Greenbelt Water Authority Has Long, Eventful History

Once A Dream - - Now A Reality

The following is a history of the Greenbelt Municipal and Industrial Water Authority as prepared by C. W. Estlack, editor of the Donley County Leader, and Clarendon Chamber of Commerce committee. It was compiled from the files of the late C. B. "Cap" Morris and the files of the Donley County Leader. It is authentic in every respect.

The Greenbelt Dam five miles north of Clarendon is now complete and is awaiting rain to fall on its watershed to expand its shore line.

The scenery at the dam site has changed considerably from the time some nineteen years ago when several Clarendon and Donley County residents heard that Oklahoma wanted the water rights of Salt Fork of Red River as they had already tied up the North Fork of Red River.

These men, headed at that time by C. B. "Cap" Morris, J. R. Porter, Ray J. Noblitt, W. Carroll Knorpp, presently vice-president of Greenbelt, and W. S. Whaley, Chamber of Commerce Secretary, thought it wise to do something toward nailing down prior water rights on Salt Fork.

Through their efforts, a Water Compact was formed March 4, 1950 between Donley, Armstrong, and Collingsworth counties. A second meeting was held April 25, 1950 at which time officers were elected and the organization was named "Donley County Upper Red River Development Ass'n." Joe Jones, mayor of Clarendon, was named president and Mike McCully, secretary.

A Tri-County meeting was held May 10, 1950 at which time the group formed the "Upper Basins of Salt Fork, Elm Creek and Buck Creek of Red River Ass'n" with Ray J. Noblitt as chairman and W. S. Whaley as secretary. It was at this time that another present director of Greenbelt, Clifford Johnson of Hedley, joined

