Wagon Train stories to be in July 4th paper

Wednesday morning Donley County citizens had their eyes turned toward the west to watch the Wagon Train roll into the county and spend their first night in Ashtola then Thursday the Train rolled into Clarendon before it continued on its journey through the county to Brice.

The Clarendon Press did many interviews with Wagon Train people, the couple from Wisconsin who drove their wagon from Wisconsin to Texas and when the train ends, they will drive their wagon back to Wisconsin, Robert Duffie, an internationally known artist, and a native of Amarillo. He had a display in the First Bank & Trust of Clarendon on Thursday. Also interviewed were the outsider who rides a blind horse, Hazel Bowen, the 78-year-old driver

of the Texas Official Wagon, Donna Stepp, who wrote a poem in Donley County for Donley County and many others. A story will also be done on the Wagon Train School. The stories and pictures are so many it was hard to decide which we would have room for and which we would have to leave out. Therefore, The Clarendon Press decided to print them all in the July 4th paper. There will be pictures, pictures and more pictures along with the stories.

As we watch this train ride into the sunset, our eyes then will turn toward the east as the sun rises August 20 the Lone Star Wagon Train will roll into Hedley. The Lone Star Wagon Train is officially sanctioned by the Texas Sesquicentennial Commission.

Business courses offered summer semester at CC

Two courses will be offered by the Business Administration Department at Clarendon College during the first summer term semester. These two courses will be CIS 205 (Principles of Computer Information Systems) and BUS 214 (Accounting Principles). Both of the courses will be taught by David Wiese. Registration for these courses will be held on June 2 through June 5 at the Clarendon College Administration Building Business Office. The first summer term courses will start on Monday, June 2 and will end on July 11. Any questions or comments should be directed toward the Clarendon College business office, P.O. Box 968, Clarendon, Texas 79226, Highway 287 and Bugbee Street, Phone 806-874-3571.

CIS 205 is designed as an introductory computing course for people who have never had any experience with computers. This course is a prerequisite for all other computing courses and is transferable to most other colleges. It is one of the most popular courses offered by the CIS department due to the fact computers and their impact on our society have become very important issues in today's society. The major topics covered in this course are: computer awareness and the effects of computers on our lives, explanation to confusing computer terminology, purchase and evaluation criteria, gaining hands on experience using a popular brand of micro-computer, and finally writing and executing simple programs using programing techniques from the BASIC programming language. The course will be meeting on Monday and Wednesday nights from 6:00 to 10:00 in room 101 in the Clarendon College classroom center. Computer ownership is not required in this course as homework assignments can be done in the Clarendon College computer lab. This lab will be open for the student's convenience all day Monday through Thursday from 9:00 a.m. to 9:00 p.m. The first class meeting will be on Monday, June 2, 1986.

BUS 214 (Accounting Principles) is the introductory accounting course for people who have never studied accounting. It is the first half of the two semester accounting principles course offered at Clarendon College. This course is a prerequisite for all other accounting courses and is transferable to most other colleges. The main emphasis of this course is the study of the basic accounting concepts that apply to one owner businesses and partnerships. (After completion of the course the student should have gained the ability to keep accounting records and construct accounting statements

for the above mentioned types of businesses.) Some of the topic areas to be covered are: the double entry bookkeeping system and accounts, journalizing and posting of transactions, adjusting and closing entries, construction of the income statement, balance sheet, and capital

statements, and depreciation methods and inventory valuation techniques. This course will meet on Tuesday and Thursday nights from 6:00 to 10:00 in room 102 in the Clarendon College classroom center. The first class meeting will be on Tuesday night, June 3, 1986.

Clarendon College offers summer classes

Several classes will be offered in The Office Occupations area at Clarendon College during the first summer term beginning June 3 and ending July 10. Mrs. Pamela Denney will be teaching these individually paced courses: Keyboarding Skills Improvement, Office Machines, Word Processing II, Executive Machine Transcription, Medical Machine Transcription, and Legal Machine Transcription.

Keyboarding Skills Improvement is designed for anyone who already knows the basic typewriter keyboard by touch but desires to improve in speed and accuracy. Almost all students increase at least 10 or 20 words a minute and decrease errors to no more than 1 error per minute during this course.

Office Machines covers the basic operation of electronic calculators using the touch method. General business applications such as mark-up, interest, prorating, etc. are also learned on the calculators. Students also have options in learning to operate an electronic typewriter with memory capacity, duplicating

or machine transcription machines. Word Processing II allows the student who has had one semester of word processing to either learn to operate a different word processor or to learn more advanced functions on the word processor learned in the first semester.

