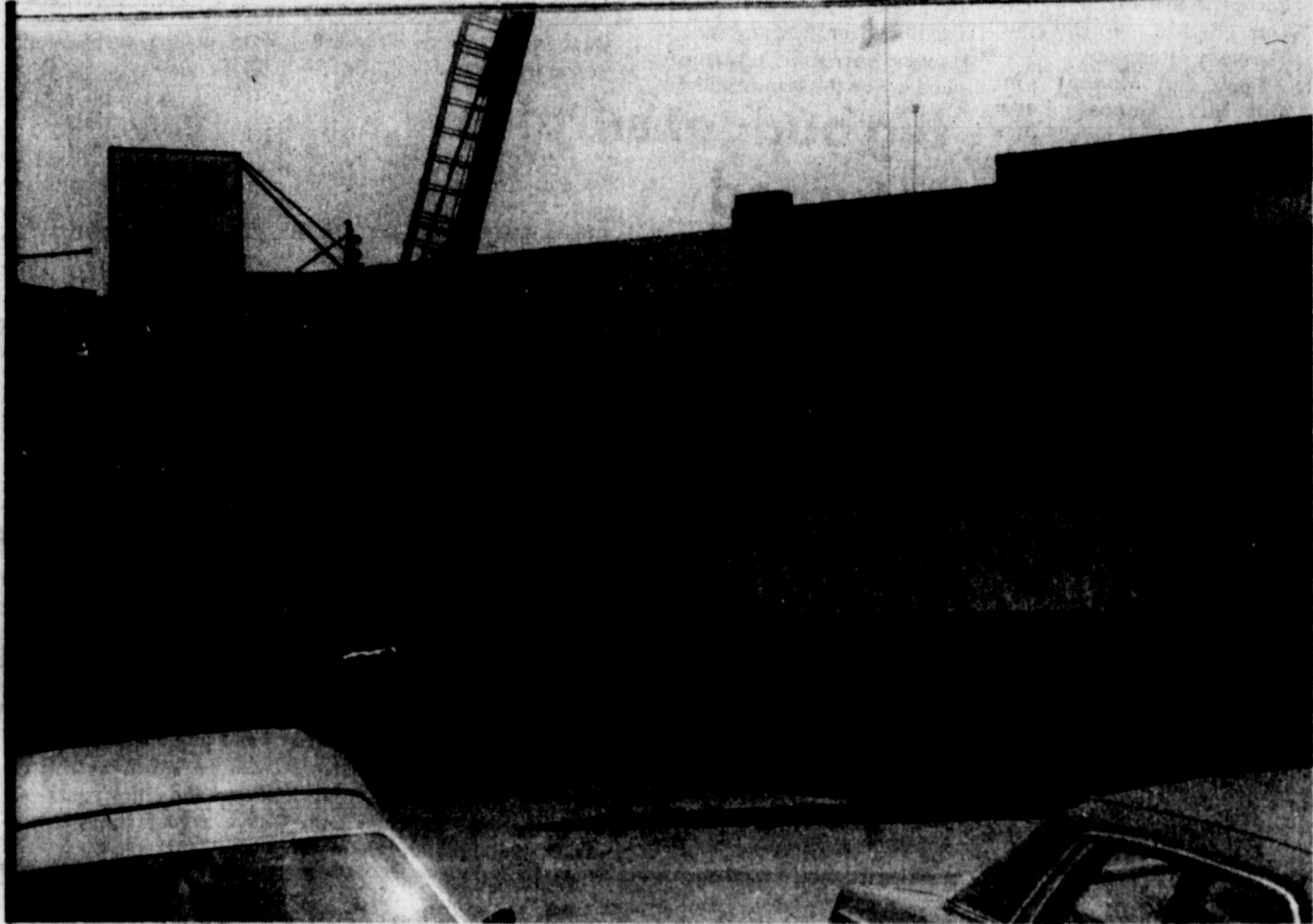

## Uniforms spruce up Bronco band

New uniforms from a Missouri Uniform company have finally arrived after many years of anticipation and savings to deck the Bronco Band members out in maroon and white splendor! The School Board has set aside \$2,000 annually for the purpose of purchasing new uniforms for the band. Last year, Mr. Ron Boley presented several styles to the Bronco Band Boosters to choose the two styles that will represent Clarendon High in concert and on the football field.

