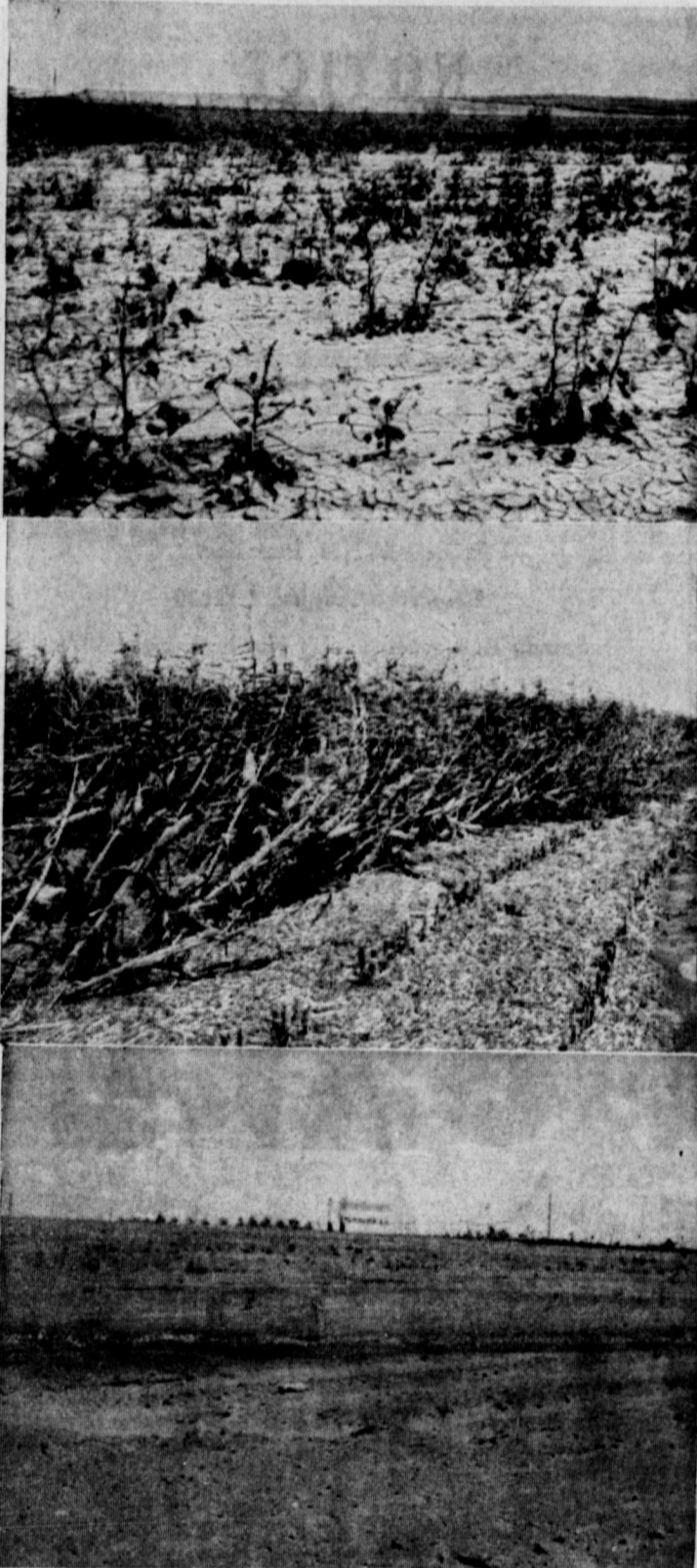

Damage from Rain, Hail and Wind Is High to Property and Crops

Torrential rain accompanied by hail and high wind late Friday afternoon took its toll in crop and property damage from the Ashtola Community to the east edge of Clarendon. It also extended to the southwest and to the north and east.

The heaviest hail damage reported was from south of Ashtola to the area immediately west of the city and within the city. What the hail didn't do, the high winds of 70-80 miles an hour did the rest. A number of residents reported seeing a tornado just above town and even though it dropped down close, it never did get on the ground. Numerous trees were uprooted and limbs broken, numerous TV antennas were toppled and fences laid over.

