## Donley County established April 11, 1882

Donley County was really an after-thought. It came from Wedgeforth County, 60 square miles in the panhandle established by an act of the 13th Legislature. The 15th Legislature divided that

larger county into Donley, Collingsworth, Wheeler and Gray counties. Donley County was named in remembrance of the Hon. Stockton P. Donley, a distinguished judge of the

Supreme Court, but Hon. B.H. White, Donley County Judge since 1884 until 1904, is often referred to as "The Father of Donley County." From an article White

wrote about Donley County in 1903, Judge White says: "This portion of Texas was practically unexplored region inhabited by hostile and aggressive Indians, who subbed on the countless buffaloes that grazed on its nutritious grasses, as well as by raids on the nearest settlements. It was a region seldom penetrated by white men other than adventurous buffalo hunters or mission-

aries....Under the conditions then existing, a livelihood could not have been made, neither could the settlers have withstood the dangers lurking about them." "In the spring of 1882, the colony [Saints Rest] was re-organized. Its newly elected officers were sworn in on the 11th day of April by Judge Emanuel Dubbs...It may be an interesting reminiscence

to old timers to recall that its first county officers were, G.A. Brown, County Judge, B.H. White, County Clerk, J.D. Wilson, Sheriff, W.D. Kimball, Treasurer, J.T. Otey, Tax Assessor, J.H. Parks Surveyor, County Commissioners, T.W. Morrison, Chas. Goodnight, L.R. Dyer, S.B. Nall." **HAPPY BIRTHDAY DONLEY COUNTY for 100 years Old!** on Easter Sunday,

## Fred Ponder now manager for Family Services

Fred Ponder has recently moved into a home in Lelia Lake and will be the new director for the Clarendon Family Services Center located at the Medical Center. Ponder comes to Lelia Lake from Galesburg, Illinois but he is originally a native of Alabama. "It's good to be back where the weather is a little better," Ponder said as the Monday's wind whipped his tie into his face.

Fred Ponder has his BA and MA in Special Education from the University of Alabama and is working on his doctorate dissertation through Mississippi State University.

The Family Services Center is a branch in Clarendon, Memphis and Wellington of the Amarillo Mental Health and Retardation Regional Office in Amarillo. They also receive some state funds but no federal funding. "We have a good referral system," Ponder said, "I'm not all-powerful and able to handle everything, so we refer those patients to experts." Some of the counseling available would be for substance abuse problems, those who recognize their problem or those who have been referred there by school administrators or physicians. Marriage and family problems can be handled at the center as well.

The office is opened all week manned by Sharon Ward. The number is 874-3504. Fred Ponder will be in the office generally on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday. If there should be an emergency, call toll-free 1-800-692-4039 and someone will help you at once. As soon as Fred gets a phone in his Lelia Lake home, he will be on 24 hour call.

### Seminar

Clarendon-area citizens interested in the operations of nursing homes and Federal programs for the elderly are invited to attend a community education seminar scheduled for Wednesday, April 14, 1982 in Clarendon. The one-day seminar will be held in Room 102, Clarendon College from 10:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m.

The seminars, sponsored by the Panhandle Area Agency on Aging (PAAA) include panel members from the Texas Department of Health, Department of Human Resources, nursing home administrators, Social Security and the PAAA.

The major purpose of the seminars is to give area citizens a chance to express their thoughts about area nursing homes and to find out how Federal programs affect residents of those homes and the elderly population in general.

Ola Kidd, director of the Nursing Home Ombudsman Program for the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission, will be conducting the seminars. During the sessions, she'll be explaining the Ombudsman program and taking suggestions about how it can operate most effectively. So far, she has 29 volunteers from across the region, representing 11 counties. She stresses that there is a constant demand for volunteers to help in the advocacy program on the local and regional level.

In April, the community education seminars will be held in Hereford (Apr. 12), Clarendon (Apr. 14), Pampa (Apr. 16), Dumas (Apr. 19) and Amarillo (Apr. 21). Continuing Education Credits will be given to participants by Amarillo College.

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# TAX RELIEF?

Texas law provides for a standard \$5,000 exemption off the market value of a residence homestead for school tax purposes. If you are 65 or over, you are entitled to an additional \$10,000 exemption off the market value of your homestead. And, if you are entitled to the 65 or over exemption, the school taxes on your residence homestead cannot increase after you apply and qualify for this exemption, unless you make improvements to your homestead.

