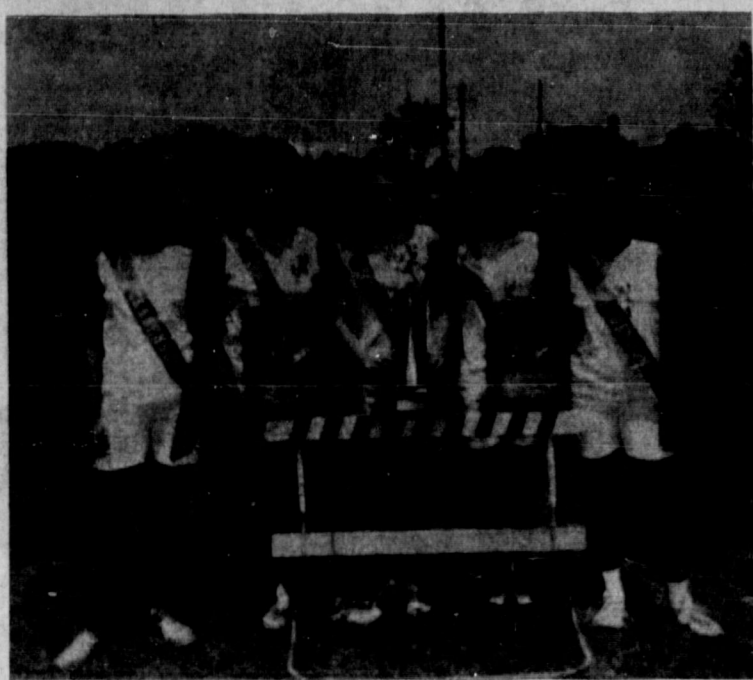

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford

House of Representatives has passed to the Senate a far-reaching consumer credit code regulating most consumer loans and allowing banks higher interest rates.

Gov. John Connally recommended the code which resulted from a two-year study of the credit field.

Bill by Rep. Randy Pendleton of Andrews establishes maximum credit charges, limits required insurance on loans, requires disclosure to borrower of all charges he must pay and prohibits misleading advertising.

Pendleton said his measure would provide Texas with one of the most "comprehensive and ef-

fective" regulations of consumer loans in the nation.

But Rep. Paul Floyd of Houston claimed the bill would "increase cost of money to borrowers."

Code covers all fields of credit under \$2,500, whether loans are by banks, savings and loan associations, credit unions or pawnbrokers. Installment purchases, including those of autos, are included.

Proponents contend that consumers will have a better loan market if banks and other lending agencies can charge the same rates as finance firms.

Although opponents emphasize that the bill allows up to 240 per cent annual interest (on a loan of \$10 for one month), rate permitted still is a reduction from that now fixed as ceiling in that class of small loans (Actual charge on the \$10 transaction under the code would be \$2.) Reduction is about 25 per cent below those now charged for loans under \$100.

These rates are authorized by the code:

- Auto installment loans — \$7.50 per \$100 on new cars ranging to \$15 per \$100 on autos over four years old.

- Regulated loans — \$18 per \$100 annually on first \$200 and \$8 per \$100 above \$300, to \$2,500.

- Secondary mortgage loans on residential property—\$8 per \$100, same rate as on installment loans.

- Retail installment sales and service would be limited to \$12 per \$100 for first \$500, ranging down to \$8 over \$1,000.

- Revolving credit maximum would be one and a half per cent per month for first \$500 of unpaid balance and one per cent on unpaid balance over \$500.

OPTOMETRY BILL DELAYED—Bill to reverse State Board of Optometry ruling which restricts multiple-office practice and advertising of eye glass firms under trade names (e.g. Texas State Optical, Lee) was sent to subcommittee after hearing before Senate Public Health Committee. Fate of the bill is uncertain.

Contested ruling, upheld by State Supreme Court, was made by six-member board, five of whom are independent optometrists.

Dr. N. Jay Rogers of Beaumont, TSO head, said Board ruling

was aimed at curtailing competition and would run up prices of glasses.

Board attorney Charles Babb argued advertising would not be prevented by ruling, although he criticized some advertising by multiple office optometrists. He said intent of Board's ruling is to require optometrists to practice under own names and maintain closer relationship to "patients."