The concert style features a short formal jacket with black bow tie and white shirt. The Marching Band style features a very unique busbee type hat with chin strap, an over-lay jacket with a high collar. Shoes for both styles will be white oxford type shoes.

Uniforms will be checked out to the students and will be their sole responsibility throughout the school year. Students must keep the uniforms clean and in good repair so that when they are returned at the end of the year, they will be ready for storage and ready for the following year's use.

"Uniforms should last 8 years or so if they are properly taken care of," Boley said.

There are 65 of the uniforms and hopefully all will be filled this year. They are made of 50% wool and 50% polyester material with the over-lay in 100% polyester. "This is the first time we have tried this type of material," Boley said.

Uniforms will set aside the Clarendon Bronco band as something special.

## Your car is taxable

All automobile owners may not have received a notice of appraised value. This does not mean that they are exempt from local property tax. Anyone residing within Donley County should pay tax here on all their taxable personal property. Not receiving an appraisal notice does NOT exempt them.

Automobiles are valued according to the Automobile Dealers Assn. price guide ("blue book") by make, model, age, etc. for tax purposes. Any questions about your personal property tax should be directed to the Donley Appraisal District office in the Court House Annex.

## 4-H recordbook judging

Clarendon 4-H'ers entered the Panhandle District Recordbook judging, held July 30 in Amarillo.

All junior recordbooks at district level receive either red, blue or white ribbons and are not placed. Senior recordbooks are placed and only the first place winner can advance to the state contest. There was a total of 85 senior recordbooks entered in the contest.

Virginia Clifford won second place in the Horse category against four other contestants and will be the alternate to the State Contest.

Richard Richardson competed in the beef category but did not place.

The following junior 4-H ribbon winners were: Lesia Fuston (Beef-blue), Lee Smith (Horse-blue), Christina Leathers, (Dairy foods-blue) Kari Shields (Fashion Revue-blue) and Deniece Richardson (Clothing-red).

Only one recordbook per category for each county can advance to district. Other 4-H'ers that competed at the county level were Shane Hall (Horse) and Katrina Leathers (clothing).

## Hearn plays Greenbelt bowl

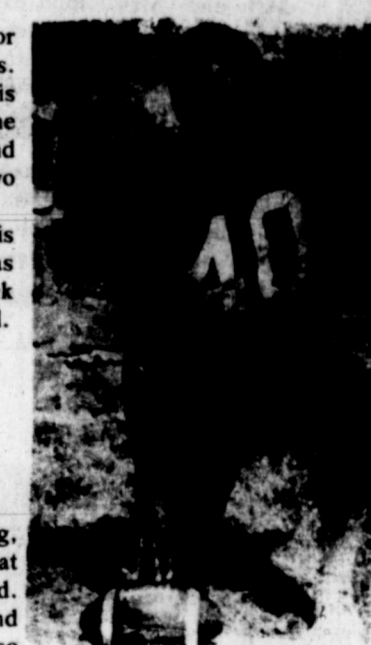
Hosea Hearn, Clarendon High's outstanding fullback, played in the 33rd Annual Greenbelt Bowl Football Classic in Childress Friday, August 6th. The All-Star contest is designed to give each player further opportunity to impress college football scouts in hopes of earning scholarships to some university.

Hearn played on the East team coached by Don Carthel of Lubbock Christian College. Carthel has won a majority of battles in recent years but lost that winning streak with a 16-10 defeat by the West Team coached by Rick Lawrence of Panhandle State University in Goodwell, OK.

Hearn galloped 28 yards to the West 4th yard line on a fourth and two situation. Hearn led all East rushers with 80 yards on 12 carries for a good game.

Hosea was a big part of a balanced Bronco attack that produced 51 TD's and over 4,000 yards of offense in the Bronco games last year. He was outstanding in the Bronco Bi-District win over Panhandle as he rushed for 303 yards and 4 touchdowns. He was a Bronco captain this year and was named to the All-District Offensive and defensive teams for two consecutive years.

Hearn will continue his efforts with Coach Carthel as he enrolls at Lubbock Christian College in the fall.

## Crop Disaster program

Approximately 75 counties in Texas, New Mexico and Oklahoma were approved for a special Disaster Payment Program for all 1982 program crops on farms that signed up in the 1982 program. Payments will be made on wheat, grain sorghum and corn participating farms that produces less than 75% of the farm yield. Payment rates will be \$1.75 bu. for wheat, 15c bu. for barley and corn, 18c bu. for grain sorghum and 20.5c lb on cotton.

