Memorial Day --- time to honor

Since Memorial Day is a special time to honor the memory of Americans who gave their last full measure of devotion to their country, we offer here a rhetorical account of the history of this day.

Memorial Day grew out of the ceremonies that honored the fallen soldiers of the Union and Confederate armies. When the tragic war between the states ended in 1865, the Union had been saved. But the problems of peace seemed as complex and vast as those of war. The states were united in name

An inspiring symbol of unity and reconciliation was needed-a symbol from which people could draw strength as they strove to become a united nation. That symbol was supplied when a kind gesture by a small group of women in a little town in the south caught the imagination of the nation.

Weather forecasting affected by proposal

The ability to predict tornade conditions and sudden thunderstorms could be hurt by the federal government's elimination of 18 weather stations and a move to close the Fort Worth regional office of the National Weather Service, says a Texas A&M University meterology professor.


However, such actions probably won't affect two- or threeday forecasts like those that recently warned Americans in the Midwest and Northeast of approaching blizzards that proved to be the worst in history, said Dr. Kenneth Brundidge.

Brundidge said the closing of any regional weather service office might be felt worst in the area of coordination with area disaster agencies and city governments.

The proposal to close the Fort Worth office, which makes regional forecasts and acts as the central weather service operation for the southernmost tier of states, came at the peak of tornado season in Texas.
