July 4th Activities

Early history indicates that Clarendon celebrated its first July 4th back in 1878. They had a rodeo, horse racing and a picnic with a lot of patriotic speeches. Hundreds of thousands of citizens have helped Clarendon celebrate this holiday since that time.

In years past, when the ranchers of the area provided free barbeque, old-timers state that as many as 10,000 have been fed. Eleven years ago the Al Morrah Shrine Club undertook the task of providing the barbeque. They did this only after the ranchers decided it was too expensive to continue the free barbeque. The Al Morrah Shrine Club raises this money to help the Shriners Crippled Childrens Hospitals and Burn Institutes. Unlike a lot of fundraising efforts, where as much as 25 to 50 percent of the money goes for administrative distribution, the Shriners give approximately 98 percent of all the money raised from the July 4th celebration to help these children.

This year the weather was beautiful and there was enough wind to



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



Texas Veterans Land Board Action Triples Texas Veterans Benefits

A recent decision by the Texas Veterans Land Board to allow multiple participation in all three Texas Veterans benefits programs has dramatically increased the value of special benefits available only to Texas Veterans from \$20,000 to

By a unanimous vote, the board voted to adopt recent recommendations of the Sunset Commission and the Texas Legislature to change the current program guidelines so that, instead of participation being limited to just one of the three Texas Veterans loan programs, an eligible Texas Veteran can now participate in all three. The multiple eligibility change will be in effect during a four-month test period that began on June 17.

The board also acted to reduce the minimum acreage required to get a Texas Veterans Land Program loan

from 10 acres to five acres. "Reducing the acreage requirerodeo. When the Vance Gray house ment from 10 acres to five will make it easier for more Texas Veterans to buy quality land close to the urban areas where they live," said Texas Land Commissioner Garry Mauro.

In addition, Mauro said that allowing Texas Veterans to participate in all three Texas Veterans programs will greatly increase the state benefits now available to Texas Veterans.

"This means Texas Veterans can now get a \$20,000 loan to buy a house and get a \$20,000 loan to buy land and get a \$15,000 home improvement loan to make repairs to their residence." said Mauro, who serves as Chairman of the Texas Veterans Land Board.

"I want to urge every Texas Vet who've always wanted to use more than one of our fine programs to act within this four-month period," Mauro said.

"In the past Texas Veterans were limited to only one loan with the Texas Veterans Land Board," said Carlton Bell, Deputy Commissioner for the Texas Veterans Land Board. Bell explained that during the next four months, however, a Texas Veteran who has already received one loan will be eligible to apply for a loan from one or both of the remaining programs as well. For example, a Veteran who had already received a Texas Veterans land loan could now apply for a Texas Veterans Housing loan or a Texas Veterans home improvement loan.

Bell stressed that at the end of the four-month test period, the board will study the effects of multiple participation and will make a decision at that time on whether to make this change permanent.

The Texas Veterans Land Program offers eligible Texas Veterans a \$20,000 loan at 8.75 percent to purchase a minimum of five acres.

The Texas Veterans Housing As-Assistance Program offers eligible Texas Veterans a \$20,000 loan at 9.5 percent to apply to the purchase of a

The newly-created Texas Veterans Home Improvement Loan Program makes available \$15,000 loans at 11.5 percent to make substantial repairs to a Veteran's residence.

The programs are financed through the sale of general obligation bonds at no cost to the taxpayer. The bonds are repaid by fees charged to Texas Veterans receiving loans through the program.

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

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

The first City of McLean Flea Market - Arts and Crafts Sale begins promptly at 9 a.m. Saturday, July 19, according to Sam Green, coordinator of the project for the City. "We have all kinds of arts, crafts, baked goods, and other flea market items for sale," she said. The Flea Market is scheduled for Saturday from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m., and Sunday from 1 p.m. to 6 p.m. in the factory building in McLean.

"The building is large enough to give us plenty of room for displays," Mrs. Green said, "and also give us a nice, cool place for people to browse and shop."

In conjunction with the Flea Market, the merchants of McLean are planning a Christmas in July Sale in most businesses on Main Street.

"If we get good response from this flea market," Mrs. Green said "we are planning to have the sale every month in the factory building." The 25,000 square foot building was formerly the home of Marie Foundations, Mrs. Green said.

The flea market is sponsored by the City of McLean.