If you have had losses in excess of 40% of your farm's established yield for wheat or if you have lost grain sorghum or cotton you should file a low yield payment request now. The final date to file a low yield request on wheat will be August 18th. The special disaster program also includes provisions for prevented planting payments if you were unable to plant your program crop acreage.

**Conservation Use Acreage - Set Aside**  
 Producers are reminded that acreages designated for conservation use must be maintained throughout the crop year. Harvesting any cover crop for hay is prohibited and grazing will not be permitted until after August 31st.

**1983 Wheat Program**  
 The details of the 1983 wheat program have been announced as follows:

- To participate in the program, you must reduce your planted acres by 20% from your wheat base.
- Wheat bases will be unchanged for 1983 on participating farms or farms that reported a zero planted acres for 1982. For farms that did not participate in the 1982 program, bases will be the average of 1981 and 1982 acreage for wheat for grain planted those two years.
- The target price as been set at \$4.30 bu. and the loan rates have been set at \$3.55 bu. for regular loans and \$4.00 bu for reserve loans.
- Notice of base acreage will be mailed to producers around the 1st of September and sign up will begin September 7, 1982.

## Christal requests disaster assistance

County Judge Billie Christal requested disaster assistance for farmers in the county from the office of the governor last week. Governor Clements replied that area farmers must contact the local ASCS office to obtain information concerning other assistance measures available under the announced program.

Governor Clements assured Judge Christal that he would request that the Secretary of Agriculture Block designate Donley County as a disaster area for the purpose of making Farmers Home Administration emergency loans available for farmers suffering physical and economic losses.

**Big budget surplus returned**

State Comptroller Bob Bullock unveiled the biggest budget surplus in Texas history Thursday, but warned "there are thorns among the roses."

The record \$1.3 billion budget surplus will mean the Legislature will have \$5.1 billion available for spending in January 1983, over and above what was available in January 1981.

"This surplus is the result of the good times we have had," Bullock said in a capitol press conference. But the Comptroller cautioned Texas that "the growth we are predicting today is substantially less than we have seen in the past 10 years."

## Heat's On

Chase away midweek blues with a special salad. Midweek is the perfect time for a luncheon get-together. This Golden Gate Salad recipe from Kraft is a cool idea to delight the taste buds as well as the eye.

- 1 12 oz pkg frozen shrimp, cooked
- 2 C sliced, fresh mushrooms
- 1 green pepper, cut in strips

### COLD PASTA SALAD

- 1 lb vermicelli
- 2 apples, chopped with peel
- 2 green peppers cut into julienne strips
- 1/2 C chopped walnuts
- 1/2 C chopped parsley
- 1/2 C raisins, plumped
- 1 herb (basil, mint, tarragon) crumbled
- 1 C special salad dressing

Cook vermicelli til done. Drain and stir in 1 or 2 drops olive oil, refrigerate. Next day stir in remaining ingredients.

- 1 C red wine vinegar
- 1 C V-8 juice
- 1 TBS Dijon mustard
- 1 TBS Worcestershire sauce
- 1 tsp honey
- 1 herb, crumbled

Before going to the ramp, prepare your boat for launching. Raise the lower unit of your outboard. Put in the drain plug. Release the tie-downs. Disconnect trailer lights. Ask about the degree of ramp drop-off and check to make sure there are no hazards.

When launching, don't turn off your car engine. Keep the trailer parking brake set, and place a tire stop behind your wheels for extra caution. Make sure someone on shore has a line that is made fast to the boat.

As soon as your boat has been launched, move your auto to the parking lot to make room for the next boat and trailer.

### Summer Salad Savvy

Summertime is salad time. With all the variety of vegetables and fruits that are available, salads are a great way to pick up wilting appetites — and an easy way to add special flair to any menu.

For example, each region of the country has its own favorite combinations. So, the next time you put a salad together, instead of lettuce, tomato and whatever, why not let your food take you on a visit?

East Coast salads show the influence of European cuisine, especially French and Italian. The result — pasta salad, a colorful, economical meal-in-a-bowl. Simply toss chilled, cooked pasta with a combination of colorful raw or parboiled vegetables like zucchini and broccoli. Add olives, cheese and shrimp or flaked fish. Top with Italian style croutons, like Salad Crispins, and serve with oil and vinegar.