BOAT PAPERS REQUIRED—Texas Parks and Wildlife Department has ordered its game wardens to more tightly enforce the state law requiring boat operators to have official papers aboard.

In making the announcement, the department reiterated the state's laws governing boats. A game warden may demand to see the certificate of number issued by the Texas Highway Department. A boat owner also must have the number affixed to the sides of the boat on the bow.

CONDEMNATION BILL DIES—Senate Jurisprudence Committee has killed a bill which would have allowed both sides in a condemnation suit to be represented on the special commission which sets the price to be paid for condemned land.

As the law now stands, when condemnation proceedings are instituted by the county, the county judge appoints three "disinterested parties" to judge the value of the land. Senate bill would have provided that the condemnor and condemnor appoint one each then agree on the third.

MEDICAID BILL ADVANCED—Senate has passed a bill to implement the "medicaid" program of medical assistance to needy which would provide a program totaling more than \$200,000,000 in the next two years.

Federal government will match state expenditures on a four-to-one dollar basis. Bill, virtually assured of House passage, also would provide hospital, nursing home and physicians services to public welfare recipients, including aged, blind, disabled and families with dependent children.

MH/MR LEGISLATION—Last week was a big one for Mental Health-Mental Retardation.

House passed a bill to allow MH/MR board members to be paid for every day they work instead of just the days they attend

a meeting; bill transferring the authority to license private mental hospitals from the State Department of Health to MH/MR; and a bill to allow the voluntary admission of mentally retarded persons to state schools.

House MH/MR Committee favorably reported a bill setting out the schedule of monthly payments for persons in mental retardation facilities; bill to allow MH/MR to make contracts for the provision of MH/MR services with hospitals and other private facilities; and a bill to require county attorneys of counties where community centers are located to file suit to collect fees of non-indigent persons in those centers.

TRAFFIC SAFETY—House Committee on Highways and Roads favorably reported two bills and sent two others to subcommittee.

Reported back to the House were bill to expand motor vehicle inspection requirements to make them conform with federal statutes and bill to provide for reflectorized license plates to be issued in Texas beginning in 1969.

Sent to subcommittee were bill to establish a uniform crime reporting system and bill to increase the amount of damage required before a written accident must be submitted to the Department of Public Safety.

MORE BILLS—Sen. Ralph Hall of Rockwall introduced a resolution urging Congress to take action toward a constitutional amendment to permit voluntary prayers and Bible reading in public schools.

Senate passed bill to authorize creation of institutes of urban studies at University of Houston and Arlington State.

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House voted for new medical school at Houston, dental school at Dallas.

House Agriculture Committee sent to subcommittee the bill to allow Agriculture Commissioner John C. White to issue "stop sale" orders when he finds a violation of the state's weights and measures law on food packaging.

Bill by Rep. Oscar Carrillo of Benavides to exempt from tuition at state-supported colleges and universities students from families with annual income of \$4,800 or less was referred by the House

Education Committee to subcommittee.

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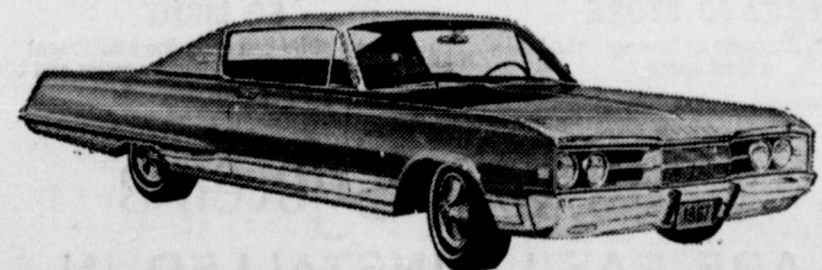
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Washington Report

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The war in Viet Nam comes closer and closer to home as more and more Panhandle and U.S. military soldiers are involved and as the casualty reports mount.

As a participant in the Korean war, I can well understand the agony that comes from each of the "we regret to inform you" messages of the wounded or killed in action messages. I know what it was to have a buddy to enemy action and can understand what

the loss of a loved one means. But I believe most of us understand the reasons and justifications for our involvement in this terrible war—a war neither of our making or asking.