The west portion of town was without power for quite some time as the storm broke several high voltage power poles and dropped big power lines across the highway just north of the Sandell Theatre. C. A. Pitts, local West Texas Utilities Manager, and Mrs. Pitts had gone out to see how the lake was rising and were returning to town when they found the line down. Pitts walked in the driving rain on into town to get the process underway to restore the power and a swift job was completed considering the damage that was done. Numerous poles and the big Bell telephone cable running along the highway in the same area went down also.

The official measure of the downpour here in town was 5.25 inches at the south end of main street but gauges in the west part of town measured 6.25 and over 8 inches to the west of town. Deep gullies were cut in streets over town and the big ditch that runs thru town was near overflowing down main street at one time and did pour several inches deep down the street by the Baptist Church.

LOCAL PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH CALLS PASTOR

His hobby is Amateur Radio and he has a HAM operator's license. Mrs. McGarity has a college degree and has been teaching fourth grade in the Elementary School at Port Neches and has a healthy interest in church and community affairs.

Worship service will be held Sunday morning, August 25, at 9 a.m. and each Sunday morning thereafter at the same hour.

Greenbelt Lake Rises 6.33 Feet Friday

Frank Drummond, Filter plant Superintendent, went to work with his calculator Wednesday morning and came up with some amazing figures in regard to Greenbelt Lake.

Run-off from the torrential rains Friday brought the lake up 6.33 feet to an elevation figure of 2631.48 feet above sea level. This figure places the lake at 51 feet deep at the dam and when the lake level reaches the top of the morning glory (concrete spillway) it will be 2561 elevation and will hold a total of 59,800 acre feet of water.

Following the run-off Friday, the lake now covers 800 surface acres and contains 15,130 acre feet of water. When full it will measure 1,990 surface acres. There are 325,850 gallons of water per acre foot and at present the dam now compounds a total of 4,930,110,500 gallons of water; that's close to 5 billion gallons. When full the dam will compound 19,485,830,000 gallons of water as the lake is approximately one-fourth full at the present time.

Heavy Rain Hikes Moisture Total

The heavy rain that hit the local area Friday afternoon boosted the weekly total to 19.46 inches compared with only 10.96 inches for the August total so far stands at 6.93 with 5.36 of that amount being recorded Friday.

The area immediately west of town caught over 8 inches Friday while Hubert Rhoades reported 2.90 at Ashtola and 5 inches for the week. Lella Lake received 2.80 inches and the area toward the Country Club and the Filter plant received 3 to 6 inches.

RC&D Project Planned For Four County Area; Meeting Fri.

Plans for the establishment of a Resource Conservation and Development (RC&D) project for the purpose of engaging in the total development and use of all resources at a local level is progressing in Donley, Collingsworth, Hall and Wheeler counties.

These counties are similar in their economic and resource makeup and can work together for a common good to establish many worthwhile projects which will help utilize the natural resources of this area.

Monty Sowers, Work Unit Conservationist of the SCS for Donley County, has met with various groups and organizations in Donley County to explain and discuss the project and encourage sponsorship. Harold White, Soil and Water Conservationist District Supervisor at Hedley, has also spoken to various groups and reports interest widespread.

Local organizations that have already passed resolutions sponsoring or endorsing the project include the Donley Soil and Water Conservation District, The Donley County Commissioners Court, Clarendon Chamber of Commerce, Clarendon Jaycees, Donley County Ministerial Alliance, Beta Sigma Phi Sorority, Clarendon Junior College, the Farmers State Bank, and perhaps the Hedley and Clarendon School Boards. Others are interested in this project and plan to endorse it at a later date. The first step in the estab-

lishment of a RC&D project is to form a steering committee for the overall project. Ten or 15 members from Donley County will serve on the steering committee and be responsible for the initial planning and drafting of an application for such a project.

A meeting of representatives from all four counties will be held Friday morning, August 23, at 9:30 a.m. in the Farmers State Bank in Clarendon to discuss and plan the formal application.