It is important to remember that these tax relief measures do not go into effect automatically. You must file for the exemptions this year before May 1. The money had been sent to Elmont Branigan and I did not have his passport, nor his signature or anything with me -- so I didn't get the money.

We went to the Olympic just in case the last bag had come in, but it hadn't -- they did take more information (our complete ticket business from London which we did not need any more) and we still hope it shows up -- I told them about the money business at the bank and I guess the woeful look I had concerning no bag and no money was more than she could stand at any rate, she wrote a voucher for about \$56.00 (American) to help pay taxi fares -- Then, over to British Air and Thassos talked them out of a bit more which he kept for all the haggling he has had to do to date. It certainly was not much money. We had to wait for about 30 minutes but finally got the first lost bag. It was after 3 p.m. and Daddy had not eaten lunch (nor had I for that matter), so he ate some peanut butter and I had a candy bar and we both had some figs.

Tonight he had the best part of a pork chop and later he will eat the peaches I brought up. He isn't feeling any stronger as he coughs so much it seem to take all its energy. While we were waiting for supper, Earnie Laurence from Rockdale, had a heart attack and passed away. They were the ones who had just moved here today -- they were the ones who used our room before and after the treatment since last Friday. He was very feeble and also had asthma which complicated the problem in his lung cancer. That is all for today -- hope fully Daddy will get over his coughing so he can sleep. Jan. 23, 1982

Saturday is a long day!! Had breakfast around 8 a.m. All of you were snug in your beds -- Daddy and I had tried last night to think of a way to fix him something he could enjoy eating--so, I walked down to Halandri town which is about as far as from our house to our store, and found us a heavy scarf for each of us to wear home -- it will probably still be cold in London -- we must take every precaution against his taking cold or pneumonia. Mine had a tobaggan to match unless Daddy would like it. Also bought a little round hot plate about 4" across with a heavy cup that holds two cups --we can heat water or something. Bought a can opener. Came back by the bakery and saw some English walnuts, Daddy can eat salt-free toasted nuts. Bought all these back to the hotel. Then Tena went with me up the street about 4 or 5 blocks to the Supermarket - a nice clean place. Bought a small skillet and a box of what I think is oats, some no-salt cheese and some pears. Daddy seemed to enjoy the pears very much. He had only 2 eggs and some bread and milk for breakfast.

Eldon Jewett, the travel agent from Fresno, invited everyone for lunch today. About 40 of us went up the street to a restaurant about half a block toward the Supermarket to eat. Nearly everyone had a steak, (thin, but good) salad, thick french fries, fried zucchini in a batter somewhat like "Zebbies", good bread (not hard) and wine for those of us who were not patients. We all enjoyed it. I kept a fair size piece of steak to bring back to Daddy as he didn't feel like going. Maybe he will like it since we can not heat it on our new hot-plate. It is now 6:10 p.m. here -- 10 a.m. in

Memphis, Texas. Jan 25, 1982

Just 11 more months until Christmas. We did nothing all day yesterday away from the hotel. I read Daddy to sleep a couple of times from the little New Testament club '51 gave us. We are reading about Pauls travel to Athens and Corinth. We really like the translation. This little boy, Hunter, the red-headed 2 1/2 year old is a frisky little fellow. The whole bunch of us feel he is a bright place in the day. They are having to stay at the other hotel, but they take more of their meals here. We could improve on Hunter's table manners some but he could be worse. He isn't quite as good at eating habits as our grandchildren are.

When we went to breakfast yesterday morning, there were just a few people eating. The majority had left early for a one-day cruise to three islands. The weather was miserable. It was cold and rainy all day. The trip would have been more enjoyable had they been able to get out on the deck more.

Called British Airline late this afternoon and they said our bag was not there yet. Mike had called early Sunday morning that it should have been in yesterday. he had received a called from the T.W.A. agent in Amarillo and she assured him it would be on B.A. as it had been left in London all this time. We have been calling each day. Washed my hair today. Every day is wash day in order to keep something clean to wear. We are enjoying our little hot plate to make instant coffee. Tena had brought a small coffee pot, but it had burned out within a few days. I made a couple of cups of coffee early in the morning, then about 7 o'clock, I knock on Tena and B.J.'s door to offer the hot plate to them for their coffee. A cup in the hotel is nearly \$1.20 a cup with no refills, but oatmeal is 40c and eggs are 40c each which is not bad. Daddy had a good breakfast of oatmeal on Sunday and two eggs today with bread, butter and milk. He had been eating better the last couple of days.