After the Senate Policy Committee issued a staff report last week which made it appear that the Republican Party was split in its support of the President's policy in Viet Nam, I joined Senate Republican leader Everett

Dirksen and House majority leader Gerald Ford in disassociating myself from agreement with that report or its implications.

Our own Senator Tower was quick in assailing the report as a "misleading" document that could be misinterpreted, and he challenged as incorrect the major contentions that President Johnson has involved the United States in a unilateral, open-ended land war in Asia in contradiction of the policy followed by President Eisenhower and historically endorsed by the Republican Party.

My main objection to the President's policy is his failure to fully utilize our naval and air superiority in stopping the flow of war materials and supplies to North Viet Nam.

In view of the reaction to General Westmoreland's visit from the noisy and misguided or misinformed dissenters, it seems to me that these "doves" and doubters should be again reminded of history, although they apparently chose to ignore the real story of Communism and its avowed goal of world conquest.

The infiltration and invasion of South Viet Nam followed the usual Communist pattern of intimidation, murder, subversion, terrorism and coercion under their propaganda camouflage of "liberation from imperialism."

But there is no more imperialistic nation in the world today than the Soviet Union. Freedom or the right of self-determination for the countries Russia took over after WW II such as Hungary, Latvia, Lithuania, Estonia, Rumania, Poland and the others is a mockery of their so-called "Peoples Democracy." And why the Berlin wall if these "liberated" people are so happy?

The Asian situation has been the same except for our intervention in Korea. Tibet, a once proud and independent nation, is an example. Anyone who doubts the intentions of the Communists even in the light of their recent deviations might read more closely the reports of events in

Latin and South America. Here, in our own hemisphere, Communist Cuba is the base and training ground for more Viet Nams in our back yard.

Castro has made a mockery of the Monroe Doctrine which said we would not tolerate the intervention of a foreign power in the internal affairs of any Latin American country. And had it not been for our timely intervention in the Dominican Republic, we would have had another Cuba to contend with.

Soviet party chief Leonid I. Breznev recently called for a world Communist conference for increased support of North Viet Nam. He said Communist support for Viet Nam is making itself "felt more and more strongly."

The Senate Policy Committee report does not, in my opinion, express or reflect the views or attitudes of the Republican leadership or more than a handful of Republicans and I for one, refuse to become involved in a political controversy over the Viet Nam war. In no previous major conflict has this country been seriously divided, except for our own war between the states, and we cannot afford dissent under the continued subtle, devious and deadly threat of International Communism.

We can properly understand the struggle in Viet Nam only if we recognize it for what it is—part of a vast and continuing struggle in which we have been engaged since the so-called end of World War II but which was really a shift from a war of Nazism against the world to a war of communism against the world—or for the world.

Former Under Secretary of State George W. Ball concluded a speech last year with: "After all, it is not the American purpose simply to preserve the status quo. That was not our history and that is not our destiny. What we want is the freedom of choice for the peoples of the world. We will take our chances on that."

FERTILIZE FARM PONDS IN THE SPRINGTIME

A properly managed farm pond can provide excellent fishing and serve as a source of recreation and income to farmers and ranchers.

Most ponds, points out County Agent Ronald Gooch, should be fertilized for maximum fish production. Fertilizer increases the supply of plankton which is the main food for small fish and water insects.

Early in the spring, when the water temperature reaches 60° F., is the time to begin the fertilization program.

Most waters in our area respond to an initial application of 100 pounds of 16-20-0 analysis fertilizer per surface acre, followed by successive treatments of 20 to 40 pounds per acre at two-week intervals until a desirable bloom has been reached. Nitrogen and phosphorus seem to be essential for good plankton production in most ponds regardless of the surrounding soil type.

The plankton is sufficient if a person's cupped hand disappears when the arm is immersed in the water to elbow depth (about 18 inches), explains the county agent. The bloom usually appears in 1 to 5 weeks after the beginning of the fertilizer program. Subsequent applications should be made only as needed to maintain the bloom.

