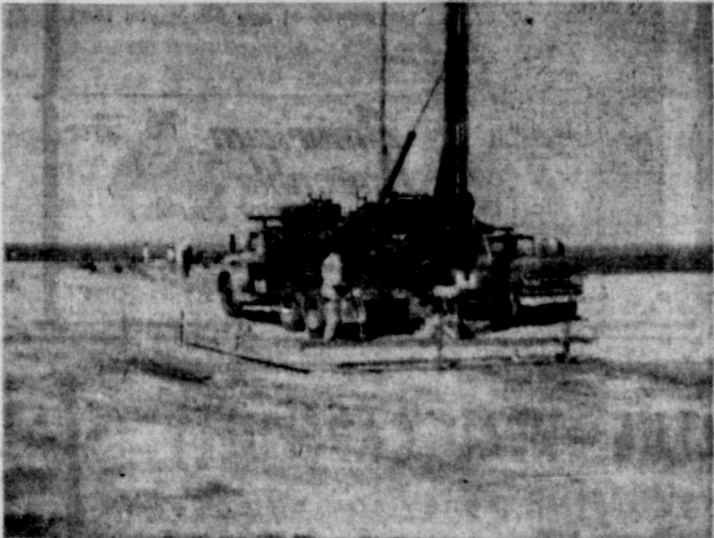

### FARM NEWS

from County ASCS Committee

#### 1968 UPLAND COTTON PROGRAM ANNOUNCED

The following changes have been made in the cotton program for 1968:

(1) The required diversion will be 5% of the allotment. This was 12.5% in 1967. The payment rate on this 5% will be the same as for 1967 — 10.76 cents per pound.

(2) The payment rate for voluntary reduction (up to an additional 30% has been reduced to 6c per pound.

(3) Price support payment on the planted acreage up to 65% of the allotment at 12.24 cents per pound as compared to 11.53 in 1967.

(4) There will be no penalty for planting in a skip-row planting pattern.

Only that land actually planted in cotton will be counted as such. The following provisions remain the same:

(1) The national allotment remains the same; however, the share for Texas is a little less than in 1967.

(2) You will vote again on whether or not you want the program.

(3) The national projected yield remains the same.

(4) The loan rate will be 20.25 cents per pound.

(5) The small farm provisions remain the same.

#### 1968 CROPLAND ADJUSTMENT PROGRAM

We have been advised that Congress has eliminated the 1968 Cropland Adjustment Program from the Appropriation Bill. This means that there will be no sign-up for producers desiring to participate in this long range program. This will in no way affect 1966 or 1967 agreements as funds will be made available to producers for annual and cost share payments for the entire agreement period.

### Gooch Warns Of Frosted Sorghums

Frost and freezing weather will soon be here and with the change in weather plant growth is affected. When the growth of all members of the Sorghum family, including Johnsongrass, sudan, milo, forage sorghums and all hybrids, is stopped by frost, they sometimes develop a high prussic acid content and a hazard to grazing livestock.

Certain chemical changes occur in the frost-wilted plants, and are responsible for the prussic acid development, explains County Agent Ronald Gooch. The poison acts quickly and can kill an animal within a very short time after the damaged plant is eaten. Whether a poisoned animal can be saved depends upon how soon a veterinarian can get to it, says the county agent.

Frosted Johnsongrass or sorghum should not be grazed until the damaged plants are as dry as good quality hay or for at least a week after the frost, warns the county agent. If it is ready to cut for hay before the frost, it may be cut immediately provided adequate curing time is allowed. Silage made from frost-damaged plants is safe as soon as the ensiling process is complete.

Young plants or second growth suckers are more likely to cause trouble than older plants nearing maturity, explains Gooch. Too, the more luxuriant the growth, the more likely the plants will be dangerous if their growth is interrupted.

Additional information is available from veterinarians and county agents on questions relating to the grazing and/or harvesting and storing of frost wilted plants.

## NEWS FROM

### Congressman Bob Price

18th District, Texas

Last week I introduced two more Veterans bills. One of them would prevent cuts in benefits which were raised by the recently enacted Veterans Pension and Readjustment Act of 1967.

