Red Cross to establish County disaster plan

Judge Christal and Mayor Clifford were contacted last week by Red Cross Volunteer Consultant Betty Moody from Childress and Bill Jean to establish a Red Cross Disaster plan for Donley County. They will conduct a seminar Thursday and Friday, July 8 and 9 from 6 p.m. until 10 p.m. at the Memorial Library.

The disaster control program will be to help local folks know how to handle the initial after-shock resulting from a major fire, a tornado, a flood or other disaster. The disaster team would learn how to handle plans for immediate shelter, clothing, food and to survey damages in the immediate wake of a disaster. Then the Red Cross comes in and will have the help of the local board to get things rolling.

Doctors, nurses, the sheriff's department, firemen, ministers, paramedics and certainly any interested citizens would be invited to attend this meeting. The first hour will be an orientation and Mayor Clifford asks that anyone interested should come for that first hour at

least. "We need a disaster plan in Donley County," Mayor Clifford said, "The Red Cross would know how to set one up and we could take it from there."

Donley County has had a Red Cross Chapter for many years. It has been largely inactive, however. The main function of the chapter has been to help servicemen. On one occasion, an aged veteran was in town and seemed disoriented. He had wandered away from a VA. The local Red Cross fund at the First Bank and Trust of Clarendon was tapped to put him on a bus and send him back. Another time, a soldier and his young wife were traveling on furlough when their car broke down in Clarendon. Funds were

taken from the account to bus them to where they were headed, taking their car as collateral. Of course, phone calls stating an emergency or crisis at home that would require the presence of a serviceman are also handled. Schedule July 8 & 9 for this important meeting.

The whole story of the Donut Hole

Jo Pyeatt, pronounced "pyre", has cleaned, painted and redecorated and turned the little pink Dream Donut Shop into a yellow and white donut heaven! She tumbles out of her bed to get into the shop at the wee hours of the day; by 3:30 a.m. she is churning and turning donut batter and frostings to prepare for the very busy days she has grown accustomed to since opening three weeks ago.

"I don't worry much because the sheriff's department is real good about checking on me as they change shifts every day," Jo said with a dab of flour on her chin and her hands full of dough.

Jo lived in Clarendon about 20 years ago and has found many changes but the people are still friendly and helpful. She has lived in Amarillo since 1948. Jo has NEVER had any dealing with donuts other than from the consumer end.

Clyde Smith, Andy Schultz's son-in-law, taught her all she knows about the business.

"I never would have gone into it if I'd known what it meant," Jo joked. "We were really a bunch of Greenhorns from the word 'go'" she laughed. "We" is her daughters Dona Goss from Clarendon and Jackie Marcum in Amarillo. Jody McAfee has been a strong right-hand helper as well. It took all of them to clean up, learn the trade and "We were so very slow in the beginning, that it took us a long time to mix up the donuts," Jo said. "But we're alot faster now and so we don't run out nearly as much. We sure do appreciate the patience everyone gave us in the beginning when we were just learning."

It wasn't patience as much as greed! People stuff donuts in their mouths at the counter, and order more and come back, sometimes twice a day. "We sometimes take day-olds up to the Day Care center so that the donuts don't go to waste and maybe we can get the kids hooked on donuts so they'll bring their parents in." About that time, a lady came in and asked for donuts because she had promised her kids donuts before they went to Amarillo, so Jo's ploy seems to be working!

Jo didn't start in Amarillo because "there are too many donut shops, it cost too much to open one and it was too

dangerous," she said. The logical place was Clarendon.

Janet Risley has helped a good deal part time and Dona Goss has worked pretty hard at getting up to help out in the shop. "I don't get paid, so Mother gets what she pays for, I don't get here at the crack of dawn like she does," Dona said as she simultaneously stuffed a sack full of donuts, rang up the charge on the cash register, and popped a donut hole into her mouth.

In addition to that kind of quality work, Jo's three grandchildren like to come help out as often as they can, too. They help keep day-old donuts to a minimum. The hours are from 5:30 a.m. until noon. Jo thanks everyone for their support and invites everyone in for milk, a soda pop, cup of coffee, juice and, of course... DONUTS!

Blister Beetles

Blister beetles can be a serious problem to different classes of livestock, but their toxicity is most severe in horses, notes an entomologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A & M University System. Blister Beetle poisoning in horses is manifested as a severe colic. The toxic chemical produced in the beetle causes severe blistering of the mucus lining of the animal's digestive tract and other internal tissues. A horse that eats two to five beetles, usually in hay, can die within 12 to 24 hours. So producers should check fields for the beetles before cutting hay.

This particular crew is part of "spread #1" which is only 106 miles of the 370 mile line running from Briscoe to Monahans, the total line. The Red River Gas Pipeline Corp. is the owner of the line which crosses the Red River four times in its long stretch.

The line began March 15 in our area as the right of way was begun, this is the hardest part since the line crosses some tough country in the Palo Duro Canyon area. The actual welding of the line began May 5. There are four different unions employed on this particular job.

