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

Approximately 75 counties in Texas, New Mexico and Oklahoma were approved for a special Disaster Payment Program for all 1982 program crops on farms that signed up in the 1982 program. Payments will be made on weat, grain sorghum and corn participating farms that produces less thant 75% of the farm yield. Payment ates will be \$1.75 bu. for wheat, 15c bu. for barley and corn, 18c bu. for grain sorghum and 20.5 c lb on cotton.

If you have had losses in excess of 40% of your farm's established yeild for wheat or if you have lost grain sorghum or cotton you should file a low yeild payment request now. The final date to file a low yield request on wheat will be August 18th.

favorite combinations. So, the next time you put a salad together, instead of lettuce, tomato and whatever, why not let your food take you on a visit?



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protein which is extracted from raw kidney beans. The protein in each tablet attaches to the amylase enzyme and reportedly prevents the absorption of up to 400 calories of starch. Starches are found in such foods as potatoes, corn, beans, bread, peas, cereal, rice, spaghetti, macaroni, and tapioca.

Some controversy exists regarding the safety and efficacy of these tablets. Unfortunately, they do not work against non-starch carbohydrates such as sugar. The protein must be carefully extracted from the kidney bean for them to be effective. Other concerns over the use of these tablets inlcude possible increases in absorption of cholesterol_and fat, as well as changes in blood clotting.

Burning Acreage for Management

Controlled burning, when done properly and in conjunction with other management programs can be a productive method for improving range conditions for wildlife and livestock.

Bill Armstrong, a wildlife biologist at the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department's Kerr Wildlife Management Area has been studying the effects of controlled burns on portions of the 6,500 acre area during the past four years.

The advantages gained from proper burning are many, Armstrong said. "Burning helps to control brush and remove old growth and afterward the regrowth of plants is of higher nutritional quality. Burning also makes nitrogen and phosphorus available to the soil." "Many plants evolved

with fire, and they actually benefit from it," Armstrong explained. "It is just as much of a natural revitalizing factor for plants as rain and sunshine."

There are several important factors to consider before attempting a burn, Arm-

Drug use impairs driving skills

According to a publication of the National Institute on Drug Abuse, use of any drug, including many overthe-counter medications, has the potential to seriously affect driving ability. The practice of taking more than one drug, or mixing drugs and alcohol, can be especially dangerous.

The institute warns that driving skills of different individuals can be affected in varying degrees by the same drug. As with alcohol, the driver's weight and emotional state, the amount of the drug and when it was taken all influence the driver's ability to size up an emergency situation or to judge relative speed.

"Burning is just one tool to use in wildlife and range management," said Armstrong, "but it may be one which has not been used in many areas where it would be extremely beneficial."

TV and Your Child Tips From TSTA

The Texas State **Teachers Association**partners in your child's education—examines the effect of television on children. Here is Part II, of a four part series on the subject:

TV Can Be A **Family Affair**

Have you asked yourself, "What can I do to keep TV from having a harmful effect on my kids?" Try some of these tips which could help you solve the problem.

Watch television with your children. Help them to select the right programs by checking the TV listings in advance. Look for programs that are fair in their treatment of people or programs that are not violent or too sophisticated in content.

Plan with children what shows they can watch-whether you are home or away. Be aware that public television has special programming and that commercial TV produces many excellent shows especially geared to children.

Insist on a limit to TV time. Discuss what's "real" and what's "unreal" on TV and in life. Talk about how violence can be harmful-real people hurt when injured.

Provide adequate light in the television area and watch for tiredness.

listlessness, glassy eyes, trance-like statessigns of poor health or too much television. Discuss ways pro-

blems might have been solved other than the way they were presented in the TV story.

Turn off the assaults. attacks, and uproars when they appear on your television set. Youngsters need a friendly atmosphere at home without a lot of unnecessary noise or violence.

Correct any language errors your child may hear on television. Unfortunately, there are mistakes on TV. Why not have fun finding them together?