Executive Machine Transcription helps a student learn to transcribe directly onto a typewriter from cassette taped documents. The student has a choice of working in different types of simulated job situations. Part of the course also teaches and reinforces many of the basic grammar principles.

Medical Machine Transcription is similar to Executive Transcription except a student works entirely with medical documents. A great deal of medical terminology is also learned during the course.

Legal Machine Transcription is the same as the other transcription courses except a student works entirely with legal documents. A great number of legal terms are also learned during the course.

Mildred got some really good pictures.

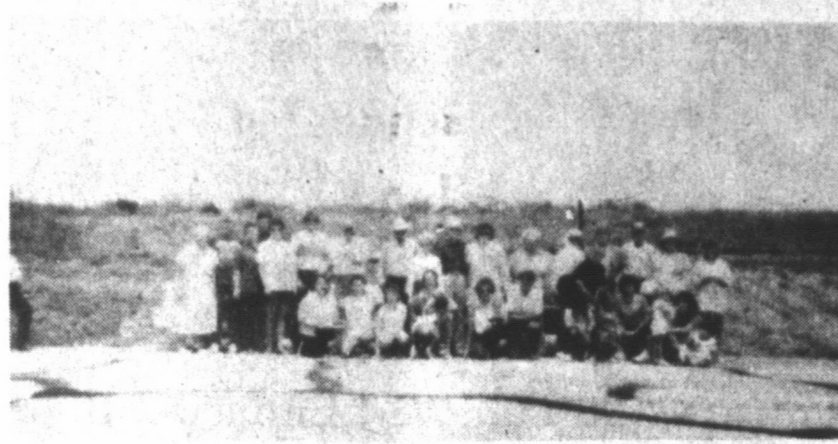

Tammie C. - What were you and Keith Owens doing that made Miss Anglin turn soooo red!

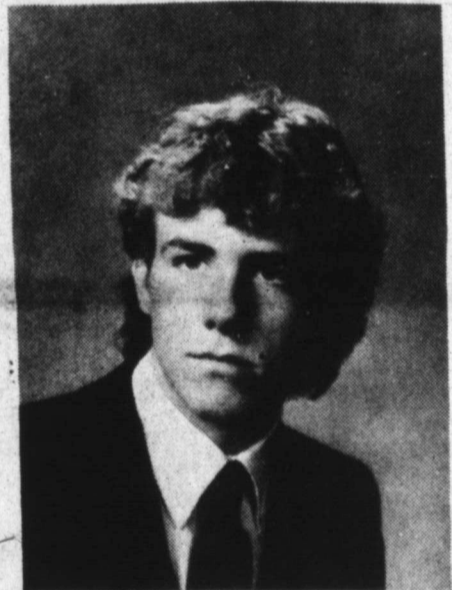

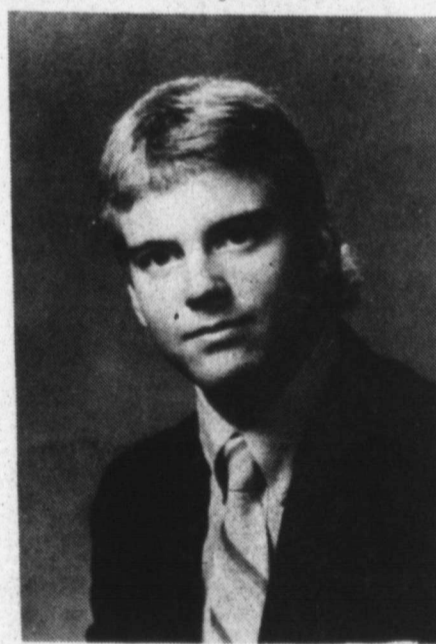
The District schedule was rough as Memphis advanced to the area play-offs.

DAY CARE VACCINE

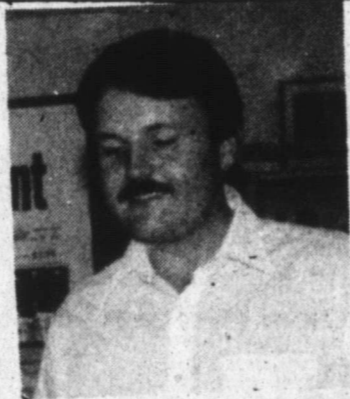
A few months ago, the United States Food and Drug Administration approved a vaccine that was developed to prevent a condition commonly referred to as Day Care Disease - a bacterial infection caused by Hemophilus influenzae type "b". Each year, this organism caused thousands of infections in young children, especially those between the ages of six months and six years. One of the infections produced in children by this organism is meningitis, an often fatal inflammatory condition of the membranes that cover the brain and spinal cord.