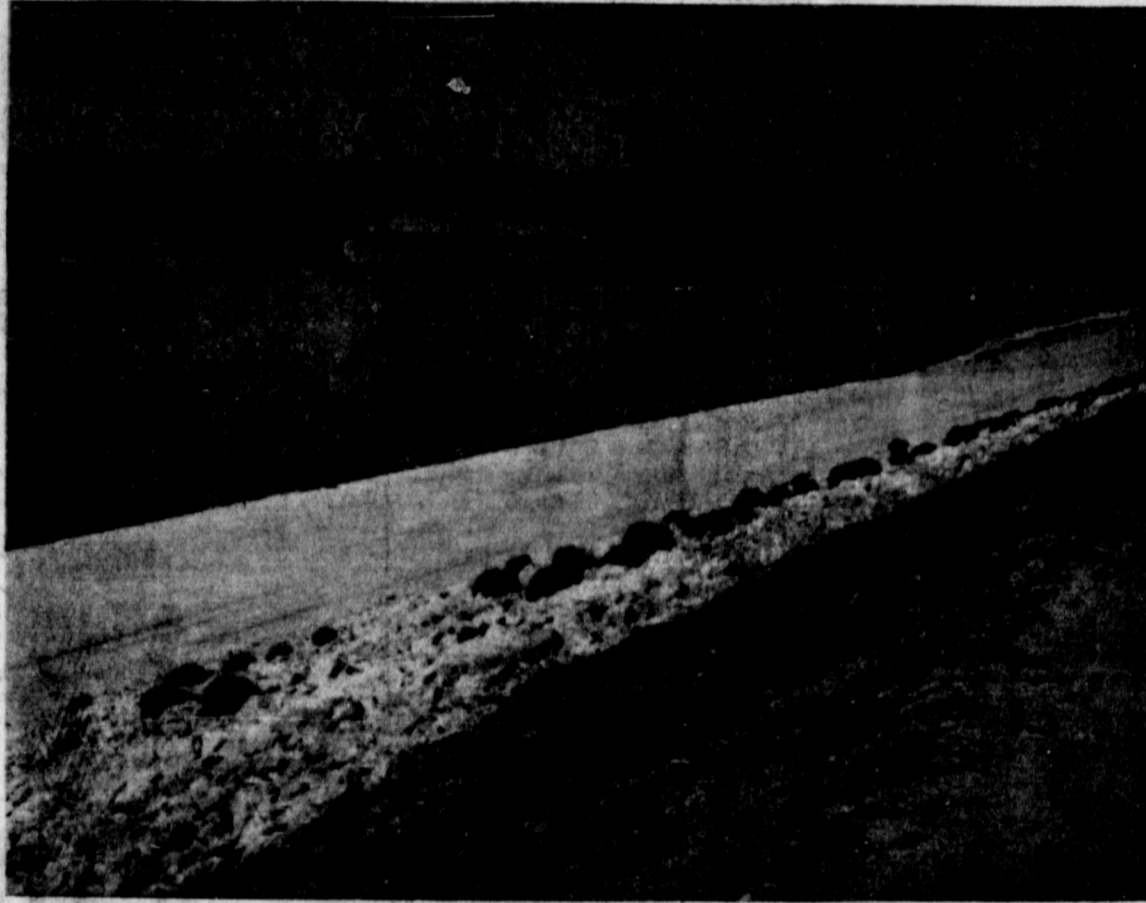

in the quest to keep the water rights. Armstrong County dropped out of the Compact and a meeting of Donley, Collingsworth, and Hall Counties was held August 30, 1950 and it was voted at this time to file an application for prior rights with the State Board of Water Engineers at Austin on Salt Fork of Red River only. The application cost was \$250.

The Clarendon Chamber of Commerce, merchants, and individuals paid the annual fee and extended the effort to convince the Water Board that the claim to water rights should be extended throughout the years until an act was passed by the Texas Legislature in 1954 creating the Green Belt Authority. It took

considerable maneuvering to keep the rights renewed as Oklahoma was putting pressure on politicians to make a swap deal so they could get the Red River rights.

Clarendon merchants and individuals helped make up \$1,500 to pay A. H. Woolverton to make a survey to determine feasibility of a dam to impound the water from Salt Fork of Red River.

During this time another meeting was held and the name of the Association was changed to "Upper Basin of the Salt Fork of Red River Water Ass'n, and C. B. "Cap" Morris was named president; Rayburn Smith, secretary. He resigned and Clifford Johnson took his place.

At a meeting in Childress in 1953, by a suggestion of R. A. Underwood, Sr., financial advisor of Fort Worth, the name was changed to "Green Belt Municipal and Industrial Water Ass'n" as the word "Salt Fork" was undesirable in connection with "good water" which was found on the upper tributaries of the river. Cap Morris remained as president and Clifford Johnson as secretary.

State Representative Elbert Reeves of Matador was contacted by the group to start legislation in behalf of the Green Belt.

In 1954 he was assisted by Representative Grainger McIlhany of Wheeler and Jack Hightower of Vernon, also Senators George Moffitt of Chillicothe and Andy Rogers of Childress and a bill was introduced before the 53rd Legislature. An Act was passed creating the Green Belt Municipal and Industrial Water Authority.

After the Act was passed by the Legislature, Cap Morris, Clifford Johnson, Carroll Knorpp and others had the job of getting other towns interested in the project. According to R. A. Underwood, Sr., Wellington had cooled to the project and Shamrock was definitely not interested. On September 30, 1955 in a letter to Morris, Underwood stated that Childress and Quanah both had become interested and he thought they would go along with holding the confirmation elections.

C. B. "Cap" Morris continued to serve as president of the Authority along with Clifford Johnson, secretary, until 1956 following the confirmation elections.

A confirmation election was held May 8, 1956 at which time Clarendon, Hedley, Childress, Memphis, Quanah, Paducah, and Wellington approved the Authority. An election authorizing the City Councils of the respective cities to enter into a Water Contract with the Green Belt Municipal and Industrial Water Authority was held in all towns except Wellington who withdrew from the Authority. Paducah turned down the issue a week later. On October 14, 1956 following other elections, Crowell voted to join the Authority and approval

College Construction Bid Awaiting HEW Dept. Approval

Bids for construction of the Clarendon College complex, comprising six buildings, administrative, dorms and cafeteria, were opened last Friday afternoon and Ramey Construction Co. was the low bidder at \$1,290,000. There were seven construction firms that bid on the complex.

Before the bid can be accepted, it has to be approved by the Dallas office of the Health, Education and Welfare Department. Their decision will probably be forthcoming within the next week or so. If their approval is in accord with the local Board of Regents, actual construction could possibly commence within the very near future.

BREEDLOVE TO JUDGE GALLOWAY SHOW AT TRI-STATE FAIR

Flip Breedlove, vice-president of the Farmers State Bank & Trust Company will be the judge of the Galloway breeding cattle at the Tri-State Fair in Amarillo next week. This is the first year that Galloway cattle have been exhibited at the fair and entries are expected from about 5 different states.

Introduction of the 1968 General Motors car models will be forthcoming next Thursday and the Ford Motor Co. models next Friday.

