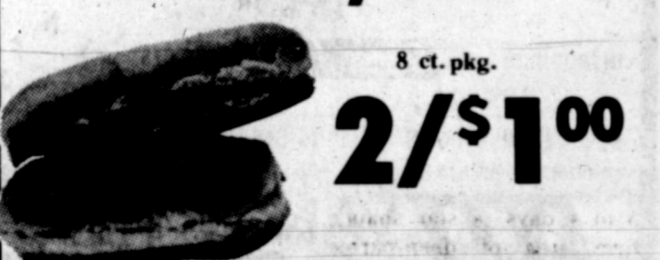

HEAT'S ON

Vitamin C helps fight colds aids the body in holding cells together and is sometimes thought of as a cure-all. In any event, it is better to get

vitamins in their natural state than in a pill form. Broccoli is better than citrus when it comes to providing vitamin C. Also, cabbage, strawberries, tomatoes and, of course, citrus fruits supply natural vitamin C.

BROCCOLI FIESTA
1 1/2 lbs fresh broccoli
1 C chicken broth or stock
3 small onions, thinly sliced
2 small cloves garlic minced
2 canned pimientos, thinly sliced, a rounded 1/3 C
3 TBS oleo
2 1/4 tsp cornstarch
1 1/2 TBS water
2 rounded TBS Dijon mustard
1 C shredded cheddar cheese
Trim leaves and stem ends from broccoli. Cut into 2" pieces. Cook in chicken broth covered until tender, about 10 minutes.
Saute onion, garlic, pimientos over medium heat in oleo until onions are golden and limp, about 5 minutes. Blend cornstarch with water. Stir into skillet with mustard. Drain broccoli, saving broth, keep broccoli warm. Measure 1/4 C broth, add water if needed. Add to skillet, stirring well to blend. Bring to full boil, boil 1 minute. Stir in cheese, reduce heat and cook until cheese is melted and blended stir frequently. Spoon sauce over broccoli.

LEMONADE BASE
1 TBS grated lemon peel
1 1/2 C sugar
1/2 C boiling water
1 1/2 C freshly squeezed lemon juice.
In a covered jar, combine lemon peel, sugar and boiling water, cover and shake until sugar is dissolved. Add lemon juice and store in jar in refrigerator. To make a glass pour 1/4 to 1/2 C syrup into tall glass add 1/4 C water and ice. To make pitcher, add 5 C water to base add ice cubes and stir. Makes 1 1/2 quarts.

FRUIT A LA PIZZA
1/4 C sugar
3 TBS cornstarch
1/4 C water
1 C orange juice
1/4 C lemon juice
1/4 C oleo
2 C finely crushed ginger snaps
1 pkg (8 oz) cream cheese
1 tsp vanilla
1/4 C sugar
fresh fruits
In a 4 C glass measure, combine sugar and cornstarch with water, orange juice and lemon juice. Cook until thick. Cool and refrigerate.
Melt oleo and stir in ginger snaps. Press into 12" dish, bake until set in moderate oven.
Soften cream cheese and add vanilla and sugar. Spread cheese mix over crumb crust. Top with sliced fresh fruits (bananas, strawberries, green grapes, peaches, etc.) Pour chilled sauce over top. Chill 1 to 2 hours before serving.

FRESH STRAWBERRY PIE
1 9" pie shell
1 qt fresh strawberries
1/2 C sugar
2 TBS cornstarch
1/4 C water
few drops red food color
whipped cream
Prick pie shell all over and bake on high 5 to 5 1/2 minutes, rotating once. Set aside. Mash enough strawberries to make 1/2 C. Combine sugar and cornstarch in a 2 qt dish. Add crushed strawberries and water, stir. Microwave on high 3 minutes or until mix boils and thickens. Stir in food coloring. Cool.
Toss remaining berries with cooled mix and pour into pie shell. Refrigerate and top with whipped cream to serve.

Unrefrigerated Milk To Be Introduced At 1982 World's Fair



MEET ME AT THE FAIR — And the biggest fair of all this year is the 1982 World's Fair in Knoxville, Tennessee. Past fairgoers have been the first to ride an elevator, eat an ice cream cone or talk on a telephone, and this year will be no different. Farm Best — fresh, fluid Grade A milk that doesn't need refrigeration — is the only new product being introduced at this year's International Energy Exposition. The milk is available in white milk (whole and lowfat) and lowfat chocolate in quarts, as well as in half-pints including a variety of flavors called Sip Ups.

