## Carroll Knorpp has 50th anniversary in banking

One of Clarendon's oldest and most respected businesses honored its president, Carroll Knorpp recently for his 50 years of service in the Donley County State Bank.

Organized in 1906, the Donley County Bank will celebrate its 75th birthday this year and continue to serve the residents of Clarendon. Donley County, and other persons whose residence is farther away; but who find what they want in banking services with the Donley County State Bank.

The original site of the bank was on the corner of Kearney and First Sts. where the old Antro Hotel is still standing today. Local families organized the bank and many Stetson hats and handcrafted cowboy boots have crossed the threshold on personal and professional business during the 75 years.

After some years the location of the bank was moved to the present site at the intersection of US 287 East and S. Kearney Street on the south side of the highway.

It was at this time that the original oak fixtures and teller cages were replaced with the very up to date marble which was used to make the counters, and the entire compartments of the teller cages. In 1956 the bank was remodeled to its present state and the marble was removed and newer materials installed.

The Knorpp family has been directly connected with the Donley County Bank since its organization with one or more members of the family actively involved with the bank operation. Today Carroll Knorpp is the only family member in the bank on a day to day basis but his brother, Walter B. Knorpp Sr. and a nephew, Walt Knorpp join Carroll on the Board of Directors of the Donley County Bank. The other members of the board of directors are Wm. J. Lowe and Willard Hudson, all of

Although changes in the site and to the building have occured, the services to patrons has not changed drastically since organization.

Service charges were only started this year, January 1, 1981 and were added because of increased costs. The national average of the cost of handling is 37c per check. The bank is still one of a fast dwindling number of banking

institutions which still pays on signature instead of a number. This practice will continue as long as it is practical to do so.

Wesley P. Knorpp, father of Carroll, John, and Walter B. Knorpp, and Fred Chamberlain Sr., were familiar figures at the bank for many Clarendons older residents. They were succeeded by Carroll and Walter B. Knorpp. Carroll remained at the bank and Walter B. (Bud) who began his service with the bank in 1936 remained until 1962. Since that time he has been a director with the bank and had other business interests.

Carroll graduated from high school at a California school in Long Beach and attended the University of Texas before joining the bank staff. He has spent the past 50 years at the bank. The Donley County Bank was one of the three Clarendon banks which remained solidly secure during the dreadful days of the Great Depression when many institutions had to close their doors forever. It is a fine tribute to the management of banking personnel and level headedness of patrons of the banks that a small town like Clarendon had such security.

Personnel changes have come mostly as a result of seniority. A few did retire and left the bank. Others stayed as long as they remained on this earth to continue their tradition of dependable service.

One reason for the minimum of changes is the comaraderie which staff members enjoy. They are members of the banks 'family' and proof of the old adage that a family who stays

together can indeed grow. Among the list of personnel in the bank's history are: Wesley P. Knorpp, Fred Chamberlain Sr., M.R. Allensworth, Jack SoRelle, Kelly Chamberlain, Roy Clayton, Holman Kennedy, Mark Kelly, and Miss Anna Bour-

Yesterday, April 20, 1981, the Public Utility Commission Staff filed its recommendations in the above case. The Staff recommendation indicates that the Company has a rate deficiency of \$4.7 million per annum. However, the Staff also recommended that the Company be penalized by \$4 million for poor quality of service. Thus, the net recommendation of the Staff is an increase of \$740,000 per year which is, in essence, no increase at all compared to the Company's requested

\$44.6 million. Last week, the Cities filed


their testimony which indicated the Company should have a rate reduction of \$6.9 million per annum (without further reduction for poor quality of service) or \$9.7 million per annum reduction after imposition of a penalty for poor quality of service. In last years General Telephone rate case, the PUC order was about \$2 million less than the amount recommended by their Staff. It is hoped that similar results can be achieved in this case.

The case commences next week. The time of hearing may require as much as two weeks. It is also anticipated that General will attempt to file supplemental testimony which would show additional needs for a rate increase. You will be advised as developments occur. 





Why Must God "Damn It?"

"The title hurts me SPEAKER BROADUS SPIVEY because I hate even to quote people who call upon the almighty to damn things, but must be understood. Yesterday I heard my barber ask God to damn his scissors, because they were not cutting properly. I asked him why he asked God to damn them and he didn't know. Do

"Let's begin with this question: What is the reason why we curse? Actually, profanity is caused by a lust for power. It gives us a sense of superiority over others and seems to put us in command of the situation. We have the need for such feelings because of our sense of inferiority to others.

"If we are honest, we'll have to admit that deep down within us, we feel very weak and uncertain of ourselves.

