16th Annual Hedley Cotton Festival Friday And Saturday, October 13-14

A large crowd is expected to be in Hedley this Friday and Saturday for the annual Hedley Cotton Festival. Committees, organizations, individuals, and groups have worked long and hard and now have all in readiness for the big event which was publicized on Cotton John's Farm & Home Show, KGNC-TV Amarillo.

Many booths and concessions as well as the Midway operated by the D.S. Dudley Shows will be open Thursday; however, the festival proper will get underway Friday with breakfast at Lions Den. Old Settlers will register at this same place. A special program has been planned beginning at 1 p.m. with Bob Ayers of Memphis serving as M.C. The afternoon's agenda will include group singing, music, novelty numbers, a cake walk and other events. In the evening there will be street dancing.

Saturday morning breakfast will be served from 7 to 9 at Lions Den and at 10:30 a.m. there will be the Kiddies Parade. Lunch will be served at various food booths, cafes, and barbecue in Lions Den. The Grand Festival Parade will be held at 2 p.m. At 5 p.m. the bale of cotton and other prizes will be presented and at 7 p.m. Cotton John, TV Station KGNC, will be on hand. An Old Fiddlers Contest is scheduled on Main Street for 7:30 p.m. and at 8 p.m. the New Queen of Cotton will be crowned at Hedley High School. Beginning at 9 p.m. there will be street dancing and at 9:30 p.m. the Festival Dance at the Legion Hall will be open.

EDITORIAL Editorials Get Things Done

Newspaper editorials get things done. At times, I've wondered what. But now I think I know. They get people to think. They may think the editor is an idiot. The Atlanta Constitution is rich with readers who hold that opinion. In order to arrive at it, however, they must (1) read his unsatisfactory argument, and then (2) justify their own. This is a painful experience on both counts, which may account for the soreness they exhibit in letters to the editor. But they have had to think about the subject.

Heavy Moisture Covers Area Friday

A frontal system that moved into the area last Friday afternoon brought heavy moisture laden clouds that turned loose a deluge of water earlier in the afternoon and again late that night. It was the heaviest precipitation to hit the county as a whole during the past several months. This was the first sizeable rain to fall on the Greenbelt Watershed and the lake rose approximately 3 1/2 feet and the shoreline was extended considerably.

The heavy downpour brought harvest operations to a standstill and from numerous reports, the hail that accompanied the storm, did considerable harvesting of crops north and east of Hedley. Damage was reported heavy to cotton and grain crops.

W. G. Johnson reported 2.60 inches of moisture at Hedley; Willard Knox reported 2.40 at Lelia Lake, Hubert Rhoades 1.80 at Ashtola, Oscar Johnson 1.40 at the Country Club and our official measurement here in town was 1.84 which brought our yearly total to 14.28.

"I guess a man's job," William Percy's father told him, "is to make the world a better place to live in, so far as he is able—always remembering the results will be infinitesimal—and to attend to his own soul."

An editorial is, of itself, no better than the incentive it provides the reader to attend to his own soul, I think. Whether the editorial opinion itself is accepted is secondary to that. The people will find their own way when they think.

This breaking of silent fear, this beginning of talking and thinking, is the goal an editor shoots for in a frozen situation where minds have ceased to question. The editorial doesn't have to be right. But it gets things done.

It gets the people to think.

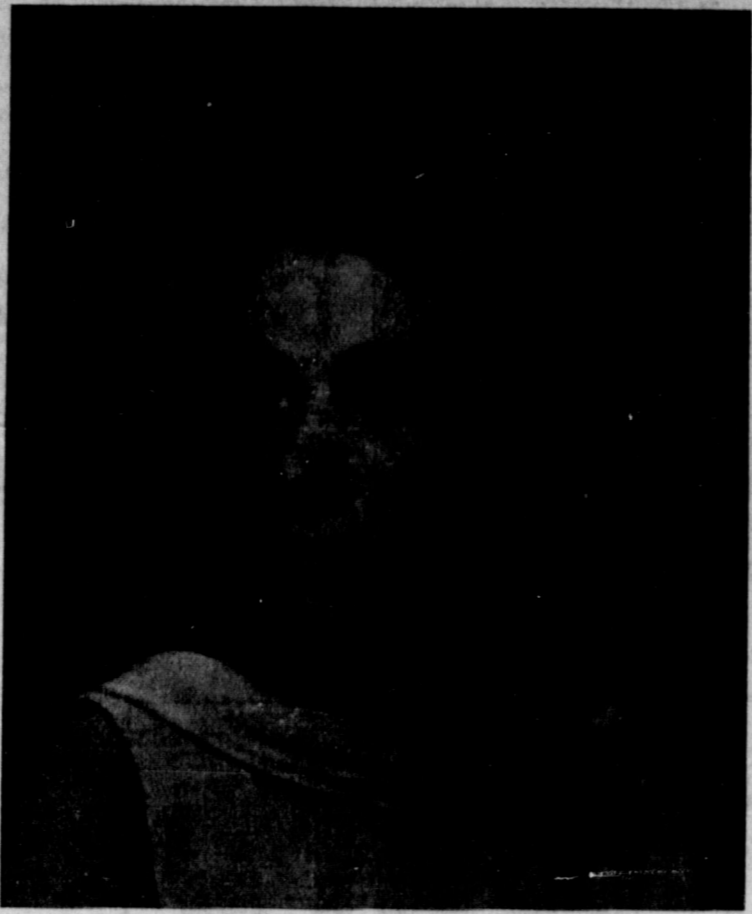

DPS To Enforce State Speed Laws

(Note: This is the third and final article dealing with an all-out drive by the Texas Department of Public Safety encouraging motorists to drive within the speed limits on Texas highways to reduce the state's ever mounting traffic toll.)

