\$25,000 ASKED IN JOYCE McCRARY Dr. J. A. Hill To Be Principal

Suit Filed Last Week End Against Ft. Worth And Denver Railroad

Suit for \$25,000 was filed against the Fort Worth and Denver railroad last week-end asking damages for the death of Joyce McCrary, 17, who was killed March 9 when the car in which he was riding with E. L. Blanks was struck by a north bound passenger train, District Clerk Walker Lane said today.

The suit was filed by C. L. Mc-Crary, father of the victim, according to Lane.

The accident in which both Mc-Crary and blanks lost their lives, occurred about 7:30 on Wednesday morning, at the stockyards crossing east of the city. The bodies were badly mangled.
