Jr. High Colts Defeat Wheeler 28-14 To Win District 2-A Grade School Honors

The Jr. High Colts coached by Pete Bromley and Bill Thomas finished an unblemished season last Thursday night by defeating Wheeler 28-14. This victory gave the Colts undisputed ownership of the District 2-A Grade School football championship for 1967.

Wesley Gardner started the Colt scoring off early in the first quarter on an eight yard run and Joe Shadle ran the 2 point conversion. A short time later, Joe Shadle crossed the goal line from the 1 yard line for 6 points and Mack Tomlinson ran the conversion and extended the score to 16-0 at half time.

In the 3rd quarter Mack Tomlinson passed to Jim Thomas for 15 yards and 6 points and the conversion try failed. Larry Longan added the final 6 points on a 40 yard pass from Tomlinson and the conversion try failed. The Colt reserves played the greater portion of the second half of the game.

Wheeler scored twice in the fourth period on a one yard plunge and on a 25 yard run in the fading moments of the game. Their conversion was good on the last try bringing the final score to 28-14.

Larry Longan, Wesley Gardner and Jim Thomas were elected season captains Tuesday after the close of the season.

Coaches Bromley and Thomas took the entire Colt squad to see the West Texas Buffaloes play Arlington Saturday night. The boys had the opportunity to witnessing the homecoming activities along with a thrilling college football game.

Coach Bromley expressed his appreciation this week for the fine fan support throughout the entire season. The Colts showed their admiration for Coach Bromley following the game Thursday night by carrying him from the field to the field house and literally soaking him with their version of Champagne (Ginger Ale and soda water).

The Colt Mothers will fete the boys with their annual football banquet November 16 in the cafeteria.

Former Clarendon Pastor Dies In Abilene

Rev. J. Perry King, a former pastor of the Clarendon First Baptist Church, was pronounced dead on arrival at an Abilene hospital Friday. Funeral services were held Saturday afternoon at the First Baptist Church in Abilene with Rev. James Flammig, pastor, officiating. Burial was in Elmwood Memorial Park.

Rev. King, 77, was born April 2, 1890 at Rome, Georgia. He attended school at Simmons College and Hardin Simmons University at Abilene and was married to the former Hortense Holt of Caps, Texas. Among the churches he had served as pastor were those at Smith, Hodges, Caps, Tye, Rule, Clarendon, Roby and Mesquite. In the early 1950s he retired and after retirement organized an Industrial Mission in Amarillo. He and his wife later moved to Abilene and he held numerous revivals and funeral services.

Surviving are his wife of 2102 Bridge Street, Abilene; one son, John Burton King of Ballinger; two brothers and nine sisters; also three grandchildren.

SKIP ROW COTTON FOR 1968
Cotton acreages planted in skip row patterns in 1968 will be determined on the same basis as in 1965. This means that cotton planted 2 in and 2 out will be considered 50% cotton. Skips of less than 4 normal rows, however, will still not count as diverted acres.

CAPS NOT OFFERED FOR 1968
There will be no long range CAP program offered for 1968. This will in no way affect 1963 and 1967 agreements.

FARM STORAGE AND EQUIPMENT LOANS AVAILABLE

The ever present need for orderly marketing to protect farm prices—particularly at harvest-time—requires sufficient bins to store crops instead of rushing them to market.

Commodity loans on stored crops can furnish immediate money and thus help farmers keep their crops off depressed markets, but this program too depends on plenty of storage.

Since many farmers do not have facilities to store and condition crops, we are reminding producers that loans are available through this office, to construct storage facilities on the farm. If you think you might be interested, come by and talk with us about this.

Halloween Vandalism Costly For Local Firms

For the most part Halloween was quite orderly with Trick & Treaters enjoying a wonderful evening of fun but this was all marred by the action of vandals with air rifles or pistols during the early hours of the morning after those youngsters who enjoyed good, clean, wholesome fun had gone to bed.

At an early count Wednesday morning, Police Chief Gary Gerdes, reported thirteen business firms that had plate glass windows and doors shot up with BB guns. In checking with Walt Knorpp at Knorpp Insurance, the damage will run into the thousands of dollars as many of the plate glass windows and doors cost in excess of \$200 and several of the firms lost more than one glass.

Broncs Defeat Claude In Close Fought Battle

The Clarendon Bronchos defeated the Claude Mustangs here Friday night in a hard-fought ballgame 18-8.

The Mustangs opened the scoring in the first of the second quarter on a quarterback sneak by Edwin Campbell. The try for the two-point conversion was good, leaving the score 8-0.

The two teams battled evenly until the last of the first half when Clarendon's Don Mooring hit Monte Land with a 49 yard scoring pass. The Bronchos' two-point conversion was good, tying the score at half-time 8-8.

Late in the third quarter Phillip Longan kicked a 45 yard field goal. These three points seemingly were to be the deciding points in the ballgame until Charles Louis broke over his own right tackle for a 30 yard scoring run.