Texas motorists will be watching their speedometers more in coming months, as the Texas Highway Patrol fields more patrolmen and more radar speed checking units in a battle against motorcade.

Purpose of the all-out drive against speeders is simple. The Highway Patrol knows that speed kills—and they hope that by sprinkling the state's heavily traveled arteries with radar speed checking units, the ever mounting Texas highway death toll will be reduced.

Previous articles in this series have shown that excessive speed is a contributing factor in a large percentage of the accidents on Texas highways, that the chances of a driver becoming involved in an accident increase many fold when he drives faster than the speed limit, and that one motorist in eight was driving faster than the speed limit on Texas highways last year.

"Now just what is the Highway Patrol going to do about all this speeding?" asks Mr. average motorist, and the answer is supplied by Major Luther C. Moore, Regional Commander of the Texas Department of Public Safety.

Major Moore has announced that the DPS has ordered enough radar speed measuring units to equip almost every patrol car in the field.

Sergeant J. W. Wilson, the Highway Patrol supervisor in this area, adds: "Use of the radar sets will enable us to patrol the high-

ways more effectively, to encourage all drivers to stay within the speed limit."

The sergeant continues: "We hope everyone will drive within the speed limit but some will fail to comply, so our efforts will be directed toward apprehending the speeders in order to protect motorists who do comply with the law."

Speeders who are apprehended will face fines up to \$200.00 and convictions will be recorded on their driving records, which could affect insurance premiums. Four convictions for moving traffic violations within 12 months or seven within 24 months will result in loss of drivers licenses and driving privileges.

The Sergeant also explained that no warning tickets will be issued to speeders since the Texas Public Safety Commission has ordered that charges will be filed in every case where there is a clear cut and substantial violation of the speed laws.



Constitutional Revision Commission is busy revising or re-writing the basic document which has governed Texas since 1876.

Before it could start, it rounded out its membership by naming five senators.

Lt. Gov. Preston Smith refused to name the Senators. He says the Commission was not legally authorized. It was created by a simple House resolution and the Senate did not concur.

Senators chosen by the Commission itself were A. M. Aikin of Amarillo, J. P. Word of Meridian, Don Kennard of Fort Worth and Henry Grover of Houston.

Gov. John Connally opened the Commission's meeting by urging its members "to make some very profound recommendations about the structure of Texas government without removing fundamental safeguards."

Connally said the commission should "eliminate those portions (of the Constitution) which are outmoded and no longer applicable".

Commission Chairman Robert Storey, a Dallas attorney, said the 25-member commission, which will report to the 61st

Legislature in 1969, should try to write a brand new constitution.

Recommendations of the Commission must go first to the Legislature. If two-thirds of the lawmakers agree that the proposed revision is worth submitting to voters, a statewide election will be required before any changes can go into effect.

Larry Temple, executive assistant to Governor Connally, was designated secretary and chairman of the drafting committee. San Antonio Mayor W. W. McAllister was named vice-chairman.

Legal or not, the group will devote 14 months to the project. Eight committees were named to study various parts of the Constitution— executive, legislative, judicial, political subdivisions, bill of rights, education, revenue and taxation, and drafting.

HURRICANE ACTION — All available federal aid will be sought by Governor Connally for Rio Grande Valley and Texas coastal areas ravaged by Hurricane Beulah.

Small Business Administration early declared SBA relief loans were available to firms in the hurricane-devastated sections.

State Insurance Board dispatched experts to the Valley to help interpret the fine print of policies. Insurance companies, which paid out \$120,000,000 in Hurricane Carla losses six years ago, moved to implement "catastrophe plans" for speeding claims handling.

Board officials advised that Texas insurance policies do not cover losses due solely to flood waters or wave damage, although some do provide coverage against wind-driven rains, as well as wind damage.

Source of controversy surrounding Carla policies mainly involved losses caused by both wind and water assessment of that portion attributable to hurricane winds.

Railroad Commission delayed setting oil allowable for October pending a survey of how Hurricane Beulah affected Gulf Coast refining capacity.

competition with domestically produced goods.

In addition to the beef cattle, dairy and fruit industries, the bill was supported by textile manufacturers, footwear, glass, steel, fuel oil and natural gas, luggage and leather goods, chemicals, furniture, electronics, plastics and many others as well as the Unions which represent employees of these industries.

Many members, including myself, have introduced various bills to limit imports of meat, cotton, oil, textiles, dairy products and many other cheaply produced foreign items. This bill does not replace any of these bills but rather compliments the need for Congressional attention to the problem many of our domestic industries face from foreign competition.

