Funeral services for William Curtis Mears, 63, Veterans Service Officer for Donley County for the past 17 years, were held at 2 p.m. on Saturday, Nov. 30, in the First Presbyterian Church with Rev. Owin McGarity, pastor, officiating. Interment was in Citizens Cemetery under the direction of Murphy Funeral Home.

Mr. Mears died Thursday morning, November 28, in Veterans Administration Hospital in Amarillo. He was born November 20, 1905 in Tupelo, Mississippi and married Nova Cook in Clarendon December 20, 1942. He was in the Hatchery business in Clarendon prior to becoming Veterans Service Officer and he also served as Selective Service Registrar for Donley County. He was a member of the First Presbyterian Church, American Legion and a veteran of World War II.

NEWS FROM CITY HALL

The annual audit for the fiscal year ending September 30, 1968 has been completed and approved by the city aldermen. The combine balance sheet appeared in last week's paper. Two items were of significance. One, the city has on deposit monies for all bonded indebtedness, excepting the Greenbelt. The second was the \$28,000 deficit of water expenses over income. Our previous \$20,000 surplus reduced this to about \$8,000. This increase in water expense was due to water purchased under contract with the Greenbelt Water Authority. In addition, several thousand dollars are on deposit in the Water Improvement Fund and the Sewer Improvement Fund (which was formed by your aldermen several years ago to insure water and sewer line improvement.)

In our current budget we have made sufficient allowance to repay the remainder due and for continued purchase of water at the present cost. We shall continue replacing water and sewer lines where needed, and we will continue the low cost paving program started two years ago. However the funds available for these projects have been decreased somewhat.

A brief word about the recent referendum concerning an airport construction. There are two false rumors. We are NOT going to build the airport anyway. We are NOT going to hold a recall election. As the aldermen decided previously, we shall abide by the vote of the people. The two grants were for \$63,000. They were grants, not loans. They did not have to be repaid. The \$30,000 required by the city would have to come from some kind of city revenue. Should the Greenbelt decrease its cost to us in January, then we shall have a surplus to continue city improvements, but not an airport. The \$33,000 gift to our city shall be allowed to expire. In other words, the city will take no further action concerning the airport unless legally obligated to do so by petition.

The Tax season is here and I urge you to pay your taxes early. The city has entered into an agreement with the law firm of Lovell, Lyle and Cobb to collect delinquent taxes ninety days after becoming delinquent. The authority was given the law firm to file suit when necessary. Pay your taxes NOW.

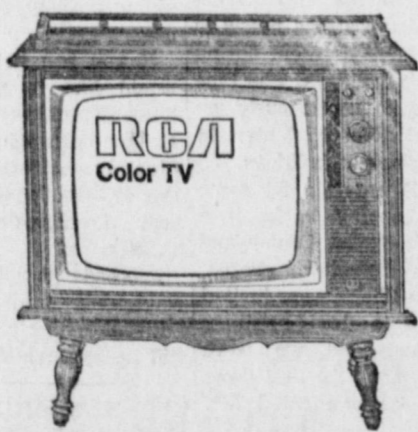

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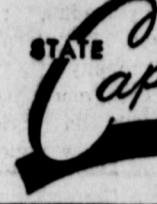

When Preston Smith becomes governor on January 21, it will be to the tune of marching bands and at least five dance orchestras. Smith has revealed plans for a gala inauguration reminiscent of the 1950's.

A big Congress Avenue parade will follow his swearing-in at noon that day, and after a brief rest Governor and Mrs. Smith will lead off the dancing at a grand ball. They'll be honored with at least four other balls during the evening.

Last time the capital witnessed such a celebration was when Price Daniel took office in 1957. Then more than 20,000 well-wishers danced 'til dawn. But inaugurations have been rather sedate since then. Governor Smith said he'd reveal more details of his inauguration in a couple of weeks.

SMITH PREPARES FOR OFFICE—Gov.-Elect Preston Smith says Harold K. Dudley will be his top assistant and that he will beef up the Texas governor's staff dealing with federal programs.

Dudley, 44, Smith's chief campaign organizer, was manager of the Wichita Falls Chamber of Commerce.

Smith said he "will have to have some additional" staff members to work with rapidly-expanding federal-state relations issues. He revealed that Wayne Gibbons of Breckenridge, who is Governor Connally's Washington liaison man, can stay on if he wants to (as can several other middle-echelon Connally aides), but that the Washington office must be expanded to do an effective job.

