new anti-contamination mobile laboratory now traveling the agricultural areas of the state.

"The public has become so aware of the possibilities of harmful effects from farm chemicals that official assurance work is an absolute necessity," said Agriculture Commissioner John C. White. "The Texas Department of Agriculture is now a pace-setter for all states in making scientific analysis of all types of crops, food supplies and water sources with this ultra-modern laboratory on wheels."

The mobile lab is equipped to find even minute traces of possibly harmful chemicals in liquids such as milk, drinking water, livestock ponds and streams. Tests are also designed to assure consumers that no dangerous residues are present in food products, White pointed out.

Operated by Texas Department of Agriculture chemists, the 46 x 10-foot scientific trailer was put into action in March in the lower

Rio Grande Valley. It will follow the maturing crops northward as the growing season progresses, covering all sections of the state. The mobility of the lab permits fast and accurate examinations of agricultural products and liquids as they become ready for national and international markets.

"Work on the laboratory will serve a two-fold purpose," Commissioner White explained. "Protection of human and animal life is the primary consideration. But a second major benefit will be derived from the tests. Crops which are certified as free of any harmful residues will command a better position on the national markets. People and buyers want to be assured of food safety."

The lab puts Texas in the front ranks in pioneering on-the-spot

residue testing work. The trailer, already receiving inquiries from other states, is expected to serve as a pilot model for additional labs which may be needed in Texas in the future.

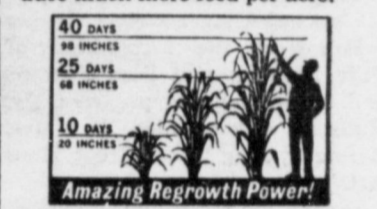

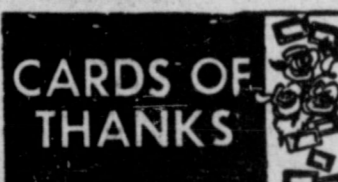
After the lunch hour the group went to the governor's office and visited with Mr. Meyer, secretary to the governor. The governor was out of town and the group did not get to see him.

PESTICIDES Pesticides can be your best weapon against insects in your garden, lawn and home, says County Agricultural Agent Ronald Gooch. To help you use pesticides in a safe way, as the spring-time battle with the pests looms ahead, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service has just published a new leaflet entitled U. B. Safe With Pesticides. The new leaflet, L-676, is now available at Gooch's office.

The leaflet has been designed for Texas homemakers, homeowners and home gardeners. It

lists step by step the things that you should remember each time you use pesticides in and around the home. The leaflet is basically in four parts with items to consider before you buy pesticides when you use them, when you put them away and when you dispose of the unwanted leftovers.

Pesticide applications around the home usually are not very extensive and probably you'll find you only have to spray or dust a few times during any spring or summer month. Like many other things, practice makes perfect; but when long periods

of time elapse between pesticide applications, it is a good idea to have some safety reminders posted somewhere near your pesticide storage area. The leaflet folds out so that the center page, if taped on the pesticide storage door, makes a good reminder list that is easily re-read before you rush out to battle the lawn or garden insects.

Leaflet L-676, then, is a listing of "safety tips" for pesticide users and is not a listing of recommendations of materials that will control specific pests. For recommendations on pest control, other

leaflets, such as the Texas Guide for Controlling Household Insects and Chemical Weed Control in Lawns are available at the county agent's office.

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NEWS FROM CITY HALL

Editors Note: The following are the views of Mayor Richard L. Gilkey and are being published as a public service as in the past.

Between 2 and 4 P.M. next Sunday, May 22nd, you are invited to the open house of your "new" City Hall. Come and see how and why your tax dollar has been spent. I think that you'll be pleasantly surprised.

Much has happened recently and many questions have been asked. Here are the answers. Our City Secretary has resigned effective in two weeks. Mr. Walter B. Knorpp has been retained to control these duties as well as that of the City Tax Assessor-Collector. He has been asked to examine all properties on the city tax rolls and advise the city aldermen of his findings.

There have been numerous complaints of the cost of the City Police Department. On the average (the past three months), the police department has cost \$222.40 in excess of our constable and night watchman system cost per month. This sum certainly does not seem excessive when the additional services are considered. Few people bother to recall when a group of indignant mothers marched on city hall a couple of years ago and demanded that the city aldermen do something about the reckless driving in the vicinity of the public schools. What is the price of a child's safety? Is our city exceeding that price?

Another answer. Who built the airport? Who owns the land, who maintains it? It was built in April 1960 at no cost to the city or county. The planning, surveying and original earth moving was done by a few interested individuals at a cost in excess of \$100 each. Other interested citizens and ranchers donated lesser sums. The property is owned by the City of Clarendon and set aside for use as a municipal airport. It has been maintained by both the city and the county. Its use has been three-fold greater than expected by business and industry concerned with this area of the panhandle. Have you ever thought what an airport costs to build? Can we afford to have it? Can we afford not to?

The city dump is having a face lifting. It is being cleaned up, the road from the South replaced, and new animal pits have been dug. Please place dead animals in the pits provided and cover them with dirt as required. Violators will be fined if they fail to cover the carcasses with earth.

While we're on the subject of city dumps and garbage, please don't take unfair advantage of our sanitation department. They can't pick up a trash barrel full of rocks (and have been instructed not to do so). We can (and do) pick up grass cuttings and small twigs if placed in small disposable boxes. But the boxes must be disposable. We simply can't allow our men the time to dig twigs out of boxes and replace the boxes.

Please keep your vacant lots cleaned up and mowed. The mosquitoes are starting to come out and tall weeds are good breeding grounds. The city cannot mow lots for private individuals. Our mosquito control will be done with a liquid spray and fog machine this year, rather than the dusting powder used last year. You'll like it much better, and we hope that it works better.

Please keep track of your dog. We pick up a pack of roving dogs almost every night, don't let yours be in the group. Keep your dog as man's best friend rather than your neighbor's worst nuisance.

These are some of the problems and some of the answers. Drop by next Sunday.

Recruits Needed For DPS School By June 6

Col. Homer Garrison, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, announced today that Monday, June 6, is the deadline for application to the next DPS recruit training school for patrolmen.

"We have several new benefits to offer qualified young men," Garrison said. "For instance, the pay during training has been increased from \$375 to \$400 per month, and upon graduation this is increased (effective September 1, 1966) to either \$468 or \$484, depending upon which branch of service to which the patrolman is assigned.

"Also, for those who prefer one branch of the uniformed service over another, we can let the men select their service (Highway Patrol, Driver Licensing, License & Weight and Motor Vehicle Inspection) and they can also choose the geographical area of the state where they will be assigned, consistent with openings."

To qualify for employment in the uniformed services of the DPS, a man must be between the ages of 21 and 35, not less than 5 feet 8 inches tall, have a high school education or its equivalent, be in sound physical condition with good vision and must be a citizen of the United States and a resident of Texas for at least one year immediately prior to the date of application.

"Among the many benefits that patrolmen enjoy," Garrison pointed out, "are two weeks annual vacation, all holidays provided for by the Legislature, modern liberal retirement systems and group hospitalization and life insurance plans, traveling expenses and longevity pay, and they are furnished with uniforms and all the necessary equipment to perform their duties."

Those men who are accepted for the position of patrolmen go through an intensive training program at the DPS Law Enforcement Academy in Austin for a period of 16 weeks. Upon graduation they are assigned to duty stations throughout the state.
