DOVE SEASON REGULATIONS NOW AVAILABLE TO HUNTER

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department has released hunting regulations for the mourning and white-winged dove seasons. Digests of these regulations are now available to interested individuals from sporting goods stores. game wardens, and any regional or district office of the depart-

Two basic changes in whitewing hunting have been made since last year. The white-winged dove season has been set to open September 2-3 and September 9-10. The area south of Highway 83 and formerly designated as to his home in Schulenburg with closed in the southern parts of counties has been opened to hunters.

The retention of one fullyfeathered wing on field dressed Mrs. Lee Palmer and Lee Ann doves is no longer required exthe mourning dove and whitewing are hunted concurrently.

Mourning dove hunting in the north zone will begin at noon central standard time (1 p.m. laylight saving time) on Friday, September 1 and continue thru sunset Monday, October 30 with a bag limit of 12 per day and 24

South zone hunting of the mourning dove will begin at noon central standard time on November 21 except in those counties where white-winged and mourning doves are hunted conthe season will close at sunset,

Those 12 early closing counties are: Maverick, Dimmit, La eron, Hidalgo and Starr. In these counties a limit of whitewing and a limit of mourning doves may be taken on each day of the whitewing hunt.