Make meals a family event-don't eat in front of the TV set. Select food carefully-not what a TV character urges kids to eat. Don't let TV turn

your child into the family shopper. Parents should take final responsibility for selecting foods, clothing, toys, etc. When children see things on TV, they may enter a "gimme-get me" stage.

Don't give in to demands for junk foods just because children ask for them after they've'seen them on TV.

Use TV to widen your child's horizons and to help the family become closer as you watch programs together.

The Right Tool

Every craftsman knows that having the right tool at the right time is the key to success. The same stands true when it comes to military airlift. Having the right airplane at the right time can mean the difference between success and failure during emergency military operations.

The demanding job of airlifting vital military equipment around the world falls on the strong shoulders of the Military Airlift Command (MAC). To support America's fighting men in the far off corners of the world, MAC must quickly and efficiently airlift tons and tons of supplies and equipment including large items such as tanks and helicopters.

A tremendous shortfall in this nation's outsize/oversize airlift capability, identified by the Congressionally Mandated Mobility Study, already has MAC working under great pressure.

To meet that tremendous shortfall the Air Force has asked for 50 new C-5 aircraft. The C-5 has proven its readiness in peacetime and in wartime actions such as iet Nam and Israel. It has performed these airlift tasks for more than ten years by delivering the U.S. Army's equipment to bases and substandard airfields around the world. Because of reduction in passenger traffic, numerous large commercial aircraft, many owned by foreign airlines, are sitting unused. They are being offered to MAC. But, commercial airplanes are designed to carry passengens. Substitution of commercial aircraft to attempt to do the job only the C-5 can handle would be use of the wrong tool. While seemingly attractive economically, it would be a blatant case of penny wise and pound foolish. The U.S. Air Force must have a force of military airlifters, designed for the combat environment. The unique features of the military airlifter have been developed over decades of Air Force combat experience. The C-5 offers the critical advantages of flexibility and loadability. Unlike commercial airlifters, it has a heavyduty cargo floor and built-in ramps to permit vehicles to drive on and off quickly. And it has two large openings eliminating time wasted in dismantling and then re-assembling quickly needed equipment. Also, it has inflight refueling capabilities to avoid time consuming stops enroute. When it arrives at a combat zone it doesn't need sophisticated ground support equipment. And it doesn't need extra length and strength concrete runways required by commercial aircraft.

Senior division contestants will be racing to win a share of \$10,000 in college scholarships, including a \$5,000 award going to the senior All-American Champ.


Beware of Hot

Weather

Use common sense and do not exercise in the hot, humid weather without gradually acclimatizing your body, advises James P. Knochel M.D., of Dallas, an AHA volunteer and expert on heat injuries. Dr. Knochel is especially alarmed about the people he sees jogging on hot days in plastic sweat suits: 'That's crazy! People have been killed in those suits because they could not vaporize their sweat."

High humidity also prevents adequate vaporization of sweat, which cools the body. Unless you are fully acclimatized, you should not do anything strenuous during the middle of the day when the temperature is above 90 degrees and the humidity is above 40 percent, says Dr. Knochel. "Even a welltrained, acclimatized person can only jog safely for approximately 15 minutes at that temperature and humidity. On hot, humid days, exercise in the early morning

CATCHIN' COUNTRY CATFISH

Catfish, sometimes called chicken of the channel, are common and widespread, bite when other fish won't, reach super sizes and above all, are incredibly tasty. Available to most folks, their nutritional goodness can become an important part of anyone's diet.

Like to try catfishing? Get up bright and early one morning and head for the nearest river, lake, or farm pond. Nighttime will also produce good results. In fact. "cats" can be caught at all times of the day, at all water temperatures and depths. The best time to plan your expedition, however, is after a heavy rain .. especially in the spring. When other fairweather fish are sluggish and temperamental. the hungry catfish forage about in the reshly rejuvenated waters.