Two of my first bills which I introduced last February were to increase benefits for veterans and their widows and to increase educational allowances for veterans. I was happy to see my bills incorporated into the Act as it was passed and signed by the President.

However, the Act has certain income limitations which would be affected in many cases by increased Social Security benefits. This would exclude some veterans from the program so it will be necessary to make adjustments in the veterans' pension program.

The Veterans Affairs Committee of the House has, in fact, already begun hearings on the legislation but will not be able to complete action until the Senate agrees on the amount of Social Security increases.

The other bill I introduced would allow the Veterans Administration to contract with community nursing homes in order to alleviate crowded conditions in V.A. hospitals. This would reimburse nursing homes up to 45 percent of the cost of care furnished by the V.A. in hospitals under direct and exclusive jurisdiction of the V.A.

The new Veterans Assistance Act that went into effect October 1, will benefit not only veterans and their widows and children with a cost of living increase in pensions but will also offer educational benefits to all veterans who have served in the military since 1955 and grants certain war time benefits not previously provided to veterans serving in the Armed Forces on or after August 5, 1964.

Higher benefits will include: \$130 a month for an unmarried veteran in school full-time.

\$155 a month for married veterans in school full-time.

\$175 a month for veterans with two dependents, in school full-time, and \$10 extra per child.

Veterans may choose on-the-job or apprentice training and receive payment from \$30 to \$100 a month for the first of 4 six-month periods with payment reduced in each succeeding six-month period.

The law also includes on-the-job farm training while attending agricultural courses and flight training.

A veteran may also complete high school without losing eligibility for college training. Time spent in completing high school will not be charged against a veteran's basic entitlement period.

The Act also increases the period of time which training may be taken by extending the age limit from 23 to 26 years. It extends the over-all delimiting date for entitlement of WW II veterans to a guaranteed, direct loan, or business loan from July 25, 1967 to July 25, 1970. And the V. A. may now increase maximum allowable direct-housing loan from \$17,500 to \$25,000 in areas where it is found that cost levels so require.

Dorman Bush of the Soil Conservation Service in Clarendon also reported that the Lakeview Watershed Program here is progressing smoothly. Most of the engineering work has been completed. We hope we can get the dams and channels constructed before serious flooding such as this occurs in Donley County.

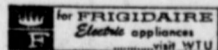

### Decisions For Texas Voters, Saturday, November 11th

Qualified Texas voters in the Nov. 11 Texas general election will cast their preferences on six proposed constitutional amendments.

The amendments and a discussion of arguments for and against them are listed in the following outline. A resume of each amendment will be continued from week to week until all have been covered.

**AMENDMENT NO. 1**  
**AUTHORIZES COUNTIES TO PUT ALL COUNTY TAX REVENUE INTO ONE GENERAL FUND WITHOUT REGARD TO**

#### SOURCE OR PURPOSE.

Financial responsibility in the post Civil War period caused the makers of the 1876 Constitution to adopt limitations on property tax rates. In 1883 the Constitution was amended to authorize counties to levy three separate taxes with minimum rates for each, and in 1907 a fourth tax was added. These taxes are for: county purposes, road and bridge, permanent improvements and the jury fund. This "earmarking" of funds was very restrictive and was amended twice. Presently County Commissioners make 4 separate non-voted tax levies on property with the total not to exceed 80 cents on the \$100 valuation. Money placed in each fund may be used only for the purposes of that fund:

**FOR:** Many times there is a surplus in one fund while a shortage exists in another. This has caused surplus funds to be used unwisely while another fund has a great shortage. By permitting all county revenues from non-voted taxes to be placed and used from one general fund, this proposed amendment would give the county commissioners greater control over budgeting procedures and would provide the flexibility necessary to permit the use of revenues collected to meet rapidly changing or unforeseen needs.

**AGAINST:** This proposed amendment would eliminate the safeguards of proper county budgeting procedure and prompt county commissioners to raise the tax rate to the 80 cents per \$100 valuation. With all the money available for unrestricted use, the County Commissioners would use available money as the need arises without any consideration of prior need or future plans.

