

Bollworm activity on the increase

Bollworm activity has increased and heavy infestations of bollworms were found in several fields on Friday. Infestations of one to three bollworms per plant or 40,000 to 100,000 worms per acre were found in some fields. Treatment may be justified when counts average 5,000 to 8,000 per acre or 10 to 15 percent of these plants are infested.

Check the entire cotton plant, as small bollworms and eggs are being found in all areas of the plant, not just in the terminal area. Continue to check fields twice a week in order to detect bollworm eggs and small larvae early.

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



Drivers cautioned as

school opens

next week

Last year in Texas there were 1.228 accidents involving school buses, with seven fatalities and 323 non-fatal injuries. Schools are about to open again, and drivers are once more being cautioned to be unusually attentive in and around school zones and school buses.

An increasing problem in recent years has been drivers who either ignored or were unaware of the law restricting vehicles from passing a school bus while the bus is loading or unloading children. Children often cross the street in front of the bus, and a car that's trying to pass may not see them coming.

The problem became so bad two years ago that the Texas Legislature considered requiring buses to have mechanical arms at the driver's window that would extend into the traffic lane while the bus is stopped. At present, buses in Texas have flashing lights at the front and back of the vehicle when stopped, as well as signs noting that vehicles are required to stop for the buses.

society. Kelli was chosen to repre- ment deserves while offering these To emphasize the importance of stopping for these buses, the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation has produced public service announcements with Texas singer-songwriter Jerry Jeff Walker as its spokesman.

Walker, the 44-year-old author of the classic, "Mr. Bojangles," believes in the message he offers in the television commercial.

"It's important to note that stopping for those flashing red lights is not just a courtesy, it's the law," Walker said. "That means stopping

whether vou're behind the bus or approaching it from the other lane."

The law states: "The driver of a vehicle upon a highway inside or outside a business or residence district upon meeting or overtaking from either direction any school bus which has stopped on the highway for the purpose of receiving or discharging any school children shall stop the vehicle before reaching such school bus when there is in operation on said school bus a visual signal such as specified in Section 124 of the Act, and said driver shall not proceed until such school bus resumes motion or is signaled by the school bus driver to proceed or the visual signals are no longer actuated. A violation of this subsection is punishable by a fine of not less than \$50 nor more than \$200."





SOME THINGS DESERVE TO BE DONE RIGHT

Some things deserve to be done right. Few people would doubt that building a super-highway, or a giant suspension bridge, or even a hundred story skyscraper requires both the best time and effort possible. Why then, is the federal government cutting corners in what is surely the most important longterm development this country is ever likely to undertake? Why is the Department of Energy not using the scientific resources at its disposal to locate the safest site possible for this nation's first high-level nuclear waste storage facility?

its behavior and actions have been characterized by incompetence, high-handedness, and condescen-

This is a question I have been asking for some time, and one for which I have yet to get a sufficient answer. I think this is a shame, because if there is any one project that needs to be done right, it is this one. The process of selecting a site for this nuclear waste dump, however, has blown up in the DOE's face, and deservedly so. Thus far,

pear to be a concern in the selection process any longer. By deciding to eliminate the Eastern U.S. (where a majority of the waste is generated) from its deliberations. the DOE may have eliminated safety from its deliberations as well. Following this formula, the DOE is saying it will choose the safest site in this country for a high-level nuclear waste repository, yet will only consider the Western U.S. in its selection process.

Examining the three finalists in the selection, DOE's lack of concern for safety becomes even more apparent. By its own selection methodology, the three sites chosen by DOE are not the safest available. If safety were a concern, any combination of finalists would include a site in Richton Dome, Mississippi. Combined with its previous decision, this indicates that the site DOE eventually chooses for the waste facility will not even be the safest in the Western U.S., let alone the whole country.

the location of this nation's first nuclear waste repository is the best in terms of the nation's interests. The American people, however, have lost faith in the DOE. They have lost faisth because the DOE has not been straight with them. It has based a critical selection process on politics rather than safety.

I am not making a backyard argument. I'm making a safety argument. Because I believe that when the DOE is talking about drilling two 12-foot-diameter shafts through the Ogallala aquifer that supplies about nine states with water, when so far they do not even have the technology to properly drill a 1-foot-diameter shaft, we have a right to raise some serious questions. We not only have a right to raise these questions, we have a responsibility to do so. To do otherwise would be to pass a horrible buck to generations yet unborn.

Bullock releases state tax restructure

State Comptroller Bob Bullock released details of a plan to restructure Texas' major taxes with reduced rates on a broader tax base.

"The Texas tax system currently does not mirror the Texas economy and is in dire need of fair, uniform simplification." Bullock said.

Bullock's suggestions were included in a Special Financial Report, "Time of Change/Time of Choice," and amount to the first overhaul of the sales tax since it was adopted 25

The centerpiece of the plan would put a lower tax rate on goods and virtually all services not currently taxed and put items taxed under separate laws--like the hotel occupancy tax--under the sales tax umbrella.

A series of calculations illustrating the tax concept shows that it could raise between \$926 million and \$4.8 billion in additional revenue in the 1988-89 biennium depending on which lower tax rate was adopted.

Bullock said the expanded sales tax base would also boost the income to cities and transit authorities by nearly \$1.5 billion in the 1988-89 budget period.

The proposal also reduces tax rates on motor vehicles sales, lowers oil and gas severance rates and taxes other minerals produced in Texas.

It also changes the make-up of the state's corporate franchise tax with it's heavy--and some say archaic-reliance on assessments against

capital and surplus with a new formula that levies against corporate gross receipts at a dramaticallyreduced rate.

Exemptions are suggested for small businesses from both the sales tax and corporate franchise tax. It would remove 110,000 current sales tax taxpayers with annual sales of less than \$5,000 and would exempt 113,000 small corporations with

annual receipts of less than \$50,000. The plan would make it possible to

roll back sales tax rates to those of 15 years ago, produce additional revenue and give small taxpayers a break, Bullock said.

The proposal keeps exemptions for food for home consumption, agricultural items, prescribed medicine, aoctors' bills, required medical devices and appliances.

Bullock said the proposal will lessen the impact of sales tax regressivity by lowering the rate and taxing sales of personal and professional services purchased by highincome households.

By spreading the sales-tax burden more fairly among all businesses, it will bring 234,000 new taxpayers into

the system, particularly service in-dustries, which now employ a fourth of the state's workers.

Lenny just laughed. He didn't need drugs, and he didn't use them. Too much to risk. Too much at stake.



Lenny?" they said. "C'mon, man, let's celebrate!" The lure of it must have been too