McCULLY ATTENDS POSTMASTERS SCHOOL

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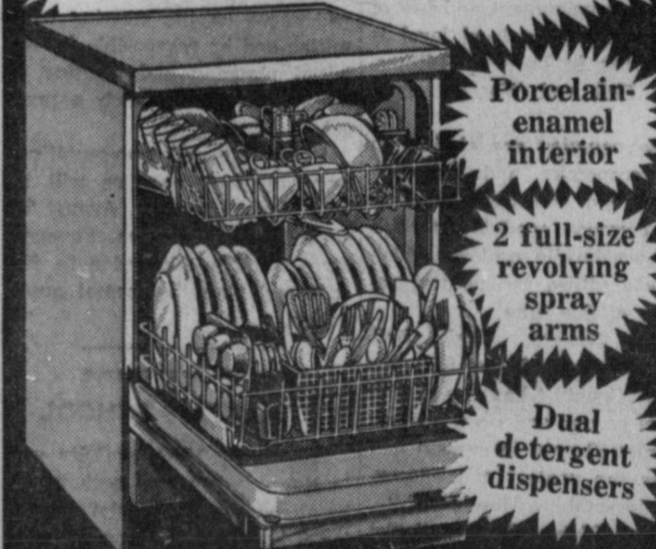
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PUBLIC NOTICE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section 52a to read as follows: "Section 52a. Bonds to be issued by Dallas County under Section 52 of Article III of this Constitution for the construction, maintenance and operation of macadamized, graded or paved roads and turnpikes, or in aid thereof, may, without the necessity of future or amendatory legislation, be issued upon a vote of a majority of the resident property taxpayers voting thereon who are qualified electors of said county, and to provide that bonds hereafter or hereinafter issued under Subsections (a) and (b) of said Section 52 shall not be included in determining the debt limit prescribed in said Section."

PUBLIC NOTICE
Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER FOURTEEN ON THE BALLOT (HR22)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That the Constitution of Texas, Article III, be and the same is hereby amended by deleting therefrom Section 18, and substituting in lieu thereof the following:

"Section 18. No Senator or Representative shall, during the term for which he was elected, be eligible to (1) any civil office of profit under this State which shall have been created, or the emoluments of which may have been increased, during such term, or (2) any office or place, the appointment to which may be made, in whole or in part, by either branch of the Legislature; provided, however, the fact that the term of office of Senators and Representatives does not end precisely on the last day of December but extends a few days into January of the succeeding year shall be considered as de minimis, and the ineligibility herein created shall terminate on the last day of December of the last full calendar year of the term for which he was elected. No member of either House shall vote for any other member for any office whatever, which may be filled by a vote

of the Legislature, except in such cases as are in this Constitution provided, nor shall any member of the Legislature be interested, either directly or indirectly, in any contract with the State, or any county thereof, authorized by any law passed during the term for which he was elected."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state, at an election to be held throughout the state on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment fixing the time during which members of the Legislature shall be ineligible to hold other offices."

"AGAINST the constitutional amendment fixing the time during which members of the Legislature shall be ineligible to hold other offices."

If it appears from the returns of such election that a majority of the votes cast therein are for such amendment, same shall become a part of the Constitution of Texas.

PROOF OF AGE NEEDED FOR SOCIAL SECURITY RETIREMENT

Are you planning to file for your social security retirement benefits anytime in the next few years? If you are, Travis C. Briggs, manager of the Amarillo social security office, suggests that you get proof of your age now rather than waiting until you file your claim.

Most frequent delay in processing a claim is waiting for proof of the applicant's age. The State of Texas has been keeping birth records since 1903. Although some births were not recorded in those early years, a surprisingly large number are on record.

Briggs suggests that if you are over 60, you should request a search for your birth record now.

Use the coupon below. Give full information. Sign your name and show your present mailing address. Enclose a \$1.50 check or money order payable to the Bureau of Vital Statistics; if you were born in Texas. The fee varies from state to state. Even a "no record" answer will help speed your future social security claim, as more recent records may then be used, adds Briggs.

