

# Centennial Procelain has arrived

This week the advance shipment of the porcelain plates chosen for centennial memorial items arrived in Clarendon. Limited in number the plates come in two sizes.

The size varies some from the original choice and the quality is of much finer ware. The earlier selection was to have been ceramic whereas the plates are porcelain.

Selecting an item which

purchasers would cherish for sentimental and real value was not an easy task for the members of the Donley County Historical Survey Commission. After much discussion plates in two sizes were decided upon. The uses and display of the porcelain pieces in two sizes are many and varied, and these factors decided the two sizes. The plates differ only in size and the gold rim which is on the larger but is not on the smaller one.

Hard as it was to decide on the item when the decision was made the decoration was easy. What could be more fitting for all of Donley County than a replica of the historic old building which has been the seat of county government for one hundred years!

Two Clarendon households have pieces of porcelain dating from about 1906 which have a picture of the old courthouse building on them. These pieces were

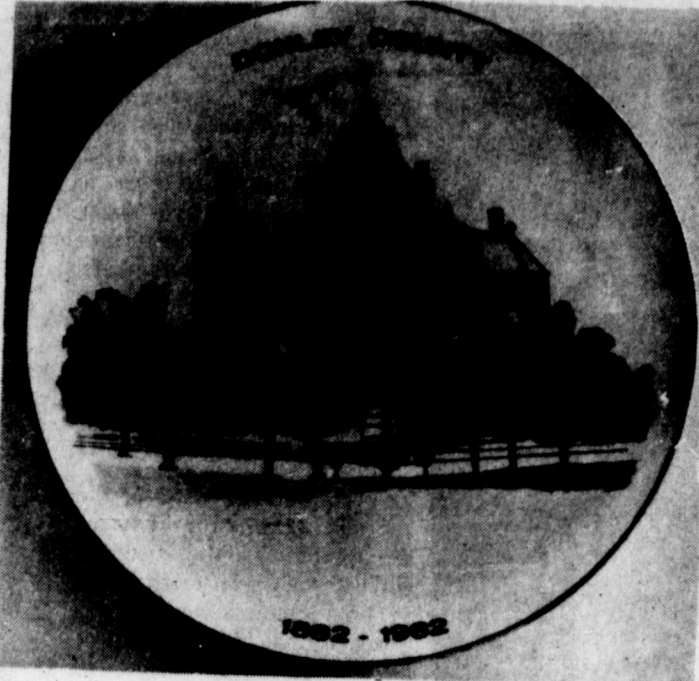
made in Germany and appear to be hand painted.

County Judge and Mrs. Christal have a small plate and Jane Bownds has three pieces. Jane's pieces are a sugar bowl, toothpick holder and pitcher. The pitcher has a picture of the old school building which was on the site of the present post office. The sugar and toothpick holder have the courthouse on them.

Mrs. Bownds is sure about the date of her pieces. They were given to her aunt, Lula Ruddle, for Christmas in 1906 when the Killough family, Jane's parents moved to Clarendon. In turn Jane was given the items many years later.

Before shipment was made delays, frustrations, time, telephone calls and some changes were endured by all parties concerned. But the finished product is of fine quality porcelain and workmanship. The Donley County Historical Survey Commission hopes you each, who purchase plates, enjoy them through the years as the Bownds and Christals have and as the DCHSC has in planning for the Donley County Birthday Year.

Purchase prices for plates will be announced as soon as shipping costs, etc., have been determined and at that time they will go on sale. The announcement will be made as soon as possible.

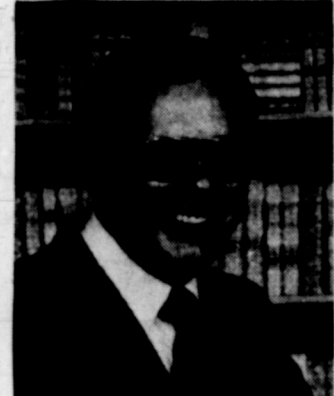

## Scoggins students perform

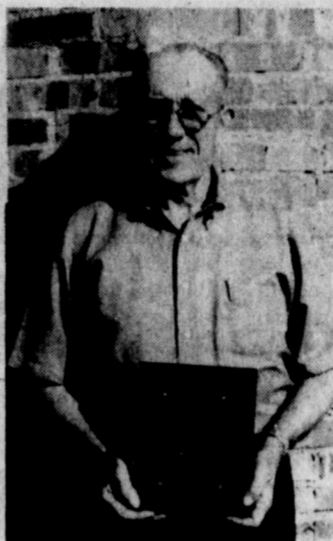

Mr. Daniels is pastor of Martin Baptist Church. His wife, Regina, is a student at WTSU and they have a new son, Randall Matthew.

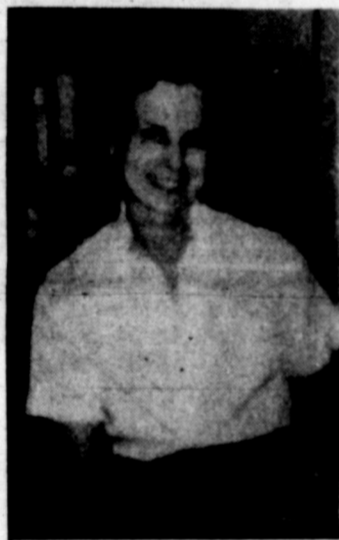

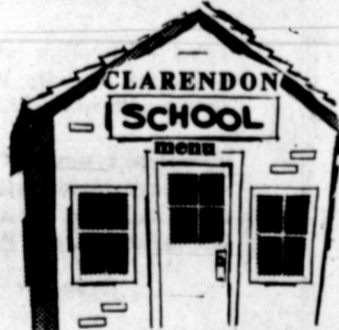