Visitors to the fair will be among the first Americans to try this dairy product innovation. Dairymen, an 8,000 member milk-marketing cooperative based in Louisville, Kentucky, is debuting Farm Best at the fair as the first step towards offering it to American consumers. "Farm Best," says Dairyman President Roy Strange, "has disconnected milk from the refrigerator. For the first time, consumers can have milk when they want it and where they want it." The reason unrefrigerated milk, with a shelf life of up to three months, is possible is a unique combination of processing and packaging. A special container, called a Ready-Pack™, protects the milk's flavor and freshness. And at the fair, the new milk is being introduced several ways. The Magnificent Magical Milk Show™, the prime attraction at Dairymen's exhibit in the Technology and Lifestyle Center, stars a cast of characters that will entertain and inform many fairgoers: Dr. Louis Pasteur, the father of pasteurization; Clara, the Cow; Farmer Brown; Hoover the Owl; and Granny. These "characters" are actually computerized animated robots that talk, wink, blink and nod; the most complex of them, Dr. Pasteur, also stands and has life-like arm movements as well. The characters tell the audience about Farm Best, which offers the consumer, for the first time, milk as a product convenient to store or take-along. Included in the show is a sophisticated audio-visual presentation utilizing a bank of six projectors and stereo sound, all of which combine to make "The Magnificent Magical Milk Show" delightful entertainment. The Dairymen exhibit also incorporates two taste-testing centers for sampling of the new milk and two informative videotapes shown on 50-inch screens. next year, the reaction would be just as severe the second time, possibly even worse. How can you remove the brown recluse spider from your home and yard? Dr. Carl Patrick, the extension entomologist for the Agriculture Research and Extension Center in Amarillo said that the only way to remove any sign or chance of brown recluse habitation within your home would be to give your attic, basement and closets a "complete and thorough cleaning, shaking out all clothing, removing everything and shaking it out and then using a good residual insecticide treatment." Dr. Patrick did mention that a spray would not be very effective since it could not possibly penetrate deep enough into the garments, etc. to kill the well hidden spider. A residual treatment, something that would stay on the floor or remain in contact with the garments and articles so that the spider would walk across it later and die, would be the only method for brown recluse spider extermination. "The spiders have invaded this part of Texas from suitcases and packing boxes brought in by transients and new-comers to the area from places where the spider is known to live," Dr. Patrick said. "The brown recluse was not supposed to live in this part of Texas and I was quite surprised to discover it did exist here, but it arrived in moving cartons and can adapt quite well to any environment," he added. "They live mostly indoors, so their climate is controlled and they are comfortably at home in your home." Dr. Patrick did suggest a professional exterminator could possibly rid your home of the spider.

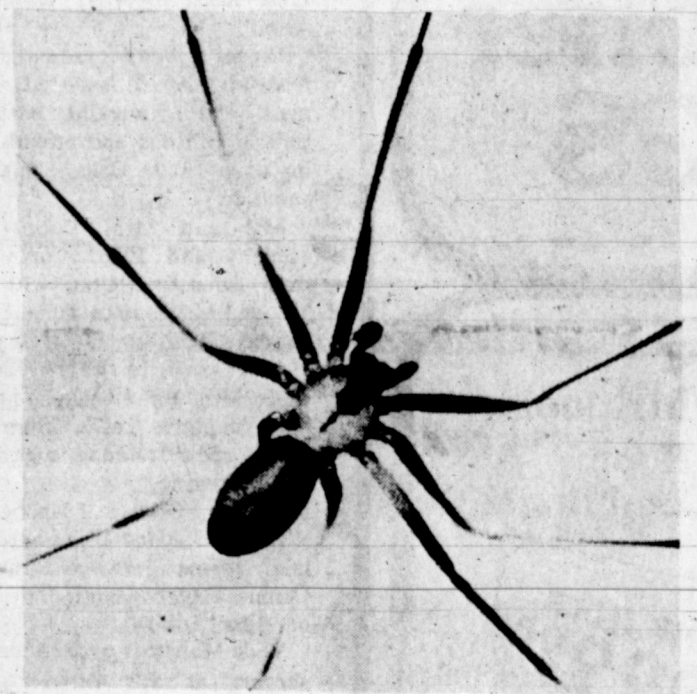

Brown Recluse Spider ...a dangerous foe

Brown recluse or fiddle back, both names for the most dangerous arachnid in Texas. It is a nonaggressive species that spins off-white to grayish nondescript webs. Many instances of bites occur when persons roll on the spider in bed while asleep or they may inadvertently trap these spiders in folds of clothing allowed to stand undisturbed for rather long periods. The spiders can be found in bathrooms, bedrooms, closets, on the underside of tables and chairs, behind baseboards and door facings, or in corners and crevices. They also frequent cellars and garages which are not cleaned often and their contents not disturbed for