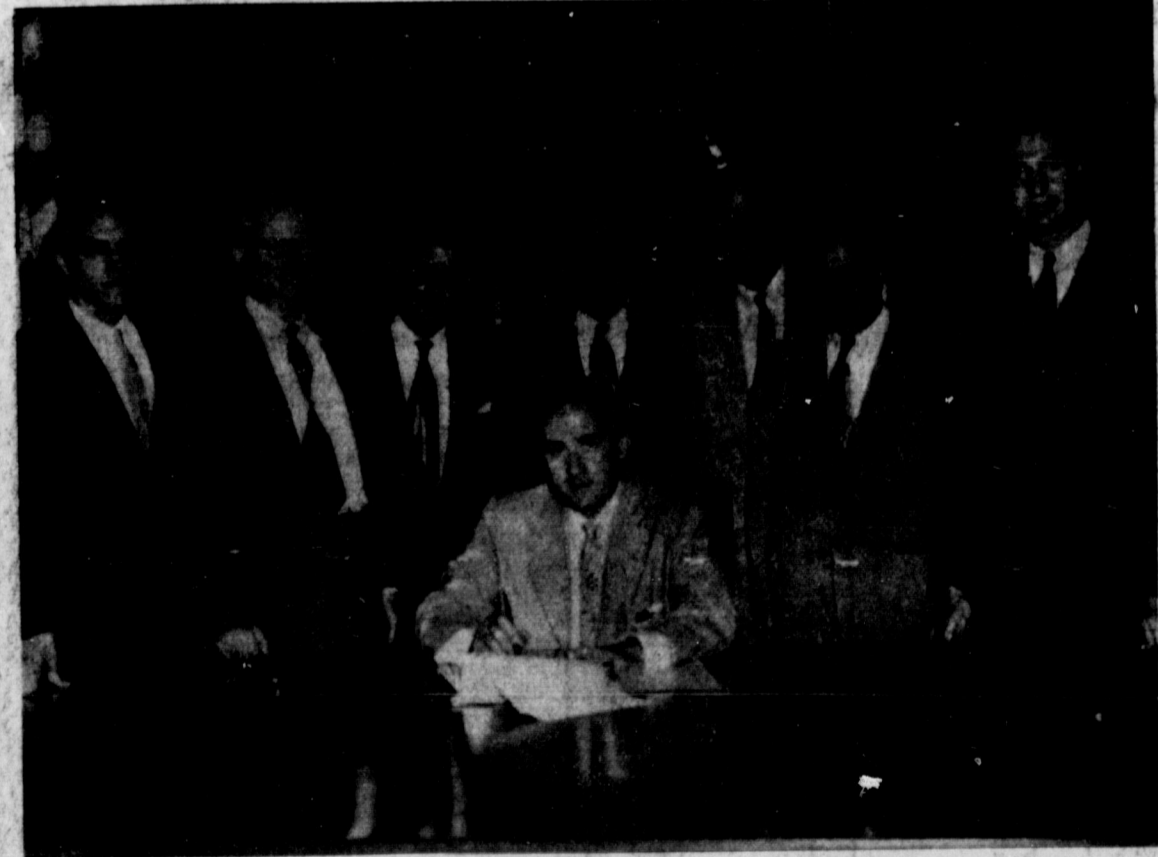
CHS HOMECOMING SET FOR WEEKEND OF SEPT. 30

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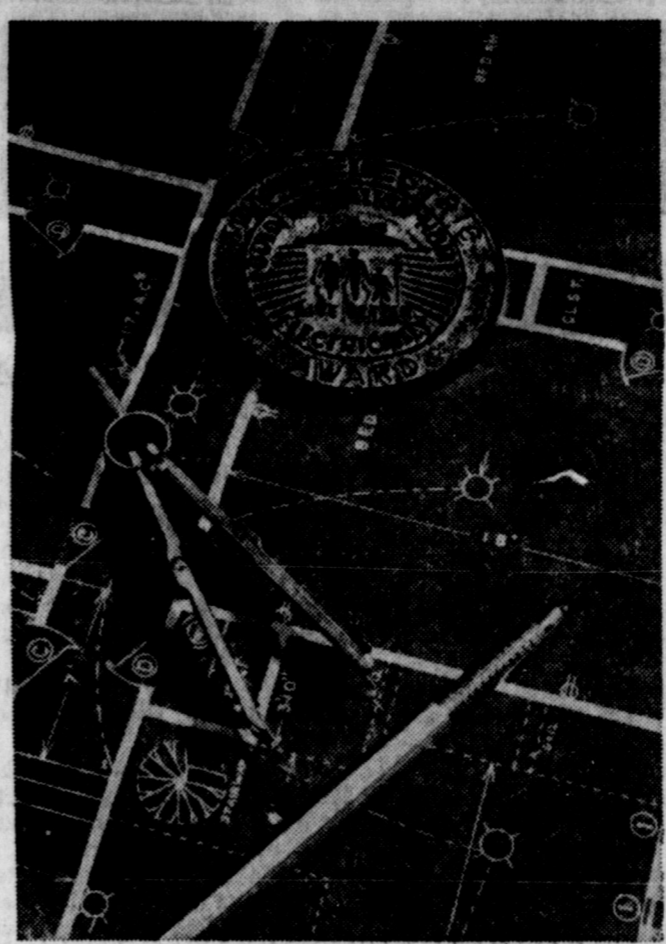
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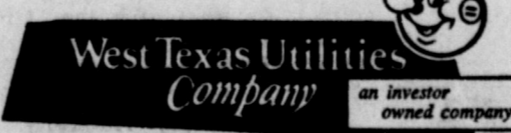

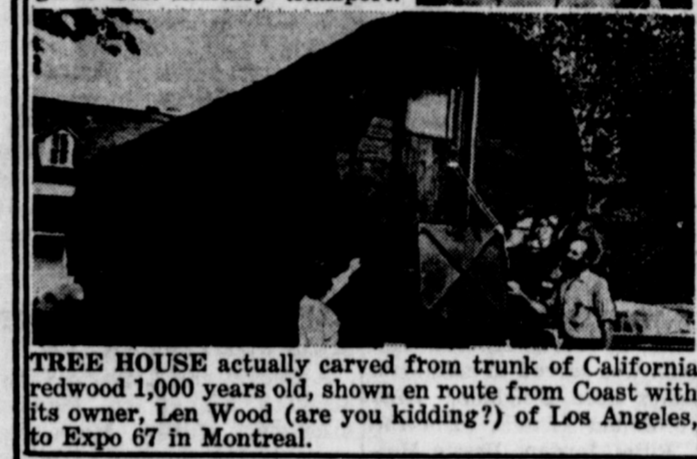

TEXAS ZEPHYR MAKES LAST TRIP MONDAY

Passenger train service between Dallas, Texas and Denver, Colorado ended when the Texas Zephyr made its final southbound run coming through Clarendon Monday morning. The northbound train made its final run here Sunday evening.

The Fort Worth & Denver and the Colorado and Southern Railroads received approval Friday from the Interstate Commerce Commission to discontinue passenger service on this run. The railroads had asked for discontinuance in May. ICC reported that four months is the longest period of time that railroads can arbitrarily be ordered to keep the trains running after their initial application.

The ICC decision was based on steadily declining revenue and the Postal Department's discontinuance of mail cars which produced a further financial drain on passenger service.

Friday's order can be appealed by interested parties however trains would, in that event, remain idle while the appeal is being heard.

Mr. Redwine, 60, resided at Carey. Funeral services and burial were Tuesday morning. Survivors include three brothers and three sisters.