Wright's company, H & M put in a bid for the job, then they contracted with the unions and hired some of the crew from previous jobs. Most of these men have not worked together, but hire out from their unions. Wright has been with the company for years. He comes from New Jersey. "That's what my drivers license says, but I

haven't been there for so long I'm not sure," Wright says. He has been on the road for three years. "I'm valuable to the company because I don't have a family and I can travel around like this. It's hard on a family to travel like this."

Although the pipeline will be completed around the first of August, there will be some members of the crew remaining in the area to wind up the loose ends of the job.

"The company has made heavy use of the lumber and hardware stores," Wright said. "We use the auto supply stores and the families will really depend on the grocery and other types of stores. But our company deals with local merchants. We have an extremely large payroll each week that gets spent locally," Wright said.

"If anyone has any questions or problems, please come by and contact me," Keith Wright invited. He doesn't have a telephone at the time of the press, but he will have one soon.

If you feel like you need your blood pressure taken on days that aren't the regular blood pressure Mondays, just ask Mrs. Mills, she can do it and will be delighted to help you out. Don't wait if you are concerned about your blood pressure.

Mesquite control

Mesquite and other brush can best be controlled with herbicides in spring and early summer when soil moisture is favorable and the brush is making rapid growth.

Broadcast application of liquid herbicides is probably the most popular method of brush control.

Mesquite is best controlled after the leaves have fully extended and have turned from light to dark green. Other brush species may be sprayed during the fall.

Herbicides are most effective when the plants are growing fastest. This occurs when the rain and soil temperature are at optimum levels.

Pellet herbicides need moisture to dissolve and move into the root zone.

Pelleted herbicides are generally applied in late winter and early spring to take advantage of spring rains. They work well on several species of oak, winged elm, whitebrush,

Macartney rose, pricklypear and redberry juniper.

Once herbicides are applied, ranchers should follow a good grazing management program. A three-month deferment from grazing is suggested, after treating with a liquid herbicide and deferment during the growing season after using a pelleted herbicide.

Keeping livestock off of those areas will help grass seedlings to become established and regain vigor.

A factor in some of the diving fatalities was the lack of strong swimmers nearby to pull the stunned or injured diver from the water. Inexperienced divers often hit the water at an angle or with legs and arms extended out from them, which increases chances of injury.

Lack of sufficient water depth, or submerged objects such as rocks and stumps also are hazards for the unwary diver.

Also, alcohol consumed to brace up the diver's courage can be a definite minus factor upon hitting the water.

Let's practice safe swimming tactics this summer and keep our lake record of drownings down to the current four since the lake has been a lake.

Local Ambulance receive license

On May 27, 1982, both Clarendon ambulances were inspected by Mr. Mike Lindsley, Regional Field Supervisor for the Texas Department of Health. This inspection is done annually in order to determine the adequacy of equipment and adequacy of the training of personnel, on every ambulance in the state.

This year, Clarendon was the first town in the Texas Panhandle to receive an inspection. There are 15 items required for issuance of a license to operate an ambulance in Texas. Additionally, there are 11 items which the Texas Department of Health urges ambulances to be equipped with but which are not required. Any ambulance which meets or exceeds this list of items annually is recognized by the Texas Department of Health by being issued a Texas Ambulance Registry Certificate which is displayed on the windshield. This recognizes ambulance services throughout the state dedicated to improving the quality of Emergency Medical Services in their community.

Clarendon has never failed to be issued a license for operation. It has also maintained its registry status on both ambulances ever since they have each been in operation.



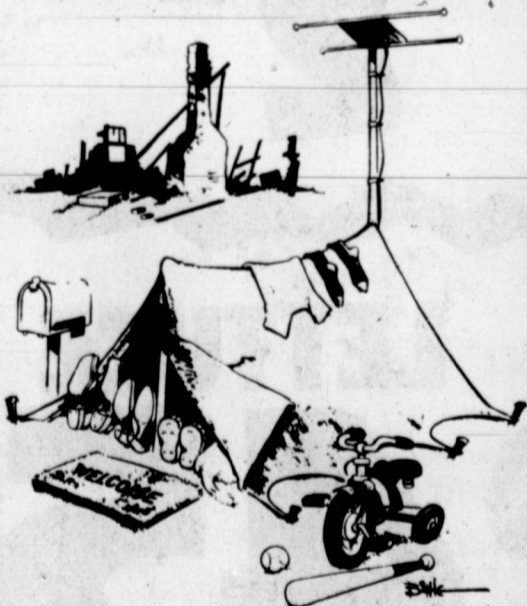

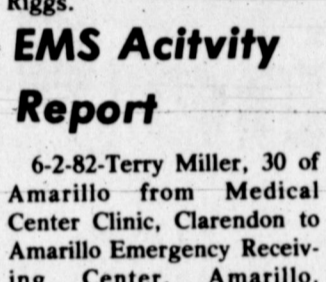
Donley County Historical Survey Commission will erect this oblique on the court house square. It will be opened in the year 2000.