The climax of the rodeo will be the naming of the Junior and Senior All-Round Cowboys, two of the highest honors that can be earned by the boys. Soil Conservation District News

With any kind of soil, the objective of good soil management is to maintain a high degree of fertility and to obtain maximum crop production.

The sandy soils in this area require intense management and a conservation cropping system to maintain fertility and production.

Cotton and sorghums are the two most important commercial crops.

Grain sorghum is recommended for stubble mulching in this area because it produces a large amount of residue.

Grow sorghum as frequently as possible to control wind erosion. Plant the crop in rows about 20 inches apart. The stubble must be in narrow rows and must be standing during winter and early spring to give maximum protection against wind erosion.

The usual practice is to plant cotton on the better soils and sorghum on the poorer soils. When entire farms are planted to cotton control of wind erosion is very difficult.

Cotton gives almost no residue cover for protection against wind erosion and therefore is not suited to sandy erodible soils. After the cotton is harvested,

stake shredding and listing is the only way to control wind erosion. Some wind erosion still takes place, however.

A small grain cover crop would be very desirable in many cases. Fertilizers are necessary on all irrigated soils coarser than fine sandy loam. Potassium may be deficient on extremely sandy soils. Liming is not required.

Terracing and contour farming are needed on many of the farms in this area. Terraces are recommended only where the subsurface soil is heavy enough to form a stable terrace.

A combination of conservation cropping system, proper management of crop residues, and contour farming will maintain the productivity of your farm and could mean the difference in the profit and loss column next January.

For further information regarding an improved cropping system for your farm contact the Soil Conservation Service in Clarendon, Texas.

TREATED WOOD SUGGESTED FOR OUTDOOR PROJECTS

Are you planning an outdoor project such as a patio, picnic table, or fence? Since wood is usually used in these projects, it should be protected by the use of preservatives, says W. A. Smith, Extension forester at Texas A&M University.

If wood is to be exposed to the

weather or in contact with the ground, it usually needs to be treated with a preservative.

Even the sapwood portion of decay resistant woods like cedar, cypress, and redwood necessitate a preservative treatment, Smith warned that only the dark colored heartwood of these species can be used without it.

"It's difficult, if not impossible, to purchase lumber of all heartwood of these species," Smith said.

The best treatment is the pressure process. Pressure treated lumber is available from most retail lumber yards and wood treating firms. One of the paintable preservatives should be requested if painting is required or if the wood will be in contact with clothing or the skin. Penta-WR with a mineral spirits carrier provides a good treatment for this purpose. An oil carrier like fuel oil or kerosene should be used if the wood is to be in contact with the ground such as in the case of fenceposts, the forester said.

Some protection for wood exposed to the weather can be gained by brush, spray, or dip treatments. Penta-WR with the proper carrier works well for this purpose. It can be obtained in the ready-mixed or concentrate form from most paint supply dealers and mail order firms. Care should be exercised to protect the skin and plants from the preservative while treating, Smith advised.

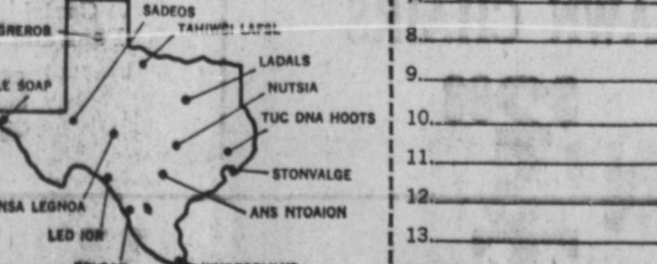

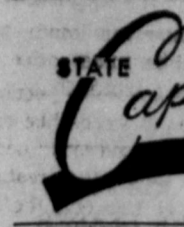

Col. Morris S. Schwartz, state selective director, said budgetary limitations will prevent pre-induction physical-mental exams during August.

July call was 695 men. Calls in 1967 ranged from a low of 674 to a high of 1,421. Monthly quotas this year have ranged as high as 2,378 (last April).