Southern salads, like Summer Waldorf Rice Salad, combine sugar and spice and everything nice. Mix whipped

topping, sugar and mayonnaise together with celery, apples, raisins and peanuts. Fold into chilled rice and serve.

For a hearty Midwest salad, try German Potato Salad or Kidney Bean Salad. As you might expect from the great rangeland, they're both excellent accompaniments to an outdoor barbecue. To make the bean salad, combine canned red kidney beans, apples, celery and sweet gherkins with mayonnaise. For extra zip, add a touch of cider vinegar.

In Western salads, the sky's the limit. The use of avocados, artichokes, crab, peaches, pineapple and tacos was pioneered by California cooks. For example, use a taco shell for your salad "bowl." Add shredded beef and lettuce, onions, cheese, egg, tomato and avocado. Top with sour cream, black olives and American style croutons. Ole!

The real key to any salad's success is to have absolutely fresh vegetables and fruits, along with a good imagination. Mix well, add a sense of adventure and enjoy!

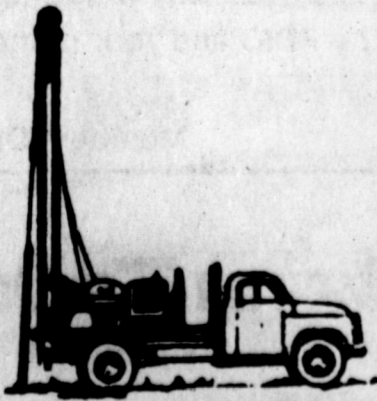

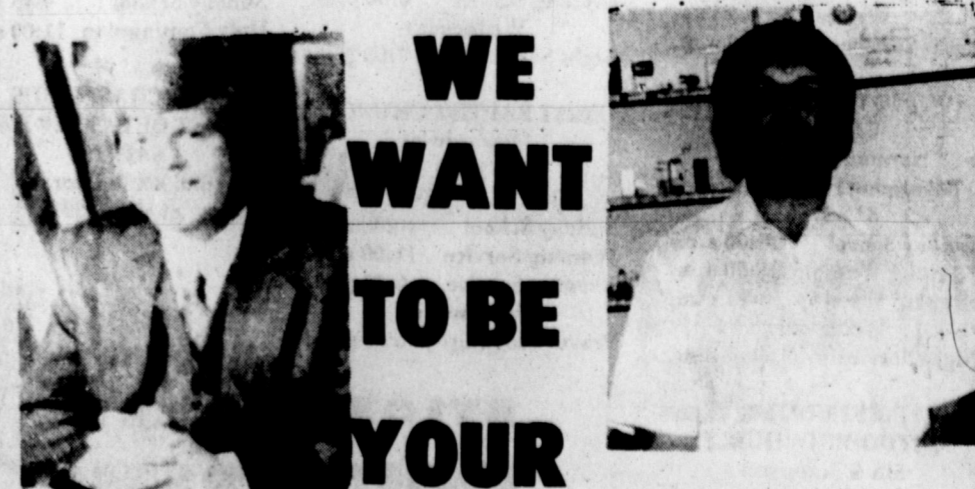

### STARCH STOPPERS

A recently introduced product in the health food market offers weight-conscious Americans the possibility of "having their cake and eating it, too". Commonly known as "Starch Stoppers," these tablets claim to promote weight reduction by inhibiting the action of an enzyme called **amylase**. The enzyme is responsible for the digestion of starch to smaller, more absorbable carbohydrates.

The active component of these tablets is a protein which is extracted from raw kidney beans. The protein in each tablet attaches to the amylase enzyme and reportedly prevents the absorption of up to 400 calories of starch. Starches are found in such foods as potatoes, corn, beans, bread, peas, cereal, rice, spaghetti, macaroni, and tapioca.

Some controversy exists regarding the safety and efficacy of these tablets. Unfortunately, they do not work against non-starch carbohydrates such as sugar. The protein must be carefully extracted from the kidney bean for them to be effective. Other concerns over the use of these tablets include possible increases in absorption of cholesterol and fat, as well as changes in blood clotting.

## TV and Your Child Tips From TSTA

The Texas State Teachers Association partners in your child's education—examines the effect of television on children. Here is Part II, of a four part series on the subject:

### TV Can Be A Family Affair

Have you asked yourself, "What can I do to keep TV from having a harmful effect on my kids?" Try some of these tips which could help you solve the problem.