We want him to get better veins to take the treatments. Today will be No. 10 and everyone is encouraging -- the 10th and 11th should begin to help. we are still expecting a miracle. Nearly 12 p.m. so I'll play a little solitaire and wait for lunch. Daddy napped until about 1:30--he could not make it over the meat balls or chicken, so he opted for ice cream. OUR neighbor, Patrick Cook from Beaumont was going for donuts and he took our order for half dozen. They aren't but 34c each--but Daddy will like them with salt-free cheese and English walnuts. I'm making some Nescafe to go with mine. The meat balls weren't all that good. Jan. 26, 1982

I guess through popular demand, the dining room put steak on the menu last night. Daddy felt real well right after his treatment, then had a coughing seige which was followed by a terrific chill. I am so thankful for the heating pad and the Moorings adapter. Called again about the luggage and still it was not in last night, so back to the washing and wearing the ones I bought here.

Daddy had coughing a lot last night and was able to get rid of a lot of stuff off his lungs -- that seems to be a sign of success. He felt pretty well and I think his hair is coming in -- at least it looks darker each day. His color is much better and

some of the fluid seems to be leaving his face. He rests a lot and is sleeping. Both of the men do a good bit of resting which is part of the treatment along with water, water, water. Speaking of water, it is trying to sprinkle and is cloudy. Oh yes, for supper last night Daddy had some cheese and figs and two donuts. Then he had peaches and syrup with another donut about midnight -- I am excited he is eating more. Since October when he began the radiation treatments in Amarillo, we have been trying every way possible to encourage his appetite. Jan. 27, 1982

Oh Boy!! We received eighteen cards and letters today. What a lovely feeling -- Just to have kind and thoughtful mail from so many from whom we didn't expect. It gave us such a lift -- however, we have fared very well. There are so many conversations going on and interesting people to visit with in the lobby, the time doesn't weigh too heavily.

Tassos took Jim Drager and me to the Flea Market -- It was quite a sight, but we went to one shop belong to a friend of Tassos -- he had the "good stuff" and gave us a 10% discount or more. Also told Tassos where to take us to buy the large tablecloths for our girls tables. We think it was a good trip and we saw a lot of Old Athens. It cost us \$15.00 cab fare, which was about what we save by the discounts. We came back about 1 o'clock and I tried to get back to our room, however the Cooks from O'Donnell asked if I knew Andy Gardenhire. He had been superintendent at O'Donnell for a while, of course, we had a good visit about Andy and his family. Finally came up to get Daddy and we had lunch. Then Daddy wanted to rest some more, so I went to town to get some more donuts as they make a good midnight snack. The Dr. is in the building and we will soon know the results of the blood test, which is the third one. Tena brought in a pretty brown suit she wants me to wear on my trip to Corinth. She told me to hem them up as she is a bit longer in the leg section then I, so I'll try it and be really dressed up. The one suit I have is getting stale and the Greek clothes are not what the "best dressed women" would go travelling in, especially as a tourist.

Just had the treatment and Daddy's count is down from 6.9 to 3.8 (3.1 units). Jan. 29, 1982--Another Friday

Daddy slept late today--he coughed a lot last night and lost sleep. We had breakfast and visited until lunch. Now we are in our room and he is resting. Today we received nine more cards and letters. We love everyone for being so thoughtful. We left home three week ago today--seems much longer--soon will be time to be back and we are anxious. Elmonette called today--our children's voices are always so welcome.

We have been discussing a manner in which we can eat (tolerate) this Greek cooking. Sometimes it is fairly palatable and oftentimes a bit harder to take. B.J. said he just looks at it when it is served--then he "attacks it". This has been a good joke around the dining room. That's about it for today. B.J. got a good report that his count is down to 3.1, which is very good. Will retire early as it is up at 6 a.m. to take the trip to Corinth.

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### SLOW COOKING IN NATURE'S KITCHEN

Jim McClarin recently told us how he found out that his compost heap could slow-cook food... without electricity. One evening, when his refrigerator went on the blink, Jim decided to make yogurt rather than let some fresh milk go sour. He had heated the milk, cooled it down, and added a helping of already-made yogurt to get the recipe started when he was unexpectedly invited out to dinner. Jim says that at this point he remembered reading that the ancient Chinese sometimes cooked eggs in compost. So, he placed the cooking container filled with yogurt-to-be in his backyard heap, hoping it'd keep warm enough to work. When he lifted the lid the next day, though, Jim found not yogurt but a crude cheese!