Trail of Forts

A federal grant of \$16,875 has been approved for the city of Portland (San Patricio County) to develop a 13-acre park and outdoor recreation facilities. City will match the grant with local funds for the \$33,750 project.

Governor Connally authorized a \$5,273 regional planning grant to Brazos Valley Development Council (Brazos, Grimes, Leon, Madison and Robertson Counties and 12 cities).

Another \$4,000 grant for planning went to the Orange County Council.

A smaller grant of \$1,277 was cleared for Austin-Travis County Organization for Regional Planning which includes Austin, West Lake Hills, Manor, Rollingwood, Pflugerville, Austin Independent School District, Del Valley ISD 910 and Water District No. 11.

Securities Permits

Twenty-eight applications for permits to sell \$18,472,706 in securities in Texas were filed last week with the State Securities Board.

This included applications from three Texas companies—Bethesda Bath House Corporation of Marlin for \$91,900, Crown Western Investments, Inc., of Dallas for \$743,047, and Non-Commissioned Officers Life Insurance Company of Austin for \$215,000.

Short Snorts

Rep. John Traeger of Seguin was re-elected urban affairs committee chairman of the southern conference of Council of State Governments.

Latest report from the Texas Liquor Control Board shows 2,831 criminal complaints were filed by LCB agents in June with 2,500 convictions for violations of the liquor law and \$90,022 in fines and costs.

Delegations from the Fort Worth-Dallas metropolitan area appeared before the Texas High-

way Commission to ask for planning of future big-city highways which between them would cost more than \$500,000,000.

With the Republican convention out of the way, Paul Eggers of Wichita Falls got back to his campaign for governor of Texas.

And his Democratic opponent, Lt. Gov. Preston Smith, got started on a round of meetings with delegates to the state Democratic convention to see what they want in the party platform.

Smith's 31 meetings with delegates from each of the 31 senatorial districts is an unusual approach to the party grassroots. He is asking the delegates to tell him how he should campaign to offset the growing Republican threat.

Democrats recall that in 1960, when then Vice-president Richard M. Nixon was the Republican candidate for president, the unknown Republican candidate for governor, William M. Steger, got 609,808 votes without even making a campaign. This time Eggers has been campaigning for months. He has been picking up support from dissident Democrats like Sen. Grady Hazlewood of Amarillo and with Nixon on the top of the ticket again, he is considered a real threat.

Eggers has been making a series of regional bus tours, campaigning in as many as 30 towns in four days, in an effort to duplicate the Smith success with personal campaigning.

During the primary campaign, Smith visited in 225 counties, some of which had never before seen a candidate for governor. This hard work showed up when he won the Democratic nomination easily.

Legislative Conference

Texas House Speaker Ben Barnes will attend the National Legislative Conference in Miami, Florida, Aug. 20-22.

Among the topics to be discussed by the state legislative leaders from all 50 states are bloc grants from the federal government, annual legislative sessions and others concerning the recent problems of state government.

Barnes is president-elect of the conference.

56 Opinions

Community Action Agencies handling poverty programs may not be under the direction of county commissioners courts not may they be headed by persons designated by commissioners courts, according to an opinion by Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin.

Opinion notes that under the Texas Constitution, commissioners courts shall deal only with county business and concludes that poverty programs are not within the constitutional boundaries of commissioners court power.

Of the 56 CAAS in Texas, only five are handled through commissioners courts, so the effect of this ruling is not expected to be major.

In another opinion, Attorney General Martin ruled that the governor may authorize spending of federal funds to build a residence for the superintendent of the Huntsville State Fish Hatchery.

Authorization does not constitute an increase in the appropriation but merely authorizes the expenditure of funds already allocated by the legislature. Martin said the superintendent's house burned after lightning hit it on May 19.

Governor Connally approved spending \$25,000 in available federal funds to build a new residence.

Securities Approved/Stopped

State Securities Board received 22 applications for permits to sell \$8,939,110 in securities in Texas last week.

Securities Commissioner William M. King said the applications included two Texas companies—Accelerators, Inc., Austin, and Electronics Data Systems Corporation, Dallas.