The new vaccine has been called a "major

breakthrough" because of the high degree of protection it affords against nervous system diseases which either kill or impair thousands of children each year. Children under age five who attend day care centers have been found to be at a higher risk for contracting this bacterial infection than those who do not attend such centers (hence the name, Day Care Disease).

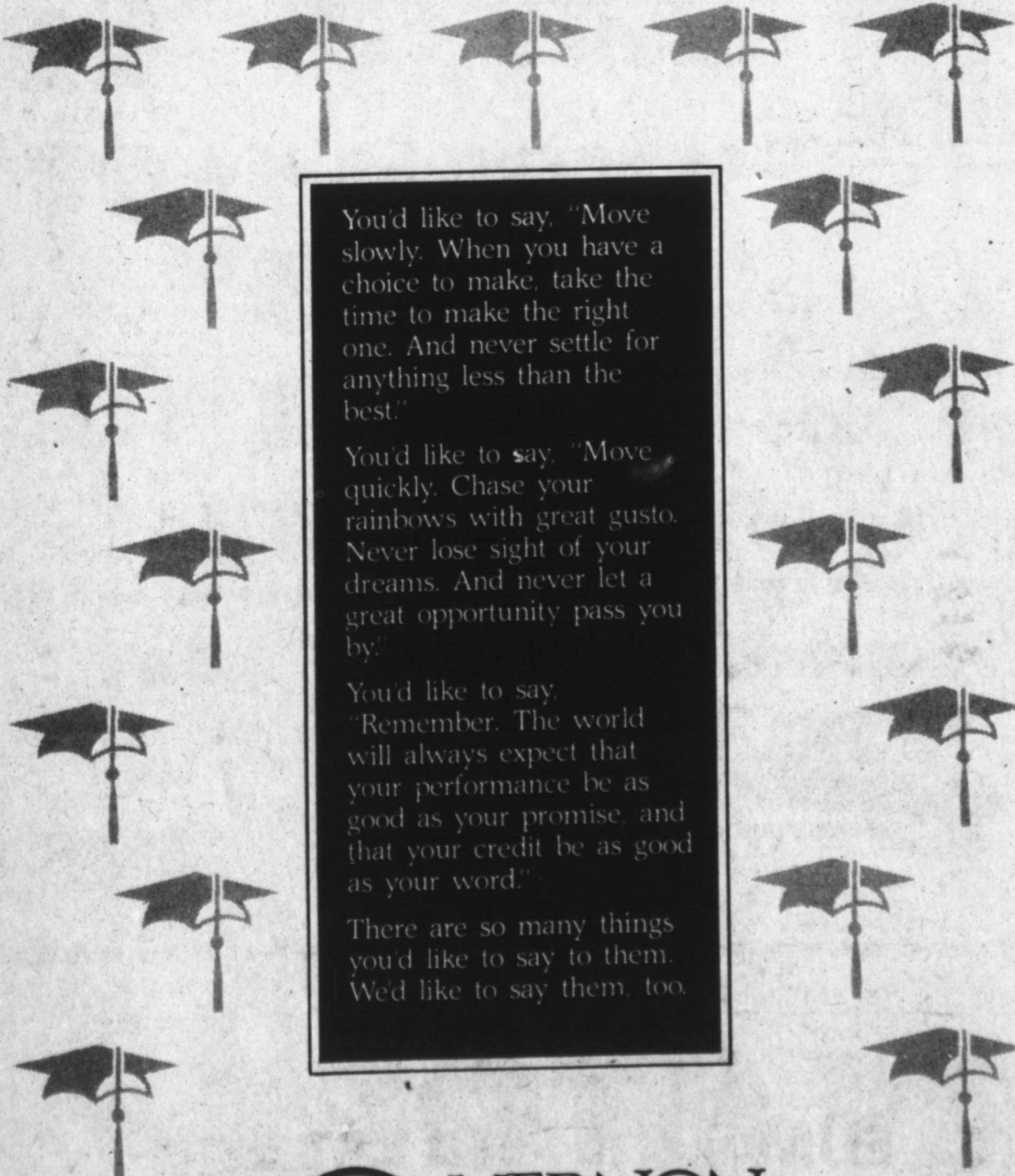
The government is recommending that children be vaccinated at age 24 months, particularly if they attend or will be attending a day care center. [Children under 18 months should not receive the vaccine.] More vaccine information can be obtained from most local health departments and physicians' offices.

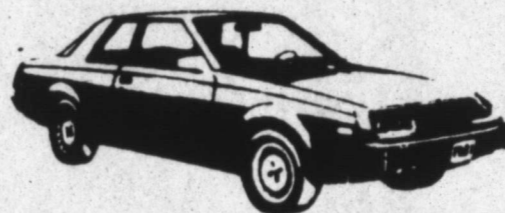
