## Dvorak attends seminar in Abilene

Dave Dvorak, area supervisor for the Panhandle area extending from New Mexico, north to the Oklahoma boarder, east to Childress and south as far as Midland, has recently returned from a special seminar in Abilene for state supervisors on employee evaluations.

Dvorak is supervisor to 6 men in the immediate area. The school was established by Governor Clements as part of his state-wide program to help supervisors in ALL state departments to become more efficient and better trained in the details of personnel management.

"These meetings are most definitely beneficial," Dvorak said, "I'm learning a lot more than I expected and can use all of it."

The Administration appears to be conservative and places most new drugs in the legend class. Drugs that produce potentially dangerous side effects may be placed in the legend class as may drugs that require supervised use.

There has been an interesting trend during the past few years to remove drugs from the legend class and place them in the OTC class. This makes more helpful drugs available to the public. As consumers become even more informed, this trend will probably continue. There will be an increased need for information by individuals...on package labels and from pharmacists...to ensure safe use.

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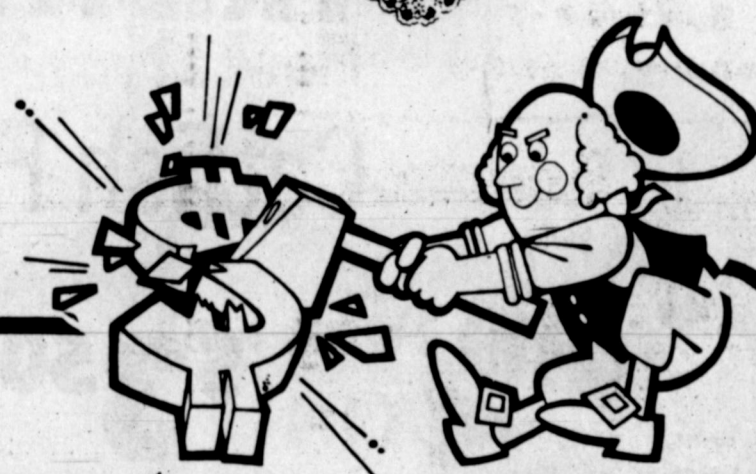

When this happens to you, beginning Friday, February 12, don't hide behind your curtains and refuse to answer the doorbell. Instead, whip out the old checkbook and write off a check for \$21.00 and buy an entire case of the cookies! 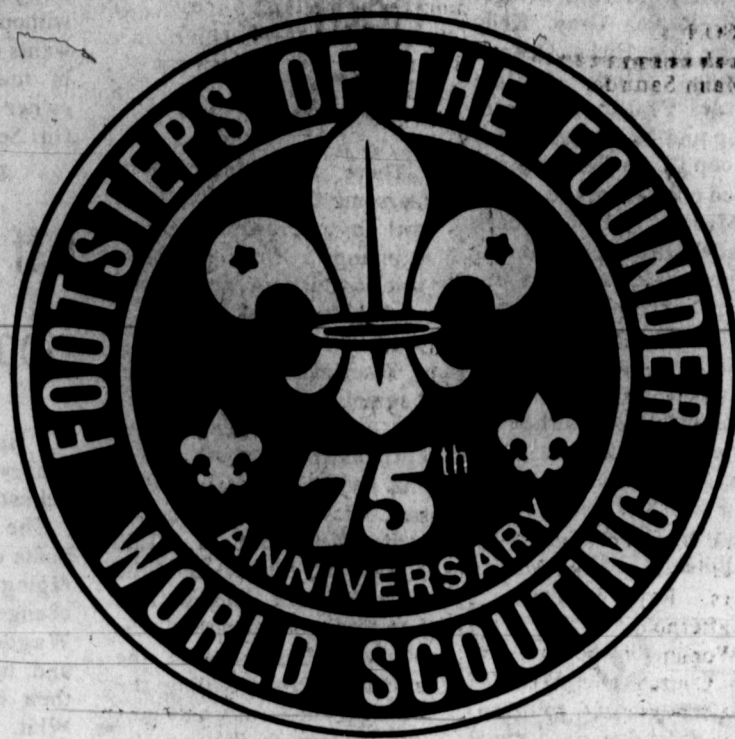

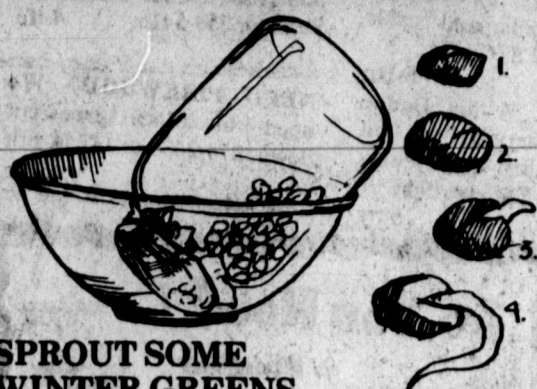

#### SPROUT SOME WINTER GREENS

The tender new buds of sprouted seeds are full of vitamins and minerals, and all of such nutrients are in natural forms which the body can readily assimilate. In fact, sprouts are more nourishing than milk or fresh meat... a person could actually live almost indefinitely on nothing but the germinated seeds! Sprouted grains and legumes supply all eight essential amino acids which make up a "complete" protein. And sprouts just happen to be packed full of enzymes, too. Furthermore, the tiny plants contain high levels of simple sugars, a fact which puts the shoots in the category of "quick energy" foods.

