Patrons often request their "heart medicine" when having prescriptions refill: ed. There are -many different types of medicines used in heart disease and, hence, there are many differeft "heart medicines". Here are a few common types:
*DIGITALIS GLYCOSIDES-These are used in heart failure to slow the heart rate and improve the pumping- of blood. Examples are digoxin, digitoxin, and digitalis leaf.
*ANTIARRHYTHMICS-When the heart does not "'beat"- in a regular rhythm, an arrhythmia is said to exist. Antiarrhymics help regulate an irregular heart beating action. Drugs used for this purpose include propranolol, quinidine, and procainamide.
*NITRATES-These drugs are-used to prevent and relieve the pain ssociated with angina...a characteristic pain in the chest. Isosorbide dinitrate and nitroglycerin are frequently used in angina.
*ANTICOAGULANTS-Although the "blood thinners" have other uses, they are also used in heart disease to prevent clots from forming in the vessels of the heart. Sodium warfarin is a commonly dispensed anticoagulant.