Sen. Dorsey Hardeman of San Angelo may also be tapped for government duties in the new administration, Smith indicated—though probably not as secretary of state. He is considering "three or four" for that post.

Smith pledged to continue his "open door" policy as governor and to hold regular weekly news conferences.

COCKTAIL CLUBS — Proposed

new rules for drinking clubs were shelled in public hearing by 11 bistro operators who urged different categories of regulations for a wide variety of establishments catering to the cocktail trade.

Texas Liquor Control Board took the issue under advisement and will hand down its ruling at an early date. Meanwhile, its proposed requirement that payment for mixed drinks be made in cash and strict definition of club "guests" remains under court attack.

Witnesses at hearing in the state capitol made these principal suggestions:

That rules be geared to types of operations in 1,335 clubs over the state (344 of which are in dry areas).

That record-keeping requirements be kept as simple as possible.

That they be punished only for "knowing" violations.

"There are obviously several kinds of private clubs, all trying to operate under one broad definition. Comprehensive regulations might include clear-cut definitions of the various kinds or classes of clubs. This would, of course, involve a classification system," testified Royce Chaney of Dallas, representing the Texas Lone Star Chapter Club Managers Association of America.

Other club operators suggested separation on lines of non-profit and strictly-business clubs—or those which have relatively static membership and the rapid-turnover clubs such as those in motels and hotels.

"No matter what regulations are adopted," maintained the president of a large San Antonio club, "there will be confusion under present laws." He suggested liquor-by-the-drink legalization is the only answer. A new push for that (probably a constitutional amendment) is expected to be made in the next legislative session which starts next month.

COURTS SPEAK — Federal judge here dismissed the suit by

a Fort Hood nuclear weapon repairman to keep his commanding officer from transferring him to Fort Sill, Okla. Employee claimed his security clearance was being taken away without due process of law.

Court of Criminal Appeals applied retroactively a U. S. Supreme Court decision that indigents must have legal counsel in all stages of criminal proceedings, and granted a new trial to a San Antonio man sentenced 13 years ago to life imprisonment for robbery by assault.

State Supreme Court upheld an injunction against a Lubbock man for engaging in the unauthorized practice of law.

Court of Civil Appeals here declined to enjoin Tarry House Inc. from operating as a private club in a Lake Austin residential area.

CANAL SYSTEM PROPOSED — Texans and their Legislature will be asked to give approval and support to the huge \$10 billion Texas Water Plan through legislation and a vote in November of 1970.

Texas Water Development Board plans to reveal details of the plan this month. It is known that it will propose two huge canal systems to carry surplus water across North Texas to the Plains, and down the Gulf Coast to the Lower Rio Grand Valley.

Both canals will be federally-financed, if they prove feasible. But state money will be needed to help finance them and companion reservoirs which will be needed to meet the water needs of Texas with 30,000,000 people in the year 2020.

Board asked a legislative study committee to endorse a proposal to increase the present \$400 million water development fund bond program to a figure in the range of \$2 to \$3.5 billion. It said it wanted advice from legislators on how much state financing, through loans, should be put into the program, before setting a precise figure. But it did suggest that the matter be submitted to the voters for approval or disapproval at the election in November, 1970.

It also asked that the Legislature make a number of policy decisions giving the board and other state agencies the authority, and the direction, to carry our jobs of pollution control, recreation and park development, water rights control, planning and contracting for the massive job which lies ahead.

If the water is to be where it is needed in the years ahead, to allow all parts of Texas to grow and prosper, detailed planning work must be begun in 1969, the board said. The Texas Water Plan will be the biggest public works job ever undertaken, nearly four times as large as the \$2.5 billion California water project now under construction.

A legislative committee headed by Rep. Bill Clayton of Springlake took the request under study. It will make its recommendations to the Legislature in January.

Texas Ranch Family To Be Featured On TV Show

A Texas ranch family — the Solon Higginses of near Dalhart — is one of four families featured in a new U. S. Department of Agriculture movie released this week, according to Monty Sowers, work unit consultant with the SCS here.

The 20-minute color movie, "Heritage of the Plains", will have its Texas premiere on an Amarillo television station, KVII, on Saturday, December 7 at 5:30 p.m., Sowers reported.

The film depicts the experiences of the four landowners as they plan and carry out a complete soil and water conservation program on their holdings under the Great Plains Conservation Program.

