

"Elfin" is definitely the word for Holly Schmidt, the little girl from Saginaw, Michigan, who has been chosen as 1968 netional poster child by Muscular Dys-trophy Associations of America. Diminutive, with bright eyes and a sudden enchanting smile, she could be one of the legen-dary "little people" whose moon-light dances, according to folk-lore, leave fairy circles in the grass.

grass.

But Holly cannot dance. She can barely walk. To make locomotion possible at all, her fragile legs must be supported by heavy steel braces. Her hands and arms are weakening, too, so that she sometimes finds it difficult to keep hold of the lively kitten, Samantha, who accompanies her Samantha, who accompanies her on all her travels for the Association. The disease which is wasting her muscles is known as peroneal muscular atrophy or—after the physicians who first identified it—Charcot-Marie-Tooth disease. It is one of the many crippling disorders of the neuromuscular unit for whose conquest MDAA has mo-bilized a worldwide army of scientists.

Roving Ambassador

It is to gain public support for that massive research program, and for the extensive services the Association makes available to patients and their families, that Holly is now "on the road." Or, rather, in the air. COMMODITY LOANS - Growers are cheating themselves if they market their crops at prices that are on fairly flat to gently below the CCC loan rate levels. that many widowers like himself might not be aware that widowers can now draw monthly benefits for their minor children. The requirements for children to receive benefits on their deceased mother's account are now the same as on a deceased father.

Mr. Wallace's situation illustrates two important changes in the Social Security Law. Patricia Ann Wallace died October 12, 1965, and was survived by her husband Glenn and son Michael, born January 26, 1959. Shortly ter her death, Mr. Wallace ap plied for and received a small lump-sum death payment. No monthly payments could be made for Michael at that time because his mother was not currently working and paying into the social security program nor furnishing one-half of Michael's sup-

As a result of the 1967 Amendments to the Social Security Law, which became effective February 1, 1968, the current work and/or support requirement was eliminated. Now the surviving children of a woman worker can receive benefits if their mother had worked and paid into the social security program, a certain length of time, even if it was many years before her death.

Mr. Wallace said his wife worked in 1957 and 1958 to help send him to college. Based on this work Michael is entitled to monthly benefits. This benefit will continue until he is age 18. The other change in the law which applies to Michael was one made in 1965. This allows a child to receive benefits after age 18 and up to age 22, if he remains in school as a full-time student and unmarried.