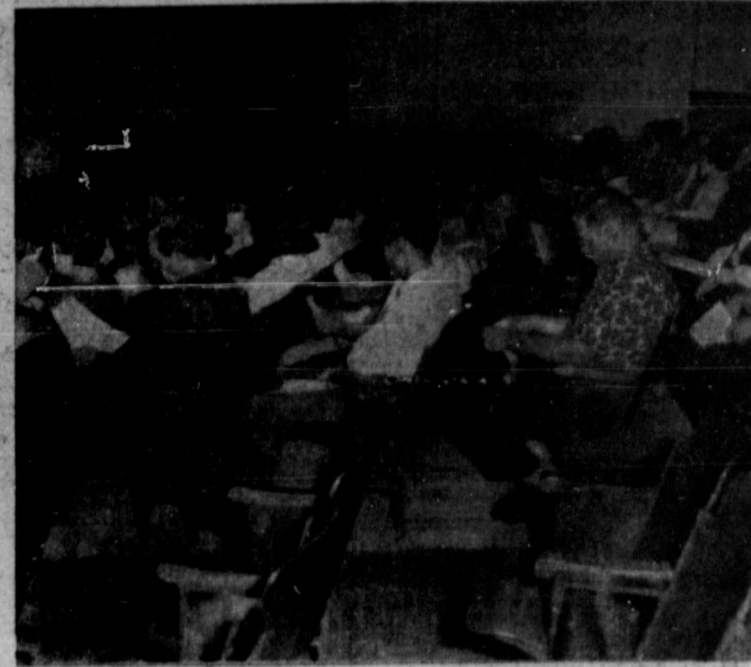

SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS

Several people from Clarendon attended the Knox City Plant Materials Center dedication last Thursday, September 7. Over 900 people including seed dealers, growers, conservation district supervisors, farmers, ranchers, city developers and college professors and county agents attended the dedication and tour.

Delbert Reed, James (Jay) Gould, Tommy Beck and Dorman Bush attended the dedication from Clarendon.

Don A. Williams, SCS Administrator, Washington, D.C. was the key speaker and H. N. Smith state Conservationist, Soil Conservation Service, Temple, Texas was the master of ceremonies.

The job of SCS plant materials centers is to find, evaluate, and put into use better plants to solve varied soil and water conservation problems. Planting materials being used include seed, sprigs, and rootstock.

Some 850 varieties of plants are being evaluated, including grasses, legumes, forbs and woody plants.

For example, about 13 selections of alkali saccaton are being watched to try to find the best grass to plant on certain alkali soils or on land damaged by salt.

Five mesa dropseeds are being studied for use on drouthy clay

and gravelly Trans-Pecos soils. Some 95 other grasses are also being evaluated, including Kleingrass, Old World bluestem composite, buffalograss (W-2 hybrid), Arizona cottontop, Lehman lovegrass and whiplash pappusgrass. Native selections of shrubs, forbs, and legumes are being tested for conservation uses and food value for deer, quail, turkey and other wildlife. Turfgrasses resistant to heavy foot traffic are being studied for climatic adaptation. These grasses are important for lawns, commercial developments, parks, and other recreational areas.

Other work being done at the center includes a search for better ways to harvest certain grass-seeds; ways to make some grasses such as vine mesquite, produce seed more consistently, and better ways to establish certain plants.

After improved plants are identified and proved at the center, they are grown in seed increase plots. After harvest, seed are used to make trial plantings on district cooperators' farms. After final tests, superior varieties are identified and released to commercial seed growers who produce seed for public sale. Groups cooperating with SCS in evaluating plants include Texas A&M University, Texas Technological College, Oklahoma State University, Prairie View A & M College and soil and water conservation districts in Texas and Oklahoma.

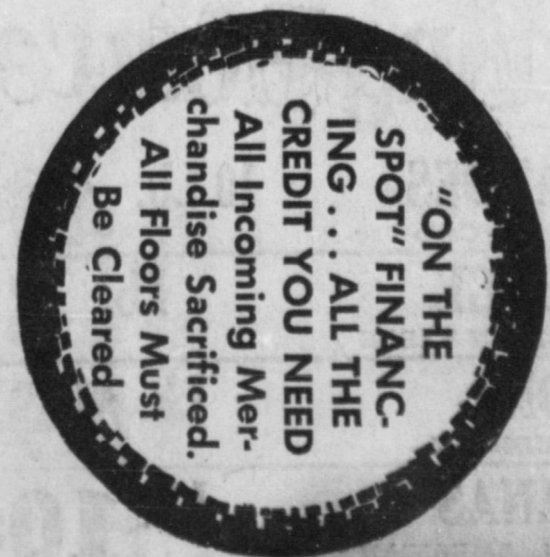

proved the Water Contract. Following the confirmation elections in 1956 at a meeting in Childress, Cap Morris resigned as president. Dr. S. H. Townsend, who was appointed as Childress representative in late 1955, was elected president; Sam Breedlove of Quanah, vice-president; and Clifford Johnson of Hedley, secretary-treasurer. The remaining members of the Board were W. Carroll Knorpp of Clarendon, Wendell Harrison of Memphis, Kenneth Tooley of Paducah, and George Shadid of Wellington. Breedlove resigned in 1957 and Carroll Knorpp was elected vice-president. Roland Walden was named the new director from Quanah. In 1959 secretary-treasurer, Clifford Johnson of Hedley, was replaced by Kenneth Tooley of Paducah. When Tooley moved out of the Water District Wm. J. Lowe, present secretary-treasurer, was appointed to fill his place.