He guessed that his humus pile had been too hot for the job, so after that first experiment Jim decided to be more picky. McClarin reports "since my initial attempt, I've learned to probe carefully in the 'working' mound until I find a spot with just the right warmth to create successful compost-cooked yogurt... a dish that has become a regular part of my diet."

Jim's next cooking effort involved a nice fresh egg safely enclosed in a plastic bag. He found a "just right" hot spot in the compost, dropped in the sack with a rope attached, and covered it over again.

"Then early the next day, I peeled and ate the most mouthwatering hard-boiled egg of my life... except, of course, the taste treat hadn't been boiled. Now, whenever I hanker for a real breakfast treat, I drop a few eggs into the compost heap in the evening and look forward to a morning feast."

Before long, Jim got around to trying to cook meat dishes in his organic "oven". The first roast, alas, was a failure. His newly built compost pile hadn't warmed up enough yet, and the established heat was a bit too cool. Undaunted, Jim bought another roast... along with a meat thermometer. Once the new heap had gotten "up to heat", a second piece of beef was placed inside the yogurt pail (to keep it sealed against bacteria) and buried in the hottest part of the pile (where Jim tested out the temperature at 155°F).

"Thirteen hours later," the experimenter says, "a brief taste of the meat trapped in its own broth convinced me that compost is the only way to roast! I served the tender, juicy viand to friends at lunch that day, and they all agreed it was superb."

"In no time at all, a duck with orange juice and apricots found its way into the hot heap. It stayed buried in its sealed container for 23 hours at 155-165°F... and was perfect when I served it with wine and wild plum sauce."

Jim has found that there are some limitations to this unusual cooking method, however. Soybeans and pinto beans never really softened, and he had no better luck with potatoes and carrots.

But, if you work it right, your compost mound can provide lots more than the organic fertilizer it's famous for. It can cook your supper for you!

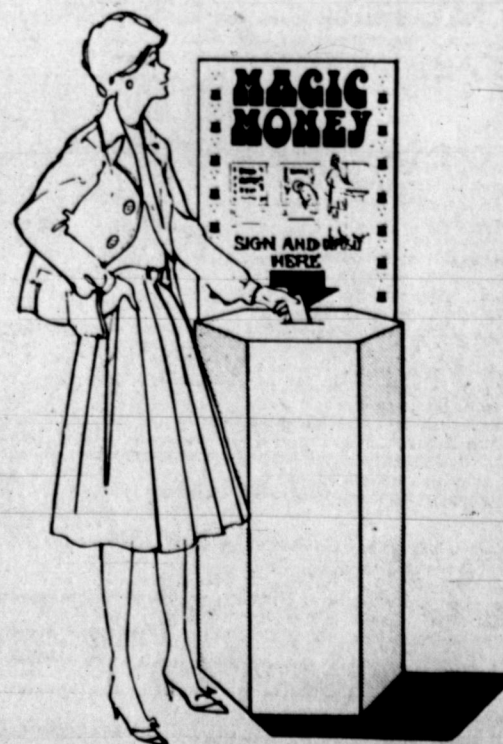
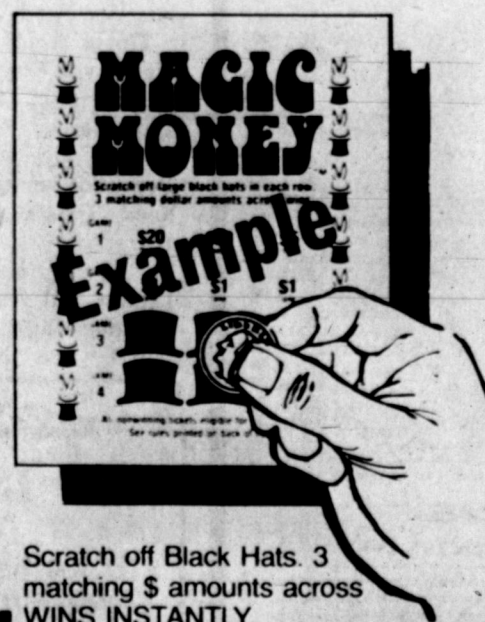