The coaches had praise for what they considered the team's best effort of the year. Clarendon's defensive unit held the potent Mustang offense to only 134 total yards.

Clarendon Jr. Varsity dropped a 14-10 decision to Memphis Saturday morning.

Funeral Services For Rev. W. H. DeBord Held Sunday Afternoon

Funeral services for Rev. William Henry DeBord, 92, a retired Baptist minister, were held Sunday afternoon, October 29, in the First Baptist Church of Clarendon. Rev. Clifford Jester, pastor of Shady Oaks Baptist Church at Hurst, Texas and Rev. J. C. Denton, pastor of Keele Heights Baptist Church at Borger, both grandsons, and Rev. W. R. Lawrence, pastor of First Baptist Church, Clarendon, officiated. Interment was in Rowe Cemetery at Hedley with Murphy Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.

Rev. DeBord died Friday, October 27, in Groom Memorial Hospital where he had been a patient for three days. He was born July 12, 1875 in Missouri. He came to the Indian Territory and on December 4, 1904 was married to Mattie Jamar at Hickory, Okla. They came to the Texas Panhandle in 1907 and he was ordained to the ministry in August 1909 at McKnight. He was pastor of churches in the Panhandle area over 60 years before his retirement in 1945. Rev. DeBord served churches in Naylor, McKnight, Windy Valley, Ashtola, Hudgins, Kheen and Bray communities among others. His church membership was in the First Baptist Church of Clarendon. He was a member of the Clarendon IOOF Lodge No. 381 for over 50 years.

Surviving are his wife, Mattie of the home; two daughters, Mrs. Elmer Dishman of Lelia Lake and Mrs. L. L. Jester of Altus, Okla.; four sons, Burk DeBord of Ashtola, Clifford DeBord of Canyon, Lawrence DeBord of Stratford, and Clarence DeBord of Vega; one sister, Mrs. Nancy Watkins of Amarillo; twenty-one grandchildren and twenty-three great grandchildren.

Pallbearers were grandsons: Derral Jester, Claude DeBord, Ray DeBord, Weldon Jester, Neal DeBord and Keith Dishman.

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Decisions For Texas Voters, Saturday, November 11th

Qualified Texas voters in the Nov. 11 Texas general election will cast their preferences on six proposed constitutional amendments.

The amendments and a discussion of arguments for and against them are listed in the following outline. A resume of each amendment will be continued from week to week until all have been covered.

AMENDMENT NO. 3 EXTENDS THE VETERANS' LAND PROGRAM BY AUTHORIZING THE SALE OF \$200 MILLION OF STATE BONDS TO PURCHASE LAND TO BE SOLD TO VETERANS AND EXPANDS THE PROGRAM TO INCLUDE VETERANS OF VIETNAM.

Presently the definition of "Texas veteran" eligible to participate in the program is left to the legislature. This proposed amendment would incorporate these qualifications in the Constitution as follows: Prescribed military service; citizen of the United States and resident of Texas at the time he files his application to purchase land; honorable discharge from the service; resident of Texas at the time he entered the service or has resided in Texas at least five years before the date of filing his application to purchase land. The main change in this from the present statute is that it does not require the veteran to be a resident of Texas at the time he entered the service.

The proposed amendment also authorizes an additional \$200 million in bonds to be issued for this

program and increases the maximum interest rate on all bonds sold from 3½ per cent to 4½ per cent. This program was started in 1949 when enabling legislation was passed for the Constitutional Amendment adopted in 1946 creating a \$25 million fund. In 1951 and 1956 amendments to the Constitution were passed increasing the fund to \$200 million. In 1963 and 1965 amendments were defeated that would have added to the fund. The program terminated on Dec. 1, 1965. This proposed amendment would reactivate the program and bring the veterans of Vietnam under its provisions.

FOR: This program does not cost the taxpayer. It will produce an eventual profit on the \$400 million from the sale of

bonds. The difference in interest paid on the bonds and that received from the veterans puts the program on the credit side of the ledger. Traditionally Texans have shown their appreciation to veterans by making land available. It is only fair that veterans of Vietnam should have the same privileges.

AGAINST: The availability of "cheap" money tends to invite land purchases by some veterans who have no intention of using it for productive purposes. The fact that the voters have twice defeated an amendment to increase the fund and extend the duration of the program shows that Texans do not want it. The program officially terminated in 1965 and should not be revived, as it is still too early to provide for veterans

of Vietnam, and veterans of other wars had ample time to take advantage of it if they had so wished. The Veterans Land Program may be considered unfair to private business since it is not a function of government to engage in the loan business.

AMENDMENT NO. 4 AUTHORIZES COUNTIES TO PAY MEDICAL DOCTOR, AND HOSPITAL BILLS OF COUNTY LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICERS FOR INJURIES RECEIVED IN LINE OF DUTY AND TO PAY SALARIES OF INJURED DURING TIME OF INCAPACITATION.

