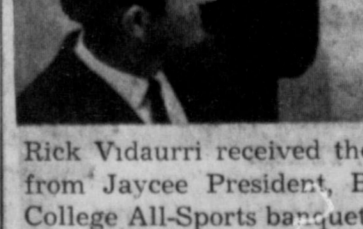

Austin, Tex. — A court lawsuit filed with fare may have far-reaching consequences for the state welfare system and final suit challenges the year state residency requirement for eligibility to receive aid to needy families dependent children. Actual issue goes considerably farther than a single class assistance. Texas state residence requirement all major types of welfare.

Welfare outlays in the last year totalled \$257,900,000 of which \$65,600,000 was money.

Attorney for Mrs. Ange B. Alvarez of San Antonio mother of six children, filed the federal court suit to require the State Department of Public Welfare grant her AFDC assistance although she admittedly not lived in the state a year. Suit claims the residence restriction is unconstitutional since 76 per cent of AFDC funds are provided by federal government.

Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin, in an answering brief vigorously defends the constitutional and statutory provisions requiring a year residency for welfare beneficiaries. Lack of such restrictions, contends Martin would create a "nomad" class of state-to-state wanderers. Legislatures of 40 states and Congress recognize residency requirement as condition of eligibility. Martin argues, suit, he maintains, would compel withdrawal of money from state treasury without a replacement law.

A Pennsylvania federal district court has upheld a similar restriction as constitutional in Texas, but a Connecticut court threw out the state's limitation as unconstitutional restriction on travel. Latter suit now gone to the U.S. Supreme Court for review.

STATE Capital NEWS

as necessary to finance the \$468,500,000 general revenue spending bill tentatively recommended by the Board for 1969. This is about \$25,000,000 above 1968's spending level of \$443,800,000.

According to staff predictions, \$345,600,000 in general revenue will be available for spending in 1969 after automatic deductions of money for earmarked purposes.

GOVERNORS ASKED FOR ADVICE — State Constitutional Revision Commission panel has voted to call on Gov. Connally and ex-Govs. Price Daniel and Allan Shivers for advice on best standards for deciding how to change the governor's powers and length of term.

Executive office committee debated at length whether the governor should be limited to one or two four-year terms and whether Texas should adopt a "cabinet" form of state government with strong governor provisions.

COURTS SPEAK — State Supreme Court and Third Court of Civil Appeals in two recent decisions concluded that a former State Savings and Loan Commissioner should have granted authority for loan-savings concerns in downtown Houston and Richardson. Applications had been denied by the Commissioner.

Court of Criminal Appeals upheld a Harrison County jury verdict of life imprisonment for a man convicted of drowning his wife. Same Court affirmed a 20-year sentence of a San Angelo man for the slaying of a cab driver in 1966.

CRIME ON RAMPAGE — Texas Department of Public Safety reports that Texas crime increased 11.3 per cent in 1967 over the previous year for a new all-time high number of criminal offenses — one every minute and a half.

An estimated 332,986 major crimes were committed in Texas during 1967, compared to 297,810 offenses the year before, said DPS Director Homer Garrison Jr. All major categories of crime — murder, rape, robbery, burglary, aggravated assault and theft — were up 10 per cent or more. Only 27 per cent of known offenses were cleared by arrests during the year.

APPOINTMENTS — Robert D. Spellings of Fort Worth is new administrative assistant to Speaker Ben Barnes. Former Bexar County Judge Charles Grace was named statewide chairman of Don Yarborough's campaign for governor. Dr. Lee Wilborn, assistant

commissioner of Education for instruction, will join Texas Bankers Association March 1 as education director.

Gayle McNutt, formerly of Comanche, will handle news and information for Barnes' campaign for lieutenant governor.

Mrs. Roland Boyd of McKinney is Texas chairman for 1968 campaign conference for Democratic women to be held in Washington, May 19-21.

APPOINTMENTS — Attorney General Martin has named former State Rep. Pat Cain of Austin to head his anti-trust and consumer protection division. Divisions handles anti-trust matters as well as enforcement of the code.

O. N. (Newt) Humphreys, Austin, moved up to acting administrator of the State Liquor Control Board after the Board accepted the resignation of veteran Administrator Coke Stevenson Jr. W. A. (Dub) Cowan, formerly of Coryell County, succeeds Humphreys as agent-in-charge of the Department of Public Safety intelligence section. Maurice Beckham of Hallsburgh took over Cowan's old job as assistant agent-in-charge.