**AMENDMENT NO. 2**  
**PERMITS MUNICIPALITIES, POLITICAL SUBDIVISIONS, & STATE SUPPORTED ENTITIES LOCATED WITHIN A HOSPITAL DISTRICT TO PARTICIPATE IN THE ESTABLISHMENT AND OPERATION OF MENTAL HEALTH, MENTAL RETARDATION, AND PUBLIC HEALTH SERVICES.**

The current trend is to make mental health and mental retardation services available to people where they live. To this end the Texas Mental Health and Retardation Act was passed in 1965. It encourages local agencies to assume responsibility for mental health and gives mental retardation services and local community centers authority to take advantage of staffing and construction grants available under federal legislation. The Attorney General of Texas has held that because the Texas Constitution does not permit other political subdivisions on the boundary of a hospital district to levy taxes for medical and hospital services these political subdivisions may not participate in the establishment of a community center for these purposes. This proposed amendment would change this by providing that the Legislature may authorize the creation of a

hospital district and at the same time not restrict other political subdivisions within the hospital district from levying taxes to provide mental health and mental retardation services through community centers. Political subdivisions within existing hospital districts would be authorized to levy taxes for these purposes unless the statute authorizing the hospital district expressly forbids it.

**FOR:** Almost one-half of the Texas population is found in the metropolitan counties having hospital districts within their boundaries. The passage of this amendment would permit establishment of mental health and mental retardation services in local communities and encourage early treatment and diagnosis. Some political subdivisions have sources of revenue other than the property tax which supports hospital districts, and new taxes to provide mental health and mental retardation services would not be necessary. Such taxes, when required at the local level, would eventually be offset by a reduction in the financial support now necessary for the large state mental hospitals and special schools.

**AGAINST:** A large share of the funds to support the community centers comes from state grants-in-aid. The local hospital district could receive this state aid in order to provide mental health and mental retardation services just as easily as could a community center supported by other than a hospital district. The proposed amendment makes possible a duplication of health program within the area of a hospital district & could result in higher costs for services provided. Since hospital districts are already financed by a property tax, a similar tax by another political subdivision would create an unfair tax burden.

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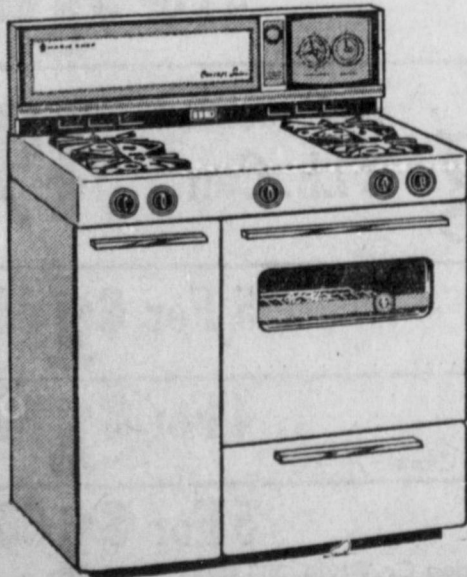

ONE RURAL TRAFFIC ACCIDENT IN SEPTEMBER

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated one accident on rural highways in Donley County during the month of September, according to Sergeant J. W. Wilson, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

This crash resulted in one person injured and an estimated property damage of \$820.00.

The rural accident summary for this county during the first nine months of 1967 shows a total of 39 accidents resulting in two persons killed, 19 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$42,937.00.

Traffic wise, the month of October signals the beginning of the most deadly season of the year. From past experience these last three months of the year almost

double the number of deaths occurring during the first three months of the year.

The Sergeant listed some factors why these three months are more deadly. (1) October marks the beginning of shorter days and longer nights. These increased hours of darkness will hide dangers otherwise visible during the daylight hours. (2) An increase in traffic due to vehicles conveying school children, football games, harvest vehicles and trailers, and the holidays. (3) Inclement weather conditions. These factors in varying degrees coupled with high speed cause accidents that would not occur in the daytime.