This proposed amendment is permissive. At the present time the Texas Constitution prohibits the payment of medical expenses of county law enforcement officers who are injured in the course of official duty. This amendment would make it possible for counties to assume these obligations if they should so desire to. It does not require that any Commissioners Court must assume this responsibility. It also permits payment of maximum salaries to these officers during their incapacitation or hospitalization until the expiration of their term of office.

FOR: Law enforcement is a dangerous business. County officers often work under hazardous conditions. The medical protection provided for in this amendment is badly needed by county officers, who are not now covered by workmen's compensation. Recruitment of law enforcement personnel is one of the greatest problems in the state today. Passage of this proposed amendment would enable counties to be competitive in attracting well trained, capable people. Definite guidelines for the salary continuation of officials will standardize the procedure for all counties.

AGAINST: This is another intrusion of government into what should be private business. It

would be better to increase the salaries of the officers and let them plan their own insurance and disability programs. Other county employees should have the same treatment; not some having preferential treatment. Wealthier counties can provide better medical plans; thus making recruitment even harder for counties in a poor financial condition.

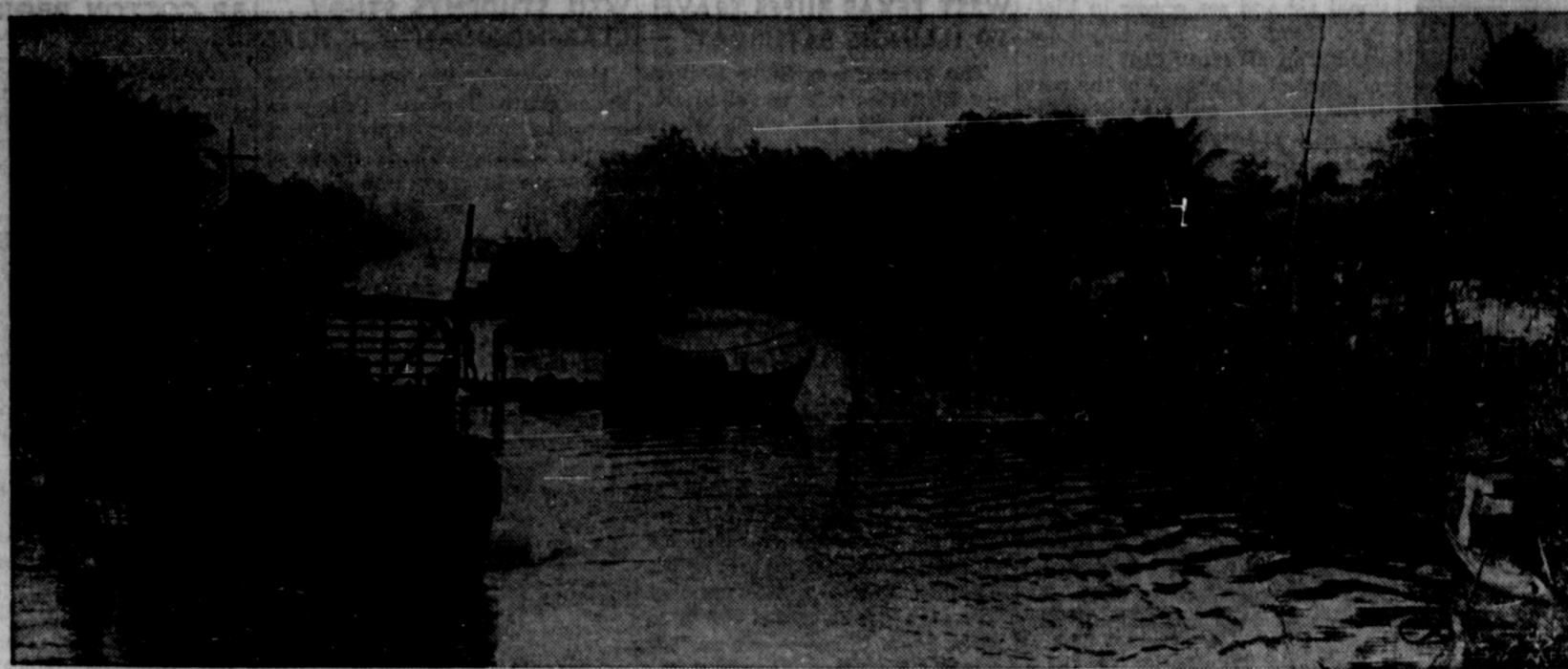

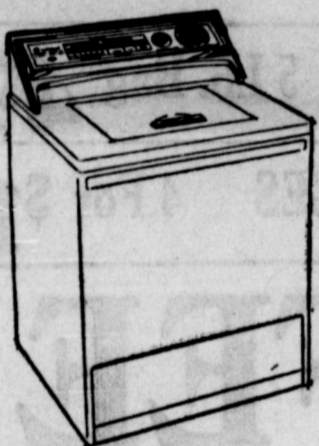

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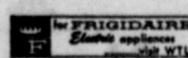
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REYNOLDS ANNOUNCES FOR RE-ELECTION COUNTY COMMISSIONER, PCT. 1