Featured with Solon Higgins, his son Rusty, and grandson Ted, are the Art Pember family of Ness City, Kansas; the Darl Hacker family of near Torrington, Wyoming; and the Hall brothers, Don and Wallace, of near Beach, North Dakota.

The four owners, all with problems typical of the Plains with its recurrent drought, high winds, dust storms, intense rainstorms and other emergencies, began their work under the federally sponsored program in 1968.

The four developed full-scale farm or ranch conservation plans with technical help from the USDA Soil Conservation Service and used federal cost-sharing from SCS to push ahead faster with the needed work. They repaired damaged cropland and range areas, switched hazardous cropland to grass, fenced for better grass management, developed stockwater and performed other needed soil and water conservation work. The Higgins ranch was infested with yucca, which restricted the grass cover. Control of the yucca was a major objective in Higgins' plan.

Grandson Ted Higgins was a 3-year-old "hand" when the first filming was done, with special saddle and stirrups to fit. In the closing scenes he is an experienced member of the outfit.

Pember is the third generation of Pembers on the Kansas farm homesteaded by his grandfather. He had begun conservation work but the special Great Plains program helped him to complete the job. Darl Hacker was developing a ranch made up largely of unsuitable cropland on farms abandoned in the 1930's. The Hall brothers had enough grass for a stable ranching operation but much of it was too far from water.

The Great Plains Conservation Program, which was authorized by Congress in 1956 with \$150 million to be spent on sound conservation work, is being used by soil and water conservation district cooperators in 421 high-risk counties in the 10 Great Plains states. More than 30,000 landowners have entered the program and have planted nearly 2 million acres of cropland to grass. Nearly 10,000 have completed all needed conservation work. The program ends in 1971. Since the program was started in Donley County there have been 210 applications signed, resulting in 171 contracts on 219,893 acres according to Sowers.

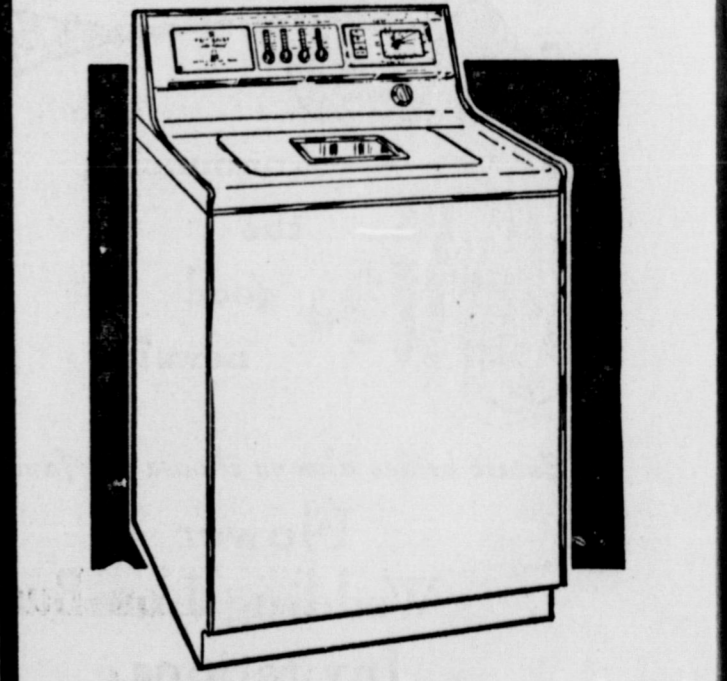

Fish is a source of abundant, high grade protein. For the most part they are divided into two classifications: seafish and freshwater fish.

Seafood include: bass, bluefish, butterfish, cod, croaker, cusk, flounder, grouper, haddock, hake, herring, lingcod, mackerel, mullet, pilchard, rosefish, sea trout, shad, the soles, swordfish, tuna, turbot and whiting.

Fresh water fish include: buffalo fish, carp, catfish, crappie, lake herring, mullet, muskellunge, yellow perch, yellow pike, pickerel, sheepshead, sucker, sunfish, brook trout, lake trout and whitefish.

While many fish are seasonal delicacies, the following are available all year round: rock bass, carp, cod, flounder, group-

er, haddock, hake, halibut, herring, red snapper, sole and tuna. Many fine restaurants, however, serve out of season fish all year around.