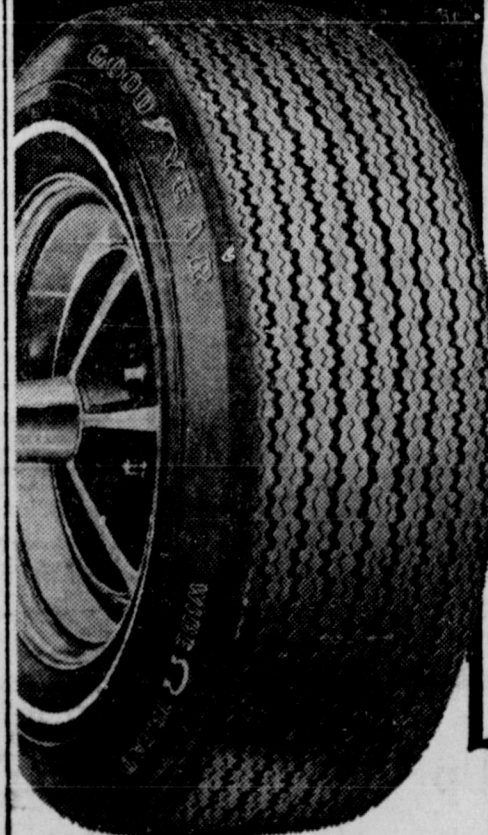

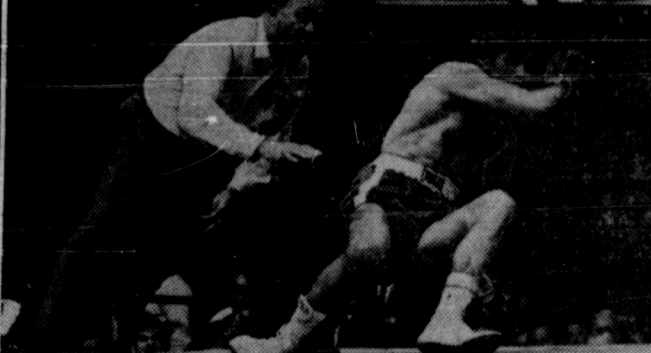

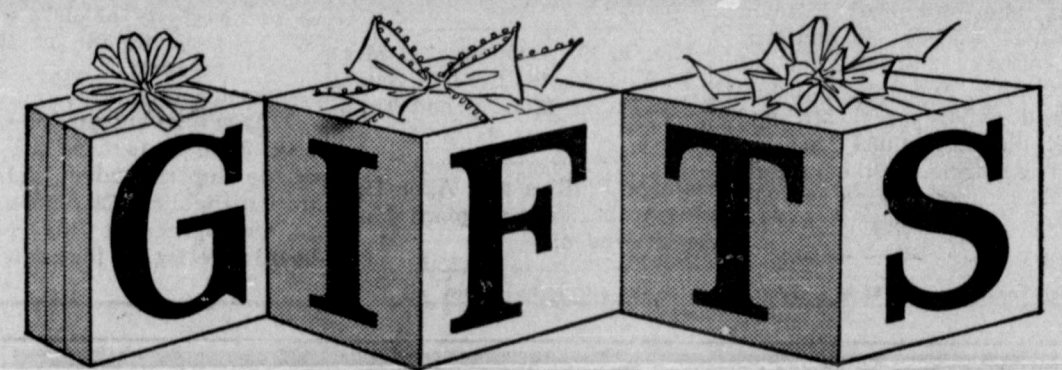

COTTON REFERENDUM

Ballots were mailed last week to all eligible voters and their wives in the Upland Cotton Allotment Transfer Referendum. These ballots must be in the ASCS Office by the close of business or be postmarked before midnight on May 19 to be counted. Eligible ballots will be counted publicly by the county committee on Wednesday, May 24, 1967, beginning at 9:00 a.m.

If at least two-thirds of growers voting in the county vote "Yes" transfer of allotments outside the county by lease or sale will be authorized for 1968 and 1969.

RECLASSIFYING WHEAT ACREAGE

Any wheat destroyed by natural causes after May 1 but prior to harvest may be reclassified upon written request by the farm operator and put to other uses.