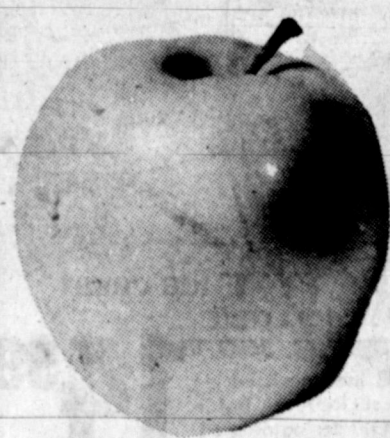

# Farm & Ranch News Donley County ASCS news

**Signup Deadline Nears**  
Have you signed up to participate in the 1982 farm programs yet? If not, you only have a few days to do so. The deadline is Friday, April 16th.

If you sign up now to participate and conditions change and you later decide not to comply, you can withdraw from the programs. There is no penalties for withdrawing. But, if you don't sign up by April 16th and then decide you should have, it's too late.

Participating is voluntary, but only those of you who comply will be eligible for deficiency payments, regular price support loans or the farmer held reserve. These benefits may not look good to you at this time, but come harvest time, they could mean the difference between

profit or loss.

### Conserving Use Acres

If you are participating in the program, you must designate the required amount of acres for conserving use acres (you may call these lay-out, set-aside, or something else). You cannot harvest any crop from this land. It cannot be grazed from March 1 to September 1 unless it was planted in wheat, barley, or oats before January 29th. You can graze these crops on out. This conserving use acres must be cropland planted to small grain or row crop in 1980 or 1981 and must be protected from wind and water erosion by using approved conservation uses.

**Grain Sorghum Deficiency Payments**  
We will be mailing these payments in a few days to

producers who planted grain sorghum in 1981. These will be paid at the rate of 27¢ per bushel times the established yield for your farm times the planted acres. An allocation factor of .9900 will be applied to those farms having more acres planted in 1981 than 1980.

### Acresage Reports

Fall seeded crops must be reported by May 15th. Also, ANY LAND DESIGNATED AS CONSERVING USE ACREAGES FOR ANY COMMODITY, and WHICH IS PLANTED TO WHEAT, BARLEY, OR OATS, MUST BE REPORTED BY MAY 15. Your reports must be accurate so if you are in doubt, you should consider having a measurement service.

Every producer, whether participating or not is encouraged to report acres to this office. Your 1983 acreage bases will be established using the acreage reports filed in 1982.

**Reporting Disasters**  
There will be no disaster payments made in 1982. However, a prompt report of natural disasters is important because it will give you credit for planted acres. This must be done before other use is made of the land.

So, if you report wheat for grain and due to drought or some other natural disaster, you decide to graze it out instead of harvesting, be sure to file an application for disaster credit before you turn the cattle in.

Eligibility for participation in all programs administered by ASCS is established under law without regard to race, color, religion, sex, handicap or national origin.

Agriculture Secretary John Block has ordered USDA economists to stop calculating net farm income. He gave the order after being criticized for withholding projections when the news was bad, according to the Washington Post.

Agriculture Department economists predicted earlier this year that net farm income would be about \$14 billion this fiscal year, the lowest since the Depression when adjusted for inflation. Last year's net farm income was \$20 billion.

Nine senators have co-sponsored a bill requiring the secretary to turn over the information. Until January, the USDA published net farm income estimates every month in its report, The

Rep. Charles Stenholm (D-Tex.), responding to the withheld USDA information, said, "The Administration has found a new way to respond to this critical problem—ignore it and maybe it'll disappear."

## Texas turkeys trot out of state

More than 800 Texas Turkeys now have new addresses as a result of recent trap and transfer operations conducted by Dave Dvorak, Wildlife Biologist and some of the men assigned to his area.

A total of 266 wild Rio Grande turkeys trapped from

areas near by were shipped to California, Oregon, Idaho and Colorado to restock ranges there. Transplanting of Texas turkeys to California has been so successful that now a huntable population now exists there. The turkeys were trapped in the winter

and shipped via air freight. Shipping the birds out of state was part of an exchange for pheasants and antelope sent to Texas in early fall. 620 birds were trapped on private ranches and stocked in 17 counties across the state.

## Texas Farmers plant fewer acres

Texas farmers intend to plant at least half a million fewer acres to crops this year.

Final plantings may be even lower as farmers make last-minute decisions regarding participation in the '82 acreage reduction program.