relatively long periods. The brown recluse is of medium size and varies from 3/10 to 1/2" in length. Legs are long and well covered with short dark hairs. They look, at first glance, similar to a granddaddy long leg spider. The most distinguishing characteristics are three pairs of eyes arranged in semicircle on the forepart of the head and a guitar or violin-shaped marking immediately behind the semicircle. A distinct short median groove forms the neck of the guitar. The spiders prefer dry, cluttered undisturbed areas either inside or outdoors. As their name indicates, they like to be left alone and will retreat when threatened. But when entrapped, it will bite as a natural defense mechanism. The victim may not be aware of the bite for 2 or 3 hours, or a painful reaction may occur immediately, depending upon the amount of venom injected and the individual's sensitivity. However, a stinging sensation usually is followed by intense pain. Within 24 to 36 hours a systemic response may occur, characterized by restlessness and fever. A small blister surrounded by a large congested and swollen area usually arises. Tissue affected locally by the venom usually is killed and gradually sloughs away, exposing the underlying tissues. Healing may take 6 to 8 weeks, leaving scars of various dimensions. The healing may not be sufficient and may require skin grafting; however, in the central area of the bite, the skin may develop a deeply depressed area and ulceration may occur. Within 3 to 4 days, a star shaped firm area of deep-purple color may appear with the apparent dead skin or necrosis evident. Chills, fever, nausea, vomiting, weakness, joint pain and occasionally serious blood disturbances such as hemolytic anemia and or thrombocytopenia may occur as a result of the spider bite. Children may die as a result of the brown recluse spider bite due to renal failure and or blood disorders. Unfortunately, there is no known cure for the spider bite. Within four hours of the bite, it has been successful if the bite site can be excised or removed before the spread of the venom into the system can occur. Systemic corticosteroids is the treatment of choice if it can be administered immediately to lessen the necrotic response as well as the systemic reactions to the spider venom. There is no such thing as developing a resistance to the venom. If a person were to be bitten today and again

Weather forecasting affected by proposal

The ability to predict tornado conditions and sudden thunderstorms could be hurt by the federal government's elimination of 18 weather stations and a move to close the Fort Worth regional office of the National Weather Service, says a Texas A&M University meteorology professor.

However, such actions probably won't affect two- or three-day forecasts like those that recently warned Americans in the Midwest and Northeast of approaching blizzards that proved to be the worst in history, said Dr. Kenneth Brundidge.

Brundidge said the closing of any regional weather service office might be felt worst in the area of coordination with area disaster agencies and city governments.

The proposal to close the Fort Worth office, which makes regional forecasts and acts as the central weather service operation for the southernmost tier of states, came at the peak of tornado season in Texas.



Hightower takes a part in National Hearing on Farm Economy

Congressman Hightower took part in the National Hearing on the Farm Economy, the massive farm call-in, May 11. Organized by the Agriculture Council of America, the call-in featured a toll-free telephone number and a 50-phone bank manned by Congressmen, Senators, agriculture committee staffers and farm lobbyists. Congressman Hightower received calls from farmers in Colorado,

Iowa and several other farm-states. The purpose of the call-in was to compile survey results on the growing farm depression that could be forwarded to the Congress and the White House in the hopes of speeding aid to farmers.

Hightower helped organize the House Farm Crisis Group and has introduced emergency farm relief legislation which is being considered by the House Agriculture Committee.

Bass fishing has become a highly complex and technical sport with the advent of high performance boats, electronic depth finders and oxygen-temperature probes, in spite of anything the purists can do.

Largemouth bass will hit a variety of artificial baits, most of which resemble natural food. Basically, bass strike a lure or bait in response to one of three stimuli: hunger (what a revelation!) protection of nests of young, or a reflex response to a food item, such as nibbling on popcorn while watching TV.

Largemouth bass rely largely on sight for feeding, but a well developed lateral line sensory system enables them to locate food items due to slight vibrations through the water. Lures that appeal to these two senses are most effective on bass. Plastic worms, spinners, crankbaits and topwater lures are all effective on largemouth bass. Minnows, particularly golden shiners, are favorite live bait.

Largemouth bass prefer areas that are not subject to direct sunlight such as weedbeds, flooded timber and boat docks. Underwater structures such as submerged islands and bushpiles are also likely candidates to attract bass. Greenbelt has all of these type areas available.

Spring is the best time to fish for bass, so, Poor Uncle Herman, get out there and fish, don't work quite so hard and work harder at fishing!

Farm Bureau conducting campaign

Jay Gould, Information Chairman and Harold White, vice-president of the Donley County Farm Bureau, says that Farm Bureau is conducting an all out campaign to improve farm income.

They attended a Farm Bureau district meeting May 18th, in Amarillo, where the organization's "Action Plan for a Profitable Agriculture" was discussed by leaders throughout this area. Similar meetings are being held in all 13 Farm Bureau districts in Texas.

Jay Gould said that Farm Bureau is taking this action because farmers and ranchers are facing their worse crisis since the Great Depression of the 1930's.

Harold White added that the problem is overproduction, coupled with the high cost of production.