Watch television with your children. Help them to select the right programs by checking the TV listings in advance. Look for programs that are fair in their treatment of people or programs that are not violent or too sophisticated in content. Plan with children what shows they can watch—whether you are home or away. Be aware that public television has special programming and that commercial TV produces many excellent shows especially geared to children.

Insist on a limit to TV time. Discuss what's "real" and what's "unreal" on TV and in life. Talk about how violence can be harmful—real people hurt when injured.

Provide adequate light in the television area and watch for tiredness.

listlessness, glassy eyes, trance-like states—signs of poor health or too much television.

Discuss ways problems might have been solved other than the way they were presented in the TV story.

Turn off the assaults, attacks, and uproars when they appear on your television set. Youngsters need a friendly atmosphere at home without a lot of unnecessary noise or violence.

Correct any language errors your child may hear on television. Unfortunately, there are mistakes on TV. Why not have fun finding them together?

Make meals a family event—don't eat in front of the TV set. Select food carefully—not what a TV character urges kids to eat. Don't let TV turn your child into the family shopper. Parents should take final responsibility for selecting foods, clothing, toys, etc. When children see things on TV, they may enter a "gimme-get me" stage. Don't give in to demands for junk foods just because children ask for them after they've seen them on TV.

Use TV to widen your child's horizons and to help the family become closer as you watch programs together.

### High Medical Malpractice Premiums Are A Rip-Off To Doctors And Consumers

During the artificial medical malpractice "crisis" of the middle 1970's, most insurance companies based tremendous increases in premiums charged to the medical profession upon dire predictions for the late 1970's and the 1980's.

These high medical malpractice insurance premiums for doctors added to the escalating health care costs at the time. Today, by use of 20/20 hindsight, we know that the predictions of the insurance companies were unsound and based upon assumptions not supported by fact.

The reports of the insurance companies themselves as well as independent authorities indicate that there has been no dramatic increase in the number of medical malpractice cases or in the losses paid by the insurance carriers as a result of them. Despite the fact that the insurance companies did not have to pay out huge sums predicted for medical malpractice lawsuits, there has been no general rollback of insurance premium levels. In fact, in some areas of the U.S. some insurance companies are still attempting to rip-off the

medical profession and the public further by again raising medical malpractice insurance premiums.

The rip-off has become so blatant that some groups of doctors have rebelled. Recently the Southern California Physicians Council sued their malpractice insurance carrier for the return of some of their high premiums paid to the carrier. The case ended in a settlement with the Physicians Council having received \$18 million of an expected \$56 million in premium refunds.

It should be pointed out that although medical malpractice insurance premiums are only about one percent of the total premiums for property and casualty insurance, they supply five percent of the total reserves and thus five percent of the entire investment income for the insurance industry. This can only be true because the insurance carriers are paying out a much lower percentage in actual losses, thus leaving more premium income for investment.

The trial bar and the medical profession must join in exposing these insurance premium rip-offs. The insurance companies should return the excessive medical malpractice insurance premiums already collected and reduce further premiums to a reasonable level.

This will help to ultimately reduce needlessly high health care cost to consumers.

### The Right Tool

Every craftsman knows that having the right tool at the right time is the key to success. The same stands true when it comes to military airlift. Having the right airplane at the right time can mean the difference between success and failure during emergency military operations.

The demanding job of airlifting vital military equipment around the world falls on the strong shoulders of the Military Airlift Command (MAC). To support America's fighting men in the far off corners of the world, MAC must quickly and efficiently airlift tons and tons of supplies and equipment including large items such as tanks and helicopters.

A tremendous shortfall in this nation's outside/over-size airlift capability, identified by the Congressionally Mandated Mobility Study, already has MAC working under great pressure.

To meet that tremendous shortfall the Air Force has asked for 50 new C-5 aircraft. The C-5 has proven its readiness in peacetime and in wartime actions such as Viet Nam and Israel. It has performed these airlift tasks for more than ten years by delivering the U.S. Army's equipment to bases and substandard airfields around the world.

Because of reduction in passenger traffic, numerous large commercial aircraft, many owned by foreign airlines, are sitting unused. They are being offered to MAC. But, commercial airplanes are designed to carry passengers. Substitution of commercial aircraft to attempt to do the job only the C-5 can handle would be use of the wrong tool. While seemingly attractive economically, it would be a blatant case of penny wise and pound foolish.