Deputy Commissioner Truman G. Holladay has ordered discontinuance of trade in the securities of Computronics Industries Corporation and Universal Computa-Data Corporation, both of 11111 N. Central Expressway, Dallas.

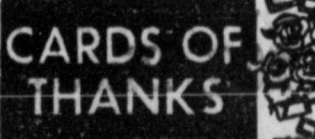
HemisFair Humphrey

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT (HJR61)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 24, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 24. Members of the Legislature shall receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary of not exceeding Eight Thousand, Four Hundred Dollars (\$8,400) per year and a per diem of not exceeding Twelve Dollars (\$12) per day of each Regular Session and each Special Session of the Legislature. No Regular Session shall be of longer duration than one hundred and forty (140) days.

"In addition to the per diem the Members of each House shall be entitled to mileage in going to and returning from the seat of government, not to exceed one round trip per month during such time as the Legislature is in session, which mileage shall not exceed Two Dollars and Fifty Cents (\$2.50) for every twenty-five (25) miles, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel, from a table of distances prepared by the Comptroller, to each county seat now or hereafter to be established; no Member to be entitled to mileage for any extra Session that may be called within one (1) day after the adjournment of the Regular or Called Session.

Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment providing the members of the Legislature shall receive as salary an amount not exceeding Eight Thousand, Four Hundred Dollars (\$8,400) per year."

"AGAINST the constitutional amendment providing the members of the Legislature shall receive as salary an amount not exceeding Eight Thousand, Four Hundred Dollars (\$8,400) per year."

PUBLIC NOTICE
Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWELVE ON THE BALLOT (SJRI4)

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 14 proposing an amendment to Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding a new Section 52a to give the Legislature the power to authorize cities and counties to issue revenue bonds for industrial development purposes.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section 52a to read as follows:

"Section 52a. The Legislature shall have the power to authorize counties, cities, and towns to issue revenue bonds for industrial development purposes, or in aid thereof; provided, that property acquired from proceeds of the bonds shall be subject to ad valorem taxes. Legislation passed in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment shall not be invalid solely because of its anticipatory nature. The tax revenue, the utility revenue, and the revenue from services of any county, city or town may not be used to pay any bonds issued pursuant to this authority nor the interest thereon."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment to give the Legislature the power to authorize cities and counties to issue revenue bonds for industrial development purposes."

"AGAINST the constitutional amendment to give the Legislature the power to authorize cities and counties to issue revenue bonds for industrial development purposes."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (SJR39)

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 39 proposing an amendment to Subsection (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas, relating to establishment of a retirement, disability and death compensation fund for officers and employees of the state, so as to create an agency of the State of Texas the Employees Retirement System of Texas, vesting the general administration and responsibility of the proper operation of said system in a state board of trustees to be known as the State Board of Trustees of the Employees Retirement System of Texas, authorizing said Board to invest assets of said system in various obligations and subjects of investment, subject to certain restrictions stated therein and such other restrictions as may hereafter be provided by law; providing that contributions of members and the state shall not exceed at any time six per centum (6%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the state; providing that such Amendment shall be self-enacting; providing for the necessary election, form of ballot, proclamation, and publication; and declaring legislative intent that the adoption of this Joint Resolution shall constitute repeal of Senate Joint Resolution No. 3, previously adopted by the 60th Legislature, so that the proposition as set forth in this Resolution may be submitted to the voters of this state in lieu of the proposition contained in Senate Joint Resolution No. 3.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Subsection (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read hereafter as follows:

"Section 62. (a) The Legislature shall have the authority to levy taxes to provide a State Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the officers and employees of the state, and may make such reasonable inclusions, exclusions, or classifications of officers and employees of this state as it deems advisable. The Legislature may also include officers and employees of judicial districts of the state who are or have been compensated in whole or in part directly or indirectly by the state, and may make such other reasonable inclusions, exclusions, or classification of officers and employees of judicial districts of this state as it deems advisable. Persons participating in a retirement system created pursuant to this Constitution shall not be eligible to participate in the Fund authorized in this subsection; and persons participating in a retirement system created pursuant to Section 48-a of Article III of this Constitution shall not be eligible to participate in the Fund authorized in this subsection, except as otherwise provided herein. The amount contributed by the state to such Fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person, and shall not exceed at any time six per centum (6%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the state.