Briefly, the bill establishes a procedure whereby the Secretary of Labor would investigate to determine if a particular product or related group of products is being imported into the United States under such circumstances as to undermine the public policy expressed in the Fair Labor Standards Act. That is, by impairing or threatening to impair seriously the health, efficiency, and general well-being of "any group of workers in the United States or the economic welfare of the community in which any such group of workers are employed."

If the investigation revealed unfair competition or undue burden on commerce from imports or conditions detrimental to workers, then the President would be empowered to take such action as he deems appropriate to "remove such impairment or threat of impairment." The committee report on the bill emphasized "that such action will be applied to the offending imports in the form of increased duties or quantitative limitations, and will not in any way be addressed to jobs or communities." The bill is so drawn that remedial action is possible on any item whether or not it is included in any trade agreement, present or future.

As one member noted during the debate on the bill, the legislation is long overdue as any Panhandle cattleman knows from the effects meat imports have had on the U. S. Livestock Industry.

Congressman Bob Price

18th District, Texas

Although our voting records in Congress are about as far apart as the North and South poles, my colleague in Congress from Illinois, Representative Melvin Price and I found ourselves both voting "Price is right" on a bill last week.

The bill known as the Fair Labor Standards Foreign Trade Act as passed by the House and sent to the Senate will establish procedures to relieve domestic industries and workers injured by increased imports from low-wage areas.

The legislation is the result of several years of study and work by its sponsors and both Democrats and Republican members of the House Committee on Education and Labor.

It was supported by labor unions, industry and agricultural associations including the American National Cattleman's Association.

Principal sponsor of the legislation, Representative John H. Dent of Pennsylvania, is also chairman of the Labor Subcommittee which heard of the impact of imports for more than six months during this and last year. Several members of the committee took an on-site investigation of foreign producers whose production is exported in large part to the United States and sold in

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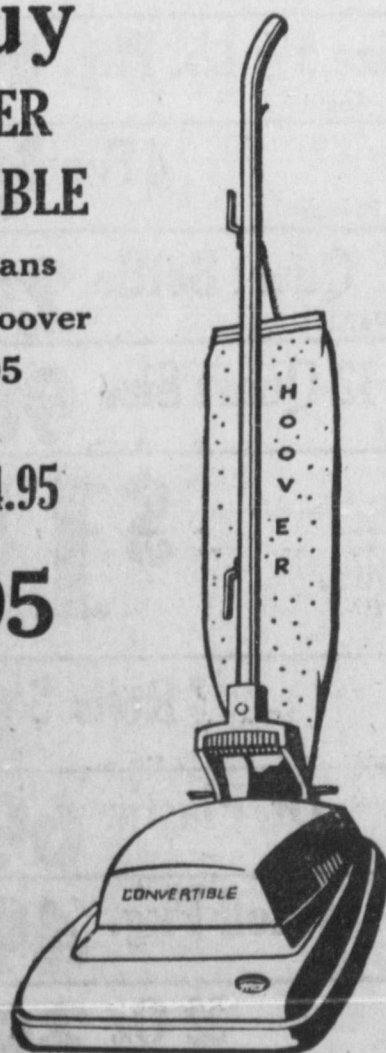
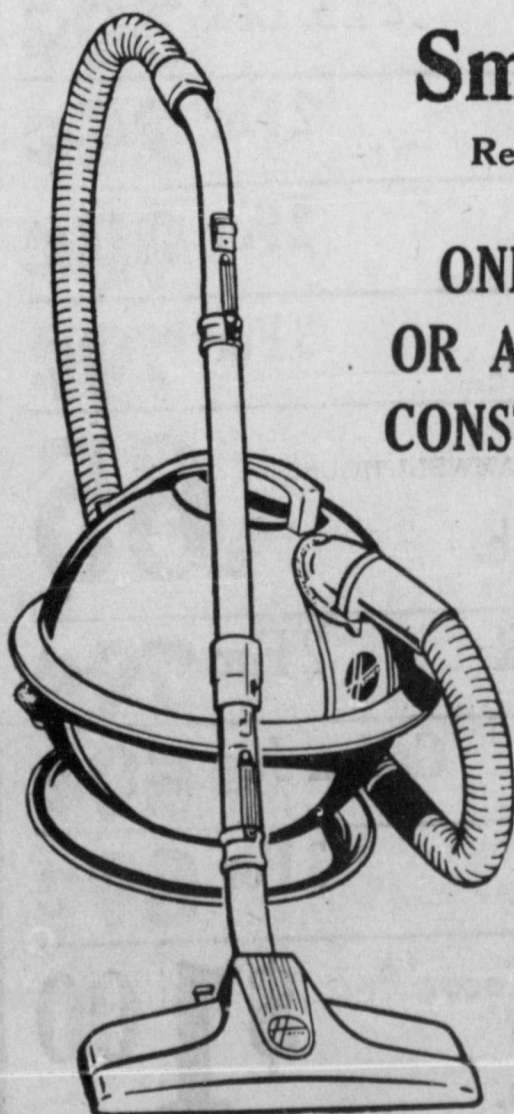