Unemployment Tex Coverage Expanded by 69th Legislature

The Texas Employment Commission has advised the farmers and ranchers of Texas of a dramatic increase in the number of farms and ranches that will be required to pay State Unemployment Tax on their employees.

The revisions to the Texas Unemployment Compensation Act were made by House Bill 32 which was passed in the latest session of the Texas Legislature. Prior to January 1, 1986, only agricultural employers who paid their employees a total of \$20,000.00 in a calendar quarter or those who had ten or more employees in twenty different weeks during a calendar year were required to pay unemployment tax. The new legislation lowered both the amount of wages and the number of employees rrequired.

The passage of House Bill 32 lowered the wage criteria to \$7,500 for 1986 and \$6,250 for 1987. It also lowered the employment criteria from 10 to 4 for 1986 and to 3 for 1987. Texas farmers and ranchers who met the respective requirements in the prior year must begin to pay

In addition to lowering the wage and employment criteria, unemployment tax is now levied on farmers and ranchers who employ migrant and seasonal workers, regardless of wage or employment criteria. Migrant farm and ranch workers are now covered by Unemployment Insurance and their earnings must be reported to TEC. Seasonal farm and farm, orchard or vineyard or who work for farmers or ranchers who employ migrants at the same time, same location and do the same work as migrants must also be reported.

Finally, under the new legislation, if a labor agent or crew leader provides workers to a farmer or rancher, for purposes of paying the tax the labor agent is the employer and must report wages to TEC. Also, the labor agent must present evidence to the farmer or rancher that he pays the tax. Ultimately, however, if the tax is due from the labor agent or crew leader is not paid, the farmer is responsible for

Total wages paid to workers in covered categories must be reported on or before the last day of the month following the end of the quarter, so the report for the first quarter of 1986 is due before April 30, 1986. The TEC advises liable farmers and ranchers to contact them as soon as possible, if they have not received a TEC account number, to avoid paying penalties.

TEC advises that farmers or ranchers can contact any of the field tax representatives stationed across Texas or may contact the Status Section of the Tax Department at: Texas Employment Commission, Tax Department, Status Section, Austin, TX 78778.

FmHA Guaranteed Operating Loans Doubled in Texas

The Department of Agriculture's Farmers Home Administration in Texas has made twice the number of guaranteed operating loans this year as it did at this time last year, according to FmHA, Texas State Director, J. Lynn Futch.

teed 11,024 operating loans totaling \$1 billion during fiscal 1986. At the same time in fiscal 1985, FmHA had made 5,951 guaranteed loans amounting to \$675 million. Texas has made 386 guaranteed loans for \$50 million. At the same time in As of June 4, FmHA had guaran- fiscal year 1985, Texas had made 171

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guaranteed loans for \$25 million. "After a somewhat slow start,"

futch said, "banks and other private sector lending institutions are participating to a greater extent with FmHA in providing farm operating credit to farmers who need special

"For the first time, direct farm operating loan funds have been exhausted in the states," he said. Additional requests for operating credit in Texas will have to be met through guaranteed loans."

As an example of the "new spirit of cooperation," Futch noted that in just three weeks since the announcement of Operation Assist, private lenders hav have accepted 232 FmHA loan guarantees nationwide for \$17.9 million. Under Operation Assist, FmHA County Supervisors complete paperwork for farm credit applicants and take them to a private lender to try to work out an FmHA guaranteed loan. If the private lender makes the loan. FmHA agrees to reimburse the lender up to 90 percent of any loss which may occur.

The Interest Buy Down program, authorized in the 1985 farm bill, already has resulted in 819 loans for \$83 million nationwide. Under the interest buy down, FmHA will match a reduction in interest rates by a bank of up to two points. That agreement can result in a reduction of up to 4 points for the farmers.

The Approved Lender program had attracted 1,300 banks as of April 30. An approved lender is a bank or other lending institution whose forms and paperwork have been approved covered by the new Unemployment by FmHA in advance. Guarantee requests from approved lenders are given high priority by the agency.

"Private sector lenders have accepted the new FmHA programs designed to help as many efficient farmers as possible to stay in business," Futch said. "The word is out that the Federal Government can no longer afford to meet all the demand for operating funds from farmers who are facing financial difficulty. From now on, that's a shared responsibility of both the private and public sectors."