We need power and we do not have it. Yet we need it to get on top of life. The use of God's name in profanity seems to give us this needed sense of power and superior-

"But now I have another question: Why do people, unconsciously harboring these deep feelings of inferiority, drag the name of Almighty God in their profanity? Why is God asked to damn things, rather than the mayor, the angels, the preacher or even the devils? "The reason is clear: the

curser uses Gods name because it INSULTS God who has given us the commandment, 'Thou shalt not use the Name of Jehovah thy God in vain.' Just as a traffic violater has the urge to insult the policeman who gives him the ticket and the judge who fines him, so the sinner

wants to insult God by dragging Him off of His Holy Throne, humiliating His person, mocking His justice and ridiculing His name. We attempt to degrade God just because we know we are guilty of breaking His commandments. "We have learned, there-

fore, that the use of God's name (not the mayor's name, nor the devil's) in profanity seems to give us a sense of power over people. In other words, we feel weak before men but so powerful before God that we even dare to insult Him! Something is terribly wrong with the person who gains power among men by insulting

"And what is wrong? God tells us: 'I have nourished and brought up children and they have rebelled against me. My people are laden with iniquity, a seed of evil doers, children that deal corruptly.' Isaiah 1:2,4. This can mean nothing else than that we have rebelled against

"I hope you can see with me that there is only one thing to do-surrender to God. Stop fighting. Seek peace with God on His terms. The Bible says, ' we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ.' Romans '5:1. Jesus comes to us with words of forgiveness-a forgiveness accomplished through the sacrifice of Himself of the cross. He finished the work of salvation by paying with his life the penalty of our guilt. He also broke the power of sin over us so that now we need no longer be under the power of sin. If Christ has freed us from guilt and power of sin, it means that we are no longer rebels who desire to insult God. Jesus Christ, therefore, is the answer to our problem. It is my hope and prayer that you will not cast Him aside.



One of the high school boys was telling me a story that I just had to believe was true because surely these kids haven't learned the fine art of lying so early. Unless his dad was a big fisherman, then it COULD be a lie,

It seems that one fall, this fellow named Ray, just for the sake of giving him a name, mind you, and a friend were hunting doves around a stock tank. When the doves fell into the water, they used a fishing pole to retrieve the birds. The sinker was on the end of the line so they could throw the line over the dove and drag it in. Ray left a hook on his line and discovered that when he had pulled his dove back in, there on the end of the hook was a 5 lb. bass! I don't think that fishing in tanks is going to be as good this fall, Ray.

Since the stock tanks are drying up and in danger of becoming part of the pasture or plowed field, the water dog concession may fall into a recession this fishing session. I have found a few adult dogs in the water meter

boxes, but they aren't good for bait. If any of you have an ambitious youngster at home, send them out siening for water dogs so we can set trot lines.

The Texas Parks and Wildlife has a booklet you should own if you hunt or fish, it's called the Hunting and Sport Fishing Guide. In it are the rules and regulations to setting trot lines. One of the things you should be aware of is that your hooks must be three feet apart, a minimum of five hooks and a maximum of 50 hooks on one line and that your total hooks on all of the trot lines you set at Greenbelt must not exceed more than a grand total of

When you set a trot line, you must have a legible lable either on the jug or on the line with your name and address and the date of the line was set. This date must be changed every 90 days. You can't set a line near a boat ramp or any area used as swiming areas.

The little Bass Nursery Pond will be in operation again this summer. The Greenbelt Water Authority sealed the end of the pond with some drilling mud so that the water won't run out of the nursery pond back into the lake. There were 20,000 largemouth fry set into the pond. This year, all of the little fishies will be of the same hatch so there shouldnot be any cannibalisim again this year. All of the fish

will grow at the same rate and be content to eat the minnows that will be fed to them rather than each other. Because of this precaution, there should be a greater number of little bass dumped into the lake in a years time. This is a noble effort on the part of the water authority people and the folks out at the lake. They are doing it in your interest and to help you catch more and bigger bass,

so why not drop by and thank them for their efforts? The Inland Fisheries folks recently dumped a bucket or two full of small mouth bass fish into the lake to grow and be caught. Last year there was a stocking of these small mouth bass and this year's stocking will make a pair of stockings so surely you should be able to catch a

small mouth bass next year

to boot! Joe Kraai and some of his crew have recently completed one of their creel counts conducted at Merrideth, McKenzie and Greenbelt lakes. The purpose of these checks is to see how many fishermen use the lakes, how many hours are spent fishing and what the rate of catch per hour is. I'm glad Gary Hunt wasn't out there because his rate of fish per hour would make even Rip

Van Winkle tired of waiting! The fisheries men counted all of the fishermen, on the bank or in the boats, then they set up a check station at the boat ramp where they counted and weighed all of the fish each and every fisherman brought in. Joe Kraai, the Inland Fisheries Project Leader out of Canyon, said that he was pleased with the result of his creel count conducted over the weekend at Greenbelt.

There were several big stringers of white bass, 20 or so. There were a couple of nice sized walleye caught and a 7 lb. 2 oz. black bass was pulled in. The crappies are biting as well, over 40 counted on Sunday. Fishing during the weekdays will be more profitable than on weekends because of the increased use of the lake for recreational boating.