The U.S. Air Force must have a force of military airlifters, designed for the combat environment. The unique features of the military airlifter have been developed over decades of Air Force combat experience. The C-5 offers the critical advantages of flexibility and loadability. Unlike commercial airlifters, it has a heavy-duty cargo floor and built-in ramps to permit vehicles to drive on and off quickly. And it has two large openings eliminating time wasted in dismantling and then re-assembling quickly needed equipment. Also, it has in-flight refueling capabilities to avoid time consuming stops enroute. When it arrives at a combat zone it doesn't need sophisticated ground support equipment. And it doesn't need extra length and strength concrete runways required by commercial aircraft.

Soap Box Derby racing is in the future for thirteen year old Chris Simmons, son of Marsha Kirk and grandson of Mr. and Mrs. Maxey of Clarendon. Chris recently won the senior division soap box derby race in Amarillo and will compete in the 45th All-American Soap Box Derby Saturday in Akron, Ohio.

Each of the 190 contestants from around the nation will receive a police escort into downtown Akron when the festivities begin. They will stay at Derbytown, a YMCA camp about 15 miles south of the city.

On the morning of the race, contestants will watch entertainment celebrities race in oversized cars.

Senior division contestants will be racing to win a share of \$10,000 in college scholarships, including a \$5,000 award going to the senior All-American Champ.

### Beware of Hot Summer Weather

Use common sense and do not exercise in the hot, humid weather without gradually acclimating your body, advises James P. Knochel, M.D., of Dallas, an AHA volunteer and expert on heat injuries. Dr. Knochel is especially alarmed about the people he sees jogging on hot days in plastic sweat suits: "That's crazy! People have been killed in those suits because they could not vaporize their sweat." High humidity also prevents adequate vaporization of sweat, which cools the body. Unless you are fully acclimated, you should not do anything strenuous during the middle of the day when the temperature is above 90 degrees and the humidity is above 40 percent, says Dr. Knochel. "Even a well-trained, acclimated person can only jog safely for approximately 15 minutes at that temperature and humidity. On hot, humid days, exercise in the early morning and late evening."

#### ADJUST TO HEAT

Your circulatory system plays a key role in controlling body temperature, he explains. When you are hot, the blood vessels under your skin expand so more hot blood comes near the surface where heat is dissipated by sweating. Under these conditions, the heart must work harder.

Help your heart by allowing your circulatory system to adjust to the heat gradually. If you don't, you may begin to feel faint when the large amounts of blood used in the cooling mechanism result in a deficiency of blood in the brain and other important organs.

**SIGNS AND SIGNALS**  
For healthy people, Dr. Knochel recommends drinking extra liquids before, during and after hot weather activity. Those with heart disease, kidney disease, high



### CATCHIN' COUNTRY CATFISH

Catfish, sometimes called chicken of the channel, are common and widespread, bite when other fish won't, reach super sizes... and above all, are incredibly tasty. Available to most folks, their nutritional goodness can become an important part of anyone's diet.



Like to try catfishing? Get up bright and early one morning and head for the nearest river, lake, or farm pond. Nighttime will also produce good results. In fact, "cats" can be caught at all times of the day, at all water temperatures and depths. The best time to plan your expedition, however, is after a heavy rain... especially in the spring. When other fair-weather fish are sluggish and temperamental, the hungry catfish forage about in the freshly rejuvenated waters.

Some people prefer an old-fashioned bait-casting rod and reel but almost any type of arrangement—from Grandma's cane pole to a fancy spinning rig—will catch a catfish. Use a small-to-medium-size hook and a sinker that's heavy enough to keep your bait on the bottom, in cat territory. The weight needed to do this will vary depending on water conditions.

Most conceivable baits will entice these tasty critters, but garden worms are the old standby. (Just don't take too many out of the vegetable patch!) Cast a generous bait to the bottom, and wait for the slow, deliberate tugging which signals that a catfish is biting. Above all, be patient!

If the water you've chosen is muddy, sluggish or still, you're very likely to catch a bullhead (a member of the catfish family that grows to no more than 20 inches long and 4 1/2 pounds in weight). All of the three common color phases of the bullhead—black, brown, and yellow—have pink meat that's sweet and fine. Faster, clearer water will generally turn up nice channel and blue cats (especially from that little pool beneath a steady current where natural nutrients abound). The variety really doesn't matter, however, because all catfish are readily distinguishable from other fish by the "whiskers" or barbels that grow out of their upper jaws, and the skin—instead of scales—on their bodies) and all are among the finest feasting anywhere.