Some people prefer an old-fashioned baitcasting rod and reel but almost any type of ar-

rangement-from Grandma's cane pole to a fancy spinning rig-will catch a catfish. Use a small-to-medium-size hook and a sinker that's heavy enough to keep your bait on the bottom, in cat territory. The weight needed to do this will vary depending on water conditions

Most conceivable baits will entice these tasty critters, but garden worms are the old standby. (Just don't take too many out of the vegetable patch!) Cast a generous bait to the bottom, and wait for the slow, deliberate tugging which signals that a catfish is biting. Above all, be patient!

If the water you've chosen to fish is muddy, sluggish or still, you're very likely to catch a bullhead (a member of the catfish family that grows to no more than 20 inches long and 4-1/2 pounds in weight). All of the three common color phases of the bullhead -black, brown, and yellow-have pink meat that's sweet and fine. Faster, clearer water will generally turn up nice channel and blue cats tespecially from that little pool beneath a steady current where natural nutrients abound). The variety really doesn't matter, however, because all catfish are readily distinguishable from other fish (by the "whiskers" or barbs that grow out of their upper jaws, and the skin-instead of scales-on their bodies) and all are among the finest feasting anywhere.

Once you've landed your eating-size fish leight inches and upt. you're faced with the procedure of dressing it out. No problem. First, grip the critter so that its three protruding fin spines are firmly extended between your fingers. Beware of those spikes .. they can easily inflict a painful, long-lasting wound! Next-with a sharp knife-

cut a shallow ring about the fish's neck, immediately behind the gill openings.


Since all catfish are scaleless they must be completely skinned . . . but the operation is actually pretty easy. Grasp the edge of your incision with a handy pair of pliers and simply peel the skin down banana style. Then remove the head, fins, tail, and entrails so that you're left with a large piece of meat that is ready to be washed, cooked, and eaten. (Incidentally, the above system works for other scaleless fish and rattlesnakes!)

How will you cook your catfish? There are probably about a million ways, all of them good, so just look in your favorite cookbook and get ready for

AUSTIN - In the past ten years, the population of Texas has increased about 27 percent. That's a lot. In the same period of time, the crime rate in keeping people out of jail. Texas has increased about 90 percent. That's too much. We must stop this First, there is no certainty increase.

Last week we talked about how we need more discipline in our criminal justice system to show young people and older criminals we mean business. Here are a few examples of what we should do.

For one thing, we must allow our schoolteachers and administrators to administer quick and fair punishment. "Spare the rod and spoil the child" is as true today as it was in **Biblical times.** Of course, not all children

will respond to this treatment. Some will end up in the custody of the Texas Youth Council, the state agency in charge of juvenile delinquents. Here again, TYC needs more power to discipline these youngsters. They need quick, certain, fair and humane punishment for their wrongdoings. We heard testimony at our meeting of the Committee on the Criminal Justice System of Texas from a well-known criminal defense lawyer. He said he was fed up with seeing young men come into his office after committing a crime such as burglary or car theft, only to see them get probation He said these young

people commit crime: against people's property and then know they will get probation two or three times before they go to jail. "This is wrong. What we

need to do is put them in jail - maybe not for forty years, but for 60 or 90 days. We need to create a situation where they know they will be punished, even if the punishment is not too severe," he said.

Remember, this call for punishment came from a man who makes his living We think the lawyer really was saying two things. punishment today.

from you about how to Second, it would be more effective to make sure every criminal is punished, lightly perhaps, than to gamble with the system we have now.

The system we have now is a gamble. Stealing a car can get a criminal 10 years in prison and a \$5,000 fine. but it probably won't. More likely, the accused will be arrested and released. From arrest to the end of the appeal process will take about four years. Then the criminal might go to jail, or he might get probation. Anyone who has ever had a child or a puppy knows four years is not the way. We must send a clear signal to children, juveniles and adults - if you break the rules, you will be punished We don't need to spen \$10,000 a year to house first offender for 10 year in prison, but we need t bust them fast and sure. W need to show them we mea business.