Clifford Johnson became Mayor of Hedley and Ross Springer was named a director. Springer was followed by A. W. Anderson. In 1962 Johnson resigned as Mayor and became Hedley's director again. Howard Stanley succeeded Roland Walden as the Quanah director and Merle Kincaid has been the Crowell director since his City joined the Authority. An amendment to the Act creating the Green Belt Municipal and Industrial Water Authority, was made by the Texas Legislature in 1965 changing the name Green Belt to one word "Greenbelt" and the Memphis director became a non-voting director although Memphis is still a member of the Authority. After much planning and seeking ways and means to locate and finance the Greenbelt project, the dam site was located 5 miles north of Clarendon on Highway 70. The financing was done through the Texas Water Development Board without any Federal assistance. The contracts for the construction of the Dam, Filtration Plant,

and Pipeline were let March 29, 1966 at a total construction price of \$3,685,635.96. R. N. Adams Construction Co., Kaufman, Texas was awarded the contract to build the Dam at a cost of \$1,795,514.06. Brown-McKee, Inc. of Lubbock, Texas received the contract to build the Filtration Plant at a cost of \$824,941, and J. T. Brodie of Amarillo, Texas received the contract for the Pipeline at a cost of \$1,230,180.90. Groundbreaking ceremonies were held at the Dam site April 30, 1966 with State dignitaries present for the ceremony. Cap Morris, one of the first and foremost promoters of the Authority was to be honored at this occasion, the actual beginning of the work on the project for which he had spent many years in promoting, but the occasion was both joyful and sad as "Cap" died suddenly at home the previous day. Morris had never doubted that the Dam would be constructed some day and on many occasions when confronted with the proposition of naming the body of

water "Lake Morris" remarked that "Lake Clarendon" was the best name since so many local people had worked on this project through the years. Too, the body of water would cover the "Old Clarendon" site and this name and this body of water would serve as a historical marker for the pioneers who settled this area. The bodies of pioneer residents of Old Clarendon which were buried in the Old Clarendon Cemetery were removed as the Dam was constructed in this area and are to be re-interred in a cemetery on Lookout Point above the Old Clarendon site. The Old Clarendon Courthouse is to be reconstructed from Old Clarendon Foundation Stone on Lookout Point, also. This stone has already been moved to the top of the hill by Clarendon Boy Scouts and interested adults. The Greenbelt Dam is now complete with a good turf of grass to prevent washing. The Filtration Plant is now in operation dispersing a "sweet" and dependable water supply to Chil-

dress and Quanah. Greenbelt Dam is exceeded in size in the Panhandle only by Lake Meredith. It is 110 feet deep, 6,000 feet long, 700 feet wide at the base and contains 3.8 million cubic yards of dirt fill and 3,400 yards of concrete. When full the Dam will impound 60,000 acre feet of water, and eighteen miles of fence have been purchased to fence in the lake area. The lake has been stocked with Northern Pike which are already 18 inches in length, and Bass that are over seven inches in length. The next big event will be the dedication of the Dam and the entire project sometime within the near future. Sam King returned to his home in Dallas Monday morning after spending the past week with his sister, Mrs. J. R. Batson and Mack. He will leave Dallas September 15 to make his home in New Orleans. Sam works with the U. S. Labor Department.

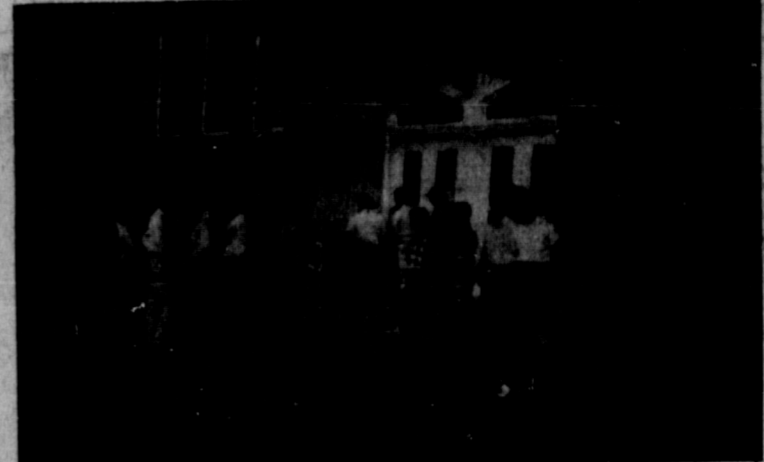