WATCH SHARP BLOW TO THE STOMACH — Such commonplace childhood accidents as to tumble from a jungle gym or a bike can have serious consequences if they resulted in a sharp blow to the abdomen. Several children who suffered such injuries seemed unharmed immediately after their accidents. Some hours later, however, acute abdominal pain and vomiting began. X-ray examination of areas in the neighborhood of the pancreas showed that all suffered injury to the pancreas, requiring surgery. (The pancreas cannot be visualized directly since it is so deeply imbedded.) Such injuries, left untreated, can prove fatal. Adults, too, can suffer serious unsuspected injury from an abdominal blow. For this reason, Cook County Hospital in Chicago now requires that all patients with a blunt abdominal injury be x-rayed for possible damage to the spleen.

Legal notice is hereby given that the Board of Directors of the Greenbelt Municipal and Industrial Water Authority, under the powers and provisions of Article 8280-160, Sec. 21, of the Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, 1925, has adopted Rules and Regulations setting forth definitions and construction of words, terms, and provisions—of the Rules and regulations; specifying non-liability of the Authority and the assumption of risk of any person upon any property of the Authority; providing for waiving or modifying the Rules and Regulations for accommodation of special events; providing for inspection of real and personal property upon any property of the Authority and providing for special provisions to be contained in any permits; providing for denial of use of all property of the Authority and the summary revocation of permits without refund of permit fees; specifying the types, general conditions, and the fees for permits; adopting the Texas Water Safety Act and the Rules and Regulations promulgated by the Texas Highway Department for the administration of the Texas Water Safety Act; adopting the Rules and Regulations Covering Disposal of Wastes from Watercraft as promulgated by the State Board of Health; adopting the United States Coast Guard Inland Rules; prohibiting certain acts in the operation of watercraft pertaining to occupancy, licensing, reckless or negligent operation, rate of speed, creation of a hazardous wake or wash, age limits, passenger position on the boat, anchoring or drifting of boats, restricted areas, circular course around fishing and swimming activities, use of sirens or any type of emergency or warning device commonly used by peace officers; prohibiting swimming from a boat; prescribing certain type of life preservers and equipment for each boat and requiring the wearing of prescribed type of life preservers while occupying a boat; prescribing certain standards of safety, construction, and equipment of boats and motors; providing for the removal of watercraft when in an unsafe operating condition or when boat or operator is in violation of any rule or regulation; authorizing seizure of abandoned watercraft, liens thereon, and summary sale thereof; adopting the Uniform Wildlife Regulatory Act and proclamations, rules, and regulations issued pursuant thereto by the Parks and Wildlife Commission; adopting the bag and possession limits of all fish and the means and methods of taking fish pursuant to the proclamations, rules, and regulations issued by the Parks and Wildlife Commission except prohibiting fishing from the rip rap on the dam, requiring tags showing ownership or operator to be attached to trollines; prescribing certain type of life preservers for persons fishing from or wearing a "floater"; prohibiting the use of rough fish, including goldfish, and prohibiting the use of "stinkbait" or "bloodbait", as bait; prohibiting commercial activities on fish taken from Greenbelt Lake; requiring persons engaging in skiing, aquaplaning, or similar activities to wear prescribed type of life preservers; requiring operators of boats towing persons on water skis, aquaplanes, or similar devices to follow a counter-clockwise traffic pattern in areas designated therefor and requiring careful and prudent operation and reasonable distance from persons and property, and prohibiting certain acts in the operation of boats and for persons engaged in water skiing, aquaplaning, or similar activities from so engaging at specified times and in willful and wanton disregard of the rights or safety of others in

a dangerous speed or manner; regulating the construction of piers, docks, and wharves; defining the restricted zone and activity and construction restrictions around the raw water intake; prohibiting attachments to, or tampering with any buoy, float, or marker belonging to the Authority; prohibiting pollution by discarding or discharging into Greenbelt Lake of waste matter or material of any type or kind, or liquid or substance whatsoever which may contaminate the water or be injurious to humans, animals, fish, or plant life, or human wastes whatsoever; prohibiting certain livestock and any fowls on any property of the Authority; providing for specified type of sewage disposal systems, inspection, and location thereof; requiring removal of garbage and trash; specifying requirements as to the disposal and removal of debris or waste material of any type or kind; prohibiting camping on any property of the Authority for more than seven (7) consecutive days; regulating hunting of waterfowl and skeet and trap shooting, and restricting the possession and use of firearms except by peace officers; permitting enforcement of laws and proclamations, rules, and regulations by the Parks and Wildlife Commission and any other peace officer; providing Security Officers of the Authority and prescribing their duties and powers; providing penalties for violations of the Rules and Regulations of a fine of not more than Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00), or imprisonment for not more than thirty (30) days, or both such fine and imprisonment; providing for the commitment to jail and the rate of