Once you've landed your eating-size fish (eight inches and up, you're faced with the procedure of dressing it out. No problem. First, grip the critter so that its three protruding fin spines are firmly extended between your fingers. Beware of those spikes... they can easily inflict a painful, long-lasting wound! Next—with a sharp knife—cut a shallow ring about the fish's neck, immediately behind the gill openings.

Since all catfish are scaleless they must be completely skinned... but the operation is actually pretty easy. Grasp the edge of your incision with a handy pair of pliers and simply peel the skin down banana style. Then remove the head, fins, tail, and entrails so that you're left with a large piece of meat that is ready to be washed, cooked, and eaten. (Incidentally, the above system works for other scaleless fish and rattle-snakes!)

How will you cook your catfish? There are probably about a million ways, all of them good, so just look in your favorite cookbook and get ready for some good eating!

blood pressure and diabetes must be extremely careful because of the extra load heat places on their circulatory system, he warns. They should see a physician before they work in the heat and before they increase their fluid intake.

Heatstroke occurs when heat accumulates faster than the body can dissipate it by sweating; organs, particularly the brain, are literally cooked. It can occur with or without exertion. Heatstroke victims are usually incoherent or in a coma, have a body temperature above 106 degrees, and have stopped sweating.

Untreated, heatstroke is always fatal, Dr. Knochel says. First aid includes getting

the victim out of the sun, removing clothes, dousing the patient with cold water and ice, and fanning him in an effort to imitate the sweat mechanism. Call an ambulance.