Here is Farm Bureau's four-point Action Plan in brief:

1. Support completion of Economic Recovery Program to stop inflation and lower interest rates.
2. Expand export markets through export financing of

agricultural commodities and removal of trade barriers.

3. Stop government from "breaking" markets through export embargoes and release of commodity reserves.

4. Cut red tape immediately to expedite approved FmHA loans.

"This is the third consecutive year of depressed income in U.S. Agriculture," Paul Macina, District I State Director from Farm Bureau said. "Prices of the commodities produced in Texas are down an average of about 12 percent from last year at this time. Prices of some of our more important crops are down as much as 20 to 40 percent."

In explaining the need for completion of the Economic Recovery Program Gould pointed out that a healthy economy is essential to agriculture, and can best be achieved through a balanced budget.

"Deficit spending must be eliminated and the tax reforms voted recently must be left intact.

Texas Farm Bureau Presi-

dent Carrol Chaloupka just returned from a trade mission to Japan with 23 other state Farm Bureau presidents and the president of the American Farm Bureau Federation.

The Farm Bureau trade mission went to Japan to add private support to the efforts under way by Trade Ambassador William Brock and other U.S. negotiators to gain greater access to Japanese markets.

Another group of state Farm Bureau presidents will visit Brussels and other European capitals in late May to talk with European economic leaders about lowering trade barriers there.

Expanded exports are essential to a sound agriculture. The Farm Bureau leader also said the Farm Bureau wants to avoid government programs that will "break" markets. He explained that commodity reserves -- intended to help farmers -- have depressed commodity prices in the past.

"Embargoes of exports place a double 'whammy' on producers of the affected commodities. First they act immediately to ruin prices. Second, they affect future

export sales because foreign buyers will avoid suppliers they regard as unreliable."

Cutting the red tape on Farmers Home Administration loans is also a serious problem that needs immediate attention.

In some cases, there is a costly delay in processing approved production loans by Farmers Home Administration.

"Immediate action on this problem is needed so that farmers who have their loans approved can get their checks in time for this year's crop," Harold White said.

"We continue to believe that the long-term outlook for agriculture is good. We are competitive in world markets and our productivity is unsurpassed. Our profitability in the future depends upon a healthy economic climate at home and abroad," State Director Macina concluded.

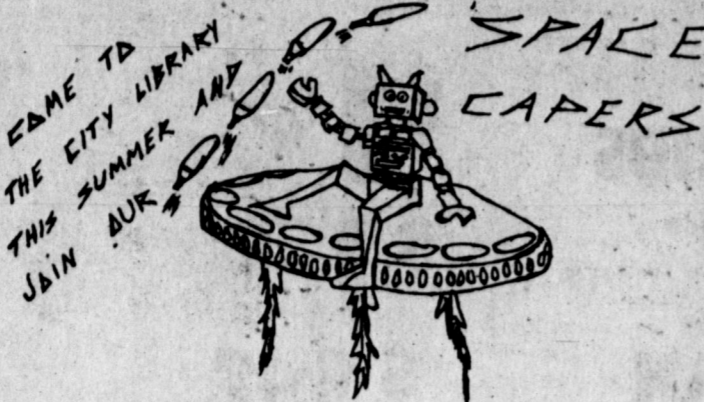

Irrigation expanded most rapidly when energy was readily available and relatively cheap. Today, more than ever, irrigators need to pay close attention to the operating efficiencies of their systems. Not just the pumping plant but also the delivery system. A system with a high potential efficiency may, through poor management, be operated at much lower efficiency. Anything that can be done to improve or increase irrigation efficiency will generally save energy and reduce energy costs. Irrigation efficiency is improved by

more uniform application of water, applying only that amount of water which can be retained within the root zone, and reduce leakage from pipelines, and surface runoff. Energy conservation must involve not only consideration of pumping energy, but all inputs of energy into the system.

You may naturally expect your home to use less electricity while you're away for a week or more. The reduction may not be as great as you think, however. That's because there are many factors that can affect your usage: weather conditions, billing periods and even vacation preparation.

1. Very hot weather before you leave and after you return means increased use of air conditioning. This makes it difficult to compare your bill with a previous month of milder weather.
2. Hot weather causes your refrigerator to run longer particularly if your home air conditioning is turned off while you are away.
3. If the time you're away falls within two billing periods the reduction you expect will be split between two bills.
4. If you didn't turn off your electric hot water heater before you left it continued to keep your water hot 24 hours a day, even though you weren't there.
5. And don't forget when getting ready for a vacation you often use more electricity than usual for cleaning, washing, drying, ironing, cooking and general preparations. The same is true about your return.

Check your meter.

If you learn to read your own meter, you can find out just how much electricity was used while you were gone. And, you'll see just how much energy you're using during the summer. The heaviest electricity consuming season, with your air conditioning operating most of the time.