Farmers will likely increase grain sorghum plantings to 5 million acres. Final plantings, however, may be less if a significant number of producers decide to comply with the 10% reduced acreage program for feedgrains.

Along with reducing total plantings, many farmers are cutting back on such production inputs as fertilizer and irrigation water because of the high cost of credit and difficulty in projecting

sufficient cash flow to cover borrowed capital.

Cotton farmers face a tough year ahead as huge cotton supplies will likely keep the lid on market prices.

Global cotton production last year is estimated at a record 71 million bales, about 5 million more than the 1980 season. The US crop totaled 15.7 million bales.

World carryover stocks are expected to increase about 4 million bales when the 1981 market seasons end on July 31. Total offtake of about 12.5 million bales in the US will fall some 3 million bales short of the estimated 15.7 million bale crop in 1982, resulting in a doubling of domestic carryover stocks at some 6 million bales.

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# FISH TALES

Some of you may have noticed that the bass nursery pond has been drained. That is because last week, James Parks from the Inland Fisheries in Canyon, assisted by game warden Gary Hunt and Leroy Johnson and Ross Hill from Greenbelt Water Authority, drained the pond and transferred the little fish into the lake.

In June, 1980, 13,000 fingerlings were stocked in

the pond. 1,417 of those large mouth bass survived and were transferred into the lake, for an 11% recovery rate. Then again in May, 1981, 20,000 fry were stocked into the pond and a partial transfer occurred in November, putting 2,000 into Greenbelt. Joe Kraai, fisheries biologist in charge of the project, wasn't satisfied with the growth rate of the fish and decided to leave the remainder in the nursery pond to grow during the winter. However, last week, only 1,670 fish were recovered, some of them were 10" but most of them were still pretty small.

Parks and his local crew

pulled 1600 fish from the pond Monday last week and 70 out Tuesday. There were some pretty good sized crawfish as well. Survival rate from the original 20,000 stocking came to about 30-40% survival rate, a most satisfactory return.

Plans for next year's nursery pond will change in some respects. The goal will not be to have large numbers of fry stocked with the hope to put a large number into the lake, but it will be to put fewer fish into the nursery and hope for them to grow larger before transfer time in the fall.

The current pond will be cleared, re-countoured and a herbicide, Simozen, will be

applied to completely clean out unwanted vegetation from the site.

The next step will be to deepen the hole, fill it with water with the help and cooperation of the Greenbelt Water Authority, and put cotton seed mill at 200 pounds to an acre to help start plankton growth to feed the fingerlings and give them cover, over the summer. Commercial fertilizer will be added again every week to keep plankton growth.

Fathead minnows will be added to the pond at this point to encourage their reproduction in the pond as a food source for the bass.

Florida bass, a hybrid, will hopefully be stocked in the

nursery pond. 46,000 fingerlings will be put into the lake proper, and only 4,000 will go to the nursery pond. These figures are estimates and are determinate upon the Fisheries hatch success.

In September or October, the survivors in the nursery pond will be placed in Greenbelt. Their chances for survival are better if they are 6" or larger and placed into the lake in the fall while there is still cover and spawning is over.

In addition to the on-going Florida bass and largemouth bass project, the Inland Fisheries will stock 200,000 small mouth bass in Greenbelt this week.

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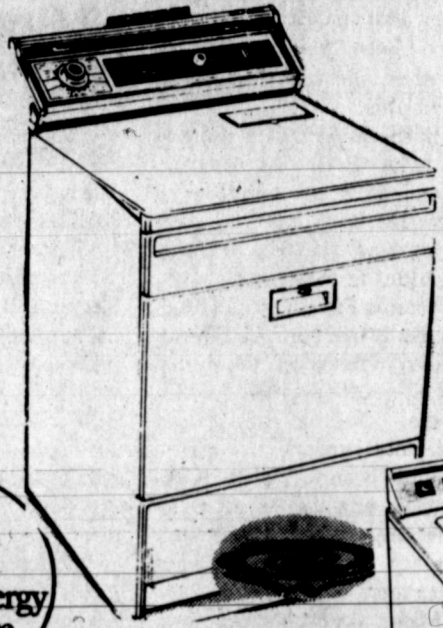
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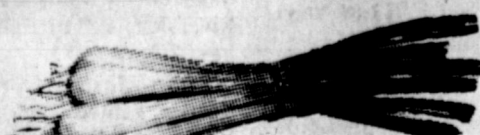