Almost any edible seed, grain, or legume can be successfully sprouted, although most devotees of the art think that alfalfa, soybeans, mung beans, lentils, peas, and the cereal grasses—which include wheat, oats, barley, and rye—give the tastiest results.

You can start a green winter garden of succulent growths by soaking the seeds in a bowl overnight in a warm, dark place (such as a kitchen cupboard) in about three times as much water as you have seeds. The liquid should be warm (70-80°F) and free of chlorine and fluoride. It takes only about a tablespoon of alfalfa seeds, and two or three times that amount of beans or peas, to "plant" a family-sized batch of sprouts.

Pour the water off the following morning, rinse the seeds (which should be approximately double in size), and place them in a wide-mouthed canning jar. Cover the container with cheesecloth or a wire screen.

Tip the jar, bottom up, at a 45° angle and place it in a bowl... then set the dish in a warm (room temperature to 90°F), dark place.

Flush the developing sprouts with water at least twice a day, morning and evening, to clean them and to insure that they have the moisture they need for growth. In three to six days, depending on the temperature and seed variety, your sprouts will again have doubled or tripled in volume.

If you then expose your sprouts to indirect sunlight during their final several hours of growth, they'll develop a healthy amount of chlorophyll. Too much of this green substance can cause the shoots to toughen; however, so don't overdo it.

Now your green garden is ready to be added to salads and sandwiches, sprinkled on soups, blended into healthful drinks, baked into breads, used in meat loaves and stews, or enjoyed in a hundred other ways.

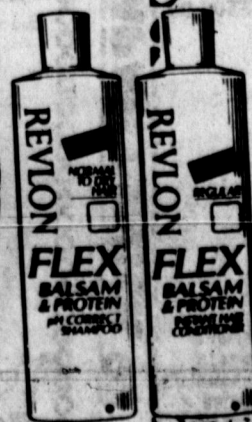

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**It's The Law!**



The Texas Legislature has enacted a law that requires you and all other Texas motorists to carry automobile liability insurance beginning January 1, 1982.

Bodily injury coverage of at least \$10,000 per person and \$20,000 for two or more persons per accident must be in force at all times. Property damage coverage must be at least \$5,000 per accident.

Failure to maintain the coverages required by this law will result in a fine of at least \$75.00 for the first offense and a minimum of at least \$200 for any subsequent offense. If you are convicted you may lose your drivers license and motor vehicle registration as well.

After January 1, 1982 law enforcement officers in Texas will ask to see proof of your insurance coverage when investigating a traffic accident or violation. The Department of Public Safety has advised that the following are acceptable forms of this proof:

- Your automobile insurance policy.
- A photocopy of the declarations page of the policy which contains the policy number, limits of liability, term of the policy, etc.
- A special identification card that some insurance companies may provide.

Even though many more Texas motorists will purchase and maintain liability insurance coverage as the law requires, hundreds of thousands of motorists will intentionally violate the law and remain uninsured.

For this reason we urge you to continue to carry uninsured/underinsured motorist coverage on your own policy. This important coverage will give you added protection should you be involved in an accident with an uninsured or underinsured driver.

Local artists are reminded that they have until April 1 to submit artwork to be considered for the 1982-83 state waterfowl stamp competition.

The art selected will adorn the \$5 state waterfowl stamp, and will be reproduced in print form for sale to the public.

Sales of these stamps and print reproductions of artwork on the 1981 stamp earned \$1.4 million to benefit Texas' migratory waterfowl.

Ted Clark, the department's Wildlife Division director, told members of the Texas Outdoor Writers Association that he believes Texas' waterfowl stamp and

print program was the most successful first effort by any state. "Money from these two sources will go directly into programs for waterfowl, including management, research and habitat acquisition," Clark said.

The state waterfowl stamp is required of waterfowl hunters in addition to a valid hunting license. Federal law also requires waterfowl hunters to have a federal waterfowl stamp.

### SCS plant selections

Two new plant selections have been released by the USDA Soil Conservation Service and Cooperating agencies.

Paul Loeffler, Range Conservationist for SCS at Clarendon said the new releases are "T-587" old world bluestem, and "Rainbow" wild plum.

"The old world bluestem release is actually a mixture of 80 similar grasses collected several years ago in the Near East," Loeffler said. "After 140 field evaluations in more than 100 countries, the mixture has been released to seed growers by SCS in cooperation with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station."

Old world bluestem is palatable, a high forage producer, and very persistent under heavy grazing pressure.

An evaluation planting was put in as a field trial in 1977 on the Jack Moreman ranch between Clarendon and Hedley. The planting has demonstrated excellent growth characteristics and has responded well to grazing use. In the five years since the planting, the grass plants have increased in size, number and production each year.

"The Rainbow release is a perennial fruit-bearing shrub, or small tree, selected for use in wildlife, or ornamental plantings," Loeffler said. "The composite of four collections was made because each produces excellent fruit crops at different months--from June through October."

Loeffler said the long maturing dates allow fruit to be available for wildlife for about five months. Propagation is attained by seed or root sprouts. In addition to its value in wildlife and beautification plantings, the selection appears to be useful in erosion control work on mine spoil while adding plant diversity on reclaimed areas. It is adapted throughout

Texas and southern Oklahoma on well-drained clayey to sandy loam soils.

Rainbow was released by SCS in cooperation with TAES and the Texas Forest Service. TFS will provide a limited number of seedlings to interested persons. Nurserymen interested in establishing seed production blocks should request seed from the SCS plant materials center at Knox City after 1983.