"There is hereby created as an agency of the State of Texas as the Employees Retirement System of Texas, the rights of membership in which, the retirement privileges and benefits thereunder, and the management and operations of which shall be governed by the provisions herein contained and by present or hereafter enacted Acts of the Legislature not inconsistent herewith. The general administration and responsibility for the proper operation of said system are hereby vested in a State Board of Trustees, to be known as the State Board of Trustees of the Employees Retirement System of Texas, which Board shall be constituted and shall serve as may now or hereafter be provided by the Legislature. Said Board shall exercise such powers as are herein provided together with such other powers and duties not inconsistent herewith as may be prescribed by the Legislature. All moneys from whatever source coming into the Fund and all other securities, moneys, and assets of the Employees Retirement System of Texas shall be administered by said Board and said Board shall be the trustee thereof. The Treasurer of the State of Texas shall be custodian of said moneys and securities. Said board is hereby authorized and empowered to acquire, hold, manage, purchase, sell, assign, trade, transfer, and dispose of any securities, evidences of debt, and other investments in which said securities, moneys, and assets have been or may hereafter be invested by said Board. Said Board is hereby authorized and empowered to invest and reinvest any of said moneys, securities, and assets, as well as the proceeds of any of such investments, in bonds, notes, or other evidences of indebtedness issued, or assumed or guaranteed in whole or in part by the United States or any agency of the United States, or by the State of Texas, or by any county, city, school district, municipal corporation, or other political subdivision of

the State of Texas, both general and special obligations; or in home office facilities to be used in administering the Employees Retirement System, including common and preferred stocks, office building; or in such corporation bonds, notes, other evidences of indebtedness, and corporation stocks, including common and preferred stocks, of any corporation created or existing under the laws of the United States or of any of the states of the United States, as said Board may deem to be proper investments; provided that in making each and all of such investments said Board shall exercise the judgment and care under the circumstances then prevailing which men of ordinary prudence, discretion, and intelligence exercise in the management of their own affairs, not in regard to speculation but in regard to the permanent disposition of their funds, considering the probable income therefrom as well as probable safety of their capital; and further provided, that a sufficient sum shall be kept on hand to meet payments as they become due each year under such retirement plan as may now or hereafter be provided by law. Unless investments authorized herein are hereafter further restricted by an Act of the Legislature, no more than one per cent (1%) of the book value of the total assets of the Employees Retirement System shall be invested in the stock of any one (1) corporation, nor shall more than five per cent (5%) of the voting stock of any one (1) corporation be owned; and provided further, that stocks eligible for purchase shall be restricted to stocks of companies incorporated within the United States which have paid cash dividends for ten (10) consecutive years or longer immediately prior to the date of purchase and which, except for bank stocks and insurance stocks, are listed upon an exchange registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission or its successors; and provided further, that not less than twenty-five per cent (25%) at any one time of the book value of investments of said Fund shall be invested in Government and Municipal Securities as enumerated above. This Amendment shall be self-enacting and shall become effective immediately upon its adoption without any enabling legislation."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November 5, 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment amending Subsection (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas relating to the Employees Retirement Fund and the Employees Retirement System of Texas, revising provisions for investments of moneys and other assets of the Fund, and changing other existing provisions and making other new provisions with respect to the administration of the Employees Retirement System."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment amending Subsection (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas relating to the Employees Retirement Fund and the Employees Retirement System of Texas, revising provisions for investments of moneys and other assets of the Fund, and changing other existing provisions and making other new provisions with respect to the administration of the Employees Retirement System."

Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary Proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

In order for a producer to protect his wheat allotment and not get a reduction, he must plant at least 75 per cent of the allotment each year. Acreage diverted or substituted is considered as planted acreage toward meeting this 75 per cent provision.