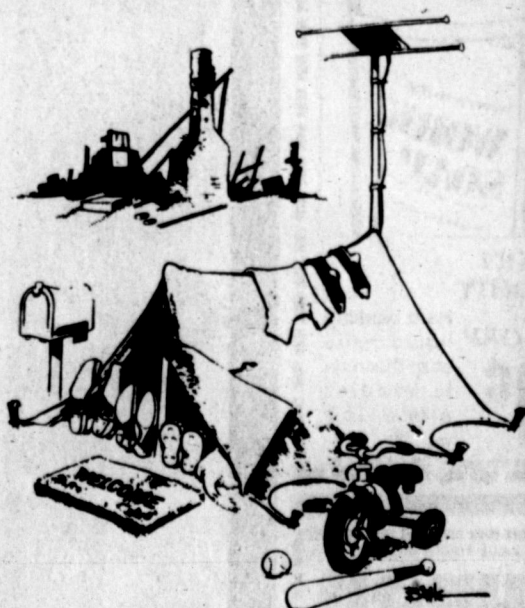

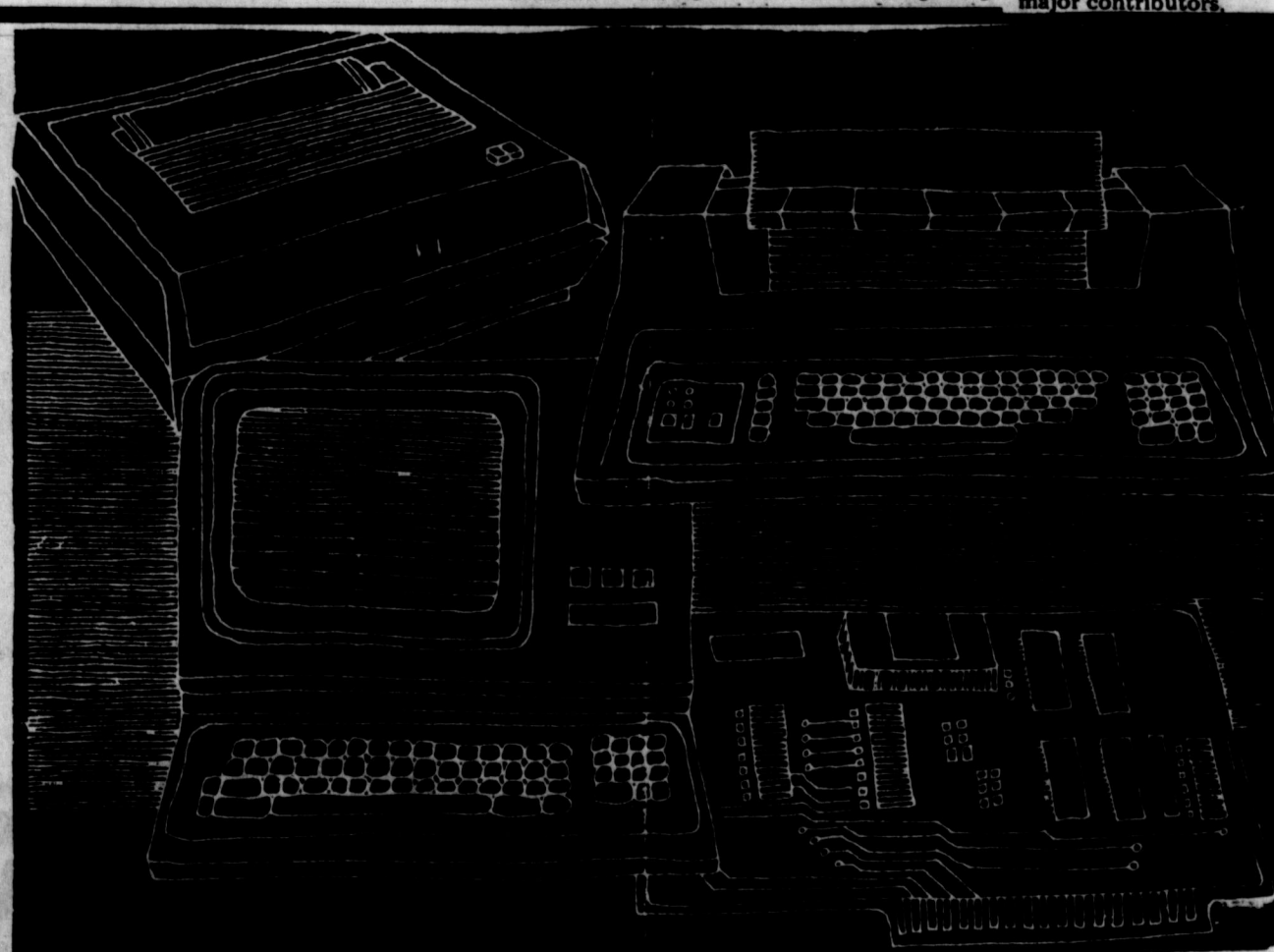

### Senator Sarpalius Reports



AUSTIN - In the past ten years, the population of Texas has increased about 27 percent. That's a lot. In the same period of time, the crime rate in Texas has increased about 90 percent. That's too much. We must stop this increase.

Last week we talked about how we need more discipline in our criminal justice system to show young people and older criminals we mean business. Here are a few examples of what we should do.

For one thing, we must allow our schoolteachers and administrators to administer quick and fair punishment. "Spare the rod and spoil the child" is as true today as it was in Biblical times.

Of course, not all children will respond to this treatment. Some will end up in the custody of the Texas Youth Council, the state agency in charge of juvenile delinquents. Here again, TYC needs more power to discipline these youngsters. They need quick, certain, fair and humane punishment for their wrongdoings.

We heard testimony at our meeting of the Committee on the Criminal Justice System of Texas from a well-known criminal defense lawyer. He said he was fed up with seeing young men come into his office after committing a crime such as burglary or car theft, only to see them get probation.

He said these young people commit crime: against people's property and then know they will get probation two or three times before they go to jail.

"This is wrong. What we need to do is put them in jail - maybe not for forty years, but for 60 or 90 days. We need to create a situation where they know they will be punished, even if the punishment is not too severe," he said.

Remember, this call for punishment came from a man who makes his living keeping people out of jail. We think the lawyer really was saying two things. First, there is no certainty of punishment today.

Second, it would be more effective to make sure every criminal is punished, lightly perhaps, than to gamble with the system we have now.

The system we have now is a gamble. Stealing a car can get a criminal 10 years in prison and a \$5,000 fine, but it probably won't. More likely, the accused will be arrested and released. From arrest to the end of the appeal process will take about four years. Then the criminal might go to jail, or he might get probation.

Anyone who has ever had a child or a puppy knows four years is not the way. We must send a clear signal to children, juveniles and adults - if you break the rules, you will be punished. We don't need to spend \$10,000 a year to house a first offender for 10 years in prison, but we need to bust them fast and sure. We need to show them we mean business.

We know you mean business about crime - we all do. But we want to hear

#### Microwave Frozen Fried Chicken