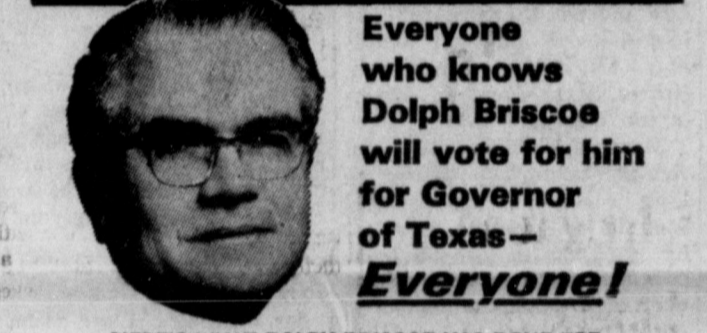

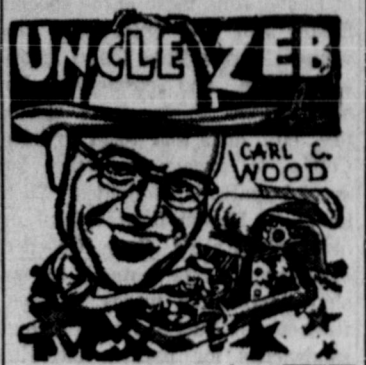

DIVERTED ACRES

No grazing will be allowed on diverted acres between April 30 and October 1. Noxious weeds must be controlled. Wheat on diverted acres must be destroyed by May 1.

WHEAT ACREAGE

You have been mailed small aerial photographs of your farm to be used in reporting your wheat acreage. You must measure and report the acreage by May 1. It is important that you do the best job possible in measuring the wheat. The main thing is that you don't guess the acreage. Measure the acreage and be sure you are in compliance before reporting.

CCC LOANS

April 1 is the final date to request wheat loans and May 31st is the final date to request grain sorghum loans. Cotton loans may be requested until April 30. Wheat loans mature April 30. Any wheat under loan must be redeemed or revealed by April 30 or be forfeited to CCC.

RESEAL LOANS

Wheat and grain sorghum loans

may be extended for one year beyond the original maturity date. By extending the loan, you keep possession of the grain for another year without repaying the loan. You may redeem the grain anytime within the year by paying the amount of the loan plus interest. CCC will pay the storage after maturity date of the loan. For further information, contact this office.

Soil Conservation District News

Are you using every drop of irrigation water efficiently?

Proper management of irrigation water depends upon three main factors: determining when to irrigate, how much water to apply, and how to apply it in the most efficient manner.

Lets look just at the pre-plant irrigation. It is generally agreed that this is our most important irrigation.

In pre-plant irrigation, we should fill the soil reservoir or root zone. For most soils in our area, the root zone is about six feet deep and each foot holds 1 1/2 to 2 inches of water.

Failure to apply enough to fill the root zone will tell on us at

harvest. On the other hand we should be careful not to apply excess water that evaporates or penetrates beyond the root zone, lacking nutrients with it.

In actually irrigating crops, we are primarily interested in the top two feet of the root zone. It is in the top 24 inches that the plant receives about 60 per cent of its moisture and nutrients.

The farmer can determine how much moisture he needs through a simple feel test of the soil. By taking samples from varying depths and squeezing them in the hand, one can tell approximately how much moisture is in the soil at that time.

Soil which leaves a damp impression on the hand is 75 to 100 percent full of water, while soil which tends to ball up and remain firm when bounced a few times in the hand is 50 to 75 percent filled. If the soil merely crumbles when squeezed, there is definitely a need for moisture.

In crop irrigation we should try to time our irrigation so as to cover the entire field before plants on the dry side start hurting for lack of moisture, or by the time the moisture level dries to 50 per cent.

The technicians of the local Soil Conservation Service office will be happy to assist in the de-

sign and operation of an irrigation system which could help to cut irrigation cost and make each drop go just a little further.

CROPLAND TO GRASS

Donley County farmers have converted thousands of acres from cropland to grass in the past fifteen years. Some of this land was never actually suitable for cropland uses. Other acreage was marginal land that was suitable for farming only with intensive management for production and erosion control.

Cropland should be evaluated to determine whether the production of annual crops will yield more net profit than could be expected from permanent grass. Crop production costs are at least as great for poor land as compared to good land, and the return from poor land is considerable lower. Poor land also requires a large investment per acre in erosion control because it is more susceptible to erosion.

The Soil Conservation Service recommends that farmers grow a crop of drilled forage sorghum in the year previous to grass planting on cropland. This crop should be mowed or shredded before seed is produced.

Grass should be planted the following spring in the undisturb-

ed stubble. The stubble crop protects the tender grass seedlings from drying winds and keeps the land from blowing.
